THE REV. JAMES TATE, A.M., LATE MASTER OF RICHMOND SCHOOL, YORKSHIRE.

The death of the Rev. James Tate, one of the Canons Residentiary of St. Paul's, is an event which deserves more than the passing notice which it received in our obituary of Wednesday last.

THE LATE REVEREND ROBERT DAVID CARTWRIGHT, was the seventh and youngest son of the late Honourable Richard Cartwright, of distinguished talent and eminent character, whose name is enrolled among the Loyalists, the first settlers of this country.

Upon leaving the University, he was soon after ordained a Minister of the United Church of England and Ireland, and immediately was appointed to a Curacy, and to the charge of a congregation in one of the most healthy and delightful Counties in England.
