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# MINUTES OF THE NINTH SESSION OF THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Conference assembled in the Parkdale Methodist Church, Thursday, June 9th, 1892, at 9 a.m. The President, Rev. H. S. Matthews, took the chair, and one hour was very profitably spent in the Conference prayer meeting. The Holy Spirit's influence was powerfully manifested.

At 10 o'clock the Conference was called to order by Rev. Dr. CARMAN, General Superintendent. The members present joined in singing Hymn 534. The Secretary read 1 John iii., and Rev. H. S. MATTHEWS, President, led in prayer.

The General Superintendent delivered a powerful and soul-stirring ad-

# REPORT ON CONFERENCE BOUNDARIES.

The undersigned, having been elected last year as representatives of this Conference on the Commission on Annual Conference Boundaries, beg leave to report that they attended the meeting of the Commission which was held in this city on the 2nd of September last. The Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent, presided, and every member of the Commission was present.

After a careful survey of the whole field, the Commission was of opinion that it was desirable to divide the work in Ontario and Quebec into four Conferences, instead of six as at present, if such a rearrangement could be made on an equitable basis. The following plan seemed to be the one that met these conditions most fully, and Commission directed that it should be published in the meantime and considered at the next meeting. The division thus proposed is as follows:

1. A Conference composed of the present Montreal Conference with the addition of the Napanee and Tamworth Districts, and without the Nipissing and Sudbury Districts.

2. A Conference composed of the present Bay of Quinte Conference, less the Napanee and Tamworth Districts, but including the following districts from the present Toronto Conference, namely: Toronto East, Whitby, Bradford, Barrie, Collingwood, and Bracebridge, also Nipissing and Sudbury Districts.

3. A Conference composed of the present Guelph Conference and the following districts from the present Toronto Conference, namely: Toronto West, Brampton, Orangeville, Parry Sound, and Algoma; and from the Niagara Conference the Milton District, except Waterdown and Mill-grove Circuits.

4. A Conference composed of the present London and Niagara Conferences, but excluding the Milton District, with the exception of the Waterdown and Millgrove Circuits.

The following are some particulars relating to these proposed Conferences:

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It will be observed that in this division, not only are the numbers of ministers and members approximately equal, but the missions and different classes of circuits are fairly apportioned, and the lines of communication by rail and steamers well observed.

#### CLASS-LEADERS' CONVENTION.

The Committee appointed at the last Conference on the Class-Leaders' Convention, beg to submit the following report:—

The Conference gave the Committee power to add to their number, and it was enlarged so as to include the Superintendent and a leader from each Circuit in the two Toronto Districts.

The Convention was held on November 2nd and 3rd, 1891, and was declared by all to be an unqualified success. Two afternoon sessions and one evening session were held in the lecture-room of the Metropolitan Church, and a public meeting on the evening of the last day in the Carlton Street Church. All these meetings were largely attended and great interest manifested.

The following topics were taken up and discussed —(1) The Class-Meeting, its place in the Methodist Church; (2) The Best Methods of Sustaining a Class; (3) Mistakes of Class-Leaders; (4) Class-Meeting Literature; (5) The Model Class-Leader; (6) Classes for the Young.

On each topic a paper was read, which was followed by an invited address, and then by an open discussion. The Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent, read the opening paper, and also added materially to the interest of the Convention by taking an active part in the discussions.

The Book Steward published in pamphlet form a full report of the proceedings, which can be obtained at the Book Room. It is confidently believed that the Convention has been successful in materially adding to the interest felt in this very important means of grace.

A permanent organization of the Class Leaders of Toronto and vicinity was formed, and it is proposed to hold another convention during the com-

# REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to call attention to the following statistical items. There has been an increase of 12 in number of schools, 180 in teachers and officers, 1167 in scholars, 719 in number taking total abstinence pledge, 1305 in copies of Onward taken, \$2312.83 in all moneys raised, 56 Epworth Leagues, 2711 in membership of Epworth Leagues. But on the other hand, there has been a decrease of 94 in number of conversions, 304 in copies of Pleasant Hours taken, and 282 in number of Happy Days.

In reference to a memorial from the Brampton District recommending the appointment of a Sunday School agent for this Conference, your Committee cannot recommend such an appointment, but would suggest that the subjects of normal and home class work and the appointment of such an agent be brought before the various circuits by the pastors during the ensuing Conference Year, and would also recommend the issue of requisites for this home class work by our own publishers.

Inasmuch as attention has been called to the fact that a large number of our schools still patronize other Sunday School publications in preference to our own, and are thereby encouraging the circulation of sentiments which, in some cases at least, are neither orthodox in doctrines nor patriotic, therefore we would express our disapproval of such a course, and urge our schools everywhere to patronize our own publishing house in preference to all others.

Your Committee recommend that in all our schools the Superintendent of the Circuit see that the provisions of the Discipline be faithfully carried out by the formation of juvenile Church classes in connection with all our Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee strongly recommend that our Sunday School Hymnal, because of its excellency, be used in all our schools, and that unauthorized hymn-books be excluded from our schools and religious services; they further recommend that the Editor of our Sunday School literature be requested to be specially careful not to publish any article which unduly exalts foreign institutions and depreciates our Canadian institutions, or weakens our Canadian patriotism; and still further recommend that our own Canadian Methodist ministers be employed to contribute to the department of "Lesson Council" in the Sunday School Banner.

Your Committee would beg to recommend that Rev. Dr. Barrass be reappointed Treasurer, and finally that the report of this Committee be published in Onward, and that the Sunday School Superintendents bring it specially before the schools.

STANDING REGULATIONS OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

This fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

All ministers, whether laboring on circuits or missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts shall have their claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz., married ministers, \$600; single ordained ministers, \$300; and probationers, \$200; the amounts to embrace salary only.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all our congregations in every circuit and mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied when possible by a layman, shall visit such circuits, and shall urge on the people as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3.00 per member for all members over sixteen years of age, and every mission that it has paid an average of \$2.00 in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of

one minister and one layman from each District appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the sessions of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

A treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for this Fund, to whom the Superintendents of circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of

The Committee recommend that the time of making the collections shall not be later than the month of March.

# REPORT OF CONTINGENT FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee find that the claims presented this year far exceed the amount placed at their disposal. They have therefore been compelled, though reluctantly, to recommend for payment in many cases amounts considerably less than were asked.

The amount in the hands of the Treasurer is \$1,659.97.

# REGULATIONS REGARDING THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. The Superintendents of circuits shall pay as soon as convenient the collections taken up on their respective circuits to the Financial Secretaries, who shall remit the same to the Treasurer.

2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint.

3. No application for special claims shall be entertained by the Committee unless they have passed the fourth Quarterly Meeting, and have been signed by the Recording Steward and recommended by the District Meeting; also no special claim shall be entertained where the claimant receives \$900 or over as appropriation from his circuit.

4. All applications for expenses incurred in the service of the Church, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted in detail to the Committee for their investigation.

5. No grants shall be made for ministerial supply on account of affliction when the circuit is deemed competent to pay for said supply, and in no case shall a grant be made for more than the salary of a single minister.

6. If grants be made to Districts to assist dependent circuits, said grants shall be fairly apportioned to the circuits claiming aid by the Financial District Meeting.

7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee, to whom was referred all matters relating to Temperance and Temperance work, beg leave to report as follows:-

In reference to the question of Temperance in our Sabbath Schools, your Committee, recognizing the importance of making total abstinence a cardinal principle with the young, would recommend the placing of Pledge Books in all the schools. Such books to be in two parts; the

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first part to be headed with the following pledge: "I hereby promise, God helping me, to abstain from the use of all distilled, fermented and malt liquors, including wine, beer and cider, as a beverage, and to employ all proper means to discourage the use of, and traffic in; the same." second part to be headed with the following pledge: - "I hereby promise, God helping me, to abstain from using profane or obscene language; also to abstain from the use of tobacco in any form, including cigarettes, and to discourage the use of both in all proper ways." And also that the Superintendents and officers of the schools be enjoined to use all diligence in securing, as far as they reasonably can, the names of all pupils and teachers in their respective schools to one or both of these pledges, as they may be able. That the pledges be presented for signature to the entire school at least once each quarter, and that the Superintendents be requested to not only urge upon the schools the necessity of signing the pledges, but that they endeavor frequently to impress upon the pupils the sacred character of a pledge, its solemnity, and the grievous sin of violating it.

Your Committee would recommend an additional column in the Sabbath School Report immediately after the one asking "How many have taken the total abstinence pledge," and to read "How many have taken the pledge against profane language and tobacco?" Your Committee would strongly recommend the introduction of the Temperance Text-Books into all the public schools.

