Italy Firm in Her Demand of Turkey. Will Force Satisfaction For Outrages Perpetrated by Turks on Italian Subjects—Situation Not Improved.

London, Sept. 27.—A letter from Tripoli dated Sept. 21 says: "On the day that the Italian newspapers intimated that Italians contemplated an expedition to occupy Tripoli were received here, every cafe and theatre, all the shops and stores were instantly closed and word was passed immediately to the Arabs throughout the town to meet in the Great Mosque to decide what they should do."

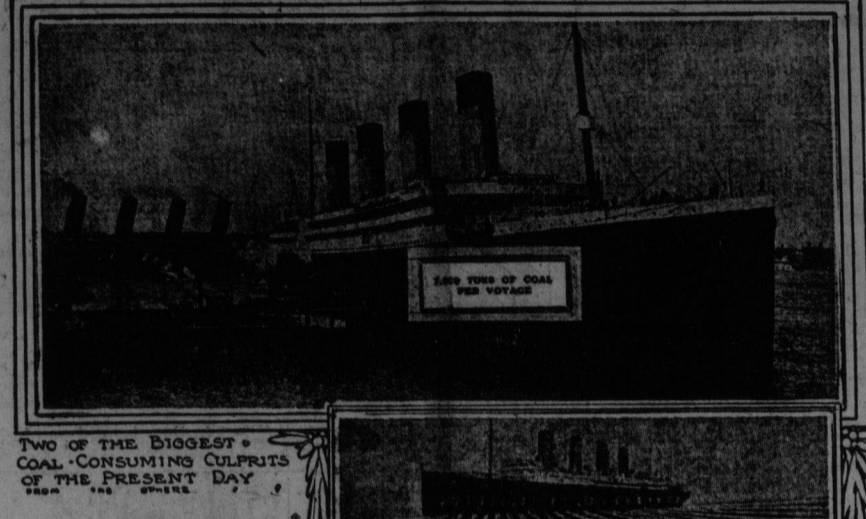
Malta, Sept. 27.—The Anglo-Maltese colony of Tripoli has petitioned the Governor of Malta for protection. Telegrams from Tripoli say that great uneasiness exists among the British subjects. They have raised the Union Jack over their houses. The British cruisers Suffolk and Barbarn are here.

Chasso Switzerland, Sept. 27.—Today's advice from Rome state that the anti-militarist demonstrations have assumed a grave character in the provinces of Ravenna and Forlì. A mob has stopped the trains which were transporting troops being moved in connection with the Turkish-Tripoli, the rioters using street cars to form barricades in the streets.

At times during the afternoon the market was almost demoralized. The close was nervous and unsettled. To lead the market for the day were the largest of the year.

Paris, Sept. 27.—The Italian embassy here today authorized the declaration that Italy needs satisfaction from Turkey for a series of recent incidents.

TON OF RADIUM COULD PROPEL A BIG SHIP FOR THIRTY YEARS



Two of the biggest coal-consuming elements of the present day. PREMIER-ELECT AND SIR WILFRID WERE GUESTS AT NOTABLE OTTAWA BANQUET

Farewell Function to Earl Grey by Ottawa Canadian Club -- Governor General Announces that He will Leave Canada on Oct. 12, but Intends to Pay us Another Visit Later.

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—The announcement that Earl Grey has postponed his departure from Oct. 6 to Oct. 12, in view of the political situation now existing at Ottawa, was made by the governor general himself tonight at the farewell banquet tendered him by the Canadian Club of Ottawa.

Canada was depending for continuance of her political liberties on the supremacy of the British navy. Some might say that her liberties depended on the Monroe doctrine, but the Monroe doctrine like the independence of the Dominion depended on the British navy. He did not know at what price the Monroe doctrine could be valued if the British navy were swept from the seas.

Good Words From Grey. In conclusion, Earl Grey spoke in high terms of the National service which would be made of the Hudson Bay Railway and made happy reference to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Borden who had been premier and leader of opposition during his term of office. He congratulated the people of Canada on their good fortune in having as leaders of the opposing parties men whose characters set them so high a standard of example.

Italian Freighters Recalled. Saloniki, European Turkey, Sept. 27.—All the Italian merchant vessels in Ottoman waters have been recalled.

