### GLAD THEY'RE IN CANADA.

The fact that the new Yukon diggings, the Klondike district, are in British Columbia, will delight the promoters of the Yukon, says the *Alaska Seaboard*. We regret exceedingly that we should ever have to make such a statement, but the truth of it will be readily recognized by all who know anything of the history of the country. For years the Yukon has been a large gold-producing region, but not one dollar has our government expended in building trails or in assisting the miners in any way. All it has ever done has been to give these people deputy collectors of internal revenue and customs and a poor mail service one season. Now there will be a radical change. The Canadian government will doubtless pursue its regular wise and liberal policy, build trails, courts, etc. It is a lamentable fact, but nevertheless true, that the Yukon before another year has rolled around will sing "God Save the Queen" more heartily than they ever sang "My Country, 'Tis of Thee." When will the United States learn that the allegiance a subject pays his country is measured by the treatment he receives? The whole thing is a matter of reciprocity. We live in a practical age rather than one of sentiment.

### ROSSLAND LABOR MARKET.

Roseland is well supplied with female labor of all kinds. Numbers of girls have been taken in by families who had no need of help. These girls are not, in most cases, earning any wages and their presence in the camp results only in a lowering of the scale of wages for all kinds of work for women. The outside press will confer a favor on the people of this community if it will inform the public that there are more laborers now in Roseland than can find work, and that there will soon be a little army of unemployed laborers without resources continue to pour into the district at the present rate.—Roseland Miner.

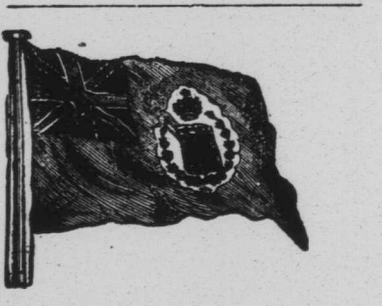
