FIRST EDITION. THE LAST TEN ROUNDS.

WALLIFE WINS FROM CARROLL BY A LUCKY BLOW. How the World's Champions Rank—The Beavers' Indoor Sports in April—Gold and Silver Medal Officers.

Speaking of the last rounds the New York Sun correspondent writes: The thirty-eight was the sensational round of the fight. Carroll forced the work and got in no less than fourteen blows on the neck and mouth.
