There has just occurred the bicentenary-the two hundredth anniversary-of the author of two of the bestknown hymns in the language, "Glorious things of Thee are spoken," and "How sweet the name of Jesus sounds," He was the Vicar of Olney, lived next door to the poet, William Cowper, and collaborated with him in the production of the famous Olney Hymns.

Yet the Rev. John Newton had been a turbulent African slave-trader. He began his career as a ship's boy, and later became a naval midshipman, attempted desertion, and was flogged. Eventually he was transferred to a slave ship, did the most menial jobs for a brutal slaver, and gave himself up to every form of dissipation. Converted By A Storm.


