President Cleveland Takes the Oath of Office.

Departure of Ex-President Harrison for Indianapolis.

Grand Military Parado Accompanied by Howling Blasts of Wind and

Dritting Snew,

Washington, March 5.—The characteristic feature about the inauguration was the clear, steady and excellent enunciation with which President Cleveland's message was delivered, and the absolute absence of any gesture. Mr. Cleveland gave no other emphasis to his remarks than that derived from the emphatic tone and determined nod of the head with which he at times stated some of the more foreible passages of his oration. He spoke without notes and turned from one part of the assembled crowd to the other, sometimes addressing the multitude in front of the stand and then again turning to the side and addressing himself more particularly to the people on the stand. The reference to the currency question provoked considerable cheers, but the loudest approval was given the tariff section of his remarks. The President began the delivery about 1:30 o'clock, and it occupied 25 minutes.

At the conclusion of his remarks Mr. Cleveland turned around to the Chief Justice to take the oath prescribed by the constitution. The Bible used in the ceremony was given President Cleveland by his mother 41 years ago, by his special request it was eight years ago put to the same service for which it was used yesterday.

After the inauguration the Presidential party returned to the White House. At 3 o'clock x-President Harrison and Mrs. Mc Kee bade the assembled party farewell and entered their carriage to x-Postmaster General Wanamaker's for lunch, thence to the station for their departure for hadian.

After spending a few minutes in the parlor, President Cleveland, on the arm of Chairman Berret and accompanied by Gen. Schofield and Admiral Gherardi, proceeded to the reviewing stand and took his place there. The 15,000 souls, more or less, that patiently awaited the approach of the Presidential party to the reviewing stand in the grounds of the White House will probably never forget the experiences of the day. Full play was afforded the northwest wind in the open space between the treasury and the army and navy buildings, and it tore around and about, roaring down the avenue, whistling through the trees, picking up the snow and carrying it into eyes and ears and nostrils, stripping the bunting that decorated the stands from its place and causing the timbers to creak until more than once the advance occupants of the Presidential stand were inclined to abandon their posts. A hearty cheer greeted President Cleveland's appearant on the reviewing stand. As the President appeared before the multitude, and while the cheers were yet rending the air, the bugles sounded "Forward, march," the officers repeated the command, and the line of march was taken up from a point opposite the Treasury Department. Mr. Cleveland followed hisown precedent in saluting only the national flag when it passed him. He also occasionally bowed to friends in the parade. He stood on the stand in the face of the howling wind impassive and dignified, not seeming to mind the waves of dritting snow that were carried in his face.

The weather was too severe to be long withstood with comfort, and the White House party returned at intervals to warm themselves. Towards evening the ladies of the party retired from the stand and did not return. But the enthusiasm of the multitude was not half vented until Gen.

CYCLONE AT THE SOUTH! Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi

Storm-Swept. Several Towns Wiped Out of Existence and a Numer of Lives Lost.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 4.—Reports

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 4.—Reports reach here of a destructive cyclone in East Mississippi and Western Alabama. Many houses were destroyed in the vicinity of Meridian and Corinth, Miss., and it is said thirteen lives are known to have been lost. The town of Toomsuba, Miss., was sweptfrom the face of the earth, only two houses being left standing. At Marion, Miss., every house was blown down. Among the killed are Mrs. Meader and her daughter Myra, who lived half a mile from the station. A negro is also reported killed and Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Harrison, an old couple, fatally injured; Geo. Taylor and Mr. White severely injured.

COLUMBUS, Ga., March 5.—Last night a terrible wind storm swept aeross several counties 50 miles north of Columbus, doing great damage and eausing considerable loss of life. At Greenville, the county seat of Merriweather county, 38 stores and dwellings are reported to have been blown down, and but three business houses in the whole town were left intact. Only one person was killed.

Odessa, a small town near Greenville, is reported to have been completely swept away, and six persons were killed.

About two miles from Woodbury, ten miles east of Greenville, two negroes and one white child were killed. Many are reported to be seriously wounded. Heavy snow fell also at Woodbury this morning.

At Molene, in Pike county, a church, academy, planing mill, two stores and several residences were blown down. Five lives were lost.

Advices from Piedmont, a few miles distant from Molena, report that only two houses out of twenty remain standing. A lady named Hawkins was killed and her parents badly wounded.

Friday night's cyclone destroyed the village of Toomsuba, Miss. Forty out of 48 houses were blown down. Several people were injured but no one killed. A short distance from the village the cyclone blew down a house and stables of Wm. Webb and one of his legs was broken. His daughter was fatally injured and his son killed.

MERIDIAN, Miss., March 5.— News.

