Now the powerful brewers and disillers are generally on the Tory side of politics, and the present govrnment has therefore a good deal o thank them for. The late Liberal government owed its overthrow nainly to the trade hostility which was created by the earnest efforts of Sir William Harcourt, to introduce scheme of legislation which would have interfered with the profits of the liquor trade. 
