

Jumped From Train

That is the Only Explanation of the Injuries of North Easton Man Found Unconscious by Track.

North Easton, Dec. 18.—William R. Searles of this town, who was found by a track walker at Canton Junction yesterday morning unconscious, the side of his face and head being badly cut, his chest bruised severely and one arm dislocated at the shoulder, is still at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston.

The railroad employees are unable to explain his presence by the track in any way that he attempted to jump from the train arriving at Canton Junction shortly before 12. His daughter, Miss Marion Searles, was expecting the return of her father on the train which arrives here at 12.30. It is thought that Mr. Searles did not realize that he had been carried by the Junction until after the train had passed the town, when he attempted to get off the train.

Mr. and Mrs. Searles went to Brookline Saturday afternoon upon receipt of the news of the death of a niece, Mary Ward, who was burned fatally Saturday, and Mr. Searles returned on the late train as far as the Junction.

At the hospital yesterday he could not tell anything of his accident and did not appear to recognize his wife and daughter.

Miss Mary S. Ames, who employed Mr. Searles as carpenter on the new mansion being constructed on her estate, and as watchman of the building Sundays, telegraphed instructions to the hospital to have the injured man placed in her ward and have every possible attention given him.

[Mr. Searles is a native of this city and will be well known to many people here.]

The World's Largest Bakery

The largest bakery in the world is located in Essen, Prussia, the home of the great gun factory.

It is a vast building, divided into two shifts, work night and day. Everything is done by machinery. A screw turns incessantly a kneading trough into which are poured some water and ten sacks of flour of 200 pounds each. This machine makes about 40,000 pounds of bread each day in the shape of 25,000 small loaves and 25,000 large loaves, produced by 230 sacks of flour of 200 pounds each. All the operations of breadmaking are performed in this colossal bakery.

The wheat arrives there, is cleaned, ground, and brought automatically to the kneading trough by a series of rising and descending pipes. There are 36 double ovens, and the workmen who watch over the baking of the bread earn from fourpence to fivepence an hour, making an average of four shillings a day for eleven hours on duty.

They have coffee and bread free, also the use of a bath-room, for they are required to keep themselves spotlessly clean, and must wash their hands eight times a day.

Household Notes.

Medicine stains will generally yield to alcohol.

To remove iodine stains apply ammonia or ether to the spot.

To remove coffee stains first put in lukewarm water and soak about 15 minutes. Then wash in warm suds.

All articles stained with cocoa should be put into cold water, rubbed thoroughly and then washed in warm suds.

Paint stains should be removed as quickly as possible. Rub with turpentine or alcohol and wash in warm suds.

A solution of boracic acid is the best known remedy for inflamed, weak or tired eyes. Apply with eye-cup or dropper.

Fresh paint on a coat sleeve or rough material can be removed by rubbing briskly with a clean piece of the same material.

Home-made candy has become so popular that the amateur candy-maker is glad of any hints concerning this new accomplishment.

If the pan or chaffing dish in which the candy is to be boiled is buttered for an inch or two down, the liquid will not boil over. It will not rise higher than the buttered rim.

To whip lace on a garment without rolling the edge of the material, lace the lace nearly one-fourth of an inch from the raw edge of the material and whip closely. This will roll the material into a neat and even hem which will wear and wash as well as if hemmed separately. This is particularly satisfactory for bias or circular edges.

Bright and delicately colored fabrics are often ruined in the process of laundering by soap being rubbed upon them or a bit accidentally adhering to them. To prevent such a mishap, keep your bar of laundry soap while washing, tied up in a small sack of thin material. Better suds can be made in this way and also every bit of soap can be used, preventing all waste.

To toast bread on a gas stove place a stove lid over the burner and lay the toaster on this. When the bread is toasted on one side the gas may be turned off and the heat remaining in the lid will toast the other side. When ironing use a stove lid in the same way. Use three irons and two handles. As you take one iron put the cold one in its place. The irons will be hotter and the work done quicker than when two are used.

This is a tested and sure recipe for preventing the under crust of pies becoming soggy. Beat one egg (white and yolk) and brush the entire bottom and sides of the pie with it, then sprinkle with bread crumbs that have been grated or put through the food-chopper. Do not use crusts, just the white part. Use about three table-spoonfuls to each pie. Now put in the filling—custard or fruit—and bake as usual. The crust will be nice and dry, and the crumbs cannot be detected.



