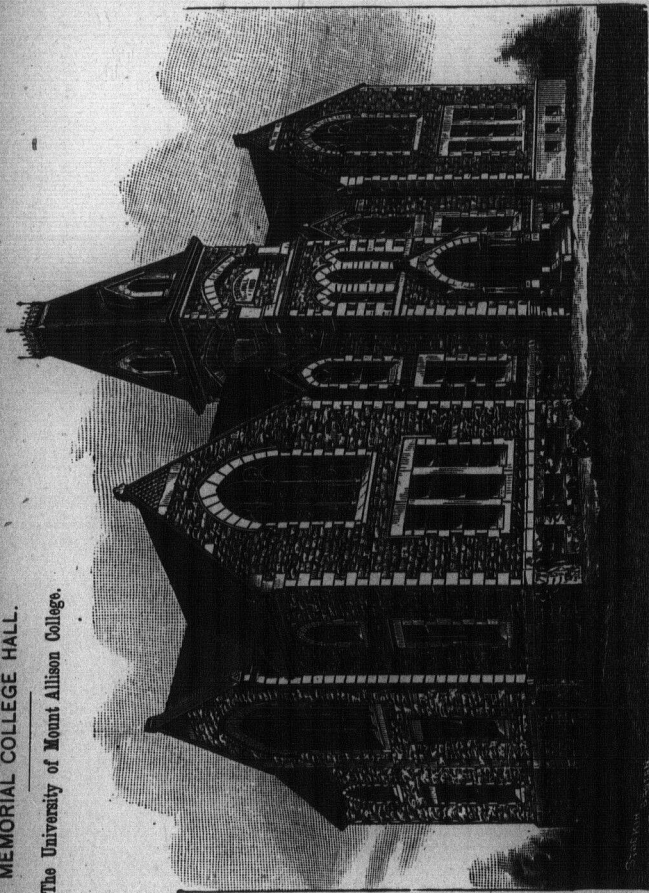

GENERAL CIRCULAR.

THE MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN COLLEGE was organized in July, 1862, under a Charter obtained from the Legislature of New Brunswick. By virtue of this Charter it possesses full University powers. An Act was subsequently passed amending the Charter, and changing the name of the Corporation to "The University of Mount Allison College."

The College is conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles. The general denominational control under which it is placed furnishes a sufficient guarantee that sceptical license will never be allowed within its walls, but does not imply the existence of a purpose or wish to interfere with the conscientious convictions of any. The fullest recognition, however, is given to the truths and claims of the Christian Religion. The Bible is publicly honored as the Word of God, and no pains are spared that the education imparted may be suitably leavened with religious principle.

Students may enter the College either as regular Undergraduates, having passed the Matriculation Examination; or as Specialists, who do not look forward to a University Degree.

For Undergraduates two complete courses of study are provided, viz.:

1. The Regular Arts Course for the B. A. Degree.
2. The Special Course for those who prefer to substitute Modern Languages for Greek and Latin, and who may desire a greater number of elective studies than the Arts Course permits. The degree of Bachelor of Philosophy (Ph. B.) will be conferred on students who shall have completed this course.

There are also Honor Courses in Classics, Mathematics, Science, Philosophy, and Modern Languages and Literature.

Special Students are admitted to any class or course of Lectures for which, in the judgment of the Faculty, after due examination, they are deemed prepared; and upon leaving the College, they will be entitled to receive Certificates bearing the College Seal, and specifying the particular branches of study in which they have received instruction and passed satisfactory examinations.

Special arrangements will be made for the convenience of public school teachers who may desire to pursue a college course while continuing to teach during the summer term.

Ladies wishing to pursue an undergraduate course will find at Mount Allison facilities for thorough collegiate training under the most favorable conditions as regards health, and domestic and social advantages. Board may be had at the Ladies' College on reasonable terms. In addition to the regular undergraduate work the best instruction in Music and the Fine Arts is available.

Mount Allison was the first chartered college in Canada to admit women to all the privileges of regular collegiate courses and degrees.

MATRICULATION.

