THE WORK OF THE PAST YEAR.

The annual meetings of the Homeopathic Hospital, Association, and Woman's Auxiliary which were held during the opening weeks of the month of December, put the friends of homeopathy in possession of the records of one more year's work in the good cause.

First came the Association's meeting on Monday December 7th, at which were submitted reports covering all the branches of the work now being carried on under its auspices. From these it was gleaned that the Homeopathic College had during the year granted to Dr. Mary Fyfe, a graduate of Bishop's College, a certificate to practice homeopathy in the Province, she having passed the requisite examination. The report also stated that it was the purpose of the College to establish at an early date a course of popular lectures on the sub-lect of homeopathy.

Under the head of dispensary work it was reported that the dispensary which had been opened on St. Antoine Street, in the summer of 1895, had been transferred to the Hospital on the completion and opening of the new wing in April last and that its work is row being continued as the out-door department of the Hospital.

Doctors John Wanless, H. M. Patton and A. R. Grifflth were appointed as the Board of Examiners of the College for the granting of diplomas for the ensuing year.

The following officers were elected: President, Charles Alexander; Vice-President, F. E. Grafton; Secretary, H. M. Patton, M. D.; Treasurer, E. G. O'Connor; Board of Directors, James Baylis, J. A. Mathewson, Dr. John Wanless, Samuel Bell, Major Evans, W. H. Stanley, C. S. DeWitt, C. G. Jones, T. J. Dawson James A. Ogilvy, J. T. Hagar, Doctors W. G. Nichol, A. R. Griffith, T. S. Nichol, H. M. Patton, W. McHarrie, and A. D. Patton, Mr. J. S. Buchan, was elected Honorary Solicitor and Mr. A. H. Plimsoll Honorary Auditor for ensuing year.

The following members of the Association were elected Governors to the Hospital for the period of two years from date: Mesdames A. O. Granger, J. T. Hagar, H. Thomas, Stewart Munn, R. C. Fisher, E. Von Rappard, and S. C. Matthews, and Messrs, C. H. Binks, A. D. Durnford and Λ. R. Grafton.

HOSPITAL WORK.

The Hospital with its kindred work of out-door department and training school for nurses now forms by far the most important work being carried on under the Association's charter.

During the past year an extension has been added to the former building which has about doubled the capacity of the Hospital. With the additional room, admirable equipment of the operating room and out-door department thus provided, the Hospital has been made one of the most complete of its kind. gical work of the best and with the most satisfactory results is constantly being The total number of patients treated for the year was 163, a lult males 57; adult females, 79; children, 27; public, 118; semi-public, 20; private, 25; Protestants, 145; Catholics, 18. Surgical operations, 54. The total deaths were 7, being a death rate of 4 per cent., or, omitting cases which were hopeless upon entering, of but 1 and 1-5 per cent. During the year the training school for nurses, which is known as the "Phillips' Training School, graduated two nurses. Miss Egan and Miss Adams, both of whom have had constant employment since their graduation.

In the Outdoor Department, the total prescriptions were 953, of which 25 were surgical and 928 medical. The patients treated were; Men. 71; Women, 157; Children, 96; total, 324. Fifteen cases requiring other treatment than the dispensary could give were sent to the hospital wards. The eye and ear department, under the charge of Dr. E. M. Morgan, is a new and exceedingly well equipped feature of the outdoor work. Dr. Morgan comes from Philadelphia with excellent recommendations.

The report of the Woman's Auxiliary in a ldition to other interesting matter told of the efforts of the ladies in raising funds for carrying on the work of the Hospital. In December of last year they held a bazaar in the Armoury from which was netted six hundred dollars. In April, on the occasion of the opening of the new wing a tea and sale of fancy articles was held in the hospital, at which for the first time in Montreal there was held a doll show This was in charge of Miss Van Horne and Miss Baylis. The display was a notable one and created wide spread interest the financial result was \$186.66. During the year the Auxiliary encountered the necessity of appointing a new Lady Superintendent and were so fortunate as to secure the services of Miss Davis who had won high praise at the General Hospital and who is doing exceedingly satisfactory work.

In the early autumn the committee of management caused a circular to be addressed to the various Protestant churches of the city, urging the claims of our

hospital to a share of the special Thanksgiving collections. Favorable responses were received from several of the churches. St. Martins sent fruit and vegetables which had been used at its Harvest Festival and two other churches sent money collections.

The following officers were elected: President, Samuel Bell; Vice-Presidents, James Baylis, Major R. J. Evans; Secretary, Joseph Gould; Treasurer, E. G. O'Connor; Committee of Management, Lady Van Horne, and Mesdames Hector Mackenzie, G. D. Phillips, Charles Morton, Sutherland Faylor, A. O. Granger, Thomas Nichol, R. J. Evans, H. Thomas, and Miss Annie Moodie.

The following were elected the Medical Board for the ensuing year: Physicians, indoor John Wanless, A. R. Griffith, William McHarrie, E. A. Grafton, and E. M. Morgan; surgeon, H. M. Patton; out-door physicians, T. Scott Nichol, A. D. Patton, Laura Muller; eye and ear department, E. M. Morgan; superiffendent, Dr. II. M. Patton. Mr. J. B. Buchan was elected honorary solicitor and Mr. E. Radford honorary auditor.

To provide for the above shortage the Committee of Management have been obliged to make a temporary loan and as the amount bears a comparatively high rate of interest it is very desirable that it be paid off at the earliest possible date.

The Woman's Auxiliary which admirable organization of ladies has charge of the maintenance and management of the domestic affairs of the hospital as well as of the "Phillips" school for the training of nurses has also incurred a debt of some \$800 00. The experience of the Auxiliary shows that the summer months of the year, are those in which revenue falls off materially, while the diminuition of expenses during the same period is comparatively inconsiderable. Contributions toward the extinction of this debt or for the maintenance of the hospital which latter may either be in money or supplies will be exceedingly acceptable.

The raising of so considerable a sum as has been expended upon the building and equipment of the wing during the past year, has proved a heavy charge

upon the resources of the friends of homoopathy in the city. When the debt which has been incurred has been paid off however, the carrying on of the Hospital from year to year will be a comparatively easy matter. Under these circumstances the Governors of the Hospital appeal with confidence to the henevolent people of Montreal to assist this institution which though a new one may, as regards the work it is doing, be justifiably ranked with the best of the charitable organizations for which our city is so justly famed.

SICK ROOM COOKERY.

OYSTER POUFFLÉ.

1 oz, butter, 1½ oz, flour, 1 gill milk or cream, pepper, salt, 1 doz. oysters, blanched and bearded, 2 yolks and 3 whites of eggs. Melt the butter, add yolks one at a time, and oysters, whip whites swiftly then add them and other ingredients and steam in a buttered tin, 50 or 60 minutes or use several smaller tins then steam 20 minutes. Serve with cream sauce thickened with flour.

SCRAMBLED EGGS.

1 tablespoonful of cream, (stock, tomatoes or beef tea may be used instead) 1 egg, pepper, salt, 1 piece of buttered toast. Make the cream hot in a stew pan, add the egg, pepper and salt, stir till quite curdled then lay neatly on the toast, serve very hot.
