

The Argentine Republic has been fixed upon by Baron Hirsch, the Hebrew philanthropist, as a place to settle a large number of the Jews who are being exiled from Russia. The Congress at Buenos Ayres have just ratified the agreement, granting the Baron 1,300 leagues of land-a tract nearly as extensive as the State of Maryland. The Government agrees to make the necessary surveys in the Provinces of Chacas and Missiones free of cost, the Baron then to have the right to select such lands in the mentioned cerritories as he may see fit. No land is to be sold by the Baron for specu-lative purposes. It is to be used solely for colonizers, the Baron agreeing to colonize the land within four years with 50,000 people, and to pay £260,000 as part payment within three months from date of contract. The Government is not to sell any of the lands there without consent of Baron Hirsch. In case Baron Hirsch does not colonize in the stated time the first money—£269,000—is to be returned to him. He is also permitted to import, duty free, all agricultural implements for a period of ten years. The Government is to send, free of cost, all colonists landing at Buenos Ayres, to the colony, and they are to be exempt from taxation for a period of ten years. These are very liberal terms. The exmption from taxation will give the settlers good start. It is just as well for them they have got this concession; the public will have to pay heavy taxes for rs to come as a result of recent specu-

The speedy reconstruction of the Dominion Government has not taken place though many weeks have elapsed since Parliament adjourned, and though the byeelections must be decreed immediately if

One of them gave a testy, somewhat flippant, and wholly inadequate reply to the grave personal reflections involved in certain testimony offered before the committee, and in the refusal to hear other evidence. Sir John Thompson said that 'not a single question was ruled out' in the inquiry. This must have been a slip of memory, for the examination touching the personal aspect of the postoffice case—the proposed inquiry into salaries when absent-was simply bluffed. The natural inference was simply bluffed.

The natural inference was drawn, and is still held as a fair one by the country, that had such an inquiry been pushed, there would have been no Perth demonstration.

"Sir John Thompson showed his old-time skill as an advocate when he declared that 'many of those who had condemned the scandal had not read one line of the evidence.' His gun, when this shot was fired, was pointed at a distinguished citizen of Kingston. But Sir John has not got the range yet for striking that mark. Indeed he is wholly guessing; he is asserting as a fact that for which he has not one job of proof, when he declares that mademners of the scandal 'have not read one line of the evidence.' 
