THE MIRAMICHI VALLEY RAILWAY.

As this is a matter of vital importance to the people of the Northern section of this Province, we resume its consideration. For years our people had alternations of hope and disappointment with reference to the Intercolonial Railway...

Having given some reasons, showing a few of the benefits which the construction of the Miramichi Valley railway would confer on this country, we will now proceed, in an impartial manner, to consider the benefits which will arise to the country of Northumberland and to all the counties of the Province...

The country on the northern and north-eastern side of the Miramichi is yet a vast unexplored territory, and there are many small streams which the Miramichi Valley railway would cross, at the mouths of which much small lumber, shingles, planks, boards, and spool wood could be manufactured...

The distance from Newcastle to McAdam Junction, via the Intercolonial, is 22 miles. The Miramichi Valley railway would be 172 miles, thus a saving would be effected of 81 miles to persons travelling from the United States to the Province of New Brunswick...

Now, Fredericton, is 25 miles nearer to the United States than the Miramichi Valley railway, and Fredericton, via the Miramichi Valley, would be 55 miles nearer to St. John than the Intercolonial. It is therefore a saving would be effected of 80 miles in the carriage of goods from the United States to Newcastle...

Oats and fodder for the supply of teams, working on Miramichi, now comes largely from Prince Edward Island. But while there are special rates granted to parties engaged in other industries, fish shippers, who send from three to four car loads of fish to the market, do not receive any special rates...

From this it will be noticed that little progress may be expected in the advance of agriculture in the valley of the Miramichi until railroad communication be afforded the inhabitants. And how can the man who has 40 or 50 acres of land, and who has to market his produce, and who has to carry his small produce such a distance, as the expense incurred would take away all his profits...

It hardly appears fair that the communication between the great Bay of Fundy and the interior of the Province, should be so much longer than it need be, and it does seem that the merchants of Miramichi, who are the only ones who are benefited by the Crown, should be entitled to some more consideration than they have received...

Public Requirements.

The World is lending its aid in endeavoring to obtain the construction of a telephone line between Chatham and Esquimaux, which is much needed, particularly in the summer season. It will be remembered that we made this the subject of a leading article in the Advocate a few weeks ago...

The World also draws attention to the fact that the mail accommodation between Chatham and the parish of Hardwicke is not at all keeping with the importance of the lumbering and fishing interests of that extensive parish, and shows that the one mail per week now despatched from Chatham to Esquimaux ought to give place to postal accommodation more in keeping with the times...

Very extensive preparations are now in progress for the packing of lobsters during the coming season. There will be over 300,000 lbs. packed in Gloucester alone. Several of these will be new. The following are the new ones so far as known at present...

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Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 8. In answer to Mr. Chatham, Mr. St. Leonard Tilley stated that the net debt of Canada on December 31st, 1881, was \$14,065,910, against \$15,395,780 in 1880. The increase was \$1,329,870. This reduction has been effected in spite of the expenditure of \$1,000,000 upon capital account of no less than \$5,131,133, than that the real saving to the country has amounted to \$4,841,009; or, to put it in another way, the net debt has been reduced by \$1,329,870, or 9.5 per cent. of the total debt.
