Ottawa Weekly Letter.

The Conservative Platform

Halifax Programme After One Year.—The Policy Has Been Declared All Over Canada.—It Has Been Maintained in Parliament—And the Government Has Been Forced to Adopt Part of it.

MINISTERS WHO COMPLAIN

Paterson and Fisher Say the Charges Are All Scandals.—Then the Slanderers Are Royal Commissioners, Deputy Ministers, Auditors, Judges, Responsible Officials and Leading Liberals.

OTTAWA, August 29, 1908.

It was exactly a year after Mr. Borden laid down his party platform at Halifax when he was again made the candidate of his party in that constituency. During this time the policy defined and proclaimed by the Conservative leader has been received with great favour in the country and has been resolutely supported by the Opposition party in Parliament. Most of the principles definitely declared at Halifax a year ago had previously been asserted by the party in the House, and nearly all the others have since been affirmed by the Conservatives in their representative capacity.

Moreover, the Government has already been compelled by the force of public opinion to adopt in whole or in part several of the reforms advocated by the Opposition Leader.

HONEST EXPENDITURE.

The first plank of the Conservative platform demands honest appropriation and expenditure of public money in the public interest. Unfortunately, the Government has not adopted this principle, and ministers have been getting steadily and rapidly farther away from it. But during the long and strenuous session the Opposition members, by resolutions in the House, by searching and detailed criticism, by earnest and persistent investigation in committee, have laboured to check dishonest and improper appropriation, and to expose and prevent corrupt and extravagant expenditure.

ABOLITION OF PATRONAGE.

The second plank calls for the appointment of public officials upon consideration of capacity and personal character, and the fourth demands reformation of the civil service, so that future appointments shall be made by a commission after competitive examination. This part of the Conservative policy was so well received in the country and maintained so strongly in Parliament, that the Government was constrained to introduce a Civil Service Bill, which professes to adopt the principle. As a matter of fact, it goes but a short way, applying only to appointments in the regular civil service at Ottawa. So far as it goes, the Act is one step gained by the Conservative party, which did all that was possible to improve the measure and make it effective. It remains for the Conservatives themselves when they take office to make the reformation genuine by applying it to outside appointments and also to promotions.

CORRUPTION AND FRAUD IN ELECTIONS.

The third plank of Mr. Borden's platform calls for stronger provision against bribery and fraud in elections, for the effective and speedy trial of election petitions, and the prevention of large campaign contributions. The Government has been driven to introduce legislation proposing to meet some of these conditions—though this was not done until the opposition had brought in a strong and drastic bill for that purpose. The Government measure does not go so far as the Conservative platform demanded, or as the Conservative bill. Moreover, the Government cast suspicion on its own course by tacking on to the bill a clause snatching Dominion control of the lists in two provinces and parts of two others. It was a long task to drive the Government and the majority from this position, but it was done. When that was accomplished, the Conservatives lent their aid to improve and make stronger the government bill.

IMMIGRATION.

The Opposition has not had much

opportunity to enforce its policy of Senate Reform, but has compelled the Government to admit that some change is necessary. The clause demanding greater vigilance in admitting immigrants and the abolition of the bonus system has been supported by the Opposition in the House by resolutions on two or three occasions, and has undoubtedly affected the administration of this Department. Yet, bonuses continue to be paid, and undesirable immigrants continue to come, and the Conservative party on attaining power will have something to do in this matter. The statesmanlike course of Mr. Borden respecting Japanese immigration has been commended in the East and West alike.

PUBLIC DOMAIN.

A great part of the work of the session and much of the discussion outside has been devoted to the effort to secure for the people of Canada the benefit of their public lands and franchises. This part of the Conservative programme has been resisted. It has been and will be fought to the last by land grabbers and holders of concessions and all that group of political speculators whom the Government has been making rich. Everyone knows how rigorously the Opposition has carried on this campaign during the past year. It is a battle that must and will be won for the people.

NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION.

The Conservative party in the House and out of it adheres to the programme for the development of Canadian waterways, national ports, cold storage transportation, all on broad national principles, and not by spasmodic and unconsidered expedients made when sectional demands or the influence of some transportation interest, cannot be resisted.

PUBLIC CONTROL OF PUBLIC UTILITIES.