We also beg to call attention to the recent legislation for the prevention of the use by, and sale to minors under sixteen years, of tobacco and cigarettes, and would commend to the consideration of the Church generally the propriety of rendering what assistance they can in enforcing the penalties for its violation, believing that indulgence in this pernicious habit by the young begets and fosters an appetite for stimulants, which, though gradually and unsuspectingly, yet almost certainly, and sometimes rapidly, grows into a demand for intoxicants, thus leading the youthful victim unconsciously from what he considers a pleasant pastime down to sin, inebriety and death. Since the passage of the Act in question, an instrument, similar to the one used by vendors of chewing-gum, is being placed on the streets, and while a notice is posted at the top, saying, "No boys under sixteen allowed to draw," the facts are, these are its best patrons and customers.

We also beg to call attention to what we deem an impropriety existing to a greater or less extent in many of the schools, viz., that of allowing persons to act in the capacity of teachers who are neither Christians nor total abstainers, remembering the admonition of our blessed Lord, respecting the blind leading the blind. We commend to the careful consideration of the Superintendents and officers of the schools the propriety of a cessation of this custom, and a replacing of all such by those who are (1) Chris ians; (2) Total Abstainers.

With pleasure the Conference received the deputation of the W. C. T. U. We recognize the holy enthusiasm and cheerful faith in which the noble band of praying women have entered into the most notable crusade of modern times, against the common enemy of the human race in the form of the liquor traffic of the Dominion, and we beg to assure them that the hearts and energies, the schools, pulpits, and homes of Methodists, are with them in this glorious war. We hope that the day may soon come

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when all our women will have the right to speak for their homes at the ballot box, and thus hasten the exit of the iniquitous license to sell intoxicants from the statute books of our land.

Your Committee would emphasize the necessity of enjoining upon our members not to elect any man to any municipal, or other office, who is not a total abstainer, and ready to use his voice and influence for the entire annihilation of the traffic.

In view of all past legislation in this country in regard to the liquor traffic, we are convinced that the evil cannot be met and overcome so long as the political parties are committed to a policy of license; and we are further convinced that the attitude of the parties on this question will not change so long as they receive the support of Christian We therefore earnestly ask our people to consider carefully what their duty is in this important matter, and whether the time has not come when the Christian sentiment of the country should be organized in a party, free from all complicity in the liquor traffic.

We would also emphasize the necessity of organizing in the form of some of the Temperance organizations; not only during an agitation for the passage of local option, by-laws, or any other prohibitory measure, but

for their rigorous enforcement when adopted.

We would strongly urge that every effort shall be put forth for the adoption and enforcement of the local option law in all municipalities.

Your Committee strongly regret that no action was taken upon the petitions of the different Temperance organizations and Churches of this province, presented at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, relative to the renewal of licenses to sell liquor in taverns and shops. Said petitions asked that no license should be renewed where a majority of the legislative electors in the polling sub-division wherein the house was situated petitioned the license commissioners not to grant a renewal of the same.

We believe the embodiment of this clause in the License Act would have a very salutary effect, and we would therefore recommend that Conference take such action in the matter as in their judgment will tend to bring

about this desirable end.

We strongly approve of the action of the Dominion Alliance in reconmending the appointment of a suitable counsel to accompany the Reval Commission appointed to gather information in reference to the evils of the liquor traffic; and would recommend the co-operation of Conference in aiding them in this very important work.

Your Committee would recommend as Delegates to the Council of the Dominion Alliance, the following, viz. :- Rev. G. J. Bishop, President of the Conference; Rev. A. Langford, with the Rev. D. Cattenach, as alternate; also Sheriff Bowles, of Orangeville; E. J. Davis, M.P.P., with H.

Your Committee feel that language fails in portraying, in its true light, the debauching sin of strong drink, as well as the filthy and injurious evils arising from the use of tobacco and cigarettes, and would commend to both Church and school strong aggressive action for their suppression

Brethren, let us rise in our might and clear the skirts of the Methodist

Church of these crying evils.

# SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurers for the Year ending July 31st, 1891, as adopted by the Board.

We beg herewith to submit the Annual Statement of the Superannuation Fund:—

The affairs of the Fund occupied the earnest consideration of the General Conference, which body appointed a commission, consisting of ministers and laymen, representing different shades of opinion, to take the whole question into consideration, and report to the next General Conference.

The commission has met, and appointed sub-committees to collect information from a great variety of sources, and present it in tabulated form. Important beneficial results may be expected from the thorough and impartial examination of the whole question.

The amount raised from Circuits has exceeded that of the previous year by \$1,862.04. It is, however, just to state that a small portion of this increase arises from back payments on account of former years. The Interest Account is also in advance of the former year, \$1,249.37, and the Book Room has added \$200 to the grant of the preceding year, making the yearly grant now \$6,500.

We have received in legacies this year \$6,437.25, which sum embraces the half of the legacy of the late William Gooderham. There appears to be a praiseworthy disposition on the part of our people to remember this Fund in the final distribution of their property.

We are, however, still under the necessity of expressing our regret that there are a few Circuits that have failed to pay their apportionments in full, to the great embarrassment of the ministers laboring on them, and to the great injury of the Church. The aggregate amount is not comparatively very large, but the example is bad and it is not just to those Conferences and Circuits that are loyal to the laws of the Church.

The new claims this year are exceptionally large and amount to \$9,630, while expired claims are only \$5,848, leaving a balance of \$3,782, less \$382, being the difference between the debt of the last year and the present one, or \$3,400 to be provided for, the entire claims for the year being \$87,084. The estimated income of the Fund will be about \$85,534, so far as we can at present ascertain. The Treasurers did not, however, feel at liberty to increase the percentage on the assessable income.

#### TORONTO EAST DISTRICT.

Davisville.—That the request of the Trustees of Davisville Church, to exchange three feet of land in the rear of the church lot, in order to secure better shed accommodation, be grarted.

Scarboro'.—That permission be given to the Trustees of Scarboro' Circuit to sell the burying ground in connection with the church now belonging to the Presbyterian body, the proceeds to be applied to repairing the burying ground of the Wexford Church.

#### TORONTO WEST DISTRICT.

Elm Street.—That request of Trustees to sell the parsonage at No. 35 Elm Street, be granted. Proceeds to be applied according to provisions of Discipline.

## REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee on Memorials beg leave to report that, after having considered with care the various matters referred to them, they recommend as follows:—

#### CLAUSE I.

Regarding the subject of communication from the Prisoners' Aid Association, our recommendation is that Revs. Dr. Johnston, Dr. Galbraith, W. J. Maxwell, J. E. Starr, G. N. Rutledge, and Messrs. Mayor Fleming, ex-Ald. Score, ex-Ald. Vokes, J. B. Willmott, D.D.S., J. W. St. John, B.A., be appointed a committee to represent the Toronto Conference in assisting the Association to accomplish the objects before it, and that the Secretary of Conference forward these names to the Secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association.

#### CLAUSE II.

The following copy of a resolution passed at the last Provincial Sabbath School Association, held in Ottawa, in October, 1891, was received:—

Resolved,—That in view of the low tone of public morals, notably in the duties of citizenship, of which such sad instances have of late been made manifest in our midst, this Convention believes that the time has come for definite action in the diriction of giving the Bible a more pronounced and positive position in our Educational Institutions; and would respectfully urge the Church courts to take up the best method of giving effect to this matter, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to such courts.

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Your Committee would recommend in this case, that a small committee be appointed by this Conference to confer with such similar committees as may be appointed by other Churches and Conferences for the purpose of suggesting needful remedial legislation, and report to the next Conference.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on the Epworth League is pleased to report that the League has doubled during the past year in this Conference, there being 114 Leagues and 5,004 members, and have raised \$3,118.

There are 160 Circuits, with 477 preaching places, in this Conference, which shows that the young people of our churches are not fully organized in connection with the Epworth League

Your Committee, while recognizing the fact that a large number are working in the Society of Christian Endeavor and in local organizations, would emphasize the importance of all the Young People's Societies in the Methodist Church being identified with the Epworth League. Our young people should be so organized that the Conference could get complete statistics, and have a direct oversight of their work. The Young People's Society should not only be for the Church, but a recognized and controlled department of work in the Church. To this end we urge Methodist Christian Endeavor Societies to adopt the name Epworth/Leagues of Christian Endeavor, and thus enjoy all the privileges of the League, and also request that other Societies should avail themselves of the advantages of the Epworth League Constitution, and thus become a regular department of work in the Church.

Since the Young People's Society is regarded as the connecting link between the Sunday School and the Church, it should not be used as a mere means of recreation, of entertainment, or of money raising but for systematic Bible study, training in Christian work, and the development of Christian character. If this Society be a graduation from the Sunday School, then it should be organized around a higher study of the Bible in connection with the promotion of Christian experience, by prayer and fellowship. Our Leagues should always bear in mind "that the department of Christian Endeavor shall always be essential and fundamental in the organization and working of an Epworth League." When a Society attends merely to literary or social work, it ceases to be a League.

Your Conmittee would specially emphasize the importance of the Pledges. Let all the members be pledged and made to feel their obligation. At the monthly roll call have the Pledges repeated by each class of members. All who are members of the Church should take the active member's pledge. We suggest the holding of missionary and other meetings, for special purposes, at which five minute addresses and papers may be given on specified topics bearing upon the object; also the holding of a League Anniversary, at which the place and importance of young people's work may receive attention; and also the formation of Junior

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Leagues for youths under sixteen years of age, to be superintender by competent leaders.

