The title Right Monorable indicates that the house is a member of the Imperial Privy Council. In Canada it is the custom to make only members of the Canadian Cabinet Canadian Privy Councillors. In Canada a Cabinet position carries with it the title of "honorable" for life. Thus Hon. George E. Foster and all members of past and present Canadian Governments are entitled to the title of honorable for life. In provincial affairs members of Provincial Governments are entitled to the designation of "honorable" just so long as they hold office, and no longer. Once a member of a Provincial Government resigns his title of honorable is dropped.

In Great Britain the custom is different. There, in addition to the direct Cabinet, a number of other statesmen are made members of the Privy Council. This appointment is honorary, and the men appointed (outside Cabinet rank) never sit in the Council. The theory is that all the great figures of the Empire shaft be members of the Imperial Privy Council, and so may be assembled in meeting at some great crisis of Empire. 