The demand for a reorganization of the present Railway Commission as a public utilities board, with jurisdiction over all corporations operating public utilities or holding franchises of a national character, has been made by Mr. Borden and his supporters with some success. The Government, after much hesitation, has had the powers of the Commission extended over telegraphs and telephones. Though this is not all that the Conservative platform demands or that the Conservative party will achieve, it is a step in their direction.

Mr. Borden proposed an investigation with the view of a national system of telegraphs and telephones under conditions which should be just to vested interests. That is still the platform of the Conservative party.

OTHER PLANKS.

The demand for improved postal facilities and free rural mail delivery wherever that may be found practicable, has been supported in Parliament by strong resolutions and good argument. The latter proposition was condemned and resisted in Parliament by Postmaster General Lemieux, but only this week that minister at a public meeting in Quebec fell into line by promising free rural delivery in the future.

It does not need to be said that the Conservatives stand by their tariff policy, and by their mutual preferential trade platform.

Promises and Performances.

From time to time we have given in these columns samples of the differences between the promises and performances of our Liberal friends since they assumed power in the Provincial Legislature in 1891.

On an occasion such as this you will expect some statement as to what we intend to do in the future. I lay down as plank No. 1 that we will continue cutting down and reducing every unnecessary expenditure.

Our readers will notice that Premier Peters laid down as a principal plank in the Liberal platform that economy should be practiced and the annual expenditures should be reduced.

From this table our readers will see that, with the exception of three years, the annual expenditure has steadily grown year by year, and it

will be noticed that in election years the increase has been especially large. Here we have then the evidence of the direct violation of the promise to reduce expenditure; but worse still, these increased expenditures were not met by sufficient revenue.

These deficits aggregate over \$900,000, showing by their own figures, that our Liberal friends have added that amount to our Provincial debt, during their seven teen years of office.

As our readers have learned from our last issue, Mr. Foster in his speech in the market Hall here, held the Government up to public condemnation for their numerous derelictions of duty.

In his great speech in Charlottetown, Mr. Foster, in beautiful language, pointed out the importance and nobility of statesmanship, and showed what a great work those laboring in behalf of their country were engaged in.

Mr. H. B. Ames, M. P., for Montreal, who rendered such good service during last session, in exposing the Government's pernicious land policy, has since the close of the session been carrying on the work of exposure in a most effective manner.

A couple of weeks ago the Patriot, along with other Liberal organs, published a most sensational account of alleged corrupt practices by the Conservatives in election of Stanfield in Colchester, in November last.

The case was up for preliminary examination and several witnesses were examined; but Mr. Bayne has been suddenly dropped by our Liberal contemporaries.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The paid admissions to the Toronto Fair on Labor Day were 135,000, beating all records.

During an electric storm the smelting works owned by the Deseronto, Ont., Iron Co., were struck by lightning and totally destroyed. The fire broke out in a charcoal shed. The loss is \$100,000.

In full view of 25,000 horrified spectators assembled on Central Maine Fair grounds on the 3rd, Charles Oliver Jones, a well known ascendant of Hammondport, fell 500 feet to his death.

While the Grand Trunk Pacific freight was running down hill at Trenton, Ont., the truck of the first car broke and twenty-one cars were thrown into a ditch and the contents scattered. The cars took fire and all except a car of whiskey was destroyed.

The Elder Dempster steamer Sokoto arrived at North Sydney last Thursday for coal. She had twenty-five Chinese on board. On Monday two of them were missing and the steamer's captain was forced to pay one thousand dollars head tax.

After destroying the town of Chisholm on the Mesabar Range and burning over 100 houses in St. Louis, Ontario, and Itasca counties in Minnesota and in Douglas County, Wisconsin, the many forest fires which have been raging in these regions have been checked.

On the 5th two men were killed and one slightly injured in a crash of freight trains in South Lawrence, Mass. Both trains were switching in the yards and were running parallel to each other when one started over the switch. The other train could not be stopped in time to prevent a collision.

The adaptability of the suction gas engine to ship propulsion has been strikingly shown in experiments with the obsolete war ship Batavier, which was driven with a 550 horse power engine, nearly seven knots an hour on the Clyde on the 2nd inst. at a cost of six cents a ton per mile. Slack was burned as fuel and neither boilers nor funnels were used.

The most important business before the shareholders of the C. P. R. at the annual meeting in Montreal on October 7th, will be the request of the directors to authorize an issue of \$50,000,000 additional common stock. This will bring the total authorized issue to \$200,000,000 common stock, \$100,000,000 previously authorized having been about used up.

