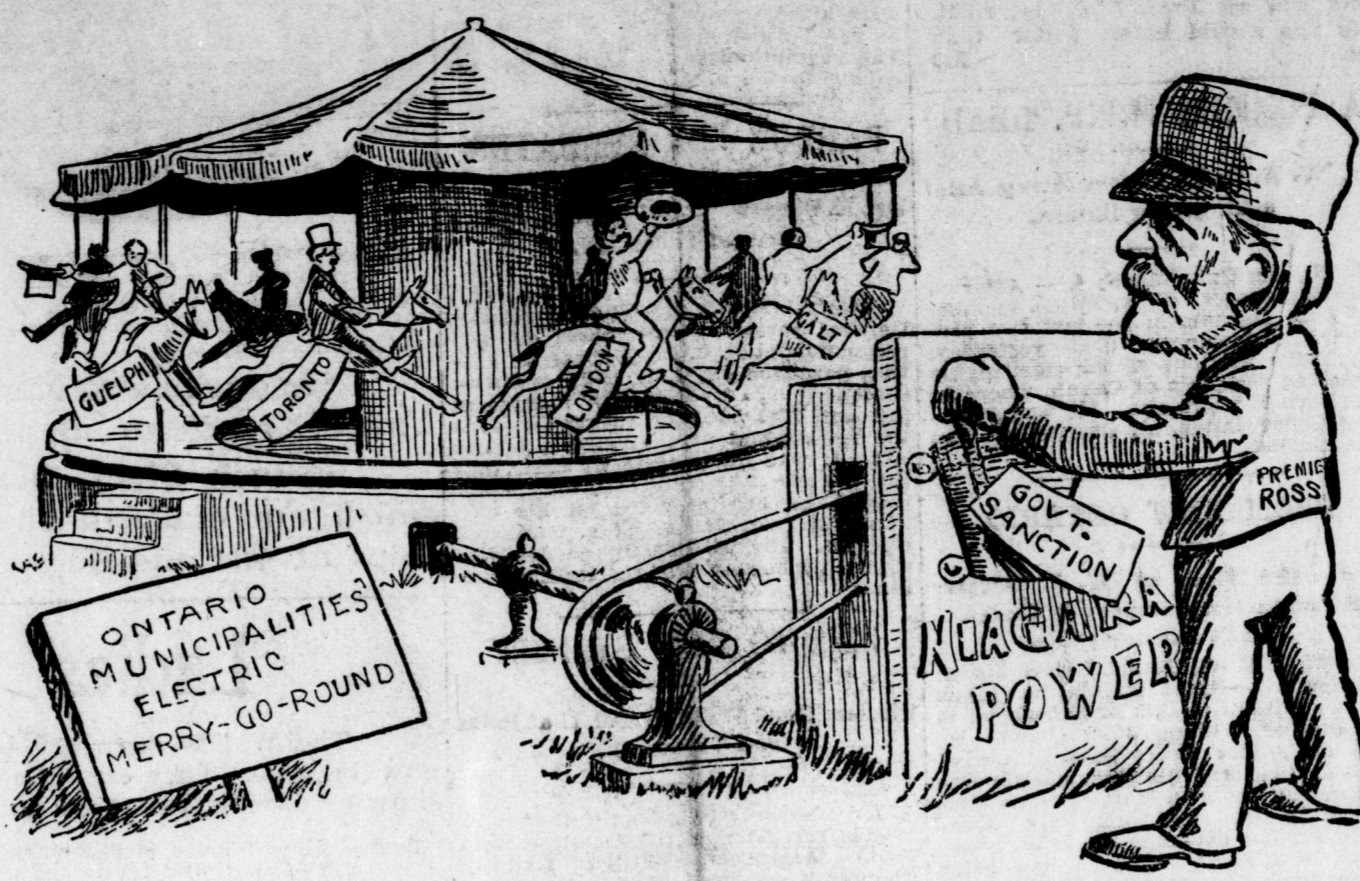

It is just possible that an agitation may be started towards the abolition of the restrictions governing the importation of mechanics and laborers.



Corruption in Soo Election; Judges Report Four Men

Toronto, March 4.—In giving judgment, unseating Andrew Miscampbell, Conservative member-elect for Sault Ste. Marie, the court, composed of Justice Osler and Chief Justice Falconbridge, finds the agency of E. Morreault established, and that he was guilty of corrupt practices in paying Albert Roy and one Delargey. The payment of \$235 to Morreault by and on behalf of the respondent Miscampbell, the court finds was without corrupt intent, but was illegal. No costs were awarded.

BRITISH TRADE FLOURISHES

Increase of Over Fifty Million Dollars in 1902—Lord Avebury Optimistic.

London, March 4.—Lord Avebury, who presided at the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday, congratulated the members upon the state of British trade. He announced that both imports and exports had increased in 1902 to a total of \$212,000,000. This was an increase of over \$20,000,000 over the previous twelve months, and was the record for British trade.

TO FIGHT AMERICAN TRADE

Combines to Be Formed in Europe—Germans Take the Lead.

London, March 4.—The first practical step towards the organization of a European combination against American competition has now been taken. A number of German businessmen, under the leadership of the foremost German political economist, Julius Wolf, of Breslau, have formed a central European commercial association to fight American trusts, not by hostile tariffs or commercial alliances, but by the formation of trusts extending over two or more European countries.

SCOTCH GET CONTRACT

Hamburg, March 4.—A sailor of the name of Hellsten, the sole survivor of the British steamer Cambrian Prince, from Coquimbo, Nov. 21, for Middleborough, which was wrecked in the North Sea on Feb. 27, was landed here today by the British steamer Claverling, which rescued him from a boat last Saturday. The rescue was effected with difficulty owing to the high sea that was running at the time.

CARLYLE AND HIS WIFE

Will Be Vindicated by New Letters—A Literary Surprise.

London, March 4.—The publication of the letters of Mrs. Jane Welch Carlyle to Thomas Carlyle, was the occasion of an interesting dinner, last night, when John Lane entertained a small company of literary men, and the effect of the production of the letters, suppressed by fraud, was informally discussed. Among the guests were Alexander Carlyle, the philosopher's nephew, who has assumed the responsibility of editing the letters, and Sir James Crichton-Browne, who has written an introduction to the book. W. S. Tilley, Sir Glizeau Reid, Augustine Birrell and others were present. It is probable that the memory of the Chelsea philosopher, which was left under a cloud by the partial and inconclusive revelation of his domestic relations, will be vindicated at the expense of Froude rather than of Mrs. Carlyle.

ONTARIO MINES YIELD WEALTH; A GREATLY INCREASED OUTPUT

Advance of 19 Per Cent in 1902 Over Preceding Year—The Statistics.

Toronto, March 4.—The report of T. Gibson, director of the bureau of mines, for the year 1902, is full of interest for the student of Ontario's development. The mineral products of Ontario for the year considerably surpassed in volume and value the output of any previous year. The total production was \$13,577,449, an increase of \$1,748,354, or 13 per cent, over 1901. Metallic products contributed \$6,285,259, and non-metallic \$7,292,181, both classes showing an advance as compared with last year's figures.
