The Accidental Poisoning Case. The inquest upon the body of the child Wm. George Bilson was held before Dr Tuck, coroner, at Ellis's Hotel on Satur-day night, when evidence to the following effect was taken:-Anne Bilson, the child's mother, said

Deceased was eleven months old; had been always healthy [until last Sunday, when he suffered from looseness in the bowels and vomiting; gave him a little

brandy with rhubarb and quinine, but it did him no good. Last night I gave him a teaspoonfull cf Mrs. Winslow's Sooth-Bombay brings intelligence of a rising among the Hindoo peasants in the dis-trict of Poonah.
