There has been many a man up to his chin in scientific perfections which proved their science, and no divine revelation, his pen a scimitar flung into the heart of theology, and experience, who were afterwards discomfited and captured for God-given little three-year-old child who has got up and put her snowy arms around his snowy neck, and asked some simple question about God and himself.

Oh, make a flank movement; steal a march on the devil, cheat that man into heaven. A \$3 trifle that will stand all the laws of homiletics may fail to do that which a penny tract, a Christian essay may accomplish. Oh, ye more Christians in attendance, not lying in idleness, but waiting for a quickening, waiting until just the right time comes. Do not talk to a man about the vanity of this world on the day when he has bought something at "twelve" and is going to sell it at "fifteen." But talk to him about the vanity of the world on the day when he has bought something at "fifteen" and is compelled to sell at "twelve." Do not rub a man's disposition the wrong way. Do not take the imperative mood when the exclusive mood will do just as well. Do not talk in perferred tenses, as "pleasure" or "try to take a toll tomorrow" with him. You can take any man for Christ if you know how to get at him. Do not send word to him that to-morrow at 10 o'clock you propose to come and converse upon him, but come on him by a skilful, persevering, God directed ambulance.

Lesson the fourth: The importance of taking good aim. This is John's aim, how are those people in ambush, up, you-der to know when they are to drop on their city, and how are they to drop. And John to know when they are to stop their flight, and advance. There must be some signal—a signal to stop the one division and to start the other. Joshua, with a spear on which were entwined the colors of battle, points toward the city. He stands in such a conspicuous position, and there is so much of the morning light dripping from that spear tip, that all around the horizon of the city. In our pulpits and pews and prayer meetings we want to get a reputation for saying pretty things, and we point our spear toward the city of heaven, or we want a reputation for saying sublime things, and we point our spear toward the stars, or we want to get a reputation for historical knowledge, and we point our spear toward the past, or we want to get a reputation for great liberality, and we point our spear all around, and it strikes all points of the horizon, and you can make out of it whatever you please. While there are old, young, proud, rebellious, and armed against all righteousness, and instead of rising, they farther away from us. Now, we ought to turn around, plant our feet in the compass of the stars, and lift the old cross and point it in the direction of the cross's conquest till the one point of the horizon of heaven is marbled down from the other side, the last latitude of all is compelled to swing out to ornament of Exodus. Oh, church of God, take aim and conquer.

I have heard it said: "Look out for a man who had only one idea; he is a heretic." I say: Look for the man who has one idea, and that a determined one for soul saving. I believe God would strike me dead if I did not have a purpose to appear in any other direction. Oh, for some of the courage and enthusiasm of Joshua. He flung two arrows, and the tip of that spear. It is sinful for us to rest, unless it is to get stronger minds and fresher brains and purer hearts for God's work. I feel on my head the burden of Christ in a new century, and you do not feel the same omnipotent pressure. There is a word for all of us, that we might stand up side by side and point the spear toward the city. It ought to be taken. It will be taken. The cities are drifting toward loose religion or what is called "liberal Christianity," which is so liberal that it takes all the cardinal doctrines of the Bible, so liberal that it surrenders the rectitude of the throne of the Almighty. That is liberality with a vengeance. Let us decide upon a work and walk in the name, heaven to do, and in the strength of God, go to work and do it.

It is comparatively easy to keep on a parade and a shower of bouquets and hand clapping, and the whole of the face blackened hazar; but it is not so easy to stand up in the day of battle, the face bathed with smoke, the uniform covered with the earth plowed up by the bullets and bursting shells, and to hold the regiment cut to pieces, and wait the commander crying, "Forward, march!" Then it requires old-fashioned valor. My friends, the great trouble of the kingdom of God in this day is the cowardice, and to depend on a parade day, and at the communion, when they have on their robes of Christian profession, and put them out in the great battle of life at the first shadow of a doubt of skepticism they dodge, they fall back, they break ranks. We confront the enemy, we open our eyes against fraud, and lo! we find on our heads a great many medals, and we say to pay their debts. And we open the battle against intemperance, and we find on our own side a great many medals who drink too much. And we open the battle against profanity, and we find on our own side a great many men, who make hard speech. And we open the battle against infidelity, and we find on our own side a great many men who are not quite sure about the Book of Jonah. And while we ought to be marching our troops, and bringing forth more than the untainted courage of Antietam, Waterloo, and Gettysburg, we have to be spending our time in hunting up antislavery. There are great many in the Lord's army who would like to go out on a campaign with sin slippers and holding under their feet their heads to keep off the heavy lead, and having nations of open sinners, slacks and lemon custards. If they cannot have them, they want to go home, they think it is unhealthy, and so they buy bullets!

I believe that the next twelve months will be the most stupendous year that we have ever saw. The nations are quaking now with the coming of our day, and you can see the men of the day of Joshua, but of down the men of the day. You put your eye to the rail track and you can hear the train coming miles away. So I put my eye to the open door, and I hear the thundering on of the lightning triums of the merces and the mercy. The mercy of God first to be tried upon this nation. It will be preached in the pulpits, and on the streets, everywhere. People will be invited to accept the mercy of the Gospel and there will be the song and the prayer will be "mercy." But suppose they will not accept the mercy of mercy—what then? Then God will come with his judgments, and the great sorrows will be sent, and the frets will devastate the valleys, and the defalcations will swallow the money makers, and the fires will sweep the cities, and the earth will quake from pole to pole.

