## CURRENT TRADB CONDITIONS.

 ONTARIO.Business for the week in white pine lumber has been satisfactory. Retail dealers report some buying for immed.. ate requirenents, while aleature of wholesale trane is the inquiry for stock for future delivery, an indication that the supply of lumber in the hands of retailers and consumers is light. Some of the largest manufacturers have sold a considerable portion of the coming season's cut, while practically all the British specifications of the Ottawa valley $r$ ills have been con tracted for. There has been a slight inprovement in red pine, whirh suffered during the past two years from over pto duction and from severe competstion from spruce and Baltic limber. Uccasionally a report is heard that mill culls are slow of sale, but in view of the strength of other grades, this weakness is likely to be onlyte $n$ porary 111 to be relieved as the spring season is approached. The expected small production of hardwood logs this winter is having an effect upon that class of lumber, and the feeling is more confident than it has been for some time The quantity of hemlock and cedar logs taken out this winter is likely 10 be slightly above the average.

QUEBEC AND NELV BRUNSIVICK.
No. 2 spruce boards and spruce lath represent the chief lumber moving in the eastern provinces. Shingles are in good demand, but the supply is short. No further advance in prices has as yet taken place, although there are indications in that direction. The statement of stocks wintering at Quebec, recently compiled, makes a most favorable showing in nearly all classes of limber. The stock of pine deals is very small, while that of spruce deals is littic more than one half that of last year. The export of square and wancy pine was $2,317,443$ cubic feet, leaving the stock over 350,000 teet less than one year ago. Of oak the stock is only 126,000 feet, which is less than half the wintering stock of las: year. The export of birch dur'ug theyearwas heavy, and leaves the supply almost exhausted The situalion in clm is difierent, cwing to a heavy production of that timber. There was received at the pori of Quebec 1, 023,372 feet, the expor! was $548, S 6 y$ feet, and the stock wintering is $59+, 922$ fcet. The outlook for this timber, in view of the heavy stock, is not very promising, although a very small quantity is being taken out this winter, which will permit
of the presert surplus being reduced. Altogether, the oullook is favorable for firm prices next season. Lumbermen in the Maritume Provinces report nunnerous enyuiries for stork, and anticipate a large demand from the United States.
manitoba and british columbia.
While the retal demand for lumber in the west is small at the present time, operations in the woods are being conducted on an extensive scale. Laige contracts for railway ties have been given out, and more men are at work in the Lake of the Wouds district than in any previous season. The interest of 'iritish Columbia lumbermen is cenised in the proposal of the British Columbia Lumber and Shingle Manufacturers Assuciation to adopl a schedule of prices to apply locally and as far east as Mantoba. Owing to the keenness of competition, culting of prices has been in. dulged in to some extent in the past, and consequently the business has not been profitable. Manufacturers hope by working tonether to bring about better conditions in the trade. It will also be the aim to limit the production, especially of shingles, as the total mill capacity is much in ex. cess of the consumption. A rumor is cuisert that an effort is to be made to combine all the mills on the Pacific coass domp an export trade. The report, bowever, is not confirmed at tume of going to press.

But for the car shortage the movement of inativen on the linated States would be much heavier. The activity is remark. able for the season of the year, and augurs well for a brisk spring demand. Reports from the east tell of a very sirong maiket for white pine. Our Buffalo list this week shows an advance of $\$ 2$ per thous. and in all grades of uppers and selects, and of about one dollas on several items of fine commion and cutting up stocks. The scarcity of the higher grades is such that dealers are not anxious to sell at present quotations. There is no weakness at any point. Sajinaw buyers have secared over $150,0 n 0,000$ feet of stock already at outside points, which is to be taken to the yards there during the coming season. Better things are expected for hardwoods in the near future. Stocks are becoming reduced and will be light when the new cut is ready for the market. The better feehing at Buffalc has resulted n an advance in the price of thick ash
and of white birch and sof maple. A temporary falling off in the demand for shingles is reported, due to the holday season. Prices, however, continue un changed. Lath is moving liberally. At Cleveland No. : whire pine brings $5_{4}$ No. 2, \$3.50; and No. 1 hemlock, \$3 to \$3.25.

The past year has been a memombic one for the lumber industry. In thd terriory tributary to this market. building operations were nover so, active, ald the manifacturers have been taxed to their utmost to supply the demand. The country was never in more prosperous condition, and people have apent and are spending their money freely. The net profits to the farmers, who are large users of lumber, from their crops, are much larger than was frist supposed, llye extremely large prices they are recciving for their products more than making itp for any strinkage in the size of the crops. All this points to a licayy demand during the present year.