The New Water System.

The water was turned off just inside of Rawlins' Cross, near Sunny-side Cottage, on Rennie's Mill Road, last night for the purpose of connecting up the new system lately completed to the higher levels by Mr. T. Kent. The supply to the East End of the city was cut off for a few hours while the work was in progress, and the task was completed by Engineer Ryan and his staff in a most successful manner. This will give the people of the higher levels an ample supply, and one independent to the mains in other parts of the city. During the progress of a fire in the lower parts of the city in the future there will be no necessity to curtail the supply to the people of the upper portion, and the danger of pipes freezing there will be minimized if not altogether obviated. The route of the new system starting at Rawlins' Cross is in Monkstown Road, up Catherine Street, in Hayward Avenue turning up through McDougall Street, across Barnes' Road, up Howley Avenue, crossing Allandale Road and into the field south of St. Michael's Orphanage thence to Merrymead Road and connects further on with the new main brought from Windsor Lake. IN PERIL OF THEIR LIVES.

Mr. Chas. F. Taylor and Capt. Williams, of the Rosalind, Narrowly Escape Drowning.

Just as the Rosalind was about to leave port shortly after 11 o'clock last night an accident occurred which came very near costing Captain Williams, of the ship, and Mr. C. F. Taylor, of St. John's, their lives. The ship lay since her arrival at A. J. Harvey & Co.'s premises, and several officers away. A few moments before the gangway was about to be taken ashore the forward spring slipped off the gump head to which it was attached, the ship's head fell off and she brought the gangway off the wharf and it fell over against her side in a perpendicular position. When this was secured Mr. Taylor was in the act of coming ashore, and only a few moments before 5 men had been standing on the gangway. When Captain Williams saw Mr. Taylor's danger as the end of the gangway was being gradually drawn from the wharf with the motion of his ship, he ran to his aid to try either to push him quickly ashore or draw him back to the vessel's deck. Before he could do so, however, the gang plank fell and Mr. Taylor was thrown violently into the water. Captain Williams now tried to clamber down the gangway which was now in a vertical position against the ship's side to Mr. Taylor's aid but in doing so fell off into the water, and the two men in the darkness were left battling for their lives in the water. There was intense excitement and consternation amongst the few people on the wharf and it was feared that one if not both would drown. Capt. Williams reached the line which had slipped and hung over the ship's side and seizing it clung to it. Those on the wharf threw a line in Mr. Taylor's direction and he managed to grasp it. He, however, was heavily clad, and those on the wharf tried to draw him up his strength gradually became exhausted. Pilot George Lewis now divested himself of his over and under coats and climbing down on the shores of the head of the pier held on to a rope which hung over it and grasping Mr. Taylor with one of his hands held on to him and kept him above water until the pilot boat which was on the other side of the ship, and in which was Capt. Goss and E. Malone, came around and picked up Mr. Taylor and also the captain. The former was chilled and exhausted and could have held above water only a few minutes longer. Captain Williams was also heavily clad and suffered from the chilly effects of the water. Several of the police on duty came to the premises on hearing of the outcry on the streets, but the men had then been drawn to safety.
Mr. Lewis deserves credit for his plucky act in getting down on the shores in the darkness and at great risk. Had he not done so Mr. Taylor must have been drowned.

Will Go to Vancouver, B.C., to Engage in the Fisheries.



LONDON, Dec. 26. A despatch from St. Petersburg says that mutiny has broken out in the Naval Ordnance. A number of mutineers have been wounded by the troops sent to repress the insubordination.

OTTAWA, Dec. 26. The Government has decided to proceed at once with work on the first section of the Hudson Bay Railway. The question whether the Hudson Bay terminal line shall be at Nelson or Fort Churchill is not affected by the route of the first section.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Dec. 26. It is reported here that Japan has carried out a survey of the Russian frontier since last June. Russian officials are in consequence insisting that the Amur and trans-Baikal provinces shall in future be closed to Japanese officials. A Japanese official was recently arrested and expelled.

ROME, Dec. 26. An exchange of communications between the Italian Foreign Office and the Chancellors of other European Powers is proceeding with the greatest activity. The subject of the communications is Tripoli, but the question of a renewal of the triple alliance between Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy is also being discussed.

