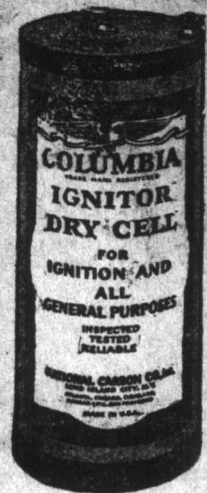

CHAPTER XXXIV.

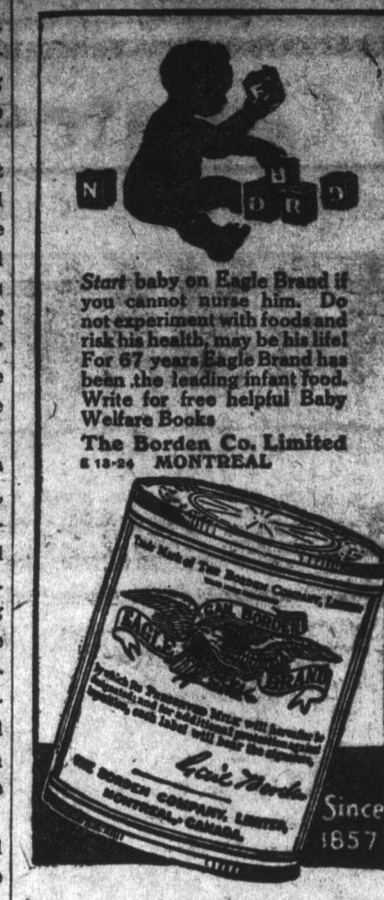

Spent Two Years in Dark Dungeon

When Out Of Bolshevik Prison Walked 700 Miles To Safety.

After recovering sight and hearing which he lost during 23 months captivity in a Russian dungeon exposed to darkness and damp, Vilho Leikas, prominent business man of Finland is now in Montreal.

As a representative of the firm of Crogrist, Talonen and Leikas, grain merchants and fruit importers of Hälsingfors, Finland, he has come to this city for the first time since 1905, seeking out better trade relations between Finland and Canada.

On the occasion of his former visit to Montreal, Mr. Leikas was interested in a book publishing company and by the placing of Finnish literature in the public libraries of this continent.

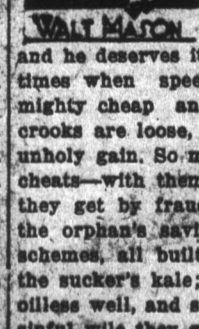
When war broke out in 1914 he had a large grain business in Petrograd. This, together with all the rest of his property, the Bolsheviks confiscated in 1918, and on his refusal to sanction the seizure by signing away what they had taken, they threw him into jail fourteen different times and kept him prisoner 23 months.

He was imprisoned in a dungeon so dark that he lost his sight and rheumatic affection he became blind. He also lost his hearing, and when less strict supervision enabled him to make his escape, he travelled some seven hundred miles to northern Russia in an effort to reach a port there, sleeping in the forest at night, since he dare not find other shelter.

Canada and U.S. Have not Agreed on Rum-Running

Up Rather Than Wound Up. OTTAWA—The rum-running treaty between Canada and the United States which was supposed to be concluded months ago has not yet been officially completed and interested parties are now wondering what, if anything, is to come out of it.

It will be recalled that last fall the United States Government despatched to Ottawa a delegation of officials for a week of conferences on restrictive measures on international rum running. The United States requests were found too extensive but part of them were agreed to in a communication sent to Washington.

French Aviator D'Oisy Abandons World Flight—Steamer Burned at Pier in Cleveland, Ohio; Loss Estimated at \$200,000.

HONOR TO SCOTLAND AND HER MINER LORD.

EDINBURGH, May 20. His Grace James Brown, and his wife, now Her Grace performed their first public function last evening when, in the great Throne Room of the old Holyrood Palace, the old minister as representative of the King received the keys of the city, presented in accordance with time honored custom by the Lord Provost. All around stood a crowd of gorgeous uniformed men and beautifully gowned women forming the court of the new Lord High Commissioner. The Marchioness of Ailsa, attending Mrs. Brown, as lady-in-waiting; and the Marquis of Clydesdale standing by Mr. Brown, as aid; while halberdiers, carrying lochaber axes, formed the guard of honor. The ceremony was brief and merely formal but it was marked throughout by grave dignity in which the unobtrusive bearing of the central figure contributed. Neither showed the slightest embarrassment. At the High Commissioner's request 30 intoxicants were served at the banquet and none will be served throughout Mr. Brown's stay in the palace. It was the first occasion that a dry court has ever been held in historic Holyrood.

