Paris, May 16 .- There are six Germans to the yard on the greater part of the Franco-Belgian front from the North Sea to the Oise, according to the Gaulois, which bases the statement on the information it reports having reached the general staff that ship was torpedoed by Italian naval 150 German divisions are situated in this area.

Finance Minister Declares Thus Only Can Trade Balance Be Restored.

Toronto, May 16 .- "As a people we are consuming too much, not only of luxuries, but of many other classes of goods. We are spending too freely for ornaments, musical instruments, and other means of amusement and pleasother means of amusement and pleasure. All this counts against us in our trade balance with the outside world, and places our dollar at a discount. If the rate of exchange between Canada and the United States is to be kept normal, that is, if our Canadian dollar is to be quoted at par, internationally, much greater economy on the part of all of us is necessary."

Warning From White.

This is the warning given to all Canada today by her finance minister, Sir Thomas White, who arrived here today fresh from his conferences in Washington and New York, where he talked in terms of hundreds of millions of dollars, with Lord Reading, British ambassador, and the financial heads of the United States Government and

> London, May 16 .- Foreign Secretary Balfour was asked in the House of Commons today whether Prince Sixtus of Bourbon, to whom Emperor Charles of Austria addressed the letters last year paid two visits to England in connection with the peace proposals and whether he was in communication on this subject with Premier George. #### QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser

D. M. T.: Q .- I was examined in Owen Sound last fall and categorized A2 but was given exemption while farming. I am 20, and when the new regulations were passed ! went to Toronto and enlisted in the 67th Battery, but when I was examined the doctor would only give me C3. What should I do? Must

me C3. What should I do? Must
I report for service?
A.—If notified to report you must do
so, and then you will receive another
examination, and your future will depend on that. The registrar's office
would have no record of the fact that
you had been place in C3, and you call
you up as an A man. However, if you
actually became a member of the battery, and then were given a discharge
certificate, the registrar would probably be notified, or if not, you would
only need to show your discharge certificate when you reported.

A. E. D.: Q.—I was placed in D last fail, but was re-examined lately and placed in A. I have a certificate from the doctor that I am at present unfit for service on account of illness last fail. Could I have another examination if I ask for it before I am called?



## LITTLE FERTILE LAND OF RUSSIA **NOW PRODUCING**

Peasants Refuse To Cultivate For Fear of Crops Being Seized.

FOOD GETTING SCARCE

Various Provinces Are Issuing Money Which Peasants Will Not Accept.

Samara, Russia, Thursday, May 2-(By the Associated Press).-In connec tion with the reports that much of the fertile land of European Russia will go uncultivated this year, the Associated Press correspondent has made a tour of the governments of Samara, Simbirsk, Moscow, Penza, Tambov, Ryanzan and Saratov, the chief remaining wheat-producing districts. The ma-jority of the larger estates and peas-ant tracts have been seized and divided etween the poorer peasants.

also been divided and scattered. The distribution of seed has been unequal, owing in part to the large requisitions made by the central government in some sections to feed the cities and because also of the disorganized transportation.

Peasants Hide Seed.
Peasants have hidden their seed and resisted the food committees. Many resisted the food committees. Many districts consequently have seed potatoes, wheat, barley and oats, but the peasants are not willing to plant all the acreage possible, fearing the future disposition of the land and the control of the harvested crop. The wheat planting season ends this week in Central Russia, and in most of the districts less than half the grain land has been plowed. The exodus of city dwellers into the grain sections has been so large that breadstuffs are extremely scarce, even in grain cen-tres like Samara where bread sells res like Samara, where bread sells for two rubles per pound. The price gradually rises approaching Moscow, and at some towns located in the grain states children gather at the incom-ing trains and beg bread from the passengers.

Several provinces have issued their own money, but the peasants and merchants refuse to accept it, unless forced to do so by armed guards. Even the provincial cities are issuing their own recovery and are legalizing the circulamoney, and are legalizing the circula-tion of officially-indorsed checks on state banks. 

BETRAYER OF LIBERTY

PARIS, May 15.—M. Duval, who was director of the suppressed Germanophile newspaper Bonnet Rouge, was condemned to death today by courtmartial for treason.

Before the verdict was reached, M. Duval, in an impassioned speech, had declared that none of the accused were in any way an accomplice of his. He declared he was ready to face any verdict serenely.

#### THE TEUTONIC ALLIANCE,

REMANY and Austria-Hungary have formed an alliance for fifteen years, which provides for the closest military, economic and customs relations, according to the latest dispatches from Europe. British papers view the situation with concern and attach the greatest importance to the meeting of the kaiser and Emperor Charles at which they suspect it may have been decided that Austria shall strike at Italy when Hindenburg delivers his next assault on the Allied lines in the west and that an arrangement has been reached for the militarization of the Mitteleuropa policy which would force the Entente nations to put in effect the resolutions calling for economic pressure on Germany after the

It is of importance if Austria is to strike at mons. Italy or if she is going to send divisions to strengthen the German attack on the west, but neither move will come unexpectedly. The possibility of either action has been considered, and it would express lack of faith in General Foch to doubt that he has made preparations to meet such eventualities.

As to the future policy of the Teutons, is it worth worrying about? When the war is won by the Allies and they have the dictating of peace terms, as they must have, such problems can be dealt with, but it hardly seems necessary to let them intrude themselves while the fighting continues. If there is in existence after the war any treaty or alliance which may prove a menace to the peace of the world, the victors will be able to insist upon its revocation and will be in a position to see that their terms are obeyed. This war against militarism is not going to end with the springing-up of an even greater menacing power than Germany. That is something which will be guaranteed when peace is signed.

#### BACKYARD GARDEN HINTS (By The Girl With the Hoe.)

GOOSEBERRIES.

The plants for new plantations of gooseberries are obtained from cuttings or by what is technically known as layering. This latter method is most generally followed. Prune the old bushes very closely in the autumn, thereby causing an abundant growth of young wood during the next summer. Early in July heap the earth through and around the bushes until only the tips of the young shoots are above ground. Pack this earth closely about the young shoots, leaving a mulch of loose soil on top to preserve the moisture. By autumn these shoots, if of American varieties, will have rooted well, and the next syring they may be transplanted. Engineers will be a the same time autumn the same way as the currant cuttings.

The actual setting out of the plantation is usually done in the fall, sometimes as early as September. Set the plants four feet apart in rows six feet apart, pruning the roots before doing so. Official Proclamation Gives Rules and Schedule of . Licenses.

Ottawa, May 16 .- Following the announcement by the Canada Food Board that on and after June 1 no person may legally operate a public eating place without first having obtained a license, the board has now issued regulations which will govern such licenses.

Licenses are required by every hotel, boarding-house, cafeteria, club, dining-car, steamship, ice cream stand and every other place whatsoever where meats or refreshments, to the number of 24 or more per diem are served to persons other than members of the family or household of the proprietor.

The regulations governing public eating place Neensees prohibit business dealings with persons who have not complied with the license requirements of the Canada Food Board. The same general rules applicable to other place ating place licenses.


