

## Newest Revolution in Germany Ends in Farce; Extreme Political Comedy It Was and Kappa Joke

### Luetwitz and Kapp Have Made Hasty Departure, But Tragedy is Left in Their Wake—Will Now "Beat Up" the Baltic Troops—Police Take Hold.

BERLIN, March 19.—The dictatorship of Dr. Wolfgang Kapp and the role of his Pratorians ended as suddenly as it began.

With the inglorious departure of Kapp from the Chancellor's palace at ten o'clock Wednesday night and the ignominious kicking out of Baron Luetwitz by a committee of determined citizens, the curtain was being drawn upon an extreme political comedy as ever staged in the most unstable Republic of South America.

By Disarm Baltic Troops  
Kapp's Pratorian guard of the Baltic troops and marine brigade already are packing up for departure knowing they will be disbanded and discharged as soon as they are out of the city. They are being sped on their way by an ultimatum from the officers of the Security Police—a husky body of former non-coms—that, unless the Baltic troops were removed immediately they would be beaten up by members of the Security Police.

An amnesty has been promised for the soldiers, and the Ebert Government offered no conditions.

The Ebert Government is asserted, retained until the end of its detention to have no dealing with the military Junker Government which forced it to flee from Berlin.

The Security Police have assumed a guarantee for the maintenance of law and order in Berlin and though the Baltic and other troops are still in Berlin they evidently are more concerned in protecting their own retreat than in taking control of the city

## Report Firemen Are to Go Out a Complete Canard

Members of the fire brigades including the business aged stated this afternoon that there was absolutely no truth in the story which is going the rounds that the firemen had delivered an ultimatum to the city council on the wage question. The report declared that the firemen had decided to walk out tomorrow, if they were not given definite assurance that they would get an increase in wages. The business agent said he had heard the report himself but there was absolutely nothing in it to his certain knowledge.

## Attempt to Hang Man Fails; Now Asks State to Pay Him \$5,000 Balm

JACKSON, MISS., March 19.—The state of Mississippi, if a bill which has been introduced in the legislature by Representative John Yeager of Lamar County, is adopted, will pay \$5,000 to a man who was hanged 17 years ago. The introduction of the bill recalls a tragic story that aroused intense interest and no little political bitterness throughout the state.

The beneficiary of the bill if it is passed will be Will Purvis, a prosperous farmer of Columbia, Marion county. In 1903 Will Buckley was waylaid and shot and killed, as he was riding home from Columbia, accompanied by his brother. They were suspected of having gone before the grand jury and divulged secrets of the White Caps, a lawless organization that had been terrorizing and running the negroes out of the county for several months and whose motto was death to traitors.

Will Purvis was arrested, tried and convicted and sentenced to be hanged after one of the most sensational trials ever known in the state. The day for the hanging arrived and thousands of his friends and neighbors, as well as those who were not friends swarmed into the little county town to see him pay the death penalty—the gruesome affair to be open to all comers.

When the trap was sprung the body of Purvis shot through to the ground the noose having slipped. The sheriff jumped to take another trial as executioner, but the spectators would have none of it. Purvis was dazed but by no means dead, and accompanied the sheriff back to jail, where he remained until the courts could determine whether or not he was to hang a second time.

A great hue and cry was made against going in the face of what was called the "hand of Providence," in sparing the life of one then believed to be innocent of the crime charged against him, and it was made an issue in the gubernatorial campaign then on. However, the supreme court fixed another day for the execution of Purvis.

Ange McLaurin, near candidate for governor, afterwards United States senator, announced that if he was elected governor he would commute Purvis's sentence to imprisonment for life, and later on pardon him. He was elected and carried out his promises.

Purvis returned home after two years in the penitentiary, married his old sweetheart and they and their children are living happily on an 80 acre farm in Lamar county. Three years ago Joe Beard of Marion county, then on his deathbed, called in the sheriff, a clergyman and others and confessed that another had killed Will Buckley, he, Beard, being with him at the time.

Mr. Yeager now would have the state pay Purvis, who is a prominent family, \$5,000 for his services while on the convict farm and as a belated balm for his horrible experience on the gallows. A first cousin of Mr. Buckley, the man murdered, favors the bill and it is believed the bill will pass.

## Good As Sermon To Teach Moral

Mr. Tyone Power Makes Deep Impression on Large Audience.