DOISY ABANDONS FLIGHT.

LONDON, May 20. Capt. Pelletier D'Oisy, French aviator, who landed at Shanghai to-day, on the flight from Paris to Tokio, damaging his machine in coming down informed Reuter's Shanghai correspondent he did not intend to continue the flight. Abandonment, the message says, was due to the accident which damaged his engine and propeller, as well as the tail of the plane.

FIVE MILLION DOLLAR SUIT.

TORONTO, May 20. A suit for \$5,000,000 has been launched by the liquidators of the Home Bank of Canada against nine former directors of the institution. The seven who are facing criminal charges, M. J. Haney, Toronto, former president, M. J. Ambrose, O'Brien, of Renfrew and Ottawa, who was director, 1917-20.

"CAVE DIET" FOR TUBERCULOSIS.

PARIS, May 20. His new method of treating tuber-

culosis by feeding patients pure dried juice from raw meat was described to the Academy of Science last evening by Professor Charles Richet, famous physiologist and winner of the Nobel Prize for medicine, in 1913. Professor Richet applied his method in hospital work during the war with most encouraging results, one hundred patients treated by him steadily increased in weight. For two months, their own bodies absorbed to astonishment of themselves, tissues wasted by tuberculosis. Professor Richet, who long advocated "caveman diet" as the only one according strictly to the dictates of physiology.

STEAMER BURNED AND LIFE LOST.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 20. The passenger steamer, *Babe*, of Ohio, one of the oldest on the Great Lakes, was destroyed by fire at the Municipal Pier here early to-day, with loss estimated at \$200,000. John Lee, aged 70, who for forty years was watchman for the Cleveland and Buffalo Company is missing, and is believed to have lost his life on the steamer, where he usually bunked.

DEATH OF A DIPLOMATIST.

LONDON, May 20. Sir Edward Goschen, the man to whom Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg is reputed to have characterized Belgian neutrality as "a scrap of paper," died at his home here to-day. Sir Edward was a veteran in the British diplomatic service, which he entered in 1879 and at the outbreak of the war was British Ambassador at Berlin.

REV. MR. AMBROSE IS BIBLE SOCIETY SECRETARY.

HALIFAX, May 20. Rev. G. M. Ambrose, who has been in charge of St. Mark's Church here for the past five years has resigned to become District Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society for Nova Scotia and Newfoundland with headquarters at Halifax.

BANDIT SHOT.

WINNIPEG, May 20. After holding up the Portage Avenue and Goulding Street branch of the Bank of Montreal this afternoon, and getting away with seven thousand dollars in cash, a lone unidentified bandit was pursued and shot to death at the wheel of a car he was attempting to steal. All the money was recovered.

Smart Work and Discipline on Orca

STORY OF COLLISION OFF FATHER POINT—CAT WARNS WOMAN.

NEW YORK—(A.P.)—Courage and discipline by the officers and crew of the Orca safeguarded the lives of all aboard when the steamer was rammed last Thursday night by the Norwegian freighter Forsanger in a heavy fog off Father Point, Que., according to her 44 passengers. Before the steamer docked here yesterday the passengers presented to Captain Matthews and his crew a testimonial expressing appreciation of the conduct of officers and men. With three of her staterooms wrecked and several plates above the water line stove in, the Orca came into port under her own power. The bow of the freighter struck the steamer on the starboard side amidships. A small plate, below the waterline was dented and a slight stream of water poured into the ship, but the leak was soon stopped with cement. Mrs. Raymond Fransen, of San Francisco, one of the passengers, attributed her escape from injury to Bonzo, the ship's black cat. She said she was returning to her stateroom when she heard the cat yowling. Remembering the ancient superstition, she went back to the lounge. A few minutes later the collision occurred. Her stateroom was badly damaged. Immediately after the accident, of officers and men comprising the crew, manned their emergency posts and the lifeboats swung clear, but not lowered. The passengers were reassured and soon the Orca was on her way. Captain Matthews refused to discuss the accident but corroborated the facts of the collision. The Forsanger, according to the story of several officers, was sighted by Captain Matthews several moments before the collision. He blew to short blasts indicating he would continue a straight course, the officers said, but the freighter, instead of passing, turned about and struck the Orca. The lifeboats were manned within 8 minutes and the 44 water-tight doors in the hold were closed within 50 seconds, officers said.