Year of jubilee and of woe. Which side are you going to be on? With the men of Aï or the men of Jehovah? Pass over this Sabbath into the ranks of Israel. I would clap my hands at the joy of your coming. You will have a poor chance for this world and the world to come without Jesus. You cannot stand what is to come upon you and upon the world unless you have the pardon and the comfort and the help of Christ. Come over. On this side is your happiness and safety, on the other side is the quietude and despair. Eternal defeat to the men of Aï! Eternal victory to the men of Jehovah!

THE IMMIGRATION PROBLEM.

Some of the papers are discussing what they call "The Immigration Problem," or rather—the immigration problem—for their remarks apply to the people coming in, not to those going out of the province, the latter being the more serious of the two. The immigration problem, as we take it, is—given great areas of cultivable lands in all the provinces of the dominion—how are the governments of the separate provinces to induce a desirable class of immigrants to settle on them. If the writers who are discussing the problem are correct, the immigrants who are coming in belong to the undesired class, people who, having found their way to Canada, are greatly displeased with the prospects before them, and are wishing themselves back in the old country again; artisans, work people generally, who came to compete in the over-crowded labor market in the cities, and are looked upon with no friendly eyes by the native working class; and impoverished people, brought to the dominion by the hands of charitable societies, many of whom having nothing but habits, bring with them habits of vicious idleness instead of virtuous industry. We suppose that all the immigrants who come into the dominion are not of the undesirable class, though they are sufficiently numerous to give grounds for raising a general complaint against the state of immigration. It is certain that those of the province want grumblers who will not settle to work on the land with a will, or to work to overwork the centres of labor, and in times of depression to increase their misery, or persons with a certain calling or business, and with a disposition to gain a sort of living somewhat with the least labor. There are, no doubt, a number of desirable immigrants coming into the dominion every year, but for stay in the cities, or in the provinces, being attracted to the Northwest territory and the United States. And it is the policy of the Dominion Government to induce immigration thither to the detriment of the long but far from fully settled, old provinces. It seems as if people almost thought that there is some magic virtue in the soil of the Northwest territory, which will make more bountiful the harvest than the old ones. Some time ago the faith in the golden fortune of the west was even greater than at present. To youth, desirous of pushing its fortune, the late Horace Greeley, a number of years ago, gave the advice, "Go west young man, go west," and some young men, took his advice to heart. Now on the line of railway between Denver and Cheyenne there is a settlement called after his name, reclaimed from the alkali sand desert of Colorado by irrigation. It may be progressing tolerably well, but the same amount of labor in the east, where there was wooded mountain, rushing river, and fertile plains, would surely have produced greater results. Besides, in a province by the seaboard, (like New Brunswick) the settlers would have easy access to the delights of civilization. There is something romantic in the words, "the boundless, rolling prairie," but the solitude of a small or single settlement in midst of a vast treeless expanse of grass, with patches of black ploughed soil, comes to be heart-breaking, and takes the cheery life out of many a settler. How much more comfortable and inviting would it be to have a farm near some of the New Brunswick rivers—with a clearing to the woods, if people would only think so, and not allow themselves to be cheated by the words west or far west, or northwest.

It need not be expected that the Dominion government will do anything to draw desirable immigrants to New Brunswick or any of the older provinces; that must be the work of the local government. Yet it is difficult to state what should be done. Probably an efficient mode of bringing the province before the eyes of intending immigrants would be to have a standing government advertisement, setting forth the advantages of the province as a place of settlement, and stating where pamphlets descriptive of its resources and other necessary information might be obtained, in a number of the principal papers of Great Britain and the continent.

THE SITUATION ABOARD.

The foreign correspondents of the great London dailies have had a hard and shakeling and shuffling to follow out the windings and shiftings of the policy of the Emperor and the Emperor's court in Europe. They prefer to interview persons attached to the Courts, who are familiar with all the secrets of "la haute politique," but somehow the world, after reading their lucubrations, is as much in the dark as ever as to the warlike or pacific intentions of the Imperial master of vast armies. All during winter months grew of the assembling and disbanding of masses of troops or the Russian and Austrian frontiers. London editors confidently predicted war in spring. Spring came and the rumors passed away without report of cannon. For over two years London editors have prophesied a great European conflict with such persistence that

it almost seemed as if they wished that war, which they professed to deplore, would break out, just to show that they were not at fault in reading signs of the times, and for the excitement war would cause, and the impetus it would give to teachers of languages, and to the circulation of their papers. They have cried, "Wolf, wolf," so long without danger appearing, that people have ceased to be moved by their alarms.

There was nothing concerning the state of Europe of which some editors were so confident as that the accession of a young German Emperor to the throne (who has been characterized as ambitious, arrogant, restless, morose and cold), would mean war. They may be right in the long run, but at present there is no immediate danger of its outbreak. William II. has shown in a marked manner his determination to cultivate most friendly relations with the Czar, and has thus it may be said, shown himself to be explicitly hostile to England. It is difficult to perfect his friendship for the Czar with respect to Austria which power regards Russian intrigues in the Balkans and designs on Turkey as dangerous to its interests. However in deference to the young German Emperor, the Czar will in present preserve a peaceful attitude in Europe, and not interfere in Bulgaria until Prince Ferdinand is either deposed or abdicates, then Germany will recognize or support whatever candidate for the Bulgarian throne the Czar may put forward, a course of policy which means trouble sooner or later. In the meantime Russia will have leisure to pursue her advances in Central Asia and raise alarm in England about India.

Free Trade in Michigan.

Free Trade in Michigan would be a boon to our Canadian neighbors just over the line. They could throw their farm produce upon Michigan's market at a mere nominal cost of transportation, and make the farmers of Michigan take a back seat. Labor is cheaper in Canada than it is in Michigan.—Detroit Tribune.