An actor whose personality possesses the virtues of strength individuality and careful interpretation appeared at the Grand last night in the picturesque role of "the drainman" in "The Servant in the House." Mr. Tyone Power who plays this part has chosen a style to which he can admirably adapt himself and his towering figure and deep sonorous voice makes him constantly the centre of attraction.

The drama is an analysis of human emotions, ambitions and frailties as found in certain of the higher clergy, particularly of an early date. The erudite but scheming Bishop, the vicar who permits his spiritual sensibilities to be dulled by the lust of power and social distinction, the brother who becomes a prey to drink and dissolute living and a third who develops the character akin to that of the meek and lowly Nazarine, the leading parts and all are taken with consummate skill. The two women also, as wife and niece and even the page boy delineate well the parts they take.

Outside of the drama, as a form of entertainment there is an impressive moral in "The Servant in the House." It is that even the humble and dirty work of the world has to be done by some one and that a humane soul is no less a soul because of the body in which it is housed. The duty of the church is to minister, not in a patronizing way but with true christian sympathy and kindness to the lowly as well as the exalted.

The effect of Mr. Power's visit will be as good on the large audience that enjoyed his masterly acting as a sermon.

## Experts Say He is Insane

### THREE ALIENISTS WILL TESTIFY THAT MURDERER IS NOT ACCOUNTABLE FOR HIS ACTS

Fred Fountain who was last autumn convicted of the murder of his wife and two children and sentenced to be hanged, but later granted a new trial, is to be tried at the forthcoming spring assizes.

Plan for a new trial was made on the ground that the man was insane and not accountable for his acts.

Three Alienists have examined Fountain and all three will give evidence that he is insane.

## Dutch Government Severely Censored For Giving the Kaiser Too Much Liberty

THE HAGUE, March 19.—The Dutch government was taken severely to task for what was declared to be its leniency toward the former German Emperor in a debate in the second chamber of parliament this afternoon, when the premier announced a decree limiting Count Hohenzollern's movements and his pledge that to mix in politics.

Deputy Schaper, Socialist, whose questions brought about announcement of the decree, said he was dissatisfied with the premier's answer as a mere slight increase in the guard about the former emperor was not enough and Count Hohenzollern's pledge not sufficient.

The premier, in answer, referred to his letter to both houses of parliament informing them of the assurance obtained from Count Hohenzollern that he would refrain from all political activity and do nothing which would involv Holland in any international difficulty. He added that similar action with reference to the former crown prince had been considered.

Deputy Von Ravenstein, communist, declared that the government's policy of silence had strengthened the general belief that the former emperor came to Holland originally with Holland's silent approval.

Other deputies took a similar stand some wanting to know how long the Hohenzollerns would be allowed to stay in Holland. The premier said the government long ago had stated it knew nothing in advance of the former emperor's coming and not a single person in the government knew of it.

## GERMAN EMBASSY NOT TO FLY ITS FLAG IN LONDON

LONDON, March 19.—The newly ordered German embassy here will avoid flying the German flag for some time to come at any event, but the secretaries will insist on giving their opinions of the English.

"My chief impressions after a walk through the park on Sunday," said one of Dr. Staehmer's secretaries, "was that the English people do not seem to wear such smart clothes."

"But perhaps that is only a first covmpression which will have to be revised later."

Lloyd George is reorganizing a progressive party in Great Britain.

## ARCTIC EXPLORER RESIGNS FROM EXPLORATION BOARD

OTTAWA, March 19.—Vilhjalmar Stefansson, the Arctic explorer has resigned from the governmental commission enquiring into the possibilities of northern development for meat producing purposes according to an announcement by Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, Stefansson has sailed for England and it is understood that the purpose of his trip is to seek to interest private capital in the project.

## B.C. CONSIDERS THREE PROHIBITION AMENDMENTS

VICTORIA, B.C., March 19.—Premier Oliver has promised to submit to the people of British Columbia a clear, distinct issue upon the question of prohibition or the sale of liquor under control.

Three suggested amendments to the Prohibition Amendment Act will be considered, namely, a contrary act drafted by the government on suggestions or a framework submitted by the moderatists, and a moderation act to be framed by the Government for which it will accept responsibility.

**HIGHER TAXATION?**

The prospect of a thirty-four mill rate for the city this year is fairly certain, according to the best information available. What do the citizens think of it?

Further, what do they think of the request which is being made to the Ontario Government to remove limitations in the act which has tended to regulate and keep down the taxation that councils could impose?

