Earl Roberts presided, and on his right sat Ambassador Choate, while at the same table were Lord Chancellor Halsbury, Stanford Newell, United States minister to the Nether-Baron Strathcona, the Canadian High Commissioner; Lord, Reay, Lord Farquhar, Lord Grey and the Arch-deacon of London. Many leading members of the American colony in

London were present.

Earl Roberts, the chairman, in proposing the toast of "The President of the United States and King Edward " said that Mr. Roosevelt was the President of the most enterprising republic that the world had ever seen. and that King Edward was the sovereign of an empire on which the sun never sets. Their most earnest desire was that America and Great Britain might ever continue the same fast The toast was drunk with enthusiasm.

The total of production was \$13,577,440, an increase of \$1,746,354, or 19 per cent, over 1901. Mr. Jameson, of Newbury, to preach, Dr. McCrae to address the minister, and Rev. D. R. Drummond to address the people.

The nomination of a successor to the late Principal McVicar, of Montreal College, was laid over until the next meeting of the presbytery. On behalf of the home mission committee, Rev. G. A. MacGillivray reported a careful watch was being kept for any point where services might be be gun. So far the only prospective point was in West London, where Sunday

school work was being done under the care of St. Andrew's session. Rev. H. W. Reede, of St. Thomas. convener of Young People's Societies, reported from 28 congregations, showng a great variety of organizations-Home Mission Societies, Christian Endeavor Clubs, Bible study, etc. The total membership reported is 1,142, an increase of 76 over last year. CIGARETTES AND "HOOKEY" TWO EVILS DEALT WITH

Condemns Former; Will Appoint Inspector for Latter.

The small boys of London addicted to the time-honored practice of playing "hookey," will have their peaceful hours seriously disturbed this summer if they attempt to go swimming in school hours. A man who will have no other work than to watch "mitchers" will be appointed by the board of education. Up to the present a member of the police force has done the work, but hereafter his place will be taken by a municipal officer. It was the custom for the truant officers appointed from the police to go to teachers, secure a list and hunt up bad boys who were known to be g the "hookey" act. The aim of his successor will be, however, to obtain not only those who go to school when they feel like it, and whose names are on the roll, but those who have never been to school, and whose names are not record-ed. When he sees a boy on the streets during school hours he will endeavor to find out why that boy is not studying. A census will be made of the city, so that very few homes in which are children who should be at school, but who are not, will be missed. The office was created last night, and the details were left for No. 1 committee to arrange. They will recommend a man to fill the position. The necessity of creating this post struck the board forcibly, and they adopted the suggestion, which came originally from the Trades and Labor Council, after it had been well discussed.

NO FREE TEXT BOOKS.

The board, on a vote, in which the chairman held the deciding ballot, refused to consider Trustee McLean's motion to the effect that a scheme for having free text books in the public schools be revised. While no very vigorous opposition was entered, the fact that no provided and the schools of the schools provision could be made for it in the estimates, kept the majority from favoring it. Those who thought the idea a good one said that it would be a great educational advancement. "It will come some time, and it would befit us to be the first to set it going," said Trustee McLean. "A short time ago ink had to be paid for in the schools." "Might as well give children their din-

ners when they get to school," said Trustee Blackwell. "The people who can't afford text books aren't the ones who can't afford dinners," said Trustee McLean.