For the more systematic prosecution of the work, we also recommend the holding of District Conventions for all Methodist Young People's Societies.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH, OBSERVANCE

Your Committee is becoming the more profoundly convinced of the grave importance of the question of Sabbath observance, and having given due consideration to the subject, beg leave to report as follows:

That as a Dominion we have reasons for sincere thanksgiving to the Great Head of the Church, because we enjoy in a pre-eminent degree the quiet and rest of the Sabbath Day.

We would record our appreciation of the continued efforts of Ma. Charlton, M.P., and others, to obtain better legislation for the observance of the Sabbath, securing to the vast number of employees on railways, and all other modes of transportation, their just right to have their Sabbath as a day of rest.

We wish to remind the Conference of the successful resistance made to the attempted innovation upon the sanctity of the Sabbath day, by the running of street cars in Toronto, and we desire herein to thankfully acknowledge that this result was attributable to the valuable assistance of the public press, and in no small degree to the valuable aid rendered by the ladies, as well as by the trades and labor unions and other organizations of the city, and we trust that the representatives of the people will still jealously guard the day as the Sabbath of the Lord. And we would recommend both ministers and people to give no sanction whatever to Sunday travelling, by using Sunday trains, street cars, or other public conveyances, or in beginning or ending journeys on the Sabbath.

We sincerely regret the widespread practice of Sabbath visiting, pleasure driving, boating, and other amusements, and unprofitable conversation on the Lord's Day, and respectfully urge our people to avoid all such pratices, and everything that in any way borders on the desecration of the day.

We are pleased to know that in the city of Toronto the burial of the dead has been largely discontinued on the Sabbath; and we recommend our people throughout the bounds of the Conference, so far as possible, to make such arrangements as to avoid the custom of having Sunday funerals.

And we would also recommend to our people the discontinuance of all shopping and labor after six o'clock Saturday evening, thereby giving due time for preparation for the duties of the Sabbath, and to encourage the discontinuance of the delivery of milk on the Lord's Day, or at least more than once on the day, and then not later than half-past nine in the morning.

Believing that Church parades of societies and volunteers in uniform, accompanied by bands of music, on Sabbath afternoons, materially inter-

fere with the work of the Sunday Schools, destroy the quiet and sanctity of the Sabbath, and seriously militate against the general interests for which the holy day is set apart, your Committee strongly recommend that our pastors and Church Boards co-operate for the discouragement and discontinuance of such parades on the Sabbath day, suggesting that such services be welcomed in our churches on a week evening.

We would also deprecate any departure from the simplicity of divine worship, so nearly associated with the Lord's Day, such as the holding of musical services bearing the character of Sunday concerts, and trust that our ministers and church officials will give no countenance to mere musical performances, believing that they have the tendency of diverting the attention of the people from the purity of divine worship, and the importance of Scripture teaching, and in the place of this to encourage our people in more hearty congregational singing.

And that, whereas the directors of the Columbian Exposition, to be held in Chicago next year, propose to endanger the sanctity of the Sabbath, by announcing a programme in which they proclaim their intention to keep open the Exposition. We would endorse and co-operate with all efforts that are now being made to resist the invasion of the sanctity of the Lord's Day, and would forward to our Government and the authorities in charge a strong resolution condemning the same. We would, more

in charge, a strong resolution condemning the same. We would, moreover, strongly urge our Canadian exhibitors to refrain from the display of their product and merchandise during the Sabbath; and would recommend that a committee be appointed to prepare and forward a memorial to that effect.

We would repeat the recommendation of former years, that the subject of Sabbath observance be frequently brought before the minds of our people in the public discourses of our ministers, and in the instructions of the Sabbath Schools.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee is pleased to be able to report an increase in the membership of the Church of between two and three hundred. That it is not larger is in part due to the many removals to the North-west and other places. Our Sunday School work has been well sustained, and the reports indicate a healthy condition and steady growth in all its branches.

Your Committee very carefully considered the memorial from the Toronto East District in regard to the attendance of children at the regular services of the Church, and the lack of reverance sometimes seen in our congregations. We are of opinion that children should attend, at least, one regular preaching service each Sunday. That greater respect for public worship would be cultivated by families sitting together in the sanctuary, and by kindly remarks about the service in the homes. Great care should be exercised in the selection of Church and Sunday School officials, as their conduct very materially affects the behaviour of congregations.

We respectfully call attention to a suggestion in the Minutes of last year, that every young man shall spend two years in mission work, before being put in charge of a Circuit, if possible. We commend the practice of having voluntary weekly offerings, in preference to high pew rents, and especially urge our ministers to instruct the people in the duty and privilege of systematic giving. We regard this as a vely important means of grace.

The report of last year called attention to the need of reorganizing the work in some places. We believe our people are beginning to see the necessity of uniting small congregations, and we would encourage this when practicable. We regret that some fields are so divided that it is not possible to sustain an ordained man. A different arrangement would, in some cases, relieve the Missionary Society of unjust burdens, and in others provide wise oversight for young and growing congregations.

The recent census shows that our Church continues to be the largest Protestant Church in the Dominion, and that it has also made the largest increase in proportion to the population. A gratifying evidence that God is with us, and that the fire that lived in the hearts of our fathers is still burning on our altars, is seen in the number of young men and women consecrating themselves to missionary work.

We believe that the organization of our young people into Societies for Christian work, under proper oversight, is helpful to every interest of the Church. Every member of the Church should be trained to work for the Master, and these Societies, properly conducted, afford the opportunity for such training.

It is earnestly hoped that only such singing as has the effect of increasing true devotional and spiritual worship be encouraged in our churches. We cannot but condemn those merely artistic exhibitions where the words are not distinctly pronounced, and the only effect is that produced in the ordinary concert.

While we rejoice in many marks of progress, there is reason for deep humiliation before God that we have not been more successful in winning souls for Him.

We trust that there will be more entire consecration to God and His work in the coming year, and feel confident that abundant blessings will result from it.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DEACONESSES.

This Committee was appointed at the last Annual Meeting of this Conference under the following resolution:—

Resolved,—That in accordance with the permission given by paragraph 122 of the Discipline, relating to the systematic organization of consecrated Christian women, similar to the order of Deaconesses in Primitive Christianity, this Conference appoint a committee consisting of nine members to carefully consider the whole question, and report to the next Conference on the following, among other points:—

- 1. To what extent the labors of such Christian women are now used.
- To what branches of work such labors may be profitably directed.
   What organization, if any, of such workers is desirable.
- 4. What relations such workers should bear to the pastor and the Quarterly Boards of the churches.

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5. Whether a home is desirable, and if so, what its relations should be to the Toronto Districts, and what general regulations regarding the same are recommended.

Your Committee has had several meetings during the year, and has obtained such information on the subject referred to them as was within their reach, and begs to submit the following summary of the result of

the enquiries :-

We find that a very large part of the work in connection with our charches is carried on by devoted Christian women. They are very actively engaged as class-leaders, as teachers in the Sunday Schools, as workers in the Women's Missionary Society, in mission circles, as collectors for the General Missionary Society, as workers in Ladies' Aid and Dorcas Societies, Epworth League, Mission Schools, in visiting and relieving the poor and the sick, and in other departments of Church work. There have also been some who have been actively engaged as evangelists; but your Committee is not aware of any in this Conference who now devote their whole time to this work. Some churches in Toronto have had ladies to assist the pastors in visiting, etc. We are aware of only one church which has at present a lady so employed. Our Christian women are also actively engaged in the Women's Christian Temperance Union and other

laudable enterprises not of a denominational character.

The Modern Deaconess movement originated in Germany in 1821, and there are now about 10,000 Protestant Deaconesses working in about 1,500 fields, representing the Lutheran, Episcopalian, Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist Churches. In England, homes have been established by Florence Nightingale, Rev. Dr. T. Bowman Stephenson, Dr. Barnardo and the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes. In the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, the first home and training school was established in Chicago by private enterprise. The General Conference of 1888 made provision for the work by the Discipline. They are required to give their whole time to their duties; must serve a probation of two years, be over twenty-five years of age, and are governed by a board of nine members (three of whom must be women) appointed by the Annual Conference. Homes are now established in some twenty-five of the cities of the United States. With a number of these your Committee has been in correspondence, and has obtained from them reports, copies of regulations and other information. Some of the Deaconesses act as nurses, others as visitors. In most of the homes the number of these are about equal. The only remuneration is board and clothing, and a small monthly allowance of about two dollars.

In most of the homes training and instructions are given to women who wish to qualify themselves for various departments of Chrisfian work without becoming Deaconesses, and in some of them special training to those who intend to enter the mission field.

The average cost for the support of each Deaconess is about \$200 or Nurses receive no remuneration from those they wait upon, but donations are frequently made to the funds by those benefited or by their friends. Some of the homes are rented, others are the gifts of friends. The expenses are met by collections and donations.