LONDON, Dec. 26. The proclamation of martial law at Teheran, the dismissal of Shuster by the Persian Cabinet, and fragmentary reports as to a massacre by Russian soldiers, are causing much apprehension. According to latest advices, the main trouble occurred on Sunday, when the killed at Resht are said to have numbered 500, including women and children. Direct despatches from there make no reference to serious casualties, and report that the Russian consulate at that point states that order has now been restored.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26. The Chinese six companies engaged raising a \$2,000,000 loan for Chinese revolutionary purposes, sent a telegram to Wu Ting-fang, at Shanghai to-day, asking him to resume hostilities rather than yield to Yuan's demands for a limited monarchy. A similar message has been sent to Tang Shao-yi, who represents Premier Yuan at the international conference, asking him to use his influence on behalf of a republic. All the Chinese in the United States are firm for a republic.

Special to Evening Telegram.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 26. The decision of Premier Yuan Shi Kai to submit a proposal for the meeting of a special National Assembly to decide the future form of Government in China for the consideration of the Manchus, when it became known here caused considerable satisfaction. According to the revolutionary leaders now in Shanghai, Premier Yuan's consent is tantamount to an admission that he favors a Republic. It is understood that Tang Yi, representing the Premier here, had already informed the revolutionary leaders at the peace conference that Yuan was personally in favor of a Republic. Tang admits that Yuan is in full agreement with the revolutionary plan, but is only seeking to secure assurance with regard to the future treatment of the Imperial clan and the Manchus people, and also to avoid an outbreak at Peking, when the final announcement is made. The present situation is said by the revolutionary leaders to have been anticipated. Every detail of their plans is complete for the organization of a provisional government and its eventual establishment on a staple basis.

Learning to Speak at Twenty-Five

Blow on Head Caused Man to Lose Power of Speech and He Had to Begun like a Child.

A man learning to talk at the age of twenty-five years, at the same time that his infant daughter was trying to form syllables and words, seems a paradox. But such was the experience of Harry J. Scott, of Goshen, Orange County, New York. Moreover, it took him five years to learn, and he has only just finished.

Scott is a clerk in a Goshen grocery. Five or six years ago he was a member of the Cataract Engine Company, on the Goshen Fire Department.

The company had bought some new apparatus and was testing it in the village street, when something broke and a piece of iron struck Scott on the head "with such force" that it depressed a section of his skull, and the piece of bone pressed on the brain. Scott was unconscious for days. Dr. Frederick Seward, Dr. Dennis and Dr. Condit, who attended him, agreed there was but one chance in a thousand for the man to recover. The piece of bone was removed and then fitted into place again. The lacerated brain-cells were treated antiseptically and results awaited.

Recovery of His Speech.

After a couple of years Scott was able to resume his work as a clerk in the grocery. His speaking vocabulary was limited, but as he waited on customers and used the words he had learned it increased. Fluency and ease of speaking came slowly.

There was a halting hesitation about every utterance. It was as if the man were trying to recall a forgotten something, to grasp a lost faculty. Patience and practice, however, made for constant though slow improvement, and gradually fluency and ease began to come.

Through the remaining months and years down to the present it has continued, but only recently has Mr. Scott's power of speech become normal. To-day he talks as easily and fluently as he ever did, and no one who does not know him would ever suspect his strange experience. The little daughter that learned to talk with her father is now a bright-eyed school girl.

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his daughter Ruth, who was born shortly after the accident to her father, began to learn to talk. It was strange to hear the grown man, with other faculties intact, even to the extent of being able to read papers and books intelligently and write normally, lisping words and phrases the same as the child. The two were inseparable, and learned to talk together. Progress was more rapid with the child than the father.

Trying to Free Bram

One of His Former Counsel Now U.S. District Attorney.

The greatest interest is manifested among the legal fraternity of Boston in the report from Washington to the effect that United States District Attorney Asa P. French has recommended a pardon for Thomas M. Bram, formerly mate on the bark Herbert Fuller, now serving a life sentence at the United States penitentiary at Atlanta for the murder of Capt. Charles I. Nash, his wife, Laura, and second mate Bromberg.