Weird Procession

VICTORIA, B.C.—(Can. Press)—After 435 men, women and children had been trapped in the raging inferno of flames which once had been a huge silk factory in the crowded district of Chapel, Shanghai, one of the strangest and most dramatic parades in the strange history of China was held next day when the bodies of 35 of the victims, snatched from the still-smoking ruins, were borne through the streets of the city and heaped on the doorsteps of the Chapel waterworks headquarters as a ghastly feature of protest against the inefficiency of the waterworks system. The story was brought here by passengers recently arriving from China. The procession was headed by a band paying the eerie funeral dirges of the Chinese. Then came banners bearing forth in scarlet letters the wrath of the Chapel workers. These were followed by rough coffins of the victims in whose train the family mourners marched. Six thousand silk workers trailed behind the weeping relatives, shouting imprecations, and waving aloft banners and placards, calling for arrest and punishment, and even urging immediate execution, of waterworks officials. The procession halted before the waterworks building and the bodies were stacked on the broad steps and in the entrance. On the following day every shopkeeper in the Chapel district slammed up his shutters and went on strike with the factory workers, most of them joining in the weird procession.

Business cannot recover when prices, conditions, currencies and governments can hardly be relied upon to last unchanged from one hour to the next. And Germany is the key stone of the whole business. Settle with Germany on a basis which promises some prominence, and the wheels of international trade will at once begin to revolve more rapidly.—Johnsburg Times.

Where Ramsay McDonald is Unique

Ramsay MacDonald is the first Prime Minister since the office became part of the British system two hundred years ago to reach that position without any previous experience of administration, says the London "Observer."

Such a case would have seemed fantastic to our ancestors. Even as late as 1880 Gladstone maintained that a man should serve an apprenticeship before being admitted to the Cabinet, and it was an article of faith with the governing families for many generations that the higher offices of State should be jealously guarded for themselves. Men like Canning or Disraeli who broke into the circle were bitterly opposed and grudgingly accepted. Government was by family compact, and if he was of the right stock a man might reach the top of the tree rapidly. Rockingham formed his first Ministry at thirty-five, and Mr. Pitt was Premier at twenty-four having already received an apprenticeship at the Exchequer.

Disraeli became leader of the House without any previous administrative experience, but he had led the Opposition and was steeped in political lore. Grey's experience was rather out of date by the time he reached the Premiership in 1880 but he had been, for a short time and many years earlier, at the Exchequer and at the Foreign Office. Melbourne had been Irish Secretary and Home Secretary. Peel had filled several offices. Palmerston had an accumulated experience in connection with two opposite parties and was indeed a pretty typical placeman. Gladstone himself had followed the natural line of advancement for a young man of a rather new family, and he had been a good deal more than thirty years in politics before he became Prime Minister for the first time. Salisbury had been long in public life when he became Premier for the first time in 1885, and Rosebery had held minor office in addition to the Foreign Secretaryship.

Of this century's Premiers, Campbell Bannerman had been Irish Secretary and War Secretary, Asquith had been Home Secretary and Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Lloyd George had filled several offices of importance. Mr. Baldwin is spoken of sometimes as one of the amateurs, but he was by no means without knowledge of administration, especially at the Treasury. The case of Mr. MacDonald stands alone.

Given up for Dead, Back in Custody

PENITENT AND CONSCIENCE-STRIKEN WAR VETERAN FACES CHARGE.

NEW YORK, May 9.—Given up for dead by his mother and three wealthy uncles in Canada, Hugh McVeon, battle-scarred veteran of Ypres, tired, penitent and conscience-stricken, trekked northward last night to face a charge of absconding with \$7,000 belonging to the customs service at Windsor, Ont., for which he was cashier when he disappeared last September.

He left here in custody of Sergeant James Proctor of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, who long has "banded" of MacVeon's brother throughout the war. MacVeon, the police say, admitted his guilt and said he won \$3,000 more on the races, all of which he had spent.