The Matriculation Examinations are held on the second and third days of the First Term of the Collegiate Year. Supplementary Examinations for special cases may be held at other dates.

DEPARTMENT I.—ENGLISH.

Grammar, Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography.

Books prescribed by the Councils of Public Instruction of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and P. E. Island.

DEPARTMENT II.—CLASSICS.

Latin*—Caesar, Gallic War, Book IV.; Virgil, *Aeneid*, Book III.;

Latin Grammar, *Harkness's*. Easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin. Questions in History and Geography arising out of the Books prescribed.

Greek†—Xenophon, *Anabasis*, Book VII.; Greek Grammar, *Hadley's* or *Goodwin's*.

[Instead of the Classical selections prescribed, satisfactory equivalents from the same or other authors will be accepted.]

*The Latin subjects for 1892 are Caesar, Gallic War, Book I.; Virgil, *Aeneid*, Book II.

†The Greek subject for 1892 is Xenophon, *Anabasis*, Book II.

DEPARTMENT III.—MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic—Proportion, Interest, Extraction of Square Root, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

Algebra—Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division of Algebraical Quantities, Simple Equations of one, two, and three unknown quantities.

Geometry—First and Second Books of Euclid, or the subjects thereof, and the solving of easy Geometrical exercises.

Candidates for the degree of B. A. will be allowed to take Natural Philosophy and French as an equivalent for Greek, viz.:

NATURAL PHILOSOPHY.

Elementary Mechanics, Hydrostatics, Hydraulics, Pneumatics, Acoustics, and Optics.

FRENCH.

Grammar—*Fasquelle* or *Pujol and Van Norman*;* the *Accidence*, *Fénélon's Telemaque*, Books I. and II. Translations of simple and easy sentences from English into French.

Candidates for the Ph. B. degree will be allowed to substitute the above course in Natural Philosophy and French for Greek and Latin.

Students taking the full Honours Course in any department may omit one of the optional subjects from either the Junior or the Senior Year.

The object of this method is to help students to find out the best methods of using their own powers, to fit them for independent research and study, and to give them some practice in describing, tabulating and illustrating the results.

SCHOLARSHIPS, PRIZES, ETC.

THE BRECKEN STUDENTS' AID FUND.

The Income from an Investment of \$5,000, given by the Rev. Ralph Brecken, D. D., will be available hereafter for the assistance of Students who may need such aid, under the following conditions and limitations:

1. The applicant must show himself worthy by maintaining a good standing in his classes and in regard to his conduct.
2. Not more than Fifty Dollars from this Fund will be assigned to any student in one year, but the same student may be a beneficiary of the Fund each year of his course.
3. The allocation of these bursaries will be decided by the Faculty, in part according to the relative need, and in part according to the ability of the applicants, as may be determined by examinations.

THE BLACKBURN FUND.

By bequest of the late J. J. Blackburn, Esq., of Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia, a sum of from One Hundred to Two Hundred Dollars annually is placed at the disposal of the President of the University for the educational aid of Candidates for the Ministry.

THE ROBERTSON FUND.

A bequest of the late Robert Robertson, Esq., Sen., of St. John, N. B., subject to a life annuity, provides a bursary annually of Twenty-Five Dollars for the aid of Candidates for the Ministry.

NOTE.— Applications for assistance from the Brecken, the Blackburn and the Robertson Funds, should be made to the President of the University, not later than the first of September in each year.

THE JOST FUND.

By bequest of the late Edward Jost, Esq., of Halifax, N. S., Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church may receive educational aid annually. The Trustees of this Fund are Messrs. W. B. McNutt, H. G. Laurilliard, A. M. Bell, William Crowe and Rev. S. F. Huestis, Halifax, to whom application should be made.

LIBRARY, APPARATUS, MUSEUM, ETC.

In the course of the last two or three years valuable additions have been made to the Library and to the Chemical and Physical Apparatus of the Science Department.

