THE ELORA FAIR.—The last fair at Elora was well attended for the time of year. There was no first class beef offered; mitch cows were looked for, but were not to be had of the class required.

A man in Fullerton was engaged in blasting stones a few days ago, and by imprudently using the steel end of his rod in packing the charge produced an explosion by which he lost one finger and a portion of another, and one of his thumbs, besides sustaining some other injuries.

HOMEWARD BOUND.—The Elora Company reached home on Wednesday about half past twelve o'clock, and were followed in half an hour by the Mount Forest and Hollin Companies; and the whole were lunched at the expense of the corporation.

BATHING IN THE RIVER.—People living along the river from Allan's to the Erasmoss Bridge are at present greatly annoyed by boys and even men bathing in broad day light. The police authorities ought to put a stop to this at once. There are plenty of bathing places farther up the river which are secluded, and where bathing would be an annoyance to no one.

THE HAY CROP.—The Galt Reporter says:—The hay harvest has become general in this neighborhood within the past week, and a considerable portion of the crop will gather the weather continue fine, be scattered into the barns by the close of the week. The crop altogether is a good one, although clover on some farms is light; and should it now be hauled in in good condition, there will be a slim prospect for high prices for hay the coming winter.

ACCIDENTS.—The Elora Observer has a chapter of accidents which may be summarized as follows: A boy named Alex. Williamson, in the employ of Mr. Richard Amy, of Pilkington, was thrown from a load of rails in consequence of the horses running away and was very seriously injured by the rails falling upon him, but is recovering. John Houck, of Salem, had his leg broken while working in a gravel pit in consequence of a portion of the embankment giving way; and on Saturday last Mrs. Mulligan, also of Salem, slipped while coming down from the hay loft, and sprained her arm and received some contusions on the back.

THE WEATHER.—It is perhaps unnecessary to inform our readers that the weather is rather warm, in fact it is so warm that it is frying people. Cooling drinks are being swallowed in large quantities, and the distillation of perspiration is in consequence quick as regards time and large as regards quantity. We hear that some of the masons and laborers have suspended work on account of the heat which has been oppressing them, as well as everybody else, with a relentlessness seldom experienced. Eighty-eight in the shade, and dear knows how many in the sun, is not the most pleasant temperature imaginable.

MOWING MATCH.—The trial of mowers, which was announced some time ago as about to be made under the auspices of the North Oxford Agricultural Society, came off on Tuesday, near Woodstock. Fifteen machines, of which one was a single mower, competed; they represented some of the best shops in Canada. The prizes were awarded as follows: First, Mr. Watson, of Ayr; 2nd, the Buckeye and Ohio Combined Machine, made by Mr. Noxon, of Ingersoll; and 3rd, the St. George, manufactured by Mr. Bell, of St. George.

## Horticultural Show.

The annual Spring Show of the Guelph Horticultural Society was held yesterday (Friday) in the Drill Shed. Although the weather was very hot, and the Show was this year a little later than usual, there was an excellent display of plants and flowers, and a better show than ordinary of fruits and vegetables. The collection of plants in pots was very good, the principal exhibitors being Mrs. Sorby and Messrs. D. Allan, Stone, Elliott and Laight. Mr. Tansley, as usual, showed some very fine fuchsias, and Mrs. McNeil had some beautiful flowers in the same class. Only a few geraniums were shown, but they were good. The pelargoniums, petunias, calceolarias, &c., were excellent specimens. Messrs. Allan, Parkinson and McNeil showed three fine specimens of the cactus plant, in bloom. The cut flowers were excellent in regard to variety and color. Messrs. J. A. Wood and Geo. Elliott showed some fine roses, and Mrs. Sorby had a pretty Bourbon rose tree. There was a splendid display of Sweetwilliams, some of the most beautiful colors.

The only floral ornament was that shown by Mr. N. Sunley, and both in the design and finish was worthy of praise. There was a very large collection of bouquets—both table and hand—of greenhouse plants and open air flowers. Nearly all of them were very tastefully arranged, and were made up of flowers of the most beautiful color. Of bouquets of native flowers Messrs. T. Parker and Wm. Thompson showed two good specimens. Mrs. A. Hogg showed some very pretty pansies, which took the first prize.

There was a larger collection of fruits this year than we have yet seen at any spring show. There were twelve entries of strawberries for the table, 11 for preserving, and 5 of collections of strawberries. Mr. Geo. Elliott as usual swept the board, having taken the first prizes in all classes. Mr. N. Sunley followed him as second in all the classes. There were also other specimens of great size, and most inviting to the eye and taste. Mr. Elliott had a new variety for show only, which for size beats any strawberries we ever saw. They are perfect monsters, measuring as they do 5 1/2 inches round. They are known as the "Dac de Malakoff" kind. Gooseberries were well represented, there being 16 entries, large varieties, and 19 small. Those shown by Messrs. Anderson, Pallister and Wood were fine specimens. Currants were also very good. Messrs. Wm. Thompson, D. Allan and Pallister took first prizes for these. Mr. Geo. Murton had some splendid red and white cherries, and those shown by Messrs. Sunley and R. S. Brodie were also excellent. There was the largest display of apples—growth of 1867—we have yet seen. Messrs. J. Laight and J. Parkinson showed fine specimens. A real curiosity was shown by Mr. L. Cossitt, being no less than a russet apple grown in 1865. It was in an excellent state of preservation. We are glad to notice that in fruits and vegetables the competition gets keener every year, and the entries much more numerous, especially from amateurs in the country, who are now taking quite a number of prizes. In early potatoes there were nine entries. Mr. Jas. Anderson taking the first prize. Very fine samples were also shown by Messrs. Thos. Holliday, D. Allan and D. Kennedy. Other vegetables such as rhubarb, lettuce, peas, radish, onions, &c., were largely represented, most of the samples being well grown and large in size. Mr. Benham had a fine collection of pot herbs, which took the first prize.

Quite a number visited the show in the afternoon, and a much larger number were present in the evening, when the Battalion Band delighted the company with some of their favorite airs. The judges were Messrs J. Goldie, Thos. Saunders, Adam Dunn and Mr. Roy, of Berlin.

## WELLINGTON GREY AND RAILWAY.

Special Despatch to the Evening Mercury. DUNEDIN, July 3, 1868.

The meeting in Glenelg, yesterday, was not held at a certain school near the centre of the township, as advertised, but at Travers Mills, on Rocky Saugeen, Ninth Concession, where all the neighbourhood were gathered to raise the frame of a large grist-mill. Jews in New York.—This body of men are fast abandoning the practices of their fathers. Going upon Fifth Avenue is a Jewish temple, the like of which this country has never seen.