Up in Windsor he will be greeted by the wife he deserted when she was a bride of two months. There was something like a mist in the keen eyes of Sergeant Proctor as he left with his prisoner to-night, for MacVeon bore all the ear-marks of a man who has had his lesson, but who has not lost his nerve. MacVeon's only explanation of his action was: "I wanted to see the cities of the United States before I died. I have seen them now and I am willing to go back and face the music."

Killed by Aerial

BLOWN ACROSS HIGH VOLTAGE WIRE.

NEW YORK—An aerial wire attached to an amateur wireless enthusiast to an electric light standard caused the death of two firemen recently at Upper Montclair.

From above the amateur's house, the aerial crossed a 2,400 volt overhead cable and wound itself around an iron fence.

A milkman going on his rounds collided with the fence and was knocked senseless. Sparks from the metal ignited a shrubbery and the fire brigade hurried to the scene.

Captain Muller, in charge of the brigade, tried to cut the aerial with a pair of insulated pliers, but the wire brushed against his wrist and killed him.

A member of the brigade tried to drag his chief away, but the wire blew towards his face and as he swung out his arm to ward it off he caught the wire and died instantly.

A third fireman, wearing rubber boots and gloves, finally removed the aerial.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CIVIC MANAGEMENT IN IRISH FREE STATE CAUSING TROUBLE.

DUBLIN, May 20.

The Local government minister of the Irish Free State issued an order to-day dissolving the Dublin Corporation (or City Council) as from this evening. The order states that the Minister on investigation finds the duties of the members not being duly and effectually discharged, therefore he has appointed three Commissioners to perform the Council duties. The problem of civic management is to be thoroughly examined. In the light of modern experiments in the London correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says the concession granted to the Irish Free State in the matter of having an independent Minister at Washington already has had an important result, in that the Canadian Government has decided that it must have equal advantages. The Telegraph correspondent proceeds to state that this concession to the Irish Free State is bound to have far reaching consequences, as the Imperial representation in foreign countries will be undermined and a constitutional problem of considerable gravity must be solved if there is an Irish Minister to Washington. Why not a Canadian Minister to Paris or an Australian Minister to Tokyo? The control of the Imperial foreign relations will become an impossible task.

JAMAICA TO BREAK AGREEMENT WITH CANADA.

KINGSTON JA., May 21.

On the ground that the British Government has decided to "break" its agreement as regards preferential rates it is said that the Legislative Council of Jamaica proposes to revise the Jamaica tariff in a manner that will materially benefit United States goods. Under the existing preferential agreement Jamaica exacts 25 per cent more duty on various foreign articles imported into the colony than against similar articles from Great Britain and fifty per cent more in case of cotton piece goods.

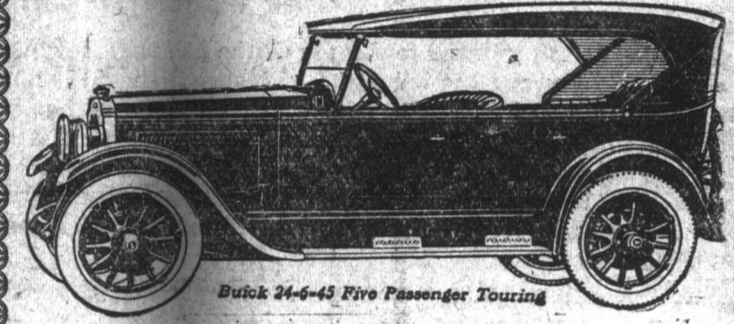
ROBBERS BAND ACTIVE IN POLAND.

He said that if a fog horn had been sounded properly by the scho. the accident would have been avoided.

RUSSIA TO RAISE LOAN FOR PRE WAR DEBTS.

LONDON, May 21.

The offer to set aside a Rump sum to cover the pre-war debts of the Russian Government to British subjects, if a long term loan could be arranged with the assistance of the British Government, was made by the Russian delegates at yesterday's session of the Anglo-Soviet Conference. The Russians said they would not consider claims of those who held Russian bonds before March 12, 1917. The British delegates replied, that the British Government would not undertake to guarantee such a loan, but would take a sympathetic attitude towards the efforts of the Russians to raise a loan privately.

