BROTHER PHYSICIAN SAYS DOCTOR ALMOST PERISHED FROM COLD

Dr. Smith, of St. Marys, Calls Upon Hospital Trust to Investigate Departure---Says Superintendent Was Discourteous to Daughter.

Dr. Smith, of St. Marys, a great friend of Dr. Thomas Sparks, of that town, who left Victoria Hospital, in speaking to The Advertiser today, said that friends of Dr. Sparks in St. Marys were not at all pleased with the statements made by Mr. Heard and quoted in The Advertiser, regarding the conditions of Dr. Sparks' acceptance at the hospital, and his leaving that institution. Dr. Smith said the friends felt hurt at the treatment handed out by the hospital authorities.

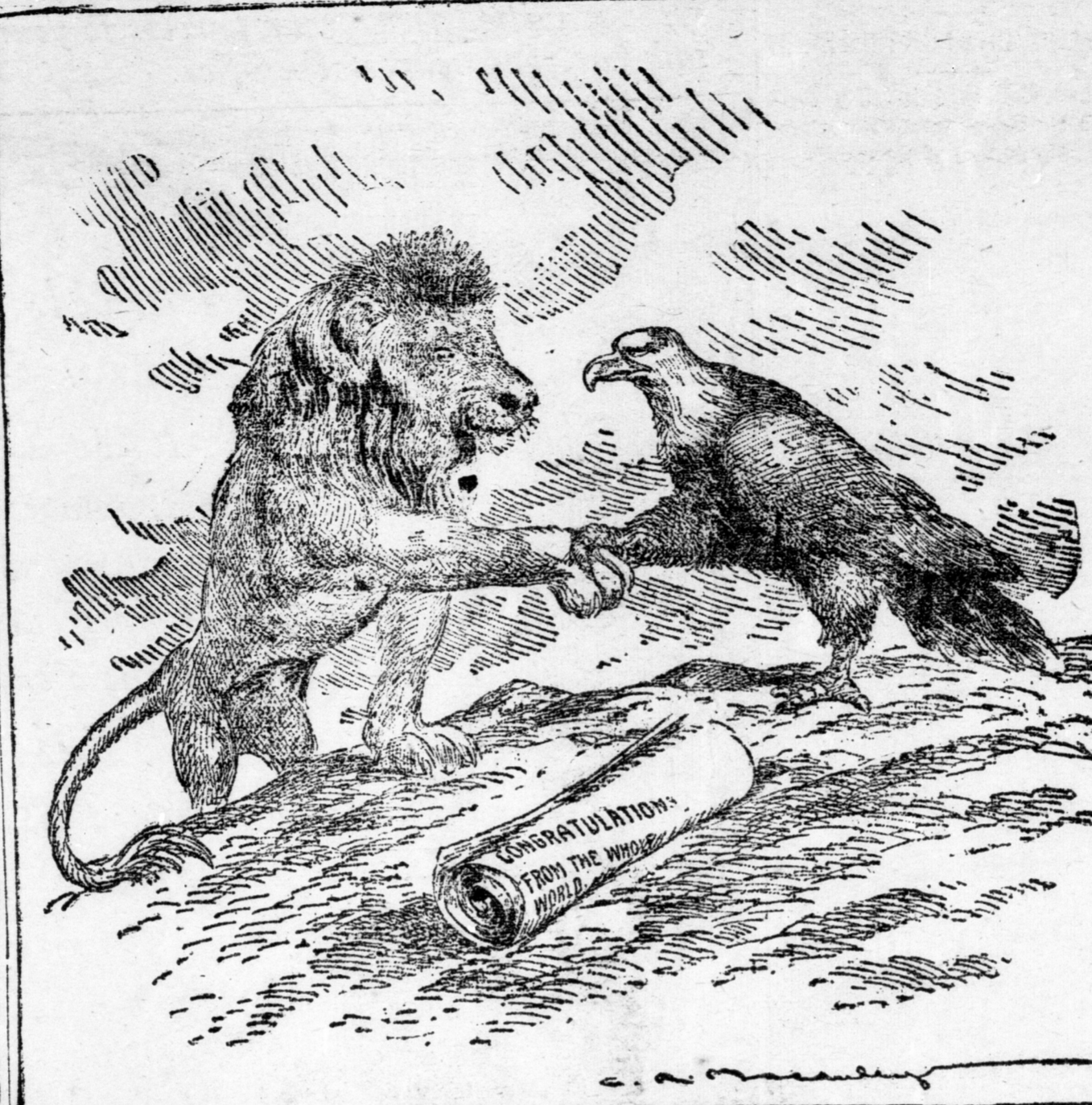
Object to Spur Line Railwaymen Claim Its Operation Would Be a Most Dangerous One.

Municipalities May Ask Permission to Exercise Privilege of Prohibition.