In an analysis and review of the corporation's financial position made in November and December last, while in office of Mayor, the Editor of The Journal stated that while organically sound, the temporary position of the city would be somewhat embarrassing for two or three years.

He also advised caution in expenditures, and economy in administration. The present mayor, among others, treated the facts lightly and regretted that there should be such a gloomy picture painted, Optimism and "dig themoney up," was the advice he gave, backed by the Queen Street oracle.

What has since happened? A journey has been made to the Drury Government, the High Potentate of civic taxation, ex-mayor Burgoyne being one of the Pilgrims, and that Government has been asked to take down a fence that will apparently open the way to heavier taxation on the people. More than that the outlook for the city rate is 34 mills this year. Verily it is a good tactic to be optimistic in the interests of the workers of the city for election purposes but why ask them to pay more taxes within three or four months afterwards? If the rate is allowed to go to 34 mills there is too extravagant expenditure in civic and academic boards. When the budget comes out The Journal will review it in the light of all the facts but it cannot support or condone a policy which leads to such an increase. One of the best ways of helping St. Catharines and the workmen here is to keep their taxes low. There is a law governing the relation of taxation to market values. Beyond that it is unwise and unsound to go.

**CANADA'S OLDEST ORANGEMAN DIES ON 17TH OF MARCH**

KINGSTON, March 18—Ex-Alderman Joseph Tait, said to be the oldest Orangeman in Canada, died yesterday in his hundredth year. He was born in County Armagh on August 21 1820, and lived in Kingston since 1847. He was a veteran of the Fenian Raid, serving under Captain Jackson and receiving a medal for his work in the campaign. Mr. Tait was a past Master of L. O. L. No. 6, and during the seventy-three years he had lived in Kingston he missed only two annual parades of the Orangemen. He was alderman for Frontenac Ward for eight years, being returned for the first time in 1895.

Mrs. M. D. Lawrie of Guelph died while on a visit to her son John in Hamilton.

**DUTCH FIXING SPOT TO INTERN KAISER**

THE HAGUE, March 18—A royal decree issued March 16th says the place to be allotted to former Emperor William of Germany as his residence will form part of the Province of Utrecht, and that it will be fixed later by the Government. The decree was in connection with an announcement to the Allied Premiers regarding their recent note concerning the one-time Monarch.

**Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work**

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Even in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial

total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,691. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

Shows Solid Growth. In all the various departments the same rate of growth has been recorded. This shows that as often as humanly possible every opportunity has been seized for the advancement of every branch of the organization. Inasmuch as every act of service means the welfare of somebody, the position which the Salvation Army occupies today indicates tremendously increased service to the community.

This service has been rendered under the leadership of Commissioner W. J. Richards. His five years in Canada have been five big years for the Salvation Army in Canada, and give great promise for the future.

**MAN STRANGLES HIS WIFE**

NEW YORK, Mar. 18—A man describing himself as George Evans of No. 662 West Main street, New Britain, Conn., attempted suicide in a room in the Park Avenue hotel yesterday afternoon by slashing his throat and taking poison. Attendants, attracted by the moans, broke into the room and the man was removed to Bellevue hospital in an unconscious condition. After being revived he said he had tried to end his life because he had killed his wife, Anna, by strangling her with reins taken from a harness.

Dispatches from New Britain today told of the discovery of the dead body of Mrs. George Eyanoff, wife of a Bulgarian miner, in a trunk in the home of her sister in New Britain. The woman had been dead twenty-four hours and had been strangled with a set of toy reins used by children. Her husband was last seen in

ABOUT THE SEED DRILL

What is Considered to be the Most Efficient Type.

The Feeding Device is the Heart of the Drill—Seed Should Be Dropped Directly Under the Axle of the Disc—Give the Bearings Careful Inspection.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

As the drill sows, so shall the farmer reap, is no fallacy. It is as true in its content as the maxim "As a man sows so shall he reap." Given the right kind of a grain drill, the seed is all planted at a uniform depth, evenly covered; the earth compacted just enough to retain the moisture around it. These conditions mean that the young plants will all come up at the same time, that the roots will be well protected, and that the grain will ripen uniformly. As the grain is planted, so will it grow and ripen. If some of the seed is planted too shallow, and some too deep, the seed that comes up first, ripens first. Thus it is that some of the grain is ready to harvest while other patches are still in the milk stage.