RUSSELL CASE IS SHROUDED IN DEEP MYSTERY

Action Brought by Former St. John Man Will be Dragged Out. Were Decoy Messages Sent to Mr. Russell?

Montreal, Sept. 27.—It was made very plain at today's hearing of the action of David Russell against the Pinkerton Detective Agency that the hearing is going to be a long one. Most of the day was devoted to preliminary work, reading a few scores of telegrams involved and trying to find out just what they all meant.

These telegrams included a number sent to Mr. Russell in New York purporting to come from Silas Carpenter, chief of the Montreal detective bureau. They were delivered to Mr. Russell in New York and all were to the effect that Mr. Carpenter would keep an appointment with Mr. Russell at once but would be able to do so only after a short delay.

McNamara Sent Them. Mr. McNamara in his testimony showed that the telegrams in question were sent, not by Mr. Carpenter, who was nowhere near New York at the time, but by himself, though who there was need for this deception he did not explain.

Plot and Counter Plot. The whole thing was a mass of efforts to show plot and counter plot against Mr. Russell, with telegrams sent under false names and testimony as to the devious movements of the dramatic personae.

THE CAMORRIST LARGE DRAGS ON

Captain Fabroni and Lawyers for the Defence May Carve Each Other on "Field of Honor."

Viterbo, Sept. 27.—There was a sensational incident at the afternoon session of the Camorrist trial which necessitated an adjournment of the court and will result in a protracted fight between the defence and the lawyers for the defence.

Mr. Borden's Tribute. Mr. Borden in his first public speech since the election opened with a cordial tribute to the splendid energy and vigor which Sir Wilfrid Laurier had displayed in the struggle just terminated.

NO DATE SET FOR RESIGNATION OF GOVERNMENT. Ottawa, Sept. 27.—There is nothing definite as to when the government will resign. Much business has to be considered and the ministers from the west are not back. It is stated that Sir Wilfrid is endeavoring to prevent Earl Grey from leaving his departure and for that reason visited Rideau Hall this afternoon.

THE ROYAL SOCIETY HONORS EARL GREY. Ottawa, Sept. 27.—The Royal Society of Canada presented Earl Grey with an address of farewell regret and appreciation today. It was informally handed over by Dr. W. F. King, Dominion Astronomer, president of the society, mentioning what the retiring Governor General had done towards encouraging letters, science and arts for the Dominion.

FRENCH TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS COLLIDE. Toulon, France, Sept. 27.—The torpedo boat destroyers Trident and Mousqueton, collided during the manoeuvres of the French navy today. The Mousqueton was rather badly stove in, but was able to make port. No fatalities have been reported.

IS SOUTHERN GIRL A MODERN BORGIA?

Annie Crawford of New Orleans May Have Poisoned Mother, Father and Two Sisters — All Died Suddenly. New Orleans, La., Sept. 27.—Following a report that the stomach of Elsie Crawford who died suddenly a few days ago contained opium Miss Annie Crawford, a sister, was arrested today. Though no formal charge has been made, the police assert there is evidence to warrant holding her.

The business before the meeting of the water and sewerage board yesterday afternoon was mostly of a routine character. The engineer, Mr. Scully, reported that the work on the extension of the water main along the waterfront had been completed.

No Tenders For Work.

The common clerk reported that he had not received any tenders for excavation work in Sydney, Mecklenburg and Princess streets, East Side, and St. John street, West Side, since the board had advertised for tenders.

Contractors Responsible.

He said that the contractor, Kane and Williams, who were digging the trench, were responsible for the provisions of their contract for man and apparently had not sustained any injuries beyond a shake-up and a wetting.

Yesterday morning Miss Akroyd started from the foot of East Twenty-sixth street at twelve minutes past ten o'clock. Those familiar with tidal conditions in local waters advised her to start at nine, but for some reason or other she lost more than ten hours before striking the pier. She made excellent progress down the East River, but her greatest speed was obtained from the Battery to Coney Island.

This stretch was covered in four hours and ten minutes, creating a new record. She also established a new mark for the swim from East Twenty-sixth street to Norton's Point her best time being one hour and a quarter better than the best previous figures set by another Boston girl, Miss Rose Pitouf. Miss Akroyd left the water in fine condition.
