

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The annexed extract from the Revised Statutes of the State of New York will show the provisions, at once wise and humane, that our neighbours have made for the em-ployment of criminals :---

" § 13. It shall be the duty of the keepers of the said several prisons, whenever any per-son shall be sentenced to hard labour therein, and any mode of labour shall be provided, to and any mode of labour shall be provided, to cause such prisoner to be kept donstantly em-ployed during every day, except Sunday : and annually to account with the board of supervi-sers of the county for the proceeds of such la-

sers of the county for the proceeds of such ha-box. "•§ 14. The beepers of the said prisons shall respectively have power, with the consent of the supervisors, of the county, from time to time, to cause such of the convicts under their charge, as are capable of hard labour, to be em-ployed upon any of the public svenues, high-ways, streats, or other works, in the county in which each prisoner shall be confined, or is any of the adjoining counties, upon such terms as may be agreed upon between the said keepers and the officers or other persons under whose direction such convicts shall be employed under the bast section, they shall be well chaimed and sectired ; and shall be wellject to such regulations as the keeper legally obarged with their custody, shall, from time to time pre-scribe."