Judging from the experience and practice in the Methodist Episcopal Church, a home seems to be an essential part of the system. We think if

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one is established in this Conference it should be under the direct control of the Conference through a Board (part of which should be ladies) appointed by the Conference.

The home should be under the charge of a competent and qualified lady superintendent, as much of its success must depend on the wisdom of this

Any church desiring the services of a Deaconess might arrange to secure them, and she would then be under the direction of the pastor and Quarterly Board.

Your Committee is of opinion that during the coming year the enquiries already begun should be further prosecuted, and that a special committee or provisional board should be appointed by this Conference to take preliminary steps, such as securing finances, selecting candidates and other necessary provisions with a view to maturing definite plans for submission to the next meeting of this Conference.

Your Committee presents herewith the communications and literature on the subject, which it has received from various quarters.

That Sault Ste. Marie be changed from a circuit to a mission.

# REPORTS OF COLLEGES.

Mr. Cox presented the Annual Report of the Directors of Ontario Ladies' College. Rev. Dr. Hare spoke in reference to the work done in the College.

Moved by Rev. W. J. Maxwell, seconded by John T. Moore,

That we have heard with inexpr ssible satisfaction and delight the brief recital of the successes of the Ontario Ladies' College for the past year. We are aware that the well merited popularity and unflagging zeal of the efficient principal and his excellent staff, the prevailing harmony within the College walls, the loyalty of the students to the discipline, as

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well as their close attention to the prescribed studies, under the blessing of God have resulted in a year of unparalled prosperity. We assure the College authorities of our cordial and increased support and sympathy. We present to them our warmest congratulations, and pray that they may abound yet more and more in numbers and excellence.

Dr. Johnston read extracts from the Report of the Wesleyan Ladies'

College, Hamilton.

Moved by Dr. Johnston, seconded by W. A. Massey,

That we have listened with great satisfaction to the report of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton. We rejoice in the well merited success which has attended the efforts of the Faculty, and that this oldest Ladies' College in Ontario is still abreast of any educational requirement of the times, and its halls thronged with students. We pray that the educational and religious success of the past may still crown-this Christian institution, founded through the efforts of some of the noblest ministers and laymen in Canadian Methodism.

Principal Austin read the Annual Report of the Alma Ladies' College, and Mr. J. H. Coyne, Registrar of Elgin, spoke of the work done by the

College.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Parker, seconded by Rev. Marmaduke L. Pearson, That this Conference has heard with great satisfaction the report of Alma Ladies' College, as presented by the Rev. Principal Austin, and James H. Coyne, Esq., M.A., Registrar of Elgin. We note particularly the large attendance of pupils, made up of respresentatives of the different denominations, their spiritual estate, and their marked proficiency in the subjects of the comprehensive curriculum, eminently qualifying them for collegiate appointments, and especially that out of three full advanced certificates in Art, granted this year by the Provincial Educational Department, Alma has had two granted. We congratulate the gifted principal upon the practical sympathy and support given by the Western Conferences, and express the hope that the appointment of a Financial and Educational Secretary may prove an unqualified success.

Rev. G. Webber read the report of Albert College, which was on motion received by the Conference.

## OBITUARIES.

#### JOSEPH WESLEY McCALLUM.

In the death of the Rev. Joseph Wesley McCallum, the Methodist Church has lost another of its most devoted and successful ministers. He was born in Smithville, Ontario, on the 19th of January, 1819, and was, therefore, in his seventy-third year at the time of his decease, which occurred, in this city, on the 29th of June last. He was a descendant, both on his father's and his mother's side, of the United Empire Loyalists, and possessed in an eminent degree the sterling qualities of that remarkable race to whom the Dominion of Canada owes so much. Joseph McCallum and Elizabeth Howe, the parents of the subject of this sketch, were among the first fruits of the labors of the pioneer preachers by whom this form of Christianity was planted in that part of Upper Canada, and were Christians of the old-fashioned Methodist type. Among the earliest recollections of their son, was that of overhearing his father in the stillness of the early morning while the rest of the household were still asleep, pleading for him in prayer, and of his mother leading him to the class-meeting when he was yet a little child.

In view of these circumstances, it is not remarkable that our deceased brother, who was of a peculiarly serious and thoughtful turn of mind, and possessed of a deep religious nature, was in very early life the subject of profound religious impressions. It was not, however, until he was twelve years of age that he became the subject of that great change which gave its coloring to the whole of his after life. It was then that he attained to the knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of sins, and the Spirit itself bore witness with his spirit that he was a child of God. Because he was a son, God sent forth into his heart the spirit of his Son, crying "Abba, Father." Of the genuineness of this early conversion, concerning which he himself never had any doubt, the uniform consistency, eminent devotion, and extraordinary usefulness of after years afforded the most indubitable proof.

Even from his boyhood he had the impression that he was called of God to the work of the ministry, and according to his opportunity he labored to prepare himself for that high calling. His educational advantages were not great, but he availed himself to the utmost of such facilities as the part of the country in which he lived afforded for intellectual improvement. Above all he sought, by the cultivation of regular habits of devotion, and by living in habitual communion with God, for that spiritual unction and power which he rightly judged to be even more important and more essential to the highest form of minis-

terial success than any merely literary or even theological training.

He did not, however, set a light value on intellectual acquirements and training. If there was anything connected with his religious and ministerial life that caused him regret in the retrospect, it was the fact that the scarcity of men, and the pressing exigencies of the work, led to his being thrust out into the active duties of the ministry as he believed somewhat representations.

the active duties of the ministry, as he believed, somewhat prematurely. But "what is the chaff to the wheat?" What are the mere accessories to the work of the ministry to that work itself? "He that winneth souls is wise." And to Joseph Wesley McCallum this divine wisdom was given in an eminent degree. He entered the ministry in 1842, and it is scarcely too much to say that he lived in the atmosphere of revival down to the close of his ministry in 1890, if not to the close of his life. He was one of those men who had a passion for soul-saving. And this passion knew no dimpution with advancing years, but rather grew stronger until the close of life. He could not rest while anyone at all within the sphere of his influence was not saved, or, at least, he had done what he could to snatch him as a brand from

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of Beu as to fi he was hension moment One the burning. Whitby was the first circuit on which he labored, and during the two years that he spent there, there were some hundreds of souls brought to God and added to the Church. And though the numbers gathered into the Church in other places were not, perhaps, so large, on all his circuits more or less extensive revivals took place, and the spiritual interests of the Church were promoted.

It would be difficult to determine which contributed most largely, to the remarkable success of Mr. McCallum's ministry, his public preaching of the Word, or his private ministrations in the homes of the people. Both were well adapted to the attainment of the end which he had constantly in view, namely, the salvation of souls. A certain minister who had been favored with a great revival in his church, explaining to his brethren how it had been brought about, among other things, said that he had been led during many months to preach pleading sermons to his people, beseeching them to be reconciled to God. bulk of Mr. McCallum's sermons, if not all of them, were of this kind. He was always serious in the pulpit; anything like lightness there would have been to his apprehension a desecration of that sacred place. He was always honest in his appeals to the conscience, and always affectionate and tender. But, above all, he was an organ of the Spirit, a voice, the voice of one crying in the wilderness-and there was a divine unction that attended his ministry which was its crowning glory, and the secret of its power. As a pastor, he especially excelled. As a house-to-house visitor among the people, he had few equals. His were not merely social visits, calls of ceremony, or even pastoral calls designed to remind the people that he had not forgotten them. He went about among the people everywhere, and always in the spirit of Him who said, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" Like Him, he went about doing good. The spirit of the Lord God was upon him, because He had anointed him to preach good tidings unto the meek. He had sent him to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound, . . . to comfort all that mourn in Zion, to give them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness. And in this spirit, and with these ends in view, he preached publicly and from house to house.

