#### CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

Business for the week in white pine lumber has been satisfactory. Retail dealers report some buying for immediate requirements, while a feature of wholesale trade is the inquiry for stock for future delivery, an indication that the supply of lumber in the hands of retailers and consumers is light. Some of the largest manufacturers have sold a considerable portion of the coming season's cut, while practically all the British specifications of the Ottawa valley ir ills have been con tracted for. There has been a slight improvement in red pine, which suffered during the past two years from over pro duction and from severe competition from spruce and Baltic timber. Occasionally a report is heard that mill culls are slow of sale, but in view of the strength of other grades, this weakness is likely to be only te noorary and to be relieved as the spring season is approached. The expected small production of hardwood logs this winter is having an effect upon that class of lumber, and the feeling is more confident than it has been for some time The quantity of hemlock and cedar logs taken out this winter is likely to be slightly above the average.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

No. 2 spruce boards and spruce lath represent the chief lumber moving in the eastern provinces. Shingles are in good demand, but the supply is short. No further advance in prices has as yet taken place, although there are indications in that direction. The statement of stocks wintering at Quebec, recently compiled, makes a most favorable showing in nearly all classes of timber. The stock of pine deals is very small, while that of spruce deals is little more than one half that of last year. The export of square and waney pine was 2,317,443 cubic feet, leaving the stock over 350,000 feet less than one year ago. Of oak the stock is only 126,000 feet, which is less than half the wintering stock of last year. The export of birch during theyearwas heavy, and leaves the supply almost exhausted The situation in elm is different, cwing to a heavy production of that timber. There was received at the port of Quebec 1, 023,372 feet, the export was 548,869 feet, and the stock wintering is 594,922 feet. The outlook for this timber, in view of the heavy stock, is not very promising, although a very small quantity is being taken out this winter, which will permit

of the present surplus being reduced. Altogether, the outlook is favorable for firm prices next season. Lumbermen in the Maritime Provinces report numerous enquiries for stock, and anticipate a large demand from the United States.

MANITOBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

While the retail demand for lumber in the west is small at the present time, operations in the woods are being conducted on an extensive scale. Large contracts for railway ties have been given out, and more men are at work in the Lake of the Woods district than in any previous season. The interest of British Columbia lumbermen is centied in the proposal of the British Columbia Lumber and Shingle Manufacturers Association to adopt a schedule of prices to apply locally and as far east as Manitoba. Owing to the keenness of competition, cutting of prices has been in. dulged in to some extent in the past, and consequently the business has not been profitable. Manufacturers hope by working together to bring about better conditions in the trade. It will also be the aim to limit the production, especially of shingles, as the total mill capacity is much in ex\_ cess of the consumption. A rumor is current that an effort is to be made to combine all the mills on the Pacific coast doing an export trade. The report, however, is not confirmed at time of going to press.

#### UNITED STATES.

But for the car shortage the movement of jumber in the United States would be much heavier. The activity is remarkable for the season of the year, and augurs well for a brisk spring demand. Reports from the east tell of a very strong market for white pine. Our Buffalo list this week shows an advance of \$2 per thousand in all grades of uppers and selects, and of about one dollar on several items of fine common and cutting up stocks. The scarcity of the higher grades is such that dealers are not anxious to sell at present quotations. There is no weakness at any point. Saginaw buyers have secared over 150,000,000 feet of stock already at outside points, which is to be taken to the yards there during the coming season. Better things are expected for hardwoods in the near future. Stocks are becoming reduced and will be light when the new cut is ready for the market. The better feeling at Buffale has resulted in an advance in the price of thick ash

and of white birch and soft maple. A temporary falling off in the demand for shingles is reported, due to the holiday season. Prices, however, continue unchanged. Lath is moving liberally. At Cleveland No. 1 white pine brings \$4; No. 2, \$3.50; and No. 1 hemlock, \$3 to \$3.25.

#### SOCKS AND PRICES.

The log cut on the Restigouche river, in New Brunswick, this winter is estimated at 30,000,000 feet, or 5,000,000 feet short of last winter.