The feeding device is the heart of the grain drill. Upon its reliability depends the accuracy of sowing the seed. The drill scale is computed for the average sized seeds, and therefore cannot always be depended upon when the size of them varies from the normal. If the grain is oversized or undersized the required amount per acre may be sown by setting the feed lever at a point slightly greater or slightly less than above the indicator. There are, in common use, two different forms of feeding devices. The fluted-cylinder-force feed, and the double-run-force feed. The amount of seed sown by the fluted-cylinder-force feed may be regulated by a lever which changes the size of the outlet, but it does not always handle all classes of seed without breaking them, as can be done with the double-run-force feed, which necessarily requires for driving it a disc wheel, or a cog wheel with from nine to fifteen sets of cogs that make as many speeds or feeds.

In the most efficient type of grain drills the seed should be deposited as nearly directly under the axle of the disc as possible, as this is the only place where the seed can be dropped directly on to the bottom of the trench without hindrance. By this method the disc is not run deeper than the seed is deposited, thus the draft is reduced to a minimum. If the seed is deposited in the rear of the centre of the axle, the rotation of the disc tends to carry earth and seed up with it, causing the seed to be unevenly deposited. In operation, a properly angled disc opens a trench about two inches wide. The falling seed strikes the concave side of the shield and the convex side of the disc, and is thus scattered evenly over the entire width of the trench.

Grain seed drills are divided into four kinds, according to the type of furrow opener—the open delivery single disc and the closed delivery single disc, the double disc, the shoe and the hoe drills. The open delivery single disc furrow opener deposits the seed between the shield and the convex side of the disc. The space is open from the end of the boot between the disc and shield to the bottom or lower end of the shield. The shield prevents the falling seed from becoming mixed with the loose earth and surface trash and insures its free passage to the bottom of the trench made by the disc. It will also do excellent work in highly cultivated soil that is free from trash.

The closed delivery single-disc furrow opener has a closed boot, similar to a hoe furrow opener, which comes down at the rear edge of the disc and deposits the seed about two inches back of the disc. It does not plant the seed at as even a depth as either the open delivery single disc or the double disc, but deposits it at least eight inches in rear of the disc hub, and wherever it meets with an obstruction, rock or hard frozen soil the disc rises up and carries the boot with it, broadcasting the seed on the surface.

There are many styles of double discs, but the one that plants the seed under or slightly back of the disc axle, or hub, is the one to use, for that point is the deepest part of the furrow. The furrow opener that shoots the grain forward of this centre is to be avoided, for the reason that the seed reaches the ground before the furrow is fully formed, and it is, therefore, mixed with the soil as the seed trench is being made, causing what is termed "wavy" sowing. The double disc type of opener tends to spread out the seed more than other kinds, so that each seed has a somewhat greater area from which to draw moisture.

The hoe furrow opener or shovel opener does not penetrate the ground readily and clogs easier than any of the other types. The shoe opener does no better work, and rather than clog will run over trash and thus plant the seed at varying depths.

In selecting a drill the bearings should be given careful inspection. They should be dust proof. The hard roller must be considered superior to all others for this kind of work, as the oil can be forced into the bearing from the centre, and as it works out it carries all the dirt with it. It should have a well-braced seed box with steel hopper bottom to allow the seed to pass freely into the cups; strong frame and substantial wheels are important features. The distance between the furrow opener varies to some extent but six inches is the usual spacing. The seed tubes may be of rubber or of steel ribbon. The rubber tubes give good satisfaction, but are hot durable if exposed to the weather. The steel ribbon tubes serve the purpose well, and if painted will last as long as the drill.—Jas. Evans, D. A. College, Guelph.

OFFICIAL CONFIRMATION OF QUARANTINE LIFTING

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Mar. 18—The lifting of the quarantine has been officially confirmed. Mr. Baldwin, Chief of the United States Immigration Department at Niagara Falls, N.Y. was notified this morning that the vaccination restrictions on the border will be officially raised Friday, March 19, at midnight.

PREPAYMENT OF FREIGHT

Hon. F. B. Carvell Makes Suggestion Which May Be Followed

OTTAWA, March 18—An early decision by the Railway Commission in the complaint of the Canadian shippers against the non-prepayment regulations of the railways, was indicated this morning. Both sides completed their case before the board.

It was intimated at the hearing this morning that the U. S. railroads would probably accept prepayment of freight for export from American ports.

