London, Jan. 18.—Readers of The World have doubtless been informed by cablegram of the sensation created in England last week by the reported resignation of the Chanceller of the Exchequer, which was the then absorbing topic. The official denial subsequently given amply proves what I said in my last letter, viz., that all the rumors lately circulated concerning Sir William Harcourt and cabinet dissensions are but the efforts of one of the inferior Press Agencies to create an excitement. It so happened that there were some circumstances last week which could be used to support the rumor, and these were taken full advantage of and placarded about London in largest type. For instance: (1) A cabinet council was summoned by telegraph; (2) Lord Rosebery left for Osborne to wait upon the Queen; (3) and, directly afterwards, Mr. Gladstone arrived in London. But now that the allegations of a Ministerial crisis have been officially contradicted, it is a matter for surprise that these trivial incidents could be so utilized as to create the stir which they did. 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

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

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