Mill owners at St. John, N. B., expect to get higher prices for spruce deals than they did last year, and are talking of \$13 for city cut deals, with the product of small country mills 50 cents to \$1 less.

The strength of hemlock lumber is responsible for a rumor that a further advance in price is to be made by manu-Buffalo is \$13.50. It is claimed that it buffalo is \$13.50. It is claimed that it the price should be further advanced it will shut off the building of frame houses and injure all classes of building.

F. E. Neale's circular of lumber ship-ments from Miramichi and Campbelltown for the season of 1901 shows that 13 for the season of 1901 shows that 19 vessels were loaded at Campbelliown chrying a total of 11,349,038 superficial feet, and that 29 vessels sailed from Mira-michi, with a total of 44,493,334 feet. The above shipments were made by Mr. Neale, representing Frank Harrison & Company, of Liverpool, Eng,

of Liverpool, Eng, Michigan firms operating in Ontario this winter expect to bank a full supply of logs. W. & A. McArthur Co., of Little Current, will have a stock of about 30,000,000 feet; Spanish River Lumber Co., about 20,000,000 feet; Eddy Bros. & Co., and the Michigan Land & Lumber Co., of Blind River, about 40,000,000 feet; The Moulthrop Lumber Co., John's Island, 18,000,000 feet; Holland & Emery Co., Byng Inlet, 40,000,000 feet; while Pius & Charlton, of Liule Current, and the William Peter Estate, of Parry Sound, are calculating upon a full output. Concerning the Barbadoes humber mar-

Sound, are calculating upon a full output. Concerning the Barbadoes lumber mar-ket Messrs S. P. Musson, Son & Com-pany, under date of September 21st, say: The "Lewanika" arrived on December 7th from Hantsport, N.S., with 308,000 feet white pine lumber and 38,000 feet spruce. On the 10th inst. the "Edna" arrived, with 106,000 feet white pine, 174arrived, with 105,000 feel while pine, 174,-ooo feet spruce and 75,000 feet hemitock, which had been contracted for; and on the 18th the \*\* Kipling, from Bridgewater, N.S., arrived with 85,000 feet white pine shippers and 95,000 feet refuse, which has been sold at \$23.11 and \$10.11 respect-ively; second quality, \$17.11. #### WHITE PINE CONDITIONS.

The condition of the lumber market in the Lake Superior district may be taken as the barometer of the white pine trade of the United States and Canada. In the last issue of the Mississipi Valley Lumber-man that market is reviewed as follows :

The current conditions in the white pine market, with the single exception of the badly shattered stocks, are all that could be wished by the manufacturer. There has been a falling off in the demand dur-ing the past week, caused by the advent of the holidays and the taking of the in-ventory by the dealers, but a light business at this time was desired by the manufac-turers that they might wind up the year's business and see in just what position they The current conditions in the white pine business and see in just what position they were to take care of the spring trade. Inventories are not yet complete, and so the figures showing stocks on hand fanuary t are not obtainable, but it is safe to assume that stocks in the Mississippi and WisconJanuary 8, 1903

sin valleys taken together are not less than 13 per cent, under those on January 1, 1901. This is taking stocks as a whole, including both the higher and lower grades. The percentage of shortage in the higher grades is very scarce, and, as stated muny times, the shortage will be-come more pronounced each week. Sid-

Sid-ing, finishing, boards, fencing, timbers, dimension, lath, shingles are among the most prominent on the "scarce" list. The past year has been a memorable one for the lumber industry. In the terri-tory tributary to this market building operations were never, so active, and the manufacturers have been taxed to their utmost to supply the demand. The country was never in more prosperous condition, and people have spent and are spending their money freely. The net profits to the farmers, who are large users of lumber, from their crops, are much larger than was first supposed, the ex-tremely large prices they are receiving for their products more than making up for any shrinkage in the size of the crops. All this points to a heavy demand during the present year. the present year.