Chief Commissioner Carvell suggested that a compromise might be affected on the situation by fixing the rate of exchange every Monday. A Canadian shipper going into an ocean would be required to pay a certain percentage of the freight rate in Canadian funds, and the exchange would be added to the remaining percentage. This suggestion appeared to be regarded favorably by some of the shippers.

Party-Line Consideration

A Two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line it is impossible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-liner user to keep in mind:

- 1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber, therefore party-line talks should be as brief as possible.
2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should be prompt, the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line.
3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.
5. Be sure always to give the operator the letters W or J in calling a party-line subscriber

**COMMISSIONER HIGGINS HERE TO CONFER ON SALVATION ARMY MATTERS**

Com. W. J. Richards, head of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada and Col. John McHillan, Chief Secretary are conferring with Commissioner Higgins, Chief of Staff and Second in Command of the Salvation Army for the work who arrived in Boston from London, England, recently. Com. Higgins came to America to discuss matters pertaining to Salvation Army affairs in Canada and the United States, with Commander Eva Booth, head of the Salvation Army in the United States and with the Canadian officials. He was for many years Chief Secretary of the United States and recently succeeded Com. Howard as Chief of Staff and Second in Command. Many matters having an important bearing upon the future policy of the Salvation Army, and its reconstruction work are to be taken up at this meeting and it is expected that on his return Com. Richards will have something to say in regard to the questions affecting the policies to be followed in Canada.

**OUR NATIONAL ECONOMIC PROBLEM.**

The following interesting extract from an article by Mr. E. W. Beatty, president of the C. P. R. appeared recently in the Montreal Gazette:—"So much in the manner in which the transportation machinery of the country is carrying out its obligations to the Canadian producer. Other aspects of the transportation problem are less satisfactory. There are many people who look upon Canadian Railways as custodians of magic fortunes which cannot be exhausted. The bookkeeping should be as simple and measurable in its tale of losses and vanished profits to a railway as it may be to a corner grocer, is to these people unthinkable. It apparently does not occur to them that no public utility is more important than to the Canadian public that the good reputation of its railway securities in the world of credit and investment should be carefully guarded. To those, however, who understand these things clearly and who view the matter from the standpoint of broad public interest, it is at once apparent that the Canadian public pays a very low rate for the quality of service rendered, and that a time is rapidly approaching when, if Canadian railway securities are not to be made less desirable to investors than any other kind of industrial security, railway rates will either have to go up, or railway operating costs go down. Such persons recognize that it is not because the situation of the railways is an easy one that certain companies have been able to show net earnings—very low net earnings compared to the actual cash invested in the industry—but because, in the past, the shareholders of such companies have been, as they are to-day, courageous persons willing to supply the means for constructive enterprises in which no one but themselves had faith, and because, too, their officers have been skilled, resourceful and loyal business men, assisted by staffs filled with the spirit of pride and devotion to their work. This, indeed, is the thing which has made it possible for Canada's railroads to function successfully during the war without making anything like the demands that foreign roads—less efficient in serving their community, yet earning the same rates and paying the same wages—have made up their public exchequers. I do not believe that this strain upon the railways and this tendency to weaken the general reputation of Canadian Railway securities should continue. The servant, after all, is worthy of his hire, and railway capital is not less worthy a servant than other forms of capital whose earnings have not been so consistently depressed. "The net earnings during the war years, of those companies which showed net earnings, would have been much lower had the Canadian railroads been making expenditures for maintenance, which circumstances would have justified, but which conditions prevented during that period. These arrears have now to be made up. During 1919 the Canadian Pacific laid 70,000 tons of steel rail. In place of, say, 2,000,000 tons, worth 44c in 1914, the Canadian Pacific laid 4,434,000 tons at 85c per ton. The sensational advance in the rate of railway wages is well known. Further advance may be necessary within the very near future, as indicated by discussions in the United States. The price of coal for locomotives was \$3.09 in 1913. Now it is \$4.77. The cost of hauling an average train (freight or passenger) one mile has risen from \$1.80 in 1913, to \$2.494 in 1918. It is higher to-day. The operating expenses of one mile of line in 1912 were \$4.152; in 1918, \$7.046, and to-day they are even greater. On the other hand, railway rates, taking all classes of revenue together, have advanced scarcely 25 per cent. I venture to say no other industry in the Dominion can show such moderation."

The death of another sister in England was reported today. Six brothers and five half-brothers of Mr. Dennison lost their lives in the war.

