ITALIAN AIR RAID

For Every Man in Navy Drop Bombs and Grenades Two Persons Contribute in Retaliation for Enemy Some Phase of Work to Outrages-All But One of Maintain Fleet's Effici- Raiders Return Safely.

London, Feb. 20—The magnitude of the work going in the navy is shown in a letter from the Admiralty to Sir Gilbert Parker, answering his inquiry in the House of Commons on the number of people engaged in all branches of the navy aid of naval work.

The letter states that the navy per had 146,000 officers and men when the war broke out, which number has now increased to 320,000, with the authority granted for a further increase to 550,000 officers and men, besides 67,000 naval reserves. There are also 85,000 men engaged in work at Royal dockyards, and other naval establishments, and several times that number on Admiralty work under contract and sub-contract.

Besides these, the letter specifies men engaged in getting coal for the fleet.







New York, Feb. 19—The market was firegular again today on a diminishing scale of operations. Trading was wholly professional, next week's holiday and the complex international situation causing a complete elimination of public interest.

Some of the early gains underwent substantial reductions in the later dealings, when active selling of coppers and Cruchle Steel caused recestions.




## WILLARD IN BEO, BOUT WITH MORAN MAY BE FURTHER POSTPONED
