Anderson, living near Cape Rich, about ten miles from Meaford, hanged himself in his own barn on Tuesday night last. No cause can be assigned for the deed. 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SUICIDE IN TORONTO.—A good deal of excitement was caused in the vicinity of Don Street, Toronto, on Wednesday, forencon, by the discovery of the dead body of an old man named Bartholomew Short, hanging from a beam in a shed attached to the Shamrock Hotel. At an inquest held by Dr. Riddell, it was deposed that deceased had been in a desponding moof for some time past, owing to the death of his wife, and the jury returned a verdict of "Suicide while laboring under temporary insanity."

TRIAL FOR MUNDER.— The trial of the Walker brothers for the murder in Onondaga, last August, of an old man named James Cochrane, commenced on Tuesday morning at the Brant Assizes. Robert Walker was first tried, the investigation lasting till ten o'clock at night, when, after an hour's deliberation, the jury found a verdict of manslaughter. He was sentenced to fourteen years in the Penntentiary. Elijah Walker was brought up on Wednesday, and, by consent of the Crown prosecutor, acquitted of murder, but is to be tried for assault with intent.

According to that writer, when Tilton first began to make statements, he coquetted with all the New York morning papers to see which would pay him the highest price. Learning of his tricks, however, they all combined against him. He had then to turn elsewhere, and as the Graphic bid the highest for his manuscript, he sold to it. It is also stated that he made like arrangements with journals outside of New York, giving proof-sheets in advance to those journals willing to pay for them. The Boston. Herald, for instance, is said to have paid \$300 for an advance copy of Tilton's last statement. Even Mrs. Tilton's idal love letters—written in wilely confidence and with wifely tenderness—he is said to have sold out to the highest biddez, for publication; and altogether, out of his own statements and his wife's letters, he is reported to have made \$20,000 since the scandal was started. Let it be remembered that these letters, which, with all their expressions of affection and home confidences, he laid bare to the world's scrutiny, were so published that he, the husband to whom they were written, might put money in his pecket. Let it also be remembered that those statements, which he so deliberately wrote and sold to newspaper agents for so much a column, were written to prove to the world that his wife was dishonored and ne himself is cuckoid. London, Oct. 22.-Seventeen of the crew of the steamer Chusan, ashore off Androssin, were drowned. The survivers have been rescued—steamer is a total loss. Brig E. C. White has been lost off Isle of Wight and four persons drowned.

The gale in the north last night was The gate in the north last night was very destructive on the coast and in the interior. Reports of damage to shipping and other property have come to hand. Several despatches announcing loss of life have also been received.

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and destructive than was indicated by the first reports. The storm has extended to Scotland. The steamship *Chusan*, from Glasgow, for Shanghai, was driven ashore near Ardrossin, and is going to pieces Fourteen of the crew were washed over board and were drowned. The persons tett on board, some sixty in number, took to the rigging, where they yet remain in full sight of the shore. Efforts are being made to save them. Several lives were lost in England. Reports from Hartlepool, Shields Hull, and other ports, bring intelligence of great damage to shipping and other property.

Larger.—A heavy storm of wind and rain prevailed last night and to-day throughout the north of England and in Scotland. All the rivers of that section are much swollen, the railway and telegraph lines interrupted, trees uproceed in all directions, and chimneys and walls prostrated. Many persons were injured in Edinburgh by flying debris. Three houses at Stockton-on-Tees were demolished, and one person was killed at Ayr, Scotland; twenty vessels broke adrift in the harbour, which is shallow and exposed, all of which were more or less a damaged, and one totally wrecked. Three persons were drowned at Deal, and two at Sunderland. The Bessemer saloon steamer, lately launched, and lying at Hull, dragged her anchors, and run aground, but floated off, and is now adrift in the Humber. Tugs have gone to her

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It is computed that 1,000 male Mormons in Utah Territory, have 3,000 wives and 9,000 children.

The Mayor of Owen Sound has signed debentures and coupons for the bonus of \$5,000 granted to the T., G. and B. Railway for the extension of the road and building passenger and freight stations. The death is announced at Turin of Prince John Anthony Lascaria Palacolo.

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On the second day of the Montreal West election trial, Mr. Mackenzie's counsel intimated that he did not wish to press the case farther, and after the evidence of a man named in a second property of the corrupt practices had been used, though without the knowledge of Mr. Mackenzie. This Finlay swore what he could to secure Mr. Mackenwhat he could to secure Mr. Macken-zie's election, had promised him money if he would vote for that gentleman. At first he refused to go, but afterwards went and voted for him, and on the way back Russell gave him one or two dollars, and they had a glass of beer each at a saloon. This evidence was consi-dered sufficient to void the election, and Mr. Mackenzie was accordingly unseated.

In the South Huron case, Judge Galt declared the election void on the ground of bribery by agents. He found that the respondent himself (Mr. M. C. Cameron), was not guilty of corrupt practices, and decreed that he should pay the costs of the petition.

The examination of witnesses in the Niagara case closed on Wednesday night, and this (Thursday) morning Judge Hagarty gave his decision, making the election void, and that Mr. Plumb was not disqualified.

The Tory press have made a great ado about the evidence brought out at recent trials regarding the corrupt practices employe: by Reformers on behalf of their candidates. In order to change the tune, we would direct their serious attention to the no less corrupt practices indulged in by Mr. Plumb's friends during the contest in this old burgh. It conclusively confirms our already expressed opinion, that Conservatives are equally guilty with Reformers in indulging in these practices, and we do most heartily wish that the present stringent election law will put an end to all such corrupt agencies as have hitherto teen employed by the friends of candidates belonging to both parties. It was proved that Mr. Plumb contributed \$1,2.00 to his election expenses, which was disbursed in many curious ways. For instance a Mr. Best had the control of some money—he could not tell how much—and out of that he loaned two voters \$20 each, which has not been returned, and which, it was admitted, was given for the purpose of influencing their votes. Then a Mr. Lawry got \$20 in an envelope, which was handed to him by a Mr. Murphy, and strange to say he felt so little curiosity to know its contents that he did not open the envelope till a week after the election. He got rid of the cash, however, for he paid a person named Stuart a bill of \$150 for legal expenses, besides other bills. This money came from Dr. Wilson, who was charged by Mr. Plumb with the work of di-bursing the \$1,200. Again we have some curious evidence from a Mr. Thompson, who got an envelope containing \$250 in the place where he kept his curry comb. How this mysterious windfall came he did not pretend to know, but he knew well what to do with it, for the hight before the election he distributed the whole of it among Mr. Plumb's instructive friends, giving \$4 to one, \$40 to another, and so on. Each of these parties who received the money had a list of names of voters whom they were to call on and get to vote for Plumb. Of course everybody knows, or can rightly conjecture, how the money was used.