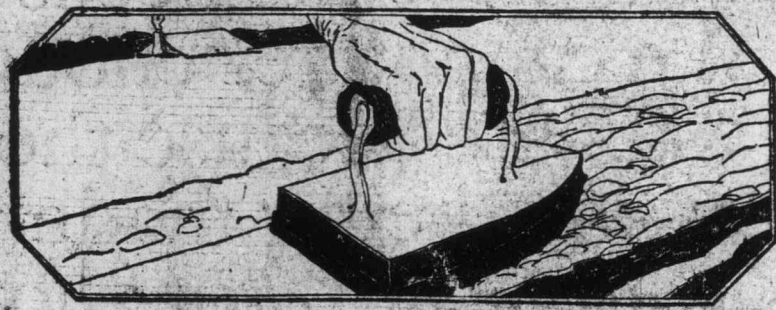

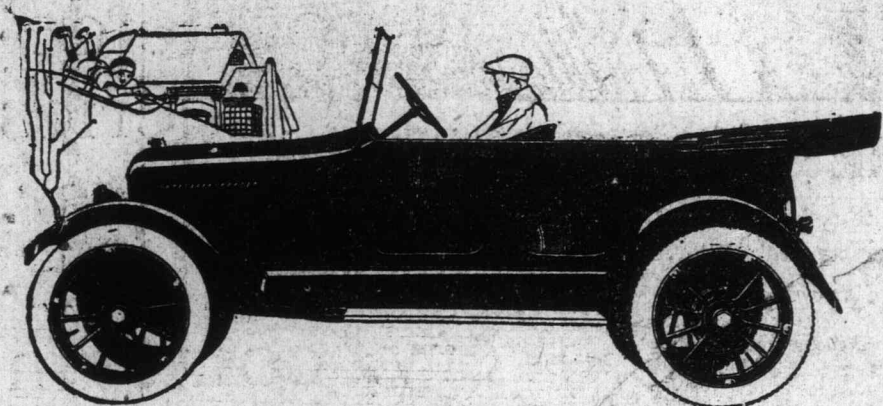

Still Sentence Asked for Alleged Rich

**NEW YORK, March 18**—When the  
court-martial of Grover Cleveland

## STARTING BEEKEEPING

Suggested Outfit for the Apiary  
Novice.  
Start With the Right Hive—The  
10-Frame Langstroth is Regarded  
as the Best—How to Prevent  
Swarming—Care of Freshening  
Cows.  
(Contributed by Ontario Department of  
Agriculture, Toronto.)

**E**XTRACTED honey production  
is the most satisfactory for  
beginners. Start with three  
colonies and sufficient up-to-  
date equipment and then make the  
bees pay their way. One colony does  
not give the beginner an opportunity  
to right mistakes or accidents profit-  
ably. Three colonies can be managed  
by devoting one evening weekly to  
the apiary.  
Avoid many troublesome pitfalls  
by starting with the right hive. The  
10-frame langstroth hive has given  
the best satisfaction in Ontario. All  
beekeepers' supply houses carry this  
hive and its parts in their regular  
stock. Buy your first hives from a  
good manufacturer. It is very neces-  
sary to have all hive parts inter-  
changeable so that they may be used  
in any colony in the apiary. Uniform-  
ity and accurate workmanship alone  
can ensure this need.  
One complete 10-fr. Langstroth  
hive consists of:  
1. A bottomboard.  
2. A hive-body with self-spacing  
frames and wire.  
3. A telescoping metal roof cover.  
In addition the beginner should  
provide for each colony one queen ex-  
cluder; two extra hive-bodies com-  
plete with frames; and 7 lbs. of Me-  
dium Brood Foundation which runs  
six sheets to the pound, to fill the  
frames with a guide and foundation for  
the future combs. All hive ma-  
terial should be nailed, wired and  
painted before the opening of the  
spring rush.  
It is advisable to commence with a  
2-lb. package of bees and queen; a  
swarm or a nucleus. Less danger  
from disease attends the buying of  
queen packages than the buying of  
swarms and nuclei. Pound packages  
may be secured for delivery from  
May 1st to June 30th. Early pack-  
ages will arrive a supply if carefully  
handled. Enquire of the Provincial  
Apiarist re disease in your locality  
before buying swarms, nuclei or col-  
onies. A small colony of bees is much  
less vindictive than a full colony and  
thus offers a better opportunity for  
the beginner to grow with his bees.  
The necessary equipment for the  
beginner should consist of:  
1. A small box of cotton, tulle.  
2. A standard bee smoker.  
3. A hive tool.  
4. A spur wheel wire embedder.  
5. A hive knife.  
6. An uncapping box.  
7. A complete set of Department  
literature, Bulletins 213, 233 and  
255, and a good reference bee book.  
8. A small box extractor.  
With the exception of Nos. 6 and  
8 it is advisable to acquire the ma-  
terial needed from a supply firm at  
once. The uncapping box can be  
made at home, and the beginner could  
probably co-operate with another bee-  
keeper in securing the use of an ex-  
tractor. With the increase of col-  
onies to ten, he would then be advis-  
able to provide a storage can to assist  
in handling the crop.—W. A. Weir, O. A.  
College, Guelph.

