CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10, via Rome.—The Belgian minister today received orders to request his passport. Belgium is the fifth of the allied powers to order its envoy to leave Constantinople. The representatives of England, Russia, France and Serbia already have left the Turkish capital.

NEW SUCCESSES ARE DEVELOPED IN THREE ZONES

Battle Rages Very Violently at the North, Where Allies Have Continued Their Steady Advance by Hand-to-Hand Fighting.

RUSSIAN TROOPS MARCH RAPIDLY TO CAPTURE POSEN AND THORN

Fears Are Expressed That Greece Will Become Involved and Bombard Unfortified Ottoman Towns.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—France's campaign against the Germans has developed new success today in the three principal zones of conflict near Ypres, Belgium, north of Soissons, France, and in Alsace.

OFFICIAL STATEMENTS.

ISSUED IN PARIS LAST NIGHT: "At the north the battle continues very violent."

ISSUED IN PARIS YESTERDAY AFTERNOON: "The action continued all day yesterday with the same intensity that has characterized the previous fighting between the sea and the region of Arras."

"The action continued all day yesterday with the same intensity that has characterized the previous fighting between the sea and the region of Arras. The encounters were of peculiar violence, for the reason that the opposing forces are alternately taking the offensive. Summing up, it may be said that the day was marked by the checking of a German attack in considerable force to the south of Ypres, and by perceptible progress on the part of the French forces in the vicinity of Bieschoote and between Ypres and Arras."

"Equally on the front of the British troops all the German attacks were repulsed with energy. Along the major part of the front from the Canal de La Bassée, as far as the Woivre, our troops made secure the results attained in the course of the past few days. There should be results also our progress in the region of Loivre, between Rhims and Berry-Au-Bac. In Lorraine there is nothing to report. In the Vosges fresh attacks on the part of the enemy directed against the heights to the south of Mount Sainte Marie and to the southeast of Thann all have been repulsed."

ISSUED BY THE GERMAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS: "Our attacks near Ypres (Belgium) yesterday are progressing slowly. More than 500 French, colored and English prisoners have been taken, and several machine guns captured."

"Further south our troops also are advancing, the strong counter-attacks of the British forces having been repulsed. In the Argonne the fighting is progressing favorably, hostile attacks being easily repulsed."

"In Russian Poland, near Konin (38 miles northeast of Kalisz), our cavalry dispersed a Russian battalion, taking about 500 prisoners and eight machine guns."

ISSUED AT VIENNA LAST NIGHT: "Our operations in the southern war theatre are progressing favorably. While our advance on the line from Sabats to Lomnitsa was ultimately resisted at a strongly fortified point at the foot of a hill, a three days' battle on the line from Lomnitsa to Kroupani ended in success. The forces of the Serbians consisted altogether of six divisions. Their troops, after a heroic defence, are now retreating toward Valjevo."

"Our troops arrived yesterday at Lomnitsa, east of the Heights of Sokolaka and Planina, southeast of Kroupani. Numerous prisoners and war materials were captured."

"By seizing the fortified heights north of the River Aise and occupying Soupir, Chavonne and Vailly, the French have given the allied armies the key to the entire territory of the Aise and now the retreat of the Germans from the angle between the Aise and the Oise Rivers is threatened."

"Paris claims that the allies have maintained their positions between the Lys and Langemarch, at the same time making appreciable progress between the latter place and Dixmude. Berlin claims to have inflicted a defeat on the Russians in East Prussia and reports the capture of 4000 men and considerable munitions of war."

BOTH CLAIM SUCCESSES. Petrograd reports sharp fighting in the Caucasus, while from both Vienna and Nish have come despatches setting forth the resumption of activities along the River Danube and the River Drina. Both sides claim successes here, but neither indicates any decisive result.

In the western area Belgian patrols are reported to have penetrated into the region of Ostend. This, if correct, would indicate that the Germans have abandoned all attempts to proceed along the coast and today are concentrating their attacks on Ypres, which is said to have been so devastated by artillery fire that the city has been deserted by its civilian population.

The German fort of Tsingtau, which surrendered three days ago, is now formally in the hands of the Japanese and British conquerors.

Critics in Berlin say that the capture of a new position in the Argonne region is of great importance in the attempt to isolate Verdun.

MUCH TO BE DONE YET. Much more work remains to be accomplished by the Germans before the strong French battle line can be said to have been broken at any point. The German report expresses satisfaction with the progress being made around Ypres.

Fears that Greece may become involved in the war are expressed in Washington and official messages tell of apprehension on the part of Turkish officials that Greece may bombard unfortified towns on the Ottoman coast.

In the latest news bulletins from the eastern theatre of war is conveyed the news that Russian troops today are marching rapidly toward Posen, German Poland, and Thorn, East Prussia. Everywhere along the line of battle the Germans and Austrians are reported to be in precipitate retreat. Austrian forces which attempted to de-

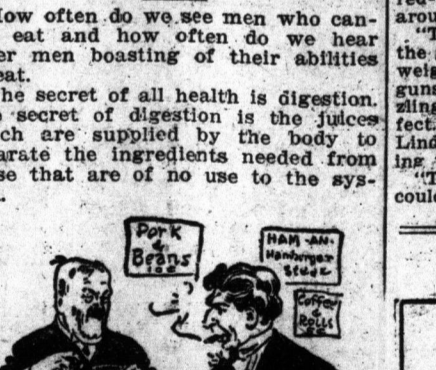

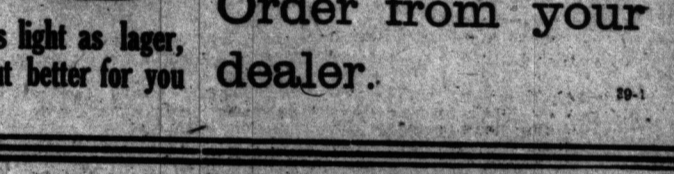
