





Enormous Decrease of Birthrate

Paris, May 18 .- The Journal Offi cial published an article by Dr. Jacques Bertillon, chief statistician of Paris, calling attention of the disastrous results of the birth and death statistics in France for 1919. The complete figures are as follows:

Marriages-309,289. Divorces-13.049. Births-774.358. Deaths-703,777.

The births are the lowest for century. In 1859 the births numbered 1,018,000. They dwindled to 984,000 in 1862, and numbered 899,000 in 1887, The number of deaths in 1910 was exceptionally low, yet the excess of births over deaths was only 70,581 ompared with 884,061 in Germany.

Dr. Bertillon concludes by declaring that there is no reason physologically or economically which prevents France from increasing as other nations, and no motive for her to resign herself shamefully to suicide .--





Newfoundlander Killed at Sydney Mines.

North Sydney, May 20.-Henry homas Farrell, a coal cutter employed at the Mackay mine, was almost instantly killed while at work in the colliery vesterday afternoon The accident followed the firing of a shot, and was due to a fall of stone which struck him on the head and crushed him to the earth. Fred Fennell, his room mate, had just left Farrell, who was in the act of pulling some loose shale from the roof, when the big stone came down and ended his life. Fennell succeeded in renoving the stone from Farrell's body with the assistance of some fellow workmen, and had the body removed from the pit. The remains were takand an inquest was held last evening by Coroner A. R. Forbes and a jury. The verdict of the jury was that death was accidental and that no blame attaches to the company.

After the inquest Farrell's body was prepared for burial and taken to his residence on Brook Street, whence the funeral will be held to Lake Side Cemetery at 2.30 Sunday afternoon. Farrell was 32 years of age and leaves a wife and six children. He came to Cape Breton about ten years ago from Clarke's Beach, Conception Bay, Nfld., and has been employed at the Mackay mine for about twenty months.



A Horrible Death.




