American lard, or some of it, exported to Cuba is not the pure article, but a patent Certain brands of it have recently been excluded by the Cuban authorities, and, referring to this, a lard refiner gives the following information to a New York paper : "The grades mentioned are those of western packers, and the action of the Cuban government is a periodical one, when the markets get overstocked with the adulterated article. It is in nowise 'refined' lard, but is what is called in the trade the 'Havana mixture.' There is probably not sufficient lard in the mixture for it to be called lard, unless the combination of common hog grease and cotton-seed oil gives it a right to that title. I should judge from the title of one of the brands that Rosedale cement is used to stiffen it up, when five per cent of water or cottonseed oil is used. The mixture sells from one to two cents a pound cheaper than refined lard, and is in great demand in Cuba, because anything is thought good enough for the negroes. 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
