"The supposition," the chancellor said, "which has recently arised, that some differences of opinion existed on the peace question between its and our allies belongs to the realm of fable. I expressly affirm this now with certainty. I am, at the same time, also expressing the conviction that the leading statesmen of the powers which are our allies are with us. "In the discussion of our war aims the only guiding line for me is the early and satisfactory conclusion of the war.