The underlying fact of his whole life was the simplicity of his purpose, the singleness of his aim. His eye was single and his whole body was full of light. He was a man of one book, and a man of one work. Though he was an uncommonly busy man, nothing was permitted to interfere with the time aletted for devotion and for the devout and prayerful study of the inspired Word. It may be added that he observed the regular weekly fast down to the end of his life. He was pre-eminently a man of prayer. What was said of Bishop Asbury might be said of equal truthfulness of him: "He prayed, and prayed, and prayed, until the wonder was what he could find to pray for." was not from a mere sense of duty that he spent those frequent and protracted seasons of communion with God. It was his solace and his delight to be permitted to come face to face with his Heavenly Father, and to converse with Him as a man converses with his friend. His devoted wife was at times alarmed when she met him coming out of his study bathed in tears, and scarcely able to stand up under the weight of glory that rested upon him. Of late, as the interval that separated between the Church below and the Church above became contracted, these gracious and extraordinary manifestations became more frequent and glorious. Like Edward Payson, before his death Mr. McCallum appears to have been for many months a dweller in the Land of Beulah; and to him the Sun of Righteousness had become so large and full as to fill the whole hemisphere. Heaven itself had come so near to him that he was only separated from it by the stream of death, and that to his apprehension had dwindled into an insignificant rill, that he might step over at any

One experience of this good man in the immediate prospect of death is

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particularly noteworthy. He said to his wife and children gathered about his bed, that in looking back upon the past he had no regrets. He could not desire that his life had been different from what it had been. If he had it to live over again, he would do just what he had done. No wonder that with such a retrospect, feeling that the whole of his religious and ministerial life had been accepted and approved of God, he was able to say to his little granddaughter: "Birdie, it is an easy thing to die; only live right and there will be nothing hard in dying." Death for him had no sting, the grave had no terrors. Like Paul, he had fought the good fight, he had finished his course, he had kept the faith, and henceforth there was a crown of righteousness laid up for him, which the Lord, the Righteous Judge, should give unto him; and not to him only, but to all them also who love his appearing. The death of such a man is a translation, it is simply passing from a state of grace to a state of glory, from the free and loving service rendered to God by a loyal and devoted heart on earth to the higher form of service, the same in kind but exalted in degree in heaven. The sun has sunk below the horizon here only to rise with increased effulgence in a happier sphere. We think not of our revered and beloved brother as dead, but as enjoying a fulness of life of which even in his most ecstatic moments in this world he probably never

In 1846 Mr. McCallum was united in marriage to Miss Mary McBrian, of the township of Whitby, who proved to be a real helpmeet to him, and why, after having shared with her devoted husband the cares, the responsibilities, and the labors of the itinerancy for forty-five years, has already followed him to the better land. The whole of his family, consisting of two sons and four daughters, with the exception of one son who resides in the State of Washington, reside in Toronto. His eldest daughter is the wife of Mr. Alderman McDougall. His second daughter is the wife of Uzziel Ogden, Esq., M.D., well-known as one of the leading physicians of Toronto. Two daughters—one of them remarkable for her gift of song—remain unmarried. And his son, James McCallum, Esq., M.D., a rising physician, is the assistant and partner of his brother-in-law, Dr. Ogden. To these the memory of their father is a perpetual

#### KENNEDY CREIGHTON

was born at Tamalaght, near the city of Londonderry, Ireland, in 1814. His father was not a religious man until late in life, but his mother, who died when he was eleven years of age, was a devout and godly woman. He did not date his conversion at any particular time, having been from early childhood religiously inclined. His pious grandmother cared for his spiritual welfare, and took him and the other members of the family to the house of God. Being gifted with a good voice, he soon became precentor in the Presbyterian church, where the family attended. His love of music led him in after years to seek relaxation from study, and often, on flute or violin, afforded pleasure to his family by playing some of the thost popular airs of his native land. In 1834, in company with his brother James, and his sister, he came to this country, and joined his father, who had preceded them. They settled in the township of Dorchester, near London, and he was immediately employed as a teacher—a work for which he was well qualified, and in which he was very successful. In 1836 he married Miss Laura S. Hart, who survives him, and who for fifty-six years shared with him the toils and privations of the itinerancy, as well as the joys and sorrows incident to life. To her he was devotedly attached, and during the last years of his life, while so dependent upon her care, his grateful recognition of her loving attentions was at times very touch-In the same year he entered the ministry of the New Connexion Methodist Church, and in 1840 joined the ranks of the Wesleyan Ministry. During

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the following year he was received into full connexion and ordained. He soon rose to distinction as a preacher and a pastor, occupying among others such places as Peterboro', St. Thomas, Dundas, Woodstock, Brantford, London, St. Catharines, Collingwood and Owen Sound. In 1854 he was appointed chairman of a district, and from that time until 1872 he held at intervals this position, with credit to himself and advantage to the Church. interest in young men who were probationers for the ministry, and generously looked after their temporal, intellectual and spiritual welfare. Brother Creighton manifested a desire for education very early in life, and while yet a child became quite proficient in the Latin language. were continued through the whole of his ministry. His sermons were largely These studious habits expository, and keeping abreast of the times, they were always fresh and inter-He would often rise at five o'clock in the morning for the purpose of assisting his children in acquiring an education. His exceptionally neat penmanship soon brought him forward as district and financial secretary, and the Conference of 1859 elected him the secretary of that body. He held advanced views on the great temperance reform, and believed in the entire prohibition of the liquor traffic. On the platform, in the pulpit and through the press he advanced powerful arguments against this giant evil. While an independent thinker, he was extremely modest, shrank from notoriety, and seemed to care little for place or power. Had he been more self-asserting he would doubtless have taken a still higher place among his brethren. He seldom took part in Conference debates, but when he did he was always heard with respectful attention. He did not ask, "Is it expedient?" but "Is it right?" He was true to his convictions, and stood up in defence of the weak with a courage as rare as it was refreshing. After preaching for twenty years, he was compelled by throat trouble to seek a superannuated relation for one year and took a farm in the neighborhood where he first settled. Such was his devotion to the work of God that he commenced preaching at what is now known as Oliver's appointment, on the Dorchester Circuit. His son, John, assisted by his sister, now Mrs. Harvie, started a Sunday School. His brother, James Creighton, and family, one of whom is a probationer for the ministry, together with his sister, Mrs. English, and family, are all members or adherents of the Methodist Church. Thus the seed scattered more than thirty years ago is still growing, and will, beyond question, yield an abundant harvest. While ministering to the King Street congregation in the city of Toronto, he was stricken with paralysis, and for the last seven years was almost completely helpless. malady affected his mind and speech to such an extent that it was difficult to converse with him but it is the opinion of those who visited and conversed with him concerning his hopes of heaven that he might have said,

When death o'er nature shall prevail, And all the powers of language fail, Joy through my swimming eyes shall break, And mean the thanks I cannot speak.

There is not a shadow of doubt but that he fully trusted in the Saviour, whom he preached for nearly half a century. Firm in his family discipline he secured their respect and love. Four of his six children preceded him to the better land. Two remain, Mrs. Harvie, wife of J. Harvie, secretary of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and the Rev. John Creighton, D.D., presiding elder of the Milwaukee District of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States. On February 10th last, the weary wheels of life stood still, and the mortal put on immortality. In the evening a few friends gathered at his daughter's residence, and an interesting service was held, in which the Rev. Mr. Wallace (Presbyterian), Doctors Briggs, Potts, Barrass, Shaw and Hunt took part. The next morning the remains were conveyed to London, and with suitable services were deposited in the family burying ground, where they await the resurrection of the just.

## WM. PIRRITTE, D.D.,

was born at Kingston, July 7th, 1829. He was the second son of the late John Pirritte, an officer of the Seventy-ninth Highlanders, H.M.S., who, with his family, moved to Little York, the same year in which our subject was born. Later they removed to Weston, where William received his early education under the able instruction of the late John Paul, M.A.

Bro. Pirritte was converted in a special service conducted by the Rev. W. D.

Hughson, in the spring of 1849.

Hardened by sin, and aiming to perfect himself in the fruit of skepticism, he attended this means of grace out of mere curiosity. But God's Spirit laid hold of him, deep pungent conviction was followed by penitence and surrender, soon to be succeeded by a consciousness of sins forgiven.

His mother's faithful teaching of the doctrine of a personal God unto whom

we are all accountable, he used to say, saved him from infidelity.

The subject of much rejoicing in his conversion, he at once sought out his companions in sin, and bore testimony to them of a personal Saviour, and as a first essay in doing good, he labored to produce in them "like precious fath."

He at once united with the late Methodist Episcopal Church, and in 1850 was made a local preacher. One year later he was sent to assist the Rev. Amos Roy, on the Whitby Circuit, was received into the conference of 1852 as a

probationer, ordained deacon in 1854, and elder in 1856.

Continuing in the active ministry until removed by death, except two years in which frail health made it imperative for him to rest, he travelled the Nelson and Oakville, Darlington, Orono, Hamilton, Brooklin, Belleville, Georgetown, Newmarket, Orangeville, Meaford, St. Clarens Ave., Toronto, and Davenport Circuits. He also served on a couple of stations in the Ohio Conference Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States. He was also for some years presiding elder, exhibiting executive ability of a high order; also assistant-editor and afterwards editor-in-chief of the Canadian Christian Advocate, wielding a vigorous pen, and keeping pace with the literary requirements of a large constituency of readers, while ofttimes contributing to other literary periodicals, and acting as regular correspondent of Zion's Herald.

As a preacher, Dr. Pirritte was clear, logical, scriptural and eloquent. Quite early in his ministry he was recognized as a man of more than ordinary ability, which promise was fully borne out by his successful career. Bro. Pirritte filled a large sphere of usefulness in the work of moral and social reform, being a most able and vigorous champion of temperance, both in this country and the United States. He enjoyed in a large degree the confidence of his brethren in the Church, who recognized in him the elements of intellectual strength and Christian manhood, and conferred upon him the highest honors in the gift of this conference, electing him secretary in 1886, and president in 1890; and Victoria University in 1887 conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

He was twice married; first to Miss Lucy Huckins, of Whitby, in 1854, who died in 1865; and again to Miss Alzina Winchell, of Palermo, in 1867, who, with their two conditions of the conditions and the conditions are considered in the conditions of the conditions of the conditions are conditionally conditions.

with their two sons, still survive him.