The sum of Two Thousand Dollars given by the Rev. Ralph Brecken, D D, for the purchase of books and scientific apparatus, has been carefully expended under the direction of a committee of the Faculty. More than seven hundred volumes of valuable works in History, Philosophy, Science, Poetry, etc., have already been placed on the library shelves, and books on local history, a department to which in the future special attention will be devoted, are being collected as opportunity offers.

The Library is kept regularly supplied with the leading Reviews, such as the *Contemporary*, *Nineteenth Century*, *Fortnightly*, *Forum*, *Nature*, *Bibliotheca Sacra*, *Hebraica*, *Old Testament Student*, etc., etc.

The attention of the friends of the College is earnestly directed to the needs of the Library, and to the importance of establishing some permanent fund to secure its steady increase. There is no way in which money can be spent to better advantage in securing the sound development of the College as an institution of learning. Gifts of books or of money will be thankfully received and acknowledged.

During the last two years there have been added to the Library through the liberality of the Rev. Ralph Brecken, M. Through the liberality of Alexander Gibson, Esq., an annual addition of considerable value has been made to the Library for several years past.

READING ROOM.

A Reading Room, in which are to be found most of the leading Periodicals of the Dominion of Canada, as well as some of the principal newspapers of Great Britain and the United States, is accessible to all the students upon the payment of a moderate fee.

THE EURHETORIAN SOCIETY.

This is a voluntary Literary Society, the history of which reaches back for more than twenty years. Its special objects are the acquisition of readiness and power in debate, and the cultivation of a pure literary taste. Not a few of the Alumni of the Institution who are to-day prominent in the professional and legislative circles of the several Provinces of the Dominion, have been enrolled in its membership. It has a well furnished room in the College in which its meetings are held weekly.

GYMNASIUM.

A commodious Gymnasium, fitted up with modern appliances for athletic exercises and physical development, and under the direction of a competent instructor, is available at a moderate charge to all students.

In all Science classes in which costly apparatus or materials are used, a small laboratory fee will be charged, to be paid when a student enters his name in a class. The supply of apparatus has been greatly enlarged through the munificence of Rev. Ralph Brecken, D.D., and every effort will be made to afford the students full courses of practical demonstration, and the use of as many instruments as can be entrusted to them. The list of charges will be posted on the Laboratory door at the beginning of each term. Breakages and carelessness in regard to the property of the department will subject a student to extra charges, or permanent dismissal from the class.

Students who, upon examination, may be admitted to an advanced position in the Undergraduate Course, and non-residents, who may apply for examination, will be charged the usual Class Fee in each subject.

BOARD, WASHING, FURNITURE, ETC.

For Board in the Academy, and for Washing, the charge to College Students will be \$40.00 for the first term, and \$60.00 for the second term, or \$100.00 for the collegiate year.

The College dormitories will be provided with stove, bed and bedding, table, chairs, wash-stand, and book-shelves. *All other articles needed or desired, including lamps and oil, must be provided by the students.*

The Steward will keep on hand, and supply to the students at cost, such articles of furniture as they may require. Upon the return to the Steward at the end of the year of any such articles, undamaged, he will refund seventy-five per cent. of the original charge.

Students will be charged for any damage to the rooms or furniture caused during their occupancy.

From the above table of charges it will be seen that the total expenses for Board, Washing, Fuel, and Instruction to a student who takes four classes (the average number) each term, the charge will be *pro rata*.

TERMS OF PAYMENT.

An advance payment of \$20 on College Fees, etc., and of \$40 on account of Board, is strictly required at the beginning of each term.

The balance of the first Term's account is payable on the 15th day of November; and of the second Term's account on the 1st day of May in each year.

A supply of the necessary Text Books, Stationery, etc., is kept on hand in the University Office, and furnished to the Students as needed by them: and the articles so supplied are charged in the Term's bill at the lowest rates.



General Governmental Regulations, Etc.

Students, both regular and special, are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all the regulations of the Faculty as announced from time to time. Students whose conduct or progress in study shall continue, after suitable admonition, to be unsatisfactory will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

Regular and punctual attendance at their classes shall be imperative on all Students. Professors will mark the presence or absence of Students immediately before commencing the work of the class, and will note as absent those who enter thereafter, unless satisfactory reasons for tardiness be assigned.