Encouraging the Fisheries

If the leader of the Government party has any constructive policy to place before the electorate, he is making a great secret of it. The Hickman press has devoted itself entirely to the abuse of opponents, and if the Prime Minister's Manifesto contains anything in the nature of a creative programme, the Advocate is ignorant of it.

Early Morning Blaze

Devastating Fire On Massey Pond Rd.
—Family Had Narrow Escape.
At 1.40 this morning a disastrous fire occurred on Massey Pond Road, when the residence of Capt. John Horwood was totally destroyed, while the family barely escaped with their lives.

The first intimation of fire was the smelling of smoke by Capt. Horwood in his bedroom, and when he rushed out to investigate the trouble, he found the downstairs flat in a mass of flames, with all means of exit cut off. He quickly aroused his family and his son, Andrew, with his wife and child, who occupied a bedroom on the second floor, and the only means of escape was by rushing through a bedroom window in their night attire. The smashing of glass aroused Mr. Murphy who lived only a short distance away, and hastening to the scene with the assistance of other neighbours who had meanwhile gathered, rescued all the occupants from the burning building, when they were comfortably lodged in the house of Mr. Murphy. Meanwhile Mrs. Murphy ran to the nearest telephone and summoned the fire companies to the scene. When the firemen arrived the flames were shooting through the roof and all efforts to save the house from ruin were futile.

Nearest Hydrant 300 Yards From The Dwelling.

The nearest hydrant was about 300 yards away, and was of no use to the fire fighters. The firemen then lost no time and, by damming a small brook flowing from Middy Pond, soon had two strong streams of water laid play by means of the pumpers. The firemen worked heroically for upwards of forty minutes and when the flames were finally subdued nothing but the charred walls remained standing.

Dwelling Completely Destroyed.

The entire contents of the house were totally destroyed and the loss to Captain Horwood is a heavy one. The occupants, in escaping from the building, were all more or less injured. Mr. Andrew Horwood, in saving the life of his infant child, who overcame by smoke, and lapsed into unconsciousness after arriving at a nearby house. Mr. Horwood is suffering mostly from shock and was taken to the hospital in the ambulance. The origin of the fire is attributed to the exploding of a kerosene lamp in an incubator which was situated in the bath room on the ground floor. The people of the neighbourhood willingly opened their homes to the Horwood family, showing the true spirit of the neighbourhood. The service rendered to the injured man, by Mrs. George Martin, a V.A.D. Nurse, is beyond praise.

Amongst those who rendered valuable assistance was Sir John Crosbie, who was early on the scene and brought a doctor along with him. The all-out signal was sent in at about 3 a.m.

Old-Time Re-Union at Victoria

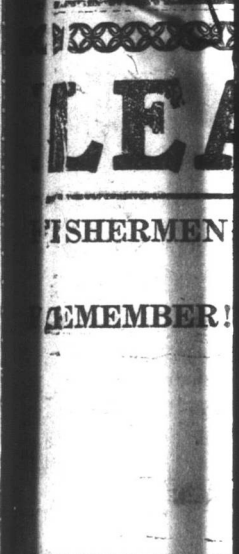

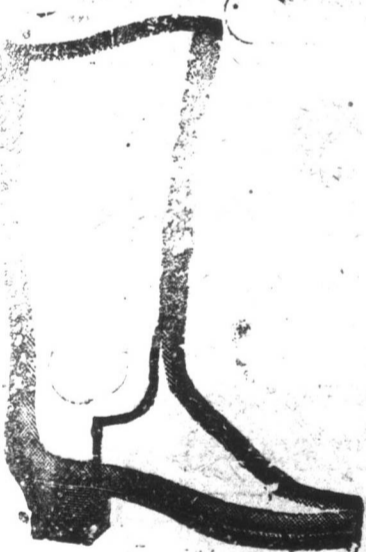

Newspapers Best for Advertising

IDEAL SELLING MEDIUM, SAYS SPEAKER TO ADVERTISING CONVENTION.

