A man learning to talk at the age of wenty-five years, at the same time that his infant daughter was trying to form syllables and words, seems ence of Harry J. Scott, of Goshen Orange County, New York. Moreover t took him five years to learn, and h has only just finished.

Scott is a clerk in a Goshen gro ery. Five or six years ago he was a member of the Cataract Engine

apparatus and was testing it in the village street, when somthing broke and a piece of iron struck Scott on the head with such force that it de pressed a section of his skull, and the piece of bone pressed on the brain Scott was unconscious for days. Dr Frederick Seward. Dr. Dennis and D. Condit, who attended him, agree there was but one chance in a thous and for the man to recover. Th piece of bone was removed and the fitted into place again. The lacerated brain-cells were treated antisepticall and results awaited.

Father and Daughter. At the end of two weeks conscious ness gradually returned. Food was given by artificial means for a time return and the man could swallow

But though consciousness had returned the power of speech had not The man could not utter a syllable At intervals he would seem to try t speak. The doctors could find no or ganic impediment to speech After s few months, following some premonitory symptoms, the man's lips moved in sound. It was not a syllable or a word, but it was a sound. He was encouraged to repeat the effort, and one day he formed a syllable or two. In turn more syllables, and in time, by dint of much patience and encouragement and effort. one-syllable words were spoken.

The doctors decided the injury had affected one side of the section of the brain controlling the organs of speech. They say that it is known to the medical fraternity that in such a case the remaining side in time will take over little by little the functions or a share of the functions belonging to the other side. Hence the man's gradual recovery of the power of

polysyllable words and short sentences

his daughter Ruth, who was born shortly after the accident to her lather, began to learn to talk. It was strange to hear the grown man, with ther facilities intact, even to the exent of being able to read papers and books intelligently and write normally lisping words and phrases the same as the child. The two were inseparable, and learned to talk together. Progress was more rapid with the child than the father.

Recovers His Speech.

After a couple of years Scott was able to resume his work as a clerk in the grocery. His speaking vocabulary was limited, but as he waited on customers and used the words he had earned it increased. Fluency and

ase of speaking came slowly. There was a halting hesitation about vere trying to recall a forgotten something, to grasp a lost faculty. Paience and practice, however, made for onstant though slow improvement, nd gradually fluency and ease began

Through the remaining months and ears down to the present it has coninued, but only recently has Mr. Scott's power of speech become normal. To-day he talks as easily and fluently as he ever did, and no one who does not know him would ever uspect his strange experience. The little daughter that learned to talk with her father is now a bright-eved





Odd Coincidence of Queen Victoria's Sorrows at Christmas Time,

One of the most extraordinary Christmas days London ever had was that of 1891. The shops had been, as usual, specially prepared and decorated with the object of attracting the buyers when suddenly on December 22, a thick fog came on. Not until the evening of December 26 did it lift. This particular fog held the record for being the heaviest London had known. Thirty lives were lost and over 200 Christmas, 1860, was the coldest

The late Queen Victoria's most emorable Christmases were the most athetic. It was in less than a fortnight from Dec. 25, 1861, that her husband, the price consort, passed away. 
