The revisors of electoral lists for the town elections have completed the lists and posted them according to law in three conspicuous places in the town.

Those who contemplate visiting Boston this season are disappointed at learning that there is no change in the annoying treatment of passengers on the Yarmouth and Halifax steamers, who are still driven into a pen like a lot of cattle, and compelled to stand, sometimes for an hour, before being permitted to land.

According to a P. E. I. man, the farmers throughout the island are pretty well satisfied with the crop prospects. Hay is bound to be a little short, especially that on the uplands.

The third quarterly session of the Grand Division, S. of T., was held at Sydney, C. B., week before last.

The Catholic Total Abstinence convention at New York passed a resolution severely condemning liquor sellers and asking them to abandon the traffic.

The date fixed by law for the opening of the public schools is Monday, 19th inst. This applies to all schools except those that have arranged for seven weeks vacation in accordance with the following regulation:

Reg. 8. "Sections having a county academy or school of four or more departments may be allowed an additional week of vacation without prejudice to their participation in the public funds, provided their application for the same be endorsed by the Inspector and approved by the educational department, and distinctly endorsed and certified in the returns."

Teachers are also reminded that the following regulation must be complied with, and will in future be strictly enforced by officials having the matter in charge:

Reg. 7. "Every teacher or assistant or substitute (except a temporary substitute) when commencing to teach in any section must on the first day of his or her incumbency, mail or otherwise directly send a notice in writing to the Inspector of the district, intimating the fact, the period of engagement, the address of the Secretary of the Board, and the name of the file in the Inspector's office, and any delay on the part of the teacher in giving such notice shall render him or her liable to loss of provincial grants up to the time of proper notification. When there are more than one teacher in the section, such intimations should come through the principal or supervisor of the schools."

A form of notification will be found in the Journal of Education. The four points required are:—1, the date of opening; 2, the period of engagement; 3, the address of the Secretary of trustees; and 4, the name of the section where previously engaged.

As all these items must be reported to the Education Office, the omission of any one of them will be treated as the omission of the whole.

A Sunny Land.

Press Notes.

Pitiful is the plea of the Massachusetts opium smoker, Li Sam, who spoke before the assembly of Chinese opium smokers against the proposed prohibition of that drug: "People who do not smoke will never know a smoker's trouble. I had the habit grown into me for the past thirty-seven long years. I have tried and tried again to stop smoking, but my strength failed me. At last I catered up my nerve to try again for the last time. I decided if I failed to do what I pledged, I would die a fend. Two weeks ago to-day I stopped for twenty-four hours. My dear fellow-men, there are not enough words in Confucius' Dictionary to tell you how I felt. I had rather have all the devils in the great hell torment me than to take the right of smoking away from me. We smokers do not ask the public to encourage us, but we would ask the public pity."

The following is the result of an analysis of a cigarette, made recently by a physician: "The tobacco was found to be strongly impregnated with opium, while the wrapper, which was warranted to be rice paper, was proved to be the most ordinary quality of paper whitened with arsenic. The two poisons combined to create in the smoker a habit of using opium without his being aware of it, his craving for which can only be satisfied by an incessant consumption of cigarettes. These facts would be sufficient to stop the manufacture of anything less insidious in its influence. But smokers will smoke on to the death."

Ohio Wesleyan University has declared against the use of tobacco. Beginning with the fall term all students will be asked to discontinue the use of tobacco, or, as President Bamford states it, "We will have to dissolve partnership necessarily."

Bokimos of the Atlantic Islands are an industrious people but slaves to tobacco, both men and women using it to excess. They chew and smoke the weed, and drink and smoke it. Until the whalers introduced rum and whisky among them they were usually quite exemplary in their married relations, but for drink they now seem willing to sell body and soul.

Manchester, England, according to telegraphic communication, will soon be a prohibition town. The leaders of the state Law and Order League have insisted that the police commissioners enforce the statutory prohibition law, and on July 23 announced that in two weeks from that time every saloon in the city must be closed. It is expected that the liquor dealers will make a vigorous fight.

The Epworth League, in international conference at Chattanooga, among resolutions adopted thus expressed itself on the temperance question: "We are unalterably committed to the prohibition of the liquor traffic, and we are determined to fight the saloon until the deadly foe is destroyed in our land." The policemen showed their appreciation of the attitude of the young people by promptly arresting three thirty counters, who with Epworth League badges in their buttonholes, were entering a saloon.

At the New England Methodist Episcopal conference held this spring, the tobacco question was propounded to candidates for the admission to the ministry was again discussed. No decision was reached in 1897, when the question either be continued or the Methodists take a step backward in their requirements of a pure ministry.

Massachusetts is about to follow the example of Germany in establishing a tramp colony. Two thousand acres of cheap land have been purchased, which by hard work can be transformed into good farm property. It is proposed that every man convicted of vagrancy be sent to work on this farm for two years. The men will, of course, be comfortably clothed and fed during this time.

The French Parliament has passed a law abolishing the tax on liquor containing less than 15 per cent. of alcohol, and prohibiting the manufacture and sale of spirits declared to be dangerous by the academy of medicine.—Union Signal.

The Michigan State Teachers' Association voted unanimously to petition the legislature for a law providing that "no person who uses tobacco in any form shall be given a certificate or be employed to teach in the schools of the state." It is said similar legislation is proposed in New York this year.

It is not generally known that in Russia women are not only on school boards but are also serving as principals and school guardians. In 1894, one small province had 45 women as superintendents of work-houses, 125 as poor law guardians and 253 as members of school boards.—Religious Intelligence.

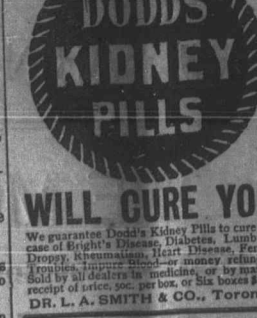