PHILADELPHIA, May 14.—Louis Wiley, business manager of the New York Times, speaking to the Second District Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, now meeting in convention here, took as his theme the mutually indispensable nature of advertising both to the newspaper and the advertiser. The retailer depended very largely upon his newspaper advertising to draw his customers to his store and on this point Mr. Wiley said:

"The psychology of this selling is based on a fixed habit. In metropolitan and suburban districts the reading of the newspaper has become a daily practice. News of the day is every day sagaciously awaited. This keen hunger for news gives the advertiser an unusual and vital point of contact with hundreds of thousands of readers. Every woman knows the importance of scanning the advertising columns of the daily paper before starting on her shopping tour. The merchant knows the importance of interesting the woman of the house in the sales his store has to offer. Eighty-eight per cent. of the retail buying of the country rests in the hands of the woman."

Newspaper advertising is gradually superseding all other methods of publicity. It provides in one medium all the conditions required for the successful presentation to the public of the merits of any kind of merchandise. Other methods, such as bill-boards, railway cars, magazines, circulars, are adapted to meet only one or two conditions. Bill-board or railway advertising must be supplemented by newspaper advertising; magazine advertising lacks timeliness, and it also to be fully successful, needs to be fortified by announcements in newspapers.

Mr. Wiley stated that the total newspaper advertising of 122 daily newspapers in 28 principal cities of the United States during 1923 was 1,332,054,971 advertisements, a gain of 92,551,690 lines over the previous year.

Speaking of newspaper postal rates being 250 per cent. higher than before the war, Mr. Wiley said that the publisher of the New York Times pays 15.2 cents to mail a copy of the Sunday edition to the State of Washington—delivering the papers already sorted at the railway terminal, whereas an ordinary citizen can wrap a copy up and for eight cents have it

collected by carrier from the mail box, sent to its destination in the same State, and delivered on arrival there.

Speaking of the coming advertising convention in London, Mr. Wiley expressed the hope that American participation might "set the example for our entrance into closer international co-operation with the Old World in the interests of peace and prosperity."

"Lost Mine" Found

VANCOUVER, B.C., May 15.—(C.P.)—Every mining district seems to have its lost mine, but it seldom happens that such a mine is found and reopened. British Columbia's original lost mine—lost for fifty years or more—has been found and work will begin immediately to get out the high grade silver ore.

It is what is known as the old Eureka mine, search for which has lured prospectors for years. It is eight miles from the town of Hope, B.C. General J. W. Stewart and associates are now owners of the mine and a crew of men and supplies have recently been sent in.

The lost Eureka was last heard of in the early '70s. According to the story which has gone the rounds of prospectors for years, it was discovered by an Indian trapper, who brought a chunk of solid silver into the then wild and woolly western mining town of Hope. Hope was then the mecca for hundreds of adventurers from all over the world, attracted by the gold in the rich bars of the Fraser River.

A company was formed in which were many men prominent in British Columbia in those days. Cabins were built and mining with crude methods was undertaken. Considerable ore was taken out and shipped to San Francisco to be treated. In three days the ore had to be packed from the mine to Hope on the backs of Indians.

Even with the tremendous transportation cost the mine paid until the owners got into difficulties and with the gold rush turned elsewhere, interest in that part of the country waned and the old mine was finally abandoned.

Then it became lost to memory as far as its exact location was concerned, but the "lost mine" story remained to be often told by old timers and given little credence by those who had stories of that kind before. That the mine really existed was a matter of record in the archives of the province.

About three years ago Mr. A. S. Williamson, while hunting "discovered" the old mine and workings. He interested his firm—Polony, Welch and Stewart—in the discovery and engineers were sent in and gave the property a thorough examination.

Belief is expressed by those in charge of development work that the Eureka will be a bonanza silver mine.

Monroe Candidates at Ropewalk

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING HELD.

The Monroe candidates for St. John's West, Crosbie, Linegar and Browne, visited Mundy Pond section last night, and held a most successful meeting in the Club House at the pond. The residents turned out en masse and greeted their coming with cheering and volleys of musketry.

CHAIRMAN APPOINTED.
When the meeting opened the hall was crowded to the doors with men and women, and the various addresses were punctuated with great applause. Mr. Mat Murphy was moved to the chair. He was sorry that Sir Michael Cashin was not with them again, owing to illness, and that Mr. Hunt found it impossible to again contest the district owing to business matters. However, he felt that in Crosbie, Linegar and Browne, were three representatives worthy of the best traditions of the district.