For some years his health was precarious, necessitating a temporary rest, and

although somewhat improved, his old time vigor never returned.

The opening of the past Conference year found him much debilitated, yet he entered upon his work with earnestness and hope, only, however, to be stricken down with physical weakness from which he never recovered. For several weeks he passed the days in pain, at times almost beyond endurance, until consciousness departed and death ended his sufferings. While able to converse with his friends he witnessed to the abiding presence of Christ. He passed into the life beyond on Monday, February 15th, 1892.

The funeral was conducted by the Rev. H. S. Matthews, President of the Conference, assisted by the Revs. Drs. Briggs, Sutherland, and Wild, J. M. Simpson, Geo. Abbs, and C. E. Perry, who, together with a large number of minis-

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terial brethren and friends followed his remains to Mount Pleasant cemetery, where all that is mortal of Wm. Pirritte was laid to rest, awaiting the resurrection of the just.

"Servant of God, well done, Thy glorious warfare's past, The battle's fought, the race is won, And thou art crowned at last."

#### DAVID JENNINGS.

Of his early life we have no particulars. He was a native of Nova Scotia, and had spent a considerable time on Circuits in the Maritime Provinces, but was not officially recognized as a minister till 1844, when he was taken out by the Chairman as a supply for Yonge Street Circuit. In 1846 he was received into full connexion and ordained, and in those days, when the ministerial term was shorter than at present, he was stationed at the following places in succession: Whitby, Owen Sound, Gananoque, Clarendon, Farmersville, Sherbrooke, Merrickville, Farnham, Bruce Mines and Holland Landing. In 1862, because of failing health, he took a superannuated relation for one year. The following year he returned to his work, and after spending two years at Gaspe he was

compelled to retire finally from the active work of the ministry.

Bro. Jennings was a very unique character. Possessed of a vigorous mind, but without systematic training, he had secured a considerable amount of knowledge, bearing on the Christian ministry. His sermons were carefully prepared, and were instructive, but on account of his manner of delivery they were not as impressive as they otherwise would have been. He held very exalted views of the dignity and importance of the Christian ministry, and could never see or hear of a minister engaging in any secular calling without using strong words of disapproval. He was naturally of a gloomy and despondent disposition, and this no doubt seriously affected his health, and at times even threatened his reason, and no doubt materially interfered with his success as a pastor. The writer was his pastor for two years, and always found him, when his health permitted, ready to supply the pulpit, or do anything that he could to forward the interests of the Church. On account of his disinclination for society, he made few friends. Those who knew him best formed a high estimate of his integrity as a man, and his devotion as a Christian.

His wife died about eight years ago, and as they had no children he was left alone, and during the last few years his niece, Miss Jennings, of Boston, cared for his welfare. For the last two years growing infirmities prevented his frequent attendance at church. His affliction was of such a character that his physician decided that a surgical operation was necessary; but his strength proved insufficient to bear the shock, and what was intended to prolong his life had the effect of bringing it suddenly to a close. He never rallied from the effects of the operation. But his death, which occurred so suddenly, and under such painful circumstances, those who knew him best firmly believe found him prepared, and that the closing of this, was to him the dawning of a brighter day,

and that, absent from the body, he is at home with the Lord.

## GEORGE BEYNON.

George Beynon was born in King's County, Ireland, on the 28th of May, 1813, and came with his parents to this country when he was about seven years of age. The family settled in the township of King, near what is now known as Temperanceville, and there he remained with them until he entered upon his ministerial career in 1840. His conversion, which took place in his seventeenth year, does not seem to have been very closely connected with the use of any

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human instrumentality. He often spoke of it as having been brought about by the direct influence of the Holy Spirit, of which he was made the subject in a very powerful manner. The change was clear and definite, and he henceforth lived in the full assurance of faith, and testified without a doubt to the power and sufficiency of the saving grace of God. He at once became a member of the Methodist Church, with which, though his parents were Episcopalians, he had somehow come in contact, and soon after began to exercise his gifts as a local preacher. Before being called into the regular work of the ministry, he had married Mary Ann West, the daughter of a Methodist family, who shared with him the toils and sacrifices of his itinerant life, and by some years preceded him to the better land. Nearly all his active work was done in Eastern Ontario, amid the privations and hardships which were common to the early days. He travelled successively the following circuits: -Elizabethtown, Hull, L'Original, Mississippi, Sheffield, Wilton, Kemptville, Bath, Farmersville, Newboro', Carlton Place, and Oakville. For five years he enjoyed the honors of the Chairmanship, and discharged its duties with fidelity and success. While at Kemptville he suffered a severe illness, as a result of which he was obliged to retire for one year. His health was never fully restored, and in 1865, after another serious attack, he had to take a superannuated relation. He lingered in an invalid condition for twenty-six years, and died at Brampton on the 13th of December, 1891.

Brother Beynon was pre-eminently a good man. He dwelt in the very atmosphere of goodness, and to come into his presence was to breathe that atmosphere and know the odors of its sanctity. He was a man of much prayer, and delighted greatly, especially during his illness, in the prayers and conversations of God's people. Without much early education, he applied himself with great diligence and perseverance to study, and so acquired a large amount of general knowledge, and became well versed in Methodist theology. A great admirer of John Wesley, he was very familiar with his notes and sermons, and with the records of his life. Expository in his preaching, he exercised his ministry with much faithfulness and power, and had extensive revivals on nearly all his fields of labor. He was true to all connexional interests, and by his excellence of character he won the confidence and affection of his brethren to a large degree. He lived, not in the dead past, but in the progressive present, with his face toward the brighter, better future, which, he deubted not, was in store for the Church and the world. To the last he was in full sympathy with the onward march of Methodism, in her missionary, educational and other enterprises.

His experiences in sickness were just what might be expected for a man who lived and worked for God as he had done. The Lord graciously sustained him. Patient, resigned, trustful, thankful for every attention, he calmly waited all the days of his appointed time, until his change should come. Among his last utterances were words of abiding confidence and steadfast hope in Jesus Christ as his Redeemer. A week before he died in the deepening twilight of the Sabbath evening, he received in solemn silence the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and realized the truth of that saying, "Whoso eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day." From that time he slowly sank to rest, and at the dawning of another Sabbath he was not, for God had taken him. "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright: for the end of that man is peace."

#### THOMAS REID.

The subject of this sketch was born in Queen's County, Ireland, May 7th, 1823, and died in Port Perry, Ontario, January 22nd, 1892. It is to be regretted that the information at hand is too meagre to furnish material for anything like a comprehensive outline of his life and labors. He came to this

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country with his parents in 1831, and settled in the township of Trafalgar. He was converted in 1842, under the ministry of Rev. S. C. Philp, sen. Six months after his conversion he was appointed a class-leader, and in 1846 he entered the ministry of the Methodist New Connexion. About the time of the union between the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, and the New Connexion Methodist Church, he joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in this country, with which he continued to labor until the consummation of the union of all the

Mr. Reid possessed some of the most essential qualifications for a successful pioneer preacher, and he probably did his full share of pioneer work. He had a remarkable physical organization, capable of enduring any reasonable amount of hardship and toil. He had, moreover, a warm heart and a ready wit, which must have secured for him hosts of friends. His early advantages probably genial brotherly disposition made him more effective than many an one with more brilliant gifts and higher intellectual attainments. To many he will be remembered chiefly as a large-hearted, genial, brotherly man.

In 1854 he was united in marriage with Miss E. J. Cannon, of South Crosby, who has proved to be a helpmeet indeed to him, having done him, according to Solomon's conception of a good wife, good and not evil all the days of his life. And they have been blessed with a family which has been a credit and a joy to them. Two of his sons are in Manitoba, one of them a preacher of the gospel, and the other a merchant. The third, with whom the widowed mother lives, is a physician, enjoying a large practice in the neighborhood of Horning's Mills. The youngest son, Charles, lives at Port Perry.

### J. B. ARMSTRONG.

John Brown Armstrong, whose parents came to this country from Ireland in the early years of the century, was born in the township of Huntley, near Ottawa, on the 28th of February, 1829. He received a liberal education for the times in the schools at Richmond, near Ottawa. His parents belonged to the Church of England, and in that Church he was baptized and received his early religious training; but, having been led into an experimental knowledge of salvation in a Methodist service, under the ministry of Rev. John Howes, he joined the Methodist Church in early life.

After spending some time in school teaching, he entered the ministry as a probationer in 1848, his first appointment being L'Original. During his probation he travelled L'Original, St. Andrew's, Cornwall and Matilda Circuits. He was ordained in 1852, at Kingston, by Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., and

stationed at Kemptville. He was then stationed successively at Augusta, Pakenham, Matilda, Morrisburg, Lyn, Richmond, Aylmer, Chambly and Caledonia. Then failing health compelled him to retire for two years, and during that time he accompanied Rev. Lachlin Taylor to Fort Garry.

