#### Youths Corner.

##### IF I WERE A BOY.

Classes for letter-picking and word-learning, for spelling and reading, are good; but the best class, to be carried out and organized, is the class of letter-picking and word-learning. I should treat the folk kindly, and not tease them; slow respect to superiors; be tender toward the unlearned; the best literature, works of the imagination, history, science and art, according to my taste and fortune. July 25.—The fishermen on the Grand River, who have had no luck to be very much disappointed owing to the number of fish which have been killed by the recent fire up in Salmon Branch, a tributary of the main river. It appears that a very destructive fire broke out on the banks of this stream and burned every bush and shrub clear to the surface, after a very heavy rain came and washed the ashes and cinders down in the stream, which substance, together with the intense heat caused by the fire, is supposed to be the cause of the great destruction among the fish. The fishermen who have just arrived from Salmon Branch say that the shores of the stream are covered with thousands of dead fish. Here and there, he also reports that they will see among the smaller fish a large salmon weighing from 40 to 50 lbs. This must be a great disappointment to those interested in the river.

An Ottawa despatch says: A gentleman who has been accompanying the international fisheries commission on its tour, and who returned to Ottawa, states that visiting the Grand peninsula the commissioners were greatly struck with the decadence seen in old fishing towns. Some of these towns formerly fitted out large fleets of fishing vessels, but the industry has decayed to such an extent that few vessels now leave those ports annually. The commission observed evidence that a number of Ottawa's fishing vessels have been engaged poaching in Canadian waters this spring.

ANNEX, N. Y., July 27.—William C. Taylor, a convict, was hanged at Sing Sing prison, September 20, 1892. At the current was turned on the foot rest on the chair broke and the underpinning gave way. Taylor began to gasp when the current was ordered to be turned on again, but the dynamo had burned out. A lineeman connected with the prison apparatus electric light plant repaired the chair in an hour. Taylor was placed in the repaired chair and current turned on. He was given morphine and died in a few minutes. In half a minute after the second application he was pronounced dead. The physicians agreed that it was impossible to pain after the first contact.