A SQUARE DEAL TO ALL.
Mr. Linegar was the first speaker. Outlining the Monroe policy of "Clean up, keep clean, and a square deal to all," the speaker said they are appealing to the country for better conditions than they have been getting for the past five years, owing to the bungling and mismanagement of the Coaker controlled administrations. If the country is to be saved then it will have to defeat the Hickmat combination. St. John's West is now in a position in which she never was before, it is without an Executive seat, in fact in the whole of St. John's there is only one Executive seat and that has been given to a man who is going to be defeated. On the other hand, Bonavista has been given two seats in the Executive which of itself is sufficient proof that the real control of the Government is in the hands of Sir William Coaker. The speaker concluded his remarks with an appeal for a straight ticket vote for Crosbie, Linegar and Browne.

THE MENACE OF COAKERISM.
Sir John Crosbie followed, expressing his pleasure at meeting the men of the Ropewalk, under the leadership of Mr. W. S. Monroe, who is so well known to his hearers. Sir John then dealt with the menace of Coakerism, the disastrous fish regulations, and the evil effects on the people of the country.

He also referred to the increased taxation and showed why it is that living in the country is so difficult. The attacks made by Dr. Mosdell and the Advocate, on the speaker were dealt with, and proved to be without foundation. The Hickman Manifesto was also referred to and Sir John finished his telling speech with an earnest appeal for a return of the Monroe Party who alone can now save the country from again having that bitter experience which it had on that memorable "Black Monday."

MONROE POLICY BEST.
Mr. W. J. Browne also received a great ovation. Mr. Browne's reputation as a speaker has now travelled from one end of the district to the other and those present, who expected something worth while, were not disappointed. The speaker dealt with the issues at stake in a very capable manner and left no doubt in the minds of his hearers that Monroe's policy is the best one for the country.

By the enthusiastic reception given the speakers it can be judged that the residents of this portion of the District are fully determined to put an end to misrule and co-optation, by a straight ticket vote for Crosbie, Linegar and Browne.

Rotary Weekly Luncheon

REV. J. B. ELLIOTT SPEAKS ON
BOY LIFE.

Rev. J. B. Elliott, Rector of St. Thomas's, spoke at the Rotary Club weekly dinner at Wood's West End Restaurant, on Tuesday. His subject "The Modern Boy as a True Citizen," was given careful thought and was expressed in a manner that afforded considerable food for reflection, and consideration. Mr. Elliott expressed thought that the training of a boy started with the origin and principles of his existence. He should be trained as to what life and the human being is; his relation to other human beings, and ample fundamentals of society—its work and duties in relation to individuals and groups. Boys needed leadership—some one to inspire them, to teach them correct lines of thought and to guide them along the channels that would develop initiative, self reliance and assertiveness. The boy is naturally care free and reckless. Rev. Elliott thought that knowledge was necessary if the boy was to develop, but it was not the knowledge of a kind associated with cramming at examination. A practical working knowledge of nature, citizenship and life, instilled in a manner which would be understood would be of very great benefit to, and much appreciated by, the boy, and if these problems were tackled seriously by Rotarians generally, he had no doubt but that future years would show good results. He was sure that the Rotary Club would lend every effort towards the general improvement and education of the boys of this city, excellent work had already been done and plans for the future give promise of bigger achievements. Mr. P. E. Outerbridge Writes

Editor Evening Telegram
Dear Sir—Might I crave space in which I know is valuable to lay the following matters before the various gentlemen who are contesting St. John's East and West, in the forthcoming election, as well as the general public. I might state that this matter is not brought forward in a spirit of criticism and while it is Election Propaganda, it is not Party Propaganda. A copy of this letter is being sent to the Editor of the five city dailies.

What is the most important need of the city of St. John's at the present moment? The answer is—Some decent attention to the city streets. Water Street is a disgrace to any civilized city; Duckworth and New Gower Streets are worse; the condition of the back streets won't bear mentioning and there is not a sidewalk in the city of St. John's that is worthy of the name. The next question is: "Whose business is it that the streets get attention?" and before I have the words on paper I can hear the answer in a chorus, "The City Council!" Correct! But the City Council cannot make bricks without straw! Under the "per Capita Grant" the city of St. John's is entitled to a grant of seventy thousand dollars a year from any Government in power towards the building, maintenance of City streets. What the city of St. John's receives is something under six thousand dollars.

