



PLASTER IN COFFIN;

CORPSE IS STOLEN

PARIS, April 4.—A mysterious discovery has been made in the cemetery of a little village in the Meuse Department called Pagny la Blanche Cote. The gravediggers, while moving the coffin of a retired officer named Reuter, who died twenty-two, years ago, to make room for that of his recently deceased mother, discovered that the coffin was filled with plaster. There was, indeed, part of a skull, and some pieces of blood-stained linen, but the rest was missing. The local authorities are making inquiries as to the fate