No Student shall be absent from the College after 10 o'clock at night without special permission of the President.

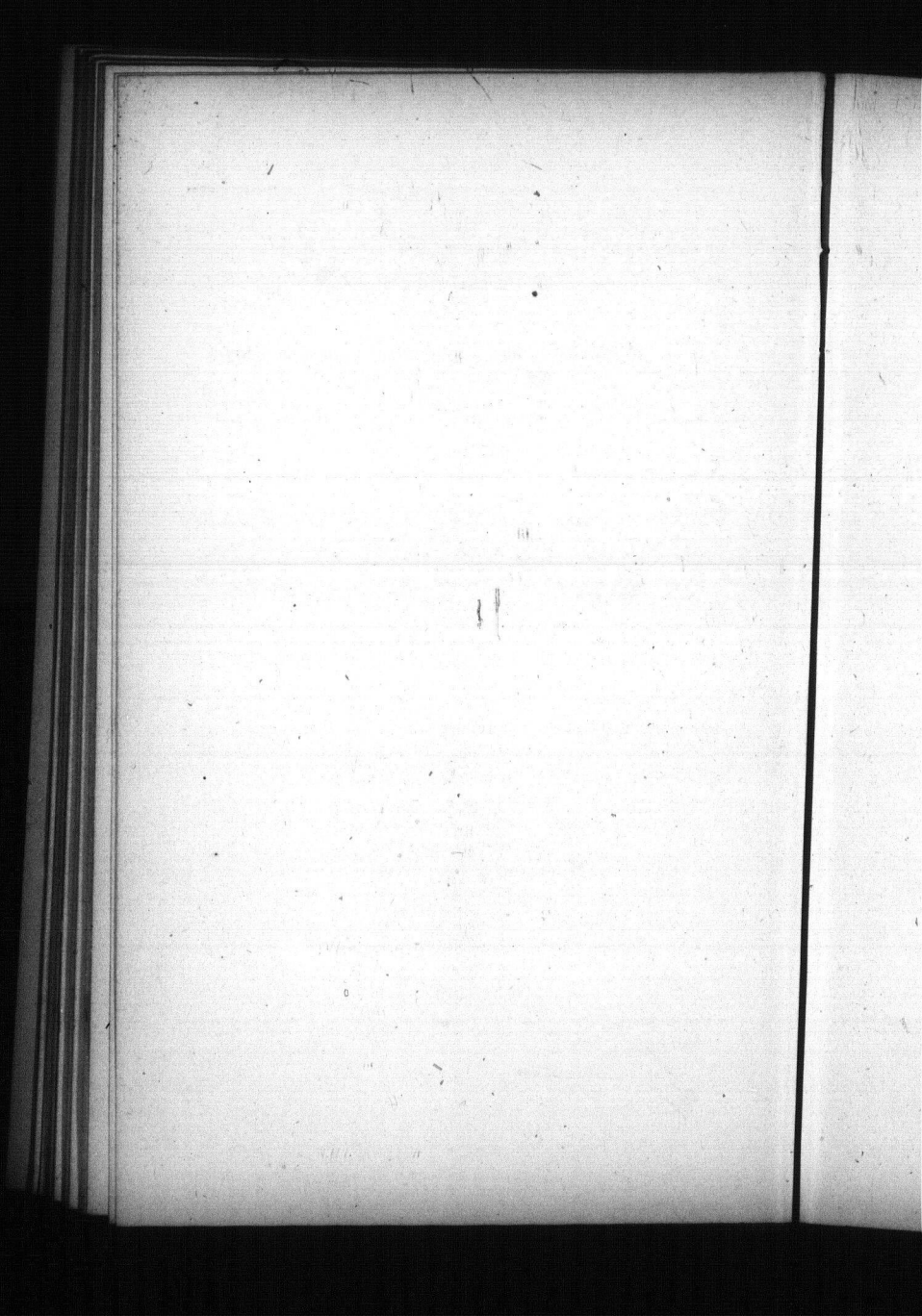
All Students are expected to attend Divine Service on Sunday, and to be punctual in attendance at daily prayers in the College Chapel.

