

Your legs and your feet have sixtytwo, your arms and hands sixty-four The grand total is reached by the addition of eight small movable bones. There are more muscles in your body than bones. They number 527. If you are curious for further knowledge regarding your bones, you will be interested to know their composition. They include phosphate of lime, carbonate of lime, phosphate of magnesia, fluate of lime, chloride of odium, cartilage, and blood-vessels. After the inquiry, Mr. Porter stated he was satisfied there were no grounds for the allegation of foul play, and that the testimony had convinced him that Captain Brushett and his brother were killed while working in the hold of the vessel in October in a heavy storm, in an effort to free the pumps. The little craft was battling against a heavy gale, he said, and the cargo of salt shifted and buried the Captain and mate. Nicholls also was buried to his waist, but managed to extricate himself. Three days later, according to the testimony, the others four members of the crew opened the hatch and found the bodies under seven feet of salt. They were buried at

As to the supposed fight Capt. Sullivan claimed to have seen when he was approaching the disabled schooner, the survivors testified that they be-Heved the Zirkel, which had broken its steering gear, was going to abandon them, and their frantic efforts to attract the attention of the steamer pro-bably had the appearance of a fight. All members said they had been close friends of Captain Brushett and his brother for years.

Mr. Porter has sent a letter of thanks to Captain Sullivan and other members of the Zirkel crew for rescuing the sailors.