The bark arrived at Halifax in July, 1896, with Bram in irons and the dead bodies in a boat towing astern. Bram was taken hence to Boston, and was twice tried and on both occasions was found guilty. At both trials Bram was defended by James E. Cotter and Asa P. French, the latter now the government prosecutor.

Bram is now assistant cook at the Atlanta prison and is an excellent prisoner. Since his incarceration, now covering thirteen years, he has grown stout and weighs about seventy-five pounds more than he did when he was sentenced. Attorney Cotter said Tuesday: "Bram wrote to me last year in regard to my obtaining a pardon for him. I informed him that as he was so far away it would be advisable for him to seek the help of some one in his immediate vicinity, with whom he could confer from time to time. In my judgment other persons who were on board the vessel had as good opportunity as Bram to commit the murder."

Living Corpse

Amazing Insurance Frauds—Dying as a Career.

A man named Poplavsky, the son of a lieutenant, has been arrested at St. Petersburg for perpetrating a series of the most amazing frauds on insurance companies. His exploits consisted in assuming successive personalities, and for years Poplavsky made the role of a "living corpse" his own. The details of his career are almost unrecited in criminal records.

In 1898 Poplavsky first appeared at St. Petersburg and changed his identity in the house where he was staying there died a two-year-old boy named Fedulin, the child of a military officer. Poplavsky got possession of the child's baptismal certificate, altered the age two to thirty-two, and sending the certificate to the place of issue obtained a new passport in the name of Fedulin, thirty-two years of age.

As Poplavsky he insured his life for \$1,500 in the Urban Assurance Company, and as Fedulin for \$3,500 in the New York Life Assurance Company. A year later he went to Pskoff (171 miles away) with an old school-fellow who was ill, and whom he inscribed in the local registers as Poplavsky. He himself masqueraded as Fedulin. In a few days "Poplavsky" died and "Fedulin," armed with the death certificate and other necessary documents, obtained \$1,500 from the Urban Company. But he still had to obtain the \$3,500 from the New York Life Assurance Company. This he succeeded in doing by getting hold of the death certificate of the boy Fedulin and making a few "alterations" in it.

He was now dead in two characters and had to find a fresh identity. So he went to Narva (100 miles from St. Petersburg) and posed as M. B. Kuntzky, a timber merchant doing business on a fast scale. Under this name he insured his life for \$3,500. He picked up at St. Petersburg the acquaintance of a man who was dangerously ill, and whom, under pretext of charity, he took with him to Starva

His Last Venture.

When Poplavsky's funds were exhausted he married a peasant woman and insured her life for £1,500, and going to a hospital took out a female patient whom he described as his wife. The woman died very soon and he received the insurance money. Emboldened by his success he planned another venture of the kind. He visited Helsinki, Finland, and insured his life for £1,000, subsequently returning to St. Petersburg and making inquiries for an invalid. By this time, however, the motives of his affected philanthropy had excited the suspicion of the police, his career was investigated, and he was arrested.

The prisoner made no attempt to deny his guilt, and answered the questions addressed to him in the laziest manner. When the chief of the detective department asked him what had led him to the paths of crime, he replied that no other career was open nowadays to any decent man.—D. M.

Shuster Has Been Dismissed

Telegram from Shiraz, where boycott has been instituted against Indian troops, report an other track on the Indians near Kaseroon. The situation there is regarded serious.

More Fighting.

Special to Evening Telegram. MADRID, To-Day.

Further fighting is reported in the official despatches from Melilla, Morocco. Several engagements between Riff tribesmen and Spanish troops. Five Spanish columns attacked Riffians simultaneously, the tribesmen were driven across the river leaving a large number of dead on the field and quantities of arms and ammunition were captured by the Spaniards, whose loss is reported two killed, forty wounded.

Gave Up Fishing.

Mr. Az. Martin, of Cabot Street, who has demonstrated to his own satisfaction, at least, that a profitable fishery can be carried on from this port, has given up the voyage for this season, at least. He was on the ground yesterday and says that cod-fish are as plentiful as ever there, but it was impossible to engage in catching it in an open boat as she became quickly lee'd up. If he can secure the desired aid he will next year fish all winter with a decked boat of about 20 tons, and will transfer his present Ferro motor, which can do 10 knots, to her using sail also as an auxiliary. He will fish all next winter and deserves both encouragement and success.—E. S. 50.