### PAINT LENGTHENS LIFE OF BUILDINGS AND MACHINES

Many an old ship has stood the racket of ocean travel for years mainly on the strength of the tar or paint applied to her sides, but sailors do not wait for the ship's hull to become weather beaten before applying the first coat of paint. Farmers, on the other hand, seem much inclined to let their buildings reach a state of partial decay before making any special effort to safeguard them against the play of wind and water. As a matter of fact, nothing ays better than paint applied immediately after the building is constructed, in lengthening the life of the structure. The same applies to farm machinery parts especially the wooden parts and it will always pay to paint such repairs to machinery wagons, etc., as have to be made before the work season for these articles commences.

Good paint applied to farm buildings and machinery, not only prevents the good management employed in serving them, but calls attention to running the farm, a fact that helps greatly in case the owner wishes to sell either the farm or some of its products. Many farmers have paid so much attention to the economic value of the farm that they have neglected an important side of farm life. There is no reason why the farmer and his family should not have as attractive a home as attractive as the city dweller has. The farmer's neighbors as well as the passing observer, will judge him largely by the care he takes of his stock, his machinery, and his buildings.

Painting is the easiest and least expensive way of making sure of neat clean surroundings, and is the best way of preserving the lumber in buildings, implements or machinery. With spring approaching, the time has arrived for going the rounds of the machine shed to lick out these articles that can be moved to a warm building for retouching with paint in addition to their annual overhauling and repair.

### GRAVESEND RACE TRACK TO BE CUT UP INTO BUILDING LOTS

NEW YORK, March 19.—The old Gravesend race track near Coney Island, over which for twenty years the Brooklyn handicap, a turf classic, was run, to-day was sold to a real estate firm for \$675,000. The entire tract of land consisting of about ninety acres, was the property of the Brooklyn Jockey Club, in which the once noted brothers, Philip and Michael Dwyer, were the principal stockholders. ### NEW PERILS ASSAIL HUNLAND

GENEVA, March 18.—Bolshevism is making a supreme effort to conquer Germany. Wherever President Ebert's order for a general strike has been effective Soviets are being proclaimed. The proletarian quarters in Berlin and the suburbs of Neukoln Welseuse, Reinickendorf and Spandau are in the hands of armed workmen. The movement is being directed by the Independent Socialists, an dthe Daumeg sent an ultimatum to Chancellor Kapp, "in the name of the soviet Republic," demanding that he withdraw his forces from Berlin within twenty-four hours otherwise Spartan troops would march on Berlin.

Kapp, who is an anti-Semitic fanatic, at first tried to pacify the workmen by distributing among them the white flour reserved by the old government for the Jews to bake Easter cakes, while General von Luetwitz called the students and high school boys, among whom the Nationalist agitation is particularly intense, to the colors to reinforce his hard-pressed troops. But later they were reported to have resigned.

Following the example of the Berlin Communists, Spartacans in Leipzig, Dresden, Halle, and other cities have declared Soviet rule. It is growing clearer hourly that the Ebert Government at Stuttgart is unable to repel the simultaneous onslaught of the Pan-Germans and Spartacans cannot crush the forces representing by the Kapp regime and at the same time master the Bolshevists without the active assistance of the Reichswehr, which is still neutral.

A probable solution of the crisis throughout the Empire is foreshadowed by the developments in Munich where the Reichswehr officers made their loyalty to the constitution government dependent on the resignation of the Socialists members and the establishment of a new cabinet in which the bourgeoisie parties dominated. The crisis thus would be the knell of Socialism as represented by the Ebert regime.