MERIDIAN, Miss., March 5. — News reached here that the cyclone struck Barnett station on the Queen and Crescent Railway, wrecking every building in the place and killing fourteen people and injuring twenty others. The family of Daniel Barnett, eight in number were instantly killed.

The cyclone also struck Marion. The track was 300 yards wide, and everything in that track was swept away, wreckage of houses being scattered for miles along its course. Mr. Burton Meadow, 70 years of age, and her daughter, Miss Myra Meadow, 40 years old, were instantly killed.

After destroying Marion, the cyclone cut a swath through the swamp until reaching Good Hope Church, two miles east, which

Good Hope Church, two miles east, which it wrecked. A number of people were killed in the vicinity of Marion, while many sustained injuries.

Sandgate Sinking.

people of Sandgate, county of Kent, were aroused by the rocking of the houses and loud rumblings underground. Walls split, ceilings fell and foundations sank and roots fell. As the inhabitants fied to the streets they found large rents in the ground and were almost overcome by noxious vapors. Everybody supposed the town was being shaken by an earthquake, and hundreds fied in a panic. Troops in an adjacent camp hastened to the aid of the people still in Sandgate. The soldiers find citizens worked for two hours in moving the most valuable property from the houses and in erecting tents in the fields about a mile outside the town for the women and children. At the end of that time the rumbling had ceased and an investigation was made. They found the ground on which Sandgate stands had sunk several feet and that a less subsidence had extended throughout the surrounding district, affect-As the inhabitants fled to the streets feet and that a less subsidence had extended throughout the surrounding district, affectin all about a square mile. The gas mains had been broken and the connection of water pipes had been disturbed so that supplies of both gasand water had been stopped. Many cottages had been wrecked completely and the better built houses had been cracked and thrown out of plumb, so that they could not be occupied with safety. Nevertheless, many of the inhabitants returned to town toward morning. Between 5 and 6 o'clock, however, they were frightened away by further subsidence of the ground and the recurrence of the rumblings. These phenomena have been repeated several times during the day and the town is practically deserted. As far as known no lives have been lost. The disaster was caused by a landslip. The town is built upon a comparatively low cliff close to the sea. The waves are believed to have undermined the cliff, which then settled and slipped toward the water, carrying with it the town. Two hundred houses were destroyed. throughout the surrounding district, affect

Large gatherings attended the anniversary services held yesterday in the Adelaide
Street Baptist Church, the congregation
in the evening especially taxing the capacity
of the auditorium to its utmost extent.
Rev. A. T. Sowrby, pastor of the Aylmer
Baptist Church, preached both morning
and evening and addressed the Sabbath
school in the afternoon. The morning
sermon was a scholarly and at the same
time a decidedly practical discourse. On
the subject of "Christian Fretfulness; Its
Cause and Its Remedy." The reverend
gentleman took for his text Psalm xxxvii.,
verses I and 3, "Fret not thyself because
of evil-doers, neither be thou envious
against the workers of iniquity. * *
Trust in the Lord and do good; so shalt
thou dwell in the land, and
verily thou shalt be fed." Referring to the Psalmist's utterance of
these words, the preacher rapidly and conoisely sketched the varying vicissitudes of
David's life—a life marked by anxiety and
trouble, but brightened by a strong belief
in God's faithfulness to fulfill all his promises. The preacher dealt first with the
cause of Christian fretfulness. He spoke of
the influence of the body on the spirit, the
worry and anxiety incident to the daily
struggle for life—for it is a struggle—and
the personal hardships that the child of
God is subject to. Then there is the
enmity of the world which the Christian has to face. "Whatever the world

CAUSES OF DEATH. The latest bulletin of the census, issued by Geo. Johnston, statistician, contains much that is interesting regarding the mortality of the people. During the year 1891, 67,688 deaths were recorded in the Dominion. The rate is equal to 144.30 deaths of males per 10,000 living males, and 135.70 deaths of females per 10,000 living females. In England the death rate in 1890 was cf males 208 per 10,000 living males, and of females 183 per 10,000 living females. While in England in recent years the conditions of life have become increasingly unfavorable to males as compared with emales, in the four Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the returns show that in 1871 there were 1,076 male deaths to 1,000 female deaths, and in 1891, 1,030 male deaths to 1,000 female deaths. This would seem to show that the conditions of life, in the four Provinces of which there is a record for twenty years, have become more favorable to males. No fewer than 5,915 deaths were attributed to lung diseases, 4,021 to diarrheal diseases, 7,490 to phthisis, and 4,299 to "old age." The deaths from drowning numbered 647; deaths from burns and scalds were 245, 83 of which were occasioned by the destruction by fire of an asylum for the insane at Longue Pointe, Province of Quebec. Almost onehalf of the deaths, or 28,194, were of children under 5 years of age, and the deaths of children under 1 year numbered 18,-568. Between 55 and 65, 3,993 persons died, between 65 and 75, 5,223 died, between 75 and 100, 7,583 died, and no fewer than 68 died who were over 100. These statistics show that life in Canada is decidedly conductive to longevity, though there is still far too great sacrifice of infant