Two Killed By Train.

Father of Seven Children and Youth Buried Under Pile of Christmas Toys.

New York, Dec. 26.—The father of seven children and a youth, the only support of his widowed mother, were hurled to instant death by a Long Island Railroad train at Queens at 8 o'clock last night. They were found dead amid a wealth of drums and dolls, toys, candies, Santa Clauses, dresses and shoes, and a thousand other things, Christmas shoppers' purchases, from James McCreery & Co., of New York. The two horses of the delivery wagon were ground under the wheels of the express train, which was making its west-bound trip on the long level stretch through Queens into Jamaica.

The dead are William Volikommer, 45 years old, driver, Brooklyn; J. H. Ehler, 17, No. 3719 Jamaica Avenue. The pilot of the locomotive caught the wagon squarely in the centre, splitting it and hurling the two men far to one side, with a cloud of speckles of every kind. The horses were whirled around against the locomotive and were drawn under the wheels. There was nothing left in the wreck of the wagon or on the two dead men to indicate their identity. From the number of the wrecked wagon and the fact that the wagon was delivering in Queens, as well as by comparison of the descriptions of the driver and helper, they were identified.

Investigation disclosed that Volikommer has seven children, most of them small, and all looking forward to Christmas and the holiday. Mrs. Ehler, the mother of the young helper, was reported to be dependent upon his earnings for her support.

While the Portia was coming down the coast this trip Chief Steward Crossman and aides decorated the saloon and other apartments of the ship in a very handsome manner for the Christmas season, to the delight of the passengers and the ship's company. Festoons of evergreens predominated and these were hung with Chinese lanterns and tans and the effect was very pretty.

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Foundered With All Hands.

Special Evening Telegram. GLASGOW, Dec. 26.

The British steamer Guillemont, from London to Genoa, foundered in the Bay of Biscay Dec. 21st. Her captain and fifteen of the crew were drowned. Seven survivors were picked up by the British steamer Lincoln and landed here to-day. Immediately after rescuing the survivors of the Guillemont, the Lincoln sighted a Spanish steamer, name not learned, showing distress signals, but before the Lincoln was able to proceed to her assistance the Spanish steamer foundered, taking all hands to bottom.

Declined to Attend Dinner

Ex-President Roosevelt has declined an invitation to attend the great Peace Dinner on Saturday next. In a letter declaring his sentiments he censures as traitors to his principles all who accepted invitations to dinner without agreeing with his purposes. Taft will be the principal speaker. There will be 1,800 guests.

Japanese Immigration.

Special Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, Ont., To-Day.

Japanese immigration to Canada has been restricted by the Mikado's Government for some time, but in future will be absolutely stopped, was the statement made yesterday by Mikado Luywer, member of Jap. parliament, now at Ottawa enroute from Rome where he represented his parliament in the International Congress Members Parliament.

One Hundred Killed in Persia

Special to Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, To-Day.

A telegram from Tabriz says the total loss to the Russians in killed and wounded in the fighting in that city numbered one hundred. The Director of the Persian Department in Russian Foreign Office interview said the Government was convinced the Persian Government were not concerned in anti-Russian outbreak in Tabriz and elsewhere. Those responsible were principally Armenians and criminals.

A full choir was present at the service and it was very pleasing to sit in calm repose and hear beautiful Xmas selections translated into exquisite musical harmony by cultured voices that could not fail to lend a charm and inspiration to the large congregation present on that occasion. 

Icebergs Will Be Discovered.

Experiments will be made in the Straits of Belle Isle Next Summer With New Detecting Machine.

Ottawa, Dec. 21.—Alex. Johnston, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, stated this afternoon that one of the government vessels would be placed at the disposal of Professor Barnes, of McGill University, Montreal, for a series of experiments in the Straits of Belle Isle next July. Professor Barnes is the inventor of an instrument for the detection of the approach of icebergs. The instrument, it is said, will indicate the presence of icebergs several miles away and will also indicate the fact that the ice is being approached. The invention has been tried out to a limited extent on the ice breakers on the St. Lawrence River, and the experiments to be conducted next June it is hoped will prove sufficiently good on the ocean. The result of this invention, and if the hopes entertained for it prove true, will be of far-reaching character in decreasing present dangers of navigation.





THE POLICE FORCE.






