PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

Of the Maritime Provinces, in Session at Charlottetown, P. E. Island.

A Large Attendance at the Opening Session—An Eloquent Sermon Preached by the Retiring Moderator—Rev. Dr. Grant of Trinidad Elected to Succeed.

(Charlottetown Guardian, 7th.)

The first sederunt of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, as constituted in Zion church at ten yesterday morning.

Rev. Dr. Smith, Musquodobit, reported congregations. Last year four congregations were self-sustaining. Grants have been made to 61 congregations, an increase of nine over the previous year. This is the largest number in the history of the Synod. There are 150 self-sustaining congregations receiving help. There are about 85 congregations receiving help. These get about eight or nine thousand dollars to the church. The yearly increase in congregations receiving help is larger than the increase in those who are self-sustaining.

Dr. Falconer in the absence of the Moderator Rev. D. S. Fraser, commented on the printed report which was submitted. The statistics were favorable. He recommended the supplementing of the present international sessions, there are drawbacks which are supplemented by the grading course. In the four summer schools there were 444 students of 1100 this year. A great number of the ministers do not realize the importance of the Sunday school work. These summer schools have come to stay as the requests have been very general for them. The work of these schools must be carried down to the individual teacher and here the Presbytery can give great help. In conclusion he urged the church to rally more and more to this most important branch of church work the Sunday school upon which many of the children of the present day are solely dependent for their religious training.

The following recommendations were unanimously accepted on motion of Rev. Dr. Fraser, seconded by Rev. Geo. Miller, Brookfield:

1. That this Synod exercise its high appreciation and approval of the summer schools for S. S. teachers and students, which were so much successful at Halifax, St. John, Charlottetown and Sydney, by the committee of the Presbytery College, Halifax, and that it be the duty of every Synod which shall be held in the future, to send a representative to the summer schools.