No Student shall resort to any tavern or place where intoxicating liquors are sold without special permission of the President; and no Student who is known to use intoxicating drinks will be allowed to retain his connection with the College.

The use of tobacco on the College premises is not permitted.

Undergraduates are expected to provide themselves with College caps and gowns, and to wear them at Classes and Lectures, at Church, and at all public Collegiate exercises and anniversaries.

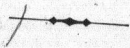

REGULATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS.**Degree of B. D.**

Candidates for this Degree must be graduates in Arts of at least two years' standing. They are required to give evidence of satisfactory acquaintance with the subjects assigned as preliminary studies.

They are required to pass a satisfactory examination in all the subjects of the three years' course of study, and to prepare for delivery a satisfactory thesis on some Biblical or Theological subject, which shall be forwarded to the Dean at least three weeks before the annual Convocation.

Persons other than graduates in Arts may pass examinations in this course, and, if successful, receive Certificates to that effect.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, who have been appointed to attend College, will pursue the course of study prescribed on page 192 of the Discipline of the Church.

The Educational Society of the Methodist Church makes provisions for free tuition, and aids in meeting the general expenses of young men appointed by the Conference to attend College.

PRELIMINARY COURSE OF STUDY.

This Course of Study is designed to meet the wants of young men preparing to offer themselves to be received on trial for the Ministry. It embraces all the subjects prescribed for the preliminary and first year's examinations of the Methodist Conference, and may extend over one, two, or three years, according to the previous attainments and circumstances of the student.

The Theological parts of this Course may be pursued in connection with Matriculation in Arts.

The English and Classical parts of this Course are prepared in the Academy and College.

Students presenting themselves for admission to this Course should bring with them letters of introduction from the Superintendent Ministers of the circuits in which they reside. If they expect to offer themselves for the Ministry at the close of the year, they must be recommended from the quarterly meetings of their own circuits, and not from the Sackville quarterly meeting. Students bringing with them certificates of such recommendation will be exempted from fees for theological tuition. Licenses as exhorters or local preachers should, also, in all cases, issue from the Superintendent and quarterly meeting of the circuit in which the student resides, and where his church membership and standing should be continued.

After examination at the close of the College year, all students in the preliminary course will return home in time to be presented at their own district meetings, in case they wish to be received on trial by the Conference.

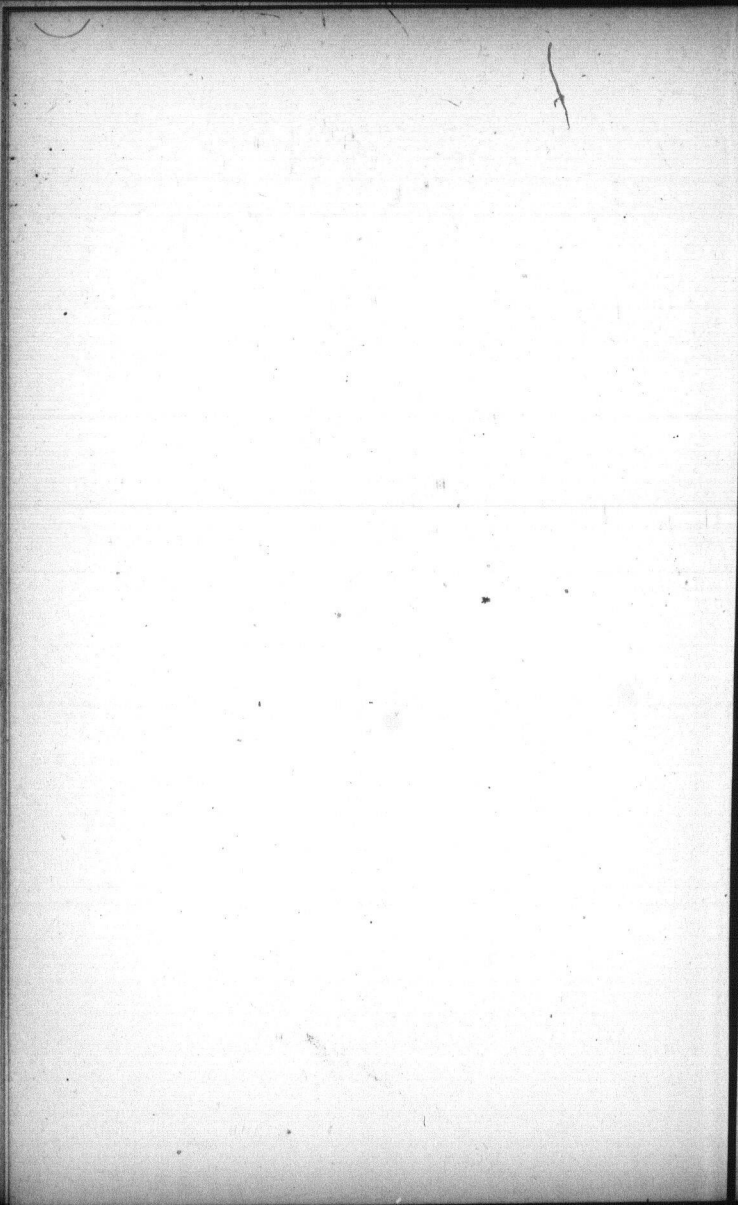
SOCIETIES.

