MOUNT ALLISON MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In another column of this issue will be found an announcement of the campaign which Mount Allison is undertaking to raise funds for the erection of a Memorial Library.

The original intention, as outlined in earlier notices in the press, was that the building should be in memory of Mount Allison men and women only, that it should record the names of the dead as well as commemorate the service of the College in the War. But as the plan of the campaign has developed, from many quarters the suggestion has come that it should have a wider application, and should memorialize the service not only of Mount Allison men and women, but should record as well the contribution of all Methodist men and women to the common cause. This suggestion has been fully considered by the Committee in charge and has met with its full approval.

This means a larger and more pretentious building with a special room devoted to the records of Methodists who have served and died, a room which will be of perennial interest to Methodism. The widened scope of the memorial, combined with an original under-estimate of the necessary endowment, meant that the objective originally set had to be increased to \$150,000.00.

Over The Top

Mr. Charles Robinson, Secretary Returned Soldiers Commission with headquarters at St. John, N. B., arrived in Campbellton on the Limited Wednesday, Mar. 26th and addressed a large gathering of the members of the Restigouche Branch of the G.W.V.A. at their regular weekly meeting held at their rooms, Murray Hall.

Mr. Robinson's address was very timely and was well received by all present.

Although he is not a resident of Campbellton, Mr. Robinson is of North Shore birth and has not left a stone unturned to help further any worthy object that will benefit this part of the Province.

It might be mentioned here that Mr. Robinson was largely instrumental in securing the appointment of the Labor Bureau for Campbellton and that this Bureau will be in full swing in the course of a few days.

A resolution was passed by the Veterans at last night's meeting that a bridge be built across the Restigouche River from Campbellton, N. B., to St. Anne de Restigouche. Mr. Robinson heartily approved of this resolution and promised to do his utmost to aid in having the bridge built as he considers it a very necessary piece of work, not only as the means of giving employment to Returned Soldiers, but as a long felt need linking up the two provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec and that it will be a great impetus for tourist travel.

This contemplated bridge has been talked about for years, being an issue at every election but it is not a political issue this time in that sense of the term but a vital matter concerning the welfare of the two provinces, New Brunswick and Quebec and will greatly help to solve the unemployed returned soldier question in this section of the country.

Mr. Robinson has done great work for the N. B. Returned men, placing hundreds of them in good paying positions, as these men can testify.

Before the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks was passed, thanking Mr. Robinson for his able address and for the great work that he has and is accomplishing for the N. B. returned soldiers.

Mr. Robinson made a very feeling reply, thanking the Restigouche Branch for its vote of thanks and he assured the members that he had always done what he could to assist the returned men in their welfare and that his heart was with them and that he would always go out of this way to do any returned man a favor if it laid in his power to do so.

Mr. Robinson left on the Maritime Express the next morning for St. John.

THE C. N. R. AND DAYLIGHT TIME

Important Announcement as to the Train Services.

Canadian National Railways Operating One Hour Earlier—Important Daylight Saving—Change of Time at 2.00 a.m., Sunday March 30th, 1919.

All clocks and watches used in operation of Canadian National Railways will be advanced one hour to prevent serious confusion and inconvenience to the public the attention of all concerned is directed to the following conditions resulting from the important change of time: If Cities, Towns, Villages and other Municipalities bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new Railway time, All concerned should keep in mind that while trains continue to leave Railway Station on present schedule such schedule will be operated one hour ahead of present local time therefore any municipality where local time is not changed to correspond with the new railway time passengers must reach Railway Station one hour earlier than shown in current timetables and public time posters. Where municipal time is changed to correspond with the new Railway time passengers will not experience difficulty growing out of change—2 wks.

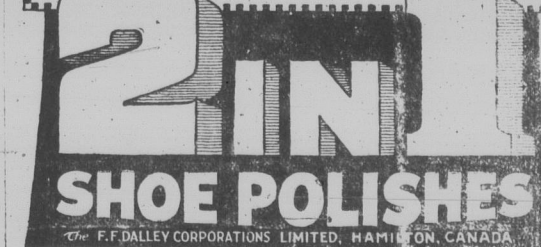

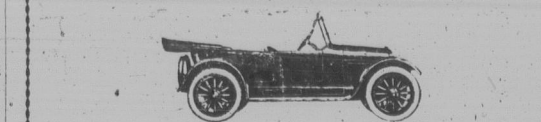

DALHOUSIE.

Dalhousie, April 6.—Following Mr. Michael McDade, of St. John, who addressed a town meeting, in English, in the Court House, here sometime ago Mr. P. P. Morris, at the request of Sir Douglas Hazen, spoke to a large meeting in Dalhousie, last week, fully explaining the War Thrift Stamp movement. Mr. LaBilais presided and in introducing the lecturer to the big audience, referred to the patriotism that had been displayed by the people of Dalhousie and the county of Restigouche in general, in men and money, to help fight the foe. He urged upon the people to invest their small savings in war stamps, to assist the government, to provide pensions for the widows, orphans, and disabled soldiers.

Mr. P. P. Morris, who speaks in public fluently, held the close attention of over 500 persons, who had assembled in the spacious Convent Hall, to hear him, during forty five minutes. He was frequently applauded, as he eloquently appealed to the people, who had not suffered from the effects of the war to economize and to do their bit.

By the conditions under which the ordinary war loans have been floated, a large part of the population was almost necessarily excluded from taking a share in this patriotic duty. The War Savings Thrift Stamp system renders it easy for every wage-earner to make at least some direct contribution to that important end.

But apart altogether from the important value of the system in this regard, it is in our interests as a people for the future, that greater economy be practised and that in a small way it is not too much to hope that the War Savings Stamp movement will help to make Canada a wealthy nation.

In strong terms he spoke of the system of economy in wages in many parishes, in the province of Quebec, and he was loudly cheered, when he gave facts and figures to show how France, had paid such a large indemnity to Germany, after the war of 1870, in comparatively a short time, due to the great saving system, that was practised by the people of France.



overseas with the 122nd Battalion, arrived home last evening, and was given a hearty welcome by his many friends.

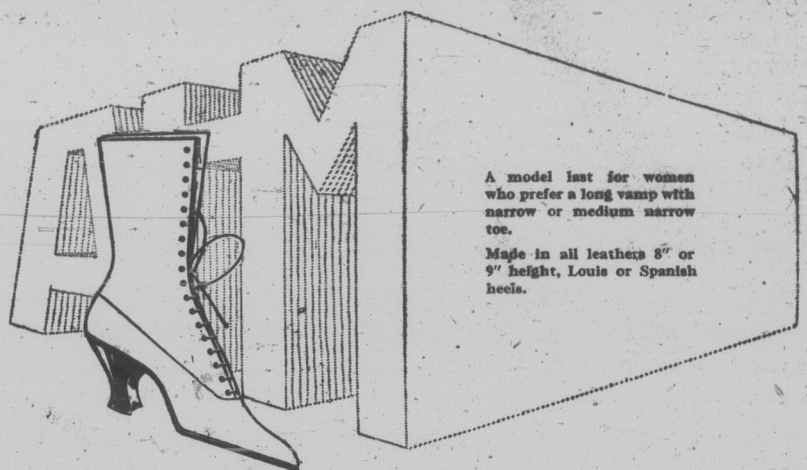