Having sufficiently recovered to re-enter the effective ranks, he was stationed at Davenport, Orillia and Baltimore; but at Baltimore his health again gave way; and, in hope of recuperation, he travelled in England, Wales and France. During this tour he attended the Ecumenical Conference in City Road Chapel, London, in 1881. After having sustained a superannuated relation to his Conference for four years, he took charge of the Rama Indian Mission for three years, after which he again superannuated and settled at Orillia, where he continued to reside until his death.

Although physically unequal to the work of the regular ministry, he still took a deep interest, during his last years, in the work of the Church, and the different pastors with whom he was associated found in him a sympathetic counsellor and helper in every good work. He was always a very welcome visitor in the homes of the afflicted. He was characterized by geniality of disposition, hospi-

tality, charity for the erring, and uncompromising loyalty to principle. He took a deep interest in the public affairs of the communities where he resided. He was a member of the first High School Board at the town of Orillia, and was also a very efficient and influential magistrate.

He was married on the 1st of July, 1856, to Miss Amanda Parlow, daughter of Mr. John Parlow, of Matilda, and cousin of our esteemed and honored superintendent, Rev. Dr. Carmen, who with one son and one daughter survives him.

During the last few months of his life he suffered much, but he endured his sufferings with great patience and joyfulness. Divine grace was eminently sufficient. The spirit he manifested and the testimony he bore were a benediction to all around him. Three days before his death, surrounded by his family, at his request, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to him by his, pastor, Rev. N. Wellwood, assisted by two venerable brethren, Rev. Thos. Walls and Rev. Dr. Gray, Presbyterian minister. All present felt that it was a hallowed hour.

"Quite on the verge of heaven."

At the conclusion of the brief, simple service, our dear brother expressed a joyful confidence in God and a glorious hope of heaven. Then he recited in tones of devout gladness the twenty-third Psalm until his voice failed, when Rev. Dr. Gray recited the remaining portion of it. He then, with beaming countenance exclaimed:

"My hope is full-O glorious hope! of immortality."

On Sunday afternoon, two days before his death, he said to his pastor, "Give my love to all my dear brethren in the ministry, when you see them at district meeting and Conference, and tell them that I am now resting sweetly in Jesus." He passed peacefully away on the morning of the 9th of February, 1892.

### JAMES BASKERVILLE.

James Baskerville was born at Traverston, County Tipperary, Ireland, April 16th, 1818, and departed this life at Flesherton, Ontario, December 7th, 1891, and had not, therefore, quite completed his seventy-fourth year at the time of his death. He was the son of God-fearing parents, by whom he seems to have been carefully instructed in respect to divine things in his childhood and youth. As an illustration of their solicitude for the moral and spiritual interests of their offspring, it may be mentioned that, in order to preserve them from being contaminated by association with the rude and turbulent children and youth who attended the public schools at Traverston, who appear to have been of the baser sort, Mrs. Baskerville, James' mother, who was a woman of good sense and considerable culture, undertook the education of her children at home, attending to both their intellectual and moral training herself. It is not remarkable that, with such a mother, the subject of this sketch was early impressed with a knowledge of his sinful state, and became, even in childhood, the subject of an earnest desire for salvation. Nor is it surprising that as soon as he was brought under a living spiritual ministry, and into contact with people to whom the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ was matter of triumphant and joyous experience, he immediately submitted himself to God, and became the partaker of His

The story of his conversion is full of interest. He was persuaded by a young friend to accompany him to a quarterly meeting on the Kilkenny circuit. The preacher on the occasion was Rev. R. Hughston, not long since deceased theme was "Wrestling Jacob," and while he unfolded it, the Spirit of grace wrestled mightily and successfully with the conscience of young Baskerville. He trembled under an apprehension of the wrath of God, which he felt resting

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upon him, and the good work which was begun under the sermon, was completed by the instrumentality of the love-feast, to which he was invited to remain. He was filled with amazement as, for the first time in his life, he heard a multitude of witnesses bearing testimony to the fact that "the Son of Man has power on earth to forgive sin," and that this precious truth has become matter of personal joyous and blessed experience to them. One after another of these people, whose hearts had been touched by the power of God, spoke such burning words that he, too, felt as if he was wrapped in the divine flame. He rose up to ask the prayers of God's people, and while he was in the act of doing so, his own darkness was, turned into day, and he, too, was enabled to rejoice in the

From that time his life, though not without trial, or, it may be, entirely free from defect, was progressively happy and useful. As a prayer-leader and class-leader, and, indeed, in other spheres of usefulness which opened to him, he found opportunity for the profitable exercise of his gifts both in his native land and on this side of the Atlantic. In 1846, with his parents and the rest of their family, he came to Canada. And, apparently, mainly through his influence, his parents, and some other members of the family, brought to God through his instrumentality, found their way into the Wesleyan Methodist Church. It was, however, with the Methodist New Connexion that he ultimately cast in his lot; and in that Church he remained up to the time of the union in 1874. He entered the ministry in 1850, and continued in the active work until 1880, a period of thirty years. In the latter of these years he was superannuated, and continued in this relation down to the time of his death. From his superannuation until last year, when he removed to Flesherton he lived in Mariannuation until last year, when he removed to Flesherton he lived in Mariannuated.

ation until last year, when he removed to Flesherton, he lived in Manitowaning.

Mr. Baskerville was a good, rather than a great man. He was not learned, or eloquent, or highly argumentative; but he had the reputation, among those who knew him best, of being a man of considerable reading and breadth of information. Above all he was a diligent and prayerful student of the Hold Scriptures. In Mr. Wesley's sense, he was a man of one book; and he delighted in expounding the truths of the Bible in public and from house to house. And by his simple, affectionate and earnest ministrations hundreds of souls were won to Christ. Rev. W. Tindall says: "I was intimately acquainted with him, as my first superintendent. He was one of the most affectionate and unselfish men I ever knew. He cheerfully toiled on the hardest fields, often with but little remuneration, but never complained." His end was peace. He rests from his labors, but his works do follow him.

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### MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

Moved by Rev. L. W. Hill, seconded by Rev. J. F. German,

That the members of the Conference, having learned with deep regret of the painful accident which befell our brother, the Rev. J. C. Willmott, M.A., Chairman of the Algoma District, on his way to this Conference, desire to express hereby our tenderest sympathy, assuring him of our kindly memories and earnest prayers for a speedy recovery.

Moved by Rev. H. Johnston, seconded by Rev. W. J. Maxwell,

Whereas, ever increasing light is being thrown on the stupendous evils of the opium traffic in India and China-a traffic which entails demoralization, and antagonizes all missionary endeavor beyond all power of expression; whereas, it is now made manifest that England, through her Indian Government, originated, and is perpetuating, this dire evil, by the manufacture of opium to the ruination of millions in India and China; and whereas, the Christian and philanthropic conscience of England is aroused even to the extent of legislative condemnation of the evil, by accepting the resolution of Sir Joseph Pease, who, in his conflict against this wrong, has expressed a desire for the moral support and prayerful sympathy of Christendom to aid British Christians who seek the abolition of this curse; therefore, be it

Resolved,—That we, the ministers and laymen of this Toronto Conference, tender to Sir Jos. Pease, and British Christians generally, our moral support and sympathy with the movement, and our prayers for

the immediate abolition of the evil by legislative enactment.

Rev. Dr. Saunders, of the Montreal Conference, was introduced to the Conference, and spoke in reference to the St. Lawrence camp ground.

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# PASTORAL ADDRESS.

The Toronto Conference to the Members of the Methodist Church under its care:—

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—At the close of another year's labors, we send you our word of Christian greeting, praying "that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith, that ye being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all saints, what is the breadth and length and depth and heighth; and to know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge, that ye may be filled with all the fulness of God."

It is with devout gratitude we are able to say that the year through which we have passed has been marked by many evident tokens of divine favor. Upon almost every field of toil there have been outpourings of the Spirit, leading to the religious quickening of the Church and a blessed ingathering of precious souls. The sower and the reaper have rejoiced together, and scores of churches have participated in the gladness of a spiritual Harvest Home.

In our annual address there are many things calling for special notice, arising from their far-reaching influence upon our life and growth as a Church. First of all, we would urge upon you to give earnest and prayerful attention to family religion and the godly training of the children at home. Too often it is to be feared that the importance of this subject is not understood, nor the duty discharged with such prayerful anxiety as it ought to be. The family is the unit out of which the Church is built up. Each Christian congregation is a spiritual organism, made up of lesser congregations gathered from our Christian homes. The family is the oldest of worshipping societies, and the priesthood of the Father is the oldest of priesthoods. It is a priesthood which, in its duties and responsibilities, has never been abrogated, and it is as truly a part of the divine order of building up the kingdom of Christ as the Church itself When Paul directed Christian parents to bring up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, he certainly intended that they should, through such training, become fit subjects for that kingdom, "which is righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Ghost." Let piety, in the form of experimental and practical godliness, reign in the home. Let it be the very life and soul of the family, scattering and uprooting the malaria of worldliness, pervading, regulating and sanctifying all the experiences of the domestic circle. Let our households be cheerful and attractive with the sweet glories of consecrated living, making them the brightest and happiest spots out of heaven. Such homes will not only be nurseries for the Church, but a perpetual means of grace to the children, where many a Samuel and many a Timothy will grow up to serve the God of their fathers.