Special attention is directed to the fact that out of 2,006 deaths of children at birth in the whole Dominion, 1,547 are reported from the Province of Quebec, leaving but 459 for all the rest of the Dominion. The eturns show that the deaths thus classified are not localized but are general over the Province. Out of a total of 10,012 deaths of children under one year in the Province of Quebec, no less than 15.4 per cent. were at birth, while in all the rest of the Dominion the deaths under this head are 5.36 per cent. of the total. Put in another way, these deaths are equal to 1,039 per million of the population of Quebec and only 137 per million of the population of Ontario. In epilepsy and convulsions the deaths of infants under 1-year-old were 379 in the Province of Ontario and 174 in the Province of Quebec. The proportion of leaths of infants in Canada as a whole is higher than in either England or Victoria, but closely approximates that of New South

The deaths from cancer recorded for the census year number 1,187, of which 558 were of males and 629 of females. Eight of he deaths from this cause were of children under 5 years and 9 of children between 5 and 15 years. Compared with England and Wales, the ravages of cancer in Canada are small, since in Canada the deaths from this disease are but 246 per million of living persons against 606 per million in England and Wales. Our returns show,

Of these centenarians, 2 females died of paralysis, 1 at 105 years and 1 at 103; 1 female died of heart disease (100) and 1 of cancer (102); I male died of influenza at 103 years, 1 of la grippe (102), 2 of phthisis (106), 1 of accidental fall (104), 1 of alcoholism (102) and 1 of drepsy (103).

She has a displacement of 14,150 tons, and under forced draught she made an average speed of seventeen knots. The trials of her 67-ton turret guns were exceedingly satisfactory. The total cost of the Hood when fully equipped will amount to nearly £950,000. She is a sister ship to the Royal Sovereign except that her guns are mounted in turrets instead of barbettes.

The old oak chest sung of in the mourn ful ballad of "The Mistletoe Bough," in which Lord Lovell's bride hid on her wedwhich Lord Lovell's bride hid on her wedding night while playing hide-and-seek, which proved her tomb, was sold at auction three weeks ago. Many people regard the pathetic tale of the wedding testivities, and of her husband's pitiful search for her through some 50 years, merely as a tale, and a similar story is told in several countries. But it has always been stoutly maintained that the tragic even really did occur at Marwell Old Hall, near Winchester, Eng., and the authenticity of the old oak chest, preserved in the hall until a few years ago, has been accepted without question. Recently the chest passed by inheritance into the possession of the late rector of Upham, Hants, and at his death recently came to public sale.

A woman was brought to a New York hospital some weeks ago suffering from typhoid fever, but one feature of the case could not be accounted for by the diagnosis of typhoid. The woman's body was covered from head to foot with small star England and Wales. Miller, and Hellmuth & Ivey represented the syndicate, and Mr. T. G. Meredith was present in the interests of the city.

Mr. Miller was closeted with the mayor and city solicitor for some time prior to the meeting. Then Mr. Miller left the room, and the council filed into the mayor's office where a private conference was held.

Serious Charges Against an Employment Agency Man.

Accused of Fraud and Conspiracy -Hundreds of Alleged Victims-Branches in London and Brantford.

It is said there will be some sensations

It is said there will be some sensational developments when an investigation is made into the charges of fraud and conspiracy made against William A. Sheppard, of Montreal, the head man in the "Dominion Business Exchange and Employment Agency," branches of which he recently established in London and Brantford.

Montreal detectives sought him in this city, but finally found him in Brantford Friday and arrested him, while he was enjoying a performance in the Opera House there. He returned home with the officers, accompanied by his wife and child. The particular charge for which he was taken into custody was one made against him by T. Strong, of Montreal, who accuses Sheppard of defrauding him of \$300, which the latter paid to obtain a partnership and become manager of a branch agency in that city.



After reading the telegram the mayor went on to tell the result of the visit of London and Southeastern railway directors to Detroit that day. "We had a conversation of over an hour with the M. C. R. president," he said. "The result was that we were to have an answer from him on Monday next, and that being the case, and our solicitor not being here I would advise the gentlemen to hold the matter over until Monday night."
