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LABOR MEN AT THE CITY HALL SHORT SPEECHES AT ANNUAL GATHERING

Public Meeting Held Last Night—Advice to Workingmen.

(From Tuesday's Daily.) Organized labor was represented by a slim attendance at the Labor Day meeting held in the city hall last evening. Mayor Hall, who had promised to preside, was delayed by the late arrival of a train which necessitated the election of a temporary chairman, and John Jardine, M. P. P. for Esquimalt, was chosen.

The land had been from early times taken from the worker, and was now a-days given to corporations and capitalists upon whom the workingman was forced to depend for even bread and butter wages.

ARCHBISHOP WILL LIVE IN VANCOUVER

COL. ANDERSON COMES ON INSPECTION TRIP

Marine Department's Engineer at Vancouver—More Lights and Wireless Station.

Anderson, chief engineer of the department of marine and fisheries, arrived in Vancouver to-day from Ottawa, on a trip of inspection during which he will arrange for the establishment of further aids to navigation. Among these will be a new flashing light for "Trial" island, off Shoal bay; a fixed light for Capilano reef, opposite Prospect point, Vancouver, and a number of occulting lights for the northern coast.

MAY SELL LEASE ON DEADMAN'S ISLAND

Famous Litigation Case Recalled by Proposed Erection of Sawmill.

Vancouver, Sept. 9.—The famous Deadman's Island litigation of five or six years ago may be revived as a result of the proposal of Theodore Ludgate to sell his lease of the island to a syndicate of Americans for the establishment of a mill there. Mr. Ludgate secured a lease of the island from the Dominion government for 25 years, renewable for a similar period.

VOLCANOS' FREAKS.

Earthquake Causes Rise and Fall in Molten Lava in Crater of Mount Kilauea.

Honolulu, Sept. 9.—Following a slight earthquake which occurred on the island of Hawaii last Friday, the molten lava in the crater of the volcano Kilauea fell from its usual level, a distance of 700 feet in a few hours. A second shock occurred on Saturday, and following this the lava began to rise again. At the present time it has risen 400 feet, or to within 300 feet of its original level, and is still rising.