Board of Health Has Two Plans for Inspection of Meat in London.

RETAILERS DISCUSS PLAN Detroit Excursion, Parcel Post Zone, and Other Questions Before Board of Trade.

INFORMATION IS WANTED Feeling That Urgent Need Would Warrant Somewhat Heavy Expenditure.

The retail section of the board of trade at a meeting on Tuesday decided to approve of the steps that had been taken towards making it more difficult for transient traders to do business in London...

Instead of establishing a municipal abattoir, the board of health may appoint a number of competent veterinary inspectors to carefully examine every piece of meat offered for sale in London.

The secretary advised that in Vancouver the fee was \$300 for a year; in Victoria, \$500 for six months, and in Winnipeg, \$350, and that in addition Winnipeg forced transient merchants to pay a business license as well in lieu of business tax.

Dr. F. Torrance, veterinary general, in a letter to the board yesterday, stated that the Government provided inspectors only for firms doing an interprovincial or export trade and that local or municipal abattoirs were not within the jurisdiction of the Federal authorities.

NO GARBAGE IS TO BE SOLD IN LONDON

Health Board Decides to Carry Out Provision of Refuse Bylaw.

NOW BOUGHT FOR HOG FEED

Refuse Collected in City Said To Be Responsible for the Epidemic of Swine.

The board of health at a meeting on Tuesday afternoon decided to enforce that provision of the health act, requiring that all garbage shall be burned or disposed of by means of the system of garbage collection.

Hogs All Fed Garbage. The chairman, Dr. F. L. Burdon said that he had been advised that one farmer had lost 36 out of 37 hogs as the result of this outbreak of indigestion.

Dr. Burdon said that this garbage was being secured even from the hospitals, and some of it was in a fearful condition. He told of one hotel where the porter had been seen dumping the contents of cuspidors into the garbage can.

Dr. Hutchinson said that the garbage was not good for hogs, even if cooked. Ask Town to Help. The township authorities in the vicinity of London will be notified of the action of the board in prohibiting the sale of garbage in the city, and will be asked to co-operate.

Inspector James Lulman was ordered to have copies of the clause of the health act relating to the matter, printed for distribution. The regulation may affect several local hotels, the owners of which go in for farming as a side line, and who use the kitchen scrapings for the nourishment of hogs.

The board's inspector, Dr. Charles Tamin, advised that there was no case of less hog cholera in the district at the present time.

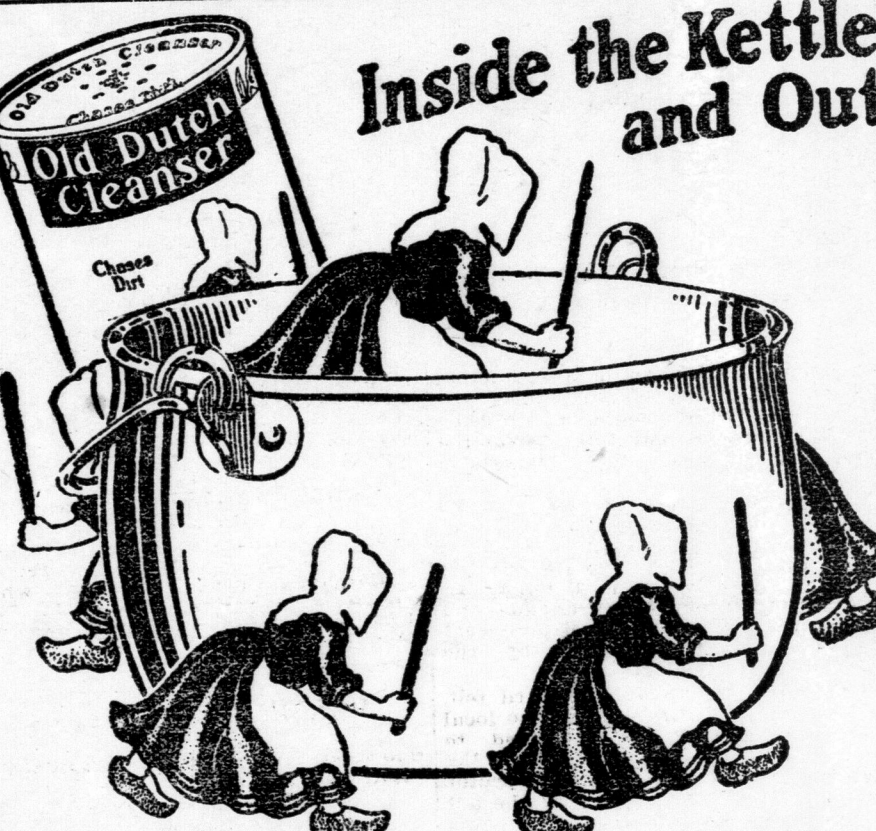