Our Sunday Schools are doing a grand work. The record of the year is most encouraging—the numerical growth and spiritual results clearly

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indicate the divine blessing resting upon the efforts being put forth. Nevertheless, it should be clearly understood, that no amount of enthusiastic devotion on the part of the teacher can supplant the duty of parental training at the home. The obligation cannot be transferred from the parent to the teacher. Let both do their work under the guidance and help of the Spirit and the most gratifying results are sure to follow.

Is it necessary to remind you that we are living in times when the spirituality of the Church is sorely threatened by insidious forms of worldliness, which are springing up among us. We adjure you, in your search for happiness, not to leave the pure fountains of the gospel for the polluted and poisoned streams of worldly pleasure. There is no need to go to the theatre or the ball-room to know what happiness is. The love of Christ, richly shed abroad in the heart, can impart a bliss which outshines and outlives all others. It is a "joy unspeakable and full of glory." The true Christian knows whereof he speaks when he says,—

"In the heavenly Lamb,
Thrice happy I am;
And my heart it doth dance
At the sound of His name."

See to it that your religious energy does not decline, or your spiritual pulsations become enfeebled and intermittent, by looking backward to the fleshpots of Egypt. Beware of that lukewarmness which enervates the soul, which shuns the rugged path of duty, and declines the task of taking up the cross for Christ.

We do not plead for eccentric singularity or morbid asceticism. We do not say that our social life shall not be of the brightest, noblest and most elastic kind, nor that the fruits of the earth shall not be enjoyed in due season; but beware of pandering to the siren of genteel dissipation; of patronizing institutions and sanctioning customs which are of doubtful morality; or of ministering to the desire of the flesh, the desire of the eyes and the vain-glory of life.

Let your life be a vigorous protest against the spirit of the world. Have nothing to do with anything which either in its nature or associations are hostile to spiritual religion, or calculated to imperil your character or usefulness as a follower of Christ. Scorn to trim your sails between God and Mammon. Have the courage to refuse a doubtful gain. Seek the grace to forego a questionable pleasure. Let it be no secret that you must hearken to God rather than to man; that you cannot but do what Christ commands, and avoid what would dishonor His name. Let men see that it is not a mere name to be a Christian. Never fail to bear a public testimony, by life and doctrine, to the faith once delivered and the holiness always required. Remember, the world expects the man of God to be true to his colors, and is far more likely to be disgusted by cowardice than alienated by courage.

Our Methodism demands the highest spiritual life, and enjoins that we not only profess the truth but practise the same. She asks for the men who are happy in their holiness and holy in their happiness; men who not only hold the truth but are held by the truth; men who live in Christ and for Christ, as those who are alive from the dead. Such

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living cannot fail to make itself felt on the world around. The voice of a Church imbued with a spirit like this will be as the voice of a trumpet, and her life will be as a convent to the life.

trumpet, and her life will be as a sermon to wake the dead. We would also affectionately urge upon you not to neglect the social means of grace. They are of incalculable value to your spiritual growth. "Forget not the assembling of yourselves together as the manner of some is." Let the class-meeting and prayer-meeting, the fellowship-meeting, the love-feast, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper always find you there as opportunity affords. In these time-honored means of grace Christ is present to counsel, comfort and direct. Through these well-known channels you will hear some whisper of God's voice to your soul-you will receive manna for your spiritual hunger, strength for your spiritual weakness and armor for your spiritual conflicts. In all ages God's people have found such seasons of social worship precious and sanctifying to the soul, and have gone home better equipped for duty and more fully prepared to faithfully perform their part in all the relations of life. Habitually neg lecting the place and undervaluing the privileges of prayer and Christian fellowship, what can prevent your declining in spiritual life? Under such deteriorating influences your love will vanish like the morning cloud, and your zeal will evaporate like the early dew. Be Christians in earnest. In your inward and outward life let there be the unfolding of a present, living Christ. Remember that any profession disjoined from obedience to the Master is a hollow deceit, and any religion which does not bring you nearer to God and God nearer to man is a shameless pretence, however beautiful it may appear in the eyes of men. One great need which we recognize at this hour is for a more widespread spirit of Christian activity in the individual membership of our Churches. We cannot all do the same things or work on the same lines, nor is it desirable that we should, but let each member find out what he can do, and then do it heartily as to the Lord. Some can speak to edification; some can pray with unction; some can sing with sweetness and power, and some can serve in the more quiet but equally blessed ministeries of home life. Let us never forget that work for Christ is done only as men do it whose hearts the Lord has touched. They are few and far between who have been saved apart from human instrumentality. Becoming a Christian involves the obligation of becoming a witness for God-a messenger of good news to others-and we will never have aggressive Churches or extensive revivals of religion until these obligations are honestly and practically recognized.

The problem of the unsaved, unevangelized masses is a serious one—one which no Church can afford to ignore without the most melancholy results. If as a Church we have no handgrasp for the poor and the neglected, if we are not by some activity or other seeking to rescue the perishing, then no matter what may be our wealth, or culture, or refinement, we may well question our claim to having any lot or part in the living Church of God and of His Christ.

Do you feel yourselves personally responsible for the prosperity of your Church? Are you doing all you can to seek and save your fellowmen? It is not enough to be able to sing.

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That love must find expression in blessed and ceaseless activity. The best proof of Christian discipleship is an anxious and earnest effort to win a soul for Christ; and what a glorious thing it will be if, at the great day of the Lord, you are able to say, "Behold, here am I, and those whom

We would also urge upon you to give no uncertain sound in regard to the suppression of the liquor traffic by all lawful and constitutional means. It is the giant evil of our land, and its victims are a multitude which no man can number. It is the most hideous fact with which we have to deal, the evidence of which is written in tears and blood. As far as you possibly can, by voice and vote, by moral suasion and prayer, strike a deadly blow at this towering wrong. Strive to create a public sentiment which will compel the enactment and sustain the enforcement of civil measures for the suppression of this God-defying business. Let the pulpit, the pew and the home be outspoken on this momentous quest toon. As a Christian Church let us stand where we ought to be, even in the very forefront of a movement, whose success will gladden more homes and save more men from ruin than any other reform ever projected by by the heart of man.

It is needless to remind you that many perplexing problems of a social and economic character are coming to the front, and plans of a very revolutionary stripe are being pushed forward as a panacea for all the ills which afflict us. From the present outlook we are not justified in concluding that things are going to continue as they are. Socialism, both atheistic and Christian, is making its voice heard in the land. The signs of the times are significant. The whole aspect of the world seems to be looking out toward some new movement of the providential hand.

Whilst some are filled with misgiving as they ponder the possible outcome of the questions which the spirit of the times is forcing upon us, nevertheless, to the most casual observer there are elements in the movement which should be hailed with delight, for they clearly indicate that humanity is preparing to take an important step forward. There is no need to look upon these things with fear and trembling. God is in it all.

"Well roars the storm to him who hears A deeper voice across the sea."

We know not how, but we do know that all things work together for good to them that love God. Let this be the sheet anchor of our soul. There may be disturbance and chaos around, but there is a Divine Spirit brooding above it all. There may be clamor and turbulence among men, but He still reigns who holds the winds in his fists and hushes the tumult of the people.

And now, beloved brethren, for another year our work is before us—let it be done wisely and well. As a Church, our origin and activities are confined to comparatively modern times, nevertheless the principles we represent are as old as the everlasting hills, and the mission upon which we are sent is wide as the world and far-reaching as the remotest child of men. In building the walls of God's spiritual Zion we have a great task before us. But an evangelical and aggressive Methodism can do it. Our activities and responsibilities as a Church are directly connected with the

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evangelization of the world. In the prosecution of this work we urge you to seek that spiritual originality in word and deed which makes the Christian life fresh and grateful as a summer breeze.

Be satisfied with no religion which you cannot carry into every day of the week and every hour of the day. The sweet spirit of Christ's life must not be shut away from trade and work and daily thought. Let nothing hinder you from being as devout amid the business of the week as you are amid the sanctities of the Sabbath. Cry mightily unto God for a double baptism of the Holy Spirit, such as will bring out everything that is fresh and individual in your lives. Abide in the warm sunshine of God's presence, for if the spiritual atmosphere of the Church were only as warm and genial everywhere as it ought to be, men of all sorts would blossom under its influence, and the manifestations of spiritual life and beauty in the Church would be as varied and abundant as we behold in nature to-day. Seek to improve all organized expressions of faith and work, especially such as are directly connected with social fellowship and aggressive enterprise, and by so doing we shall build up our beloved Methonical together."

May the "God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the ever-lasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."