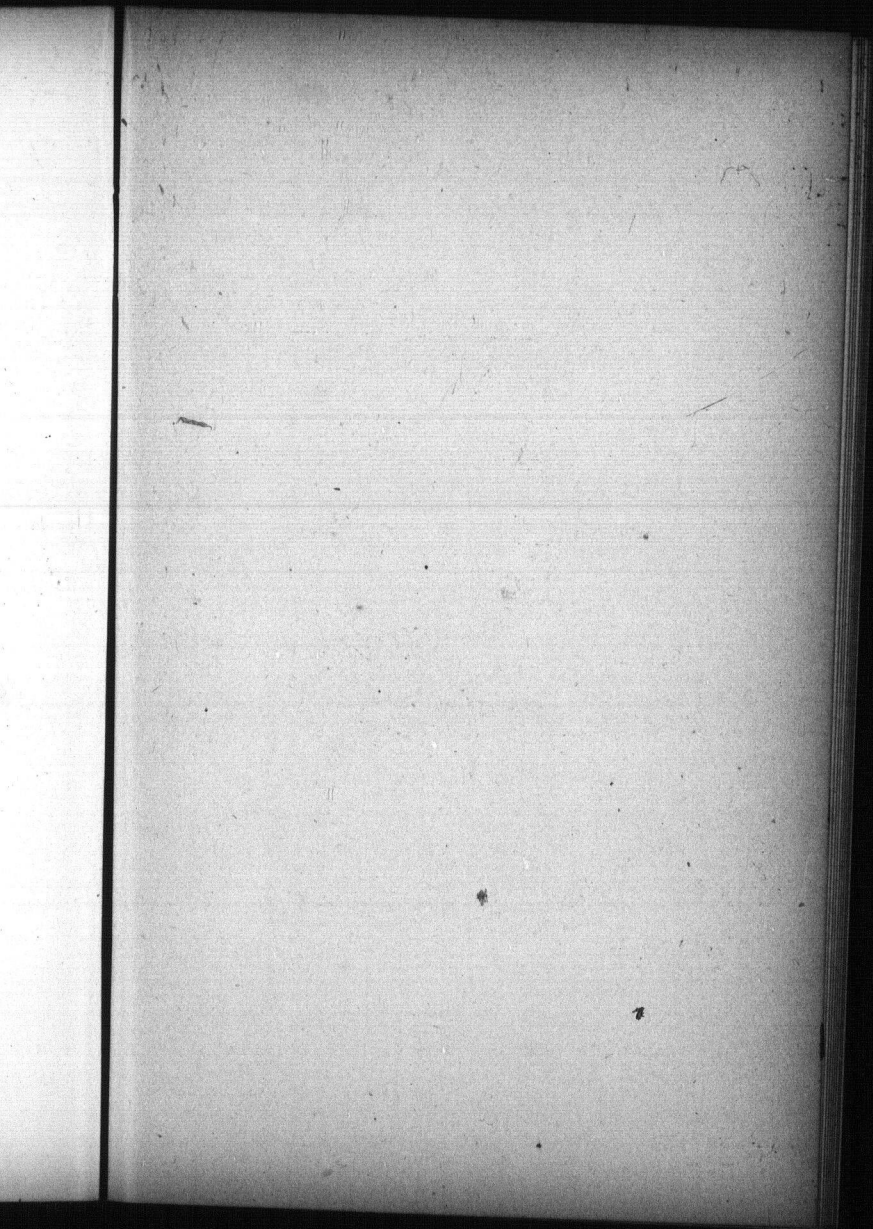

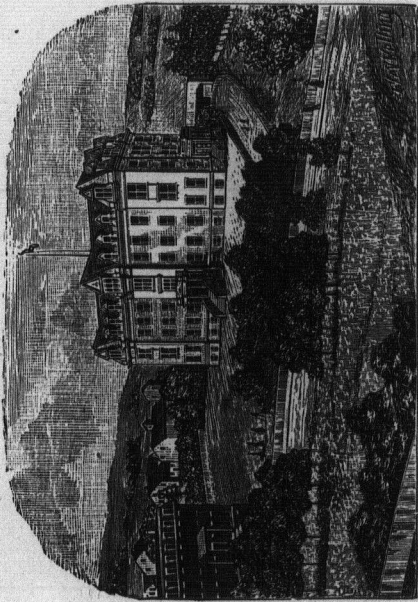

1st. A good thorough education in the Elementary Branches, such as Reading, Spelling, Penmanship, Elementary Arithmetic, Geography, Elementary Grammar, and Composition.

2nd. The studies required for Matriculation into the University, or in Law or Medicine. The requirements for University Matriculation will be found on page 14.

3rd. A thorough training for business life, including Book-keeping, Writing, Arithmetic, general and commercial, Shorthand, Typewriting, Commercial Law, and such studies in the other courses as the students are found to require. An expert teacher is being provided for this department.

Weekly Exercises, alternately in Composition and Declamation, are required of all the students.

Music.

Students who desire Music Lessons of any kind have the privilege of instruction at the Mount Allison Conservatory of Music. Special attention is drawn to this great advantage that our students have. Classes for instruction in Singing, under the direction of Prof. Mack, will be free to all students who show natural ability in that direction.

Drawing, Painting, Etc.

The course in Drawing includes Freehand, Practical Geometry, Linear Perspective, Object Drawing, and Industrial Design.

Students who desire more advanced work can have instruction at the Ladies' College from a very talented teacher.

Requirements.

The general principle insisted on is *obedience to proper authority*. *No one will be allowed to continue in the Academy whose habits are damaging to good morals, or who persistently disregards its rules.* In cases in which it appears necessary to take steps towards severing the connection of a Student with the Institution, preliminary notice will be given to the parents or guardians, *if the gravity of the offence does not require instant action.*

Punctuality and regularity in attendance upon school duties, industrious application to study, chasteness of speech, proper observance of the Sabbath, a careful refraining from injury to the buildings and property of the Institution, and a strict abstinence from tobacco and from intoxicating drinks and places where they are sold, are especially insisted on.

Students are required to attend service each Sunday at the Church to which they belong.

Remarks.

All who design to become students of the Institution should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of the Term, as the regular classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received any time. The only prerequisites for admission into the Primary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable a pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

Students in good standing can receive an honorable dismissal from the Institution at the end of the examination at the close of any Term, and at no other time, except in special cases.

Parents and guardians are respectfully requested to write to the Principal, should they find it necessary to recall a student in Term-time.

Parents are particularly requested to send every article of clothing marked with the name of the pupil in full. Initials are worthless.

Students do not require to bring any bedding, but two or three table napkins, and ring of some kind for the same, should be provided.