Beginning next year, the fisheries board of the United States will be under uniform protective regulations designed to prevent the extinction or further diminution of fish. Commissioners appointed under the treaty passed last spring have agreed on regulations and they will shortly report to their respective Governments.

Snubbing to the deadly fumes of burning pitch and oakum, deep down in the forepart of the British barque Puritan, at Boston, on the 2nd inst., four seamen were suffocated and fifth partly overcome before they were rescued. The fire, which wrought only slight damage, was caused by spontaneous combustion. The injured man was taken to the Relief Hospital, and will recover.

Dispatches from the City of Nijmegen, in the province, eighteen miles southeast of the city, tell of fire which occurred yesterday in which 4,000 houses were destroyed by flames. Fearful scenes of distress and suffering are reported as a result of the disaster, and the Government is rendering every assistance to the inhabitants of the stricken city.

Early yesterday morning a fire broke out in the Belmont Hotel, Denver-Colo. There were about one hundred guests asleep in the building at the time, and when the alarm was given they rushed pell mell into the halls in their night robes. They were hemmed in by the flames on all sides. One man plunged to his death, and half a dozen others threw themselves from windows, sustaining probably fatal injuries.

A service was held in the parish of Coughnawaga, on Saturday morning, for the repose of the souls of thirty-three Indians who perished in the Quebec Bridge fatality a year ago, and in the afternoon another ceremony was held in the cemetery, when the friends and relatives of the seventeen victims whose remains were found and buried there, deposited floral offerings on their common grave. The whole tribe and several strangers took part in this mournful anniversary.

paigner, but the Chief Engineer of the Marine Department, first appointed by the Liberal party, who on both expressed the opinion that a Government contractor had brought about the appointment of the officer who recommended the machinery he had to sell, this officer afterwards securing to this contractor about \$1,000,000 worth of profit afterwards.

It was a Government official who swore that he had paid bids which he knew to be excessive, because the minister had ordered it.

It was a Government officer and not a Conservative who swore that he had been asked to certify accounts of which he knew nothing, and that he had been made to suffer from his refusal to do so.

It was not a Conservative, but an auditor paid by the Government who reported that one department paid for goods that it never received.

It was a Liberal engineer who charged that the Government was paying contractors on the Transcontinental road prices for removing sand.

Let Mr. Paterson and Mr. Fisher deal with these charges if they object to the same statements when made by the Conservatives.

A Leaf From the Record.

The newest reply of friends of the Laurier Government to the criticisms of its extravagance is the setting up of a claim that the tens of millions it is yearly spending about what should be the reasonable cost of the administrative services are being "invested." The idea can hardly be called a happy one.

People who make investments look for a return on them. The public accounts do not show any in the case of the "investments" of the Laurier Government. The "investments" it has made, where any have been made, are not remunerative and most of them will never be remunerative.

The greatest increase in the expenditure, the increase that has made the taxation burdensome at a time of commercial distress, is in the regular everyday services, in connection with matters largely under control of ministers. It is not practical to make a comparison item by item for last year, nor even for 1906-7 and for the year before the present Government came into power.

The "year" 1906-7 was a short one of nine months only, due to the change in closing the fiscal twelve months from June 30 to March 31. Only the totals of 1907-8 have been made public. They show the expenditure in the following years to have been:

1905-6—Twelve months \$41,563,740

1906-7—Nine months 65,773,138

1907-8—Twelve months 111,896,340

The increases have almost the expenditure in twelve years to well up to three times what they were in 1905-6. Neither the population, nor the wealth of the country has increased in any such proportion, nor has the country received value for the vast additional outlay.

The figures for 1907-8 not being available, and those for 1906-7 covering only nine months, as stated above, a comparison of a full year of

The duty in taking part in this choice, and of exercising our prerogative as free citizens, is one that fronts us with an unshakable and imperative challenge. If ever citizenship meant anything, it is at such a time as this. There can be no evading the duty, no whatever the pretext, without real treason to the land in which we live.

Upon the intelligence of our choice depends the safety of the country. Where the citizens are alive to the fact of their power, and alert to use it to the fullest extent, there is every hope for all prosperity and the successful solution of all the problems with which we are faced. But without this element in our citizenship, there can be only misgivings of the future and the certainty of danger ahead.—Ottawa Citizen.
