No "Brown Tails" In Province.




The sub-committee of the board of works appointed to take up the mat-ter of the West Side transfer, held a private session yesterday afternoon. The committee wrangled for two hours but it does not appear that any new light was thrown on the question that would be likely to dazzle the benight-ed pulle. All the information vouchsafed the press was this, after much talk, it had been decided to ask the Hon. William Pugsley to bring D. McNic-holl, the manager of the C. P. R. down to St. John, to talk the matter over with the committee. It is understood that the sub-committee laid down no conditions to govern the interview. 