I have in my possession the following statement issued under date of October 6th last, over the signature of the City Clerk, and authorized by the St. John's Municipal Council. This statement was not issued for publication but there is no reason on earth why the St. John's public should not have it:

"In reply to your communication I may say that the grants received by the City Council from the Government towards the buildings and maintenance of City streets, are as follows:—Roads East: \$2,315; Roads West: \$2,512.50; Southside Road: \$430; Blackhead Road: \$50; Total \$5,807.50. With regard to a proper allocation for the city under the per Capita Grant, I may say with the population of thirty-five thousand, the City should receive the sum of seventy thousand dollars."

To continue, I need hardly point out that if the City Council received the funds to which it is entitled "for the building and maintenance of city streets," it would be in a position to make the streets second to none in any city of its size on the North American Continent and also the amount of labor that could be supplied would provide work for many of the unemployed who are prepared to give a dollar's value in work for a dollar received and who do not know where their next meal is coming from. The loafers would not be taken on because even if I should be accused of "blowing my own trumpet," in saying it, the City Council gets at least ninety per cent. value for every dollar expended on street repairing.

Now in my honest opinion the St. John's candidates to be supported during the coming election, irrespective of party, are those gentlemen who will publicly pledge themselves to make an honest endeavor to get the City of St. John's a much larger proportion of the grant to which the city is entitled "for the building and the maintenance of City streets," than is received at present. I am willing to be reasonable and say that it may not be possible to give the whole \$70,000, but at least it should be possible to get more than \$4,000 for this important purpose. And this is the sort of object that real Governments are intended for. I may say, in conclusion, I have not written this letter on behalf of "wealthy motorists." The present condition of the streets of St. John's is a matter that affects virtually every man, woman and child that can walk, every driver of a long car, every woman that pushes a baby's carriage as well as a large number of the honest unemployed. St. John's candidates let us have a pronouncement on this matter! St. John's citizens stick up for your rights!

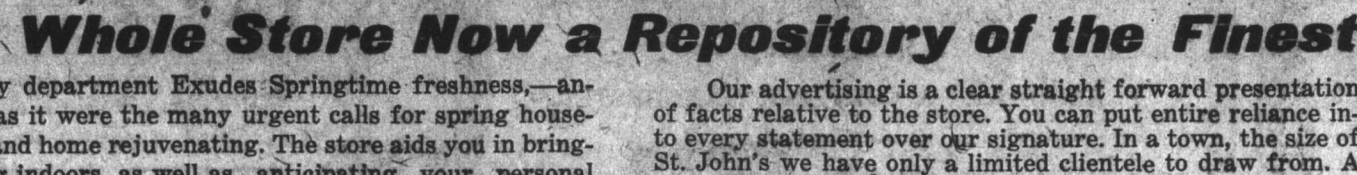

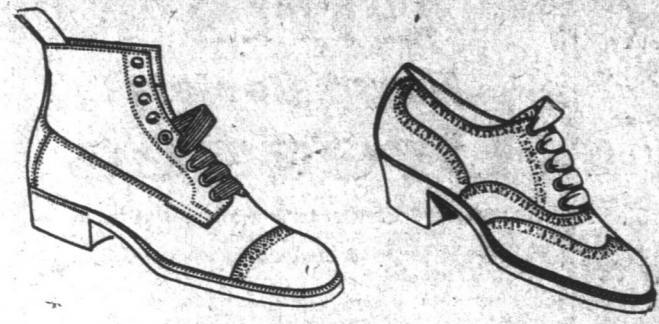

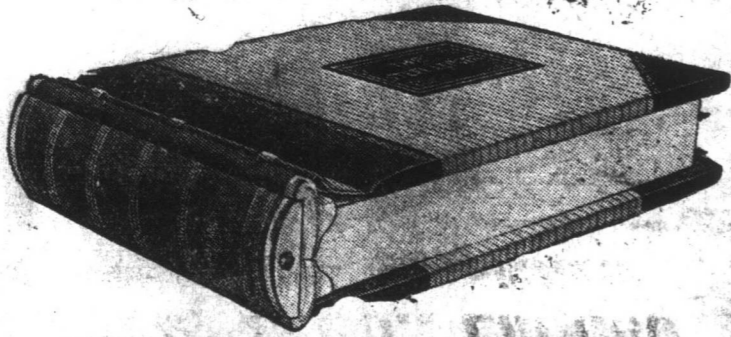
