When Told Thru Taxl Window His Firm Was Interested in Telephone Deal, He Just Sald "Go Ahead."

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.-In a determined effort to prevent the attorneys for the Ohio and Indiana Independent Telephone Companies from calling J. P. Morgan to the witness stand in the hearing before a notary here, his counsel to-day revealed just what the fa-mous financier had to do with the \$7,-000,000 deal.

"H. P. Davison, a partner in the Morgan firm, was the only one who knew of the transaction," said one of Mr. Morgan's lawyers. "After he made all arrangements, he sought Mr. Morgan to tell him about it, and obtain his formal consent. Mr. Morgan had just left his office, but Mr. Davison caught his taxicab at the curb and thru the window of it told Mr. Morgan the principal details and that the Morgan firm was to pay R. L. Day & Co. \$7,-245,000 for the Ohio and Indiana Companies.

One Survivor From French Ship That is Lost in Wild Mediterranean Storm, and He Can't Tell the Story.

PALMA, Island of Majorca, Feb. 11. -Swept helplessly from her course in one of the wildest storms that have swept the Mediterranean Sea in 40 years, the French Trans-Atlantic Steamship Company's steamer "Gen-eral Chanzy," crashed at full speed. in the dead of night, on the treacher-ous reefs near the Island of Minorca, and all but one of the 157 and all but one of the 157

in the dead of night, on the treacher ous reefs near the Island of Minorca, and all but one of the 157 souls on board perished.

The sole survivor is an Algerian customs officer, Marcel Rodel, who was rescued by a fisherman, and who lies to-night in the hospital at Ciudadela, raving as a result of the tortures thru which he passed, and unable to give an account of the disaster.

Of the ship's company there were 87 passengers, of whom 30 were in the first cabin. The orgw numbered 76.

The ship was in command of Captain Cayol, one of the most careful officers of the line. He never before had met with an accident. He soon was to have retired from the service.

'The pasengers of the Chanzy were mostly French officers and officials remostly French officers and officials remostly and the service. mostly French officers and officials re-turning to their posts in Algeria, ac-companied by their wives and children:

a few soldiers, some Italians and Turks, and one priest.

The only Anglo-Saxon names on the passenger list were Green and Stakely. They were fembers of an opera troupe of eleven, which had been engaged to

sing at the Casino in Algiers.
The "Chanzy" sailed from Marseilles. Wednesday at noon, and was due to arrive at Algiers Thursday afternoon.
The steamer was of 2257 gross tonnage, and her engines had a horse-power of 478.

The Chanzy is a total wreck. Steamers have been despatched from Spain and from points in the Balcaric Islands to the scene of the catastrophe.

A Tuberculosis Experiment.

"A very interesting experiment was started by a friend of mine, Dr. Pratt of Boston—the tuberculosis class in connection with a church," says Dr. William Osler in Woman's Home Companion for February. "It is a nice sort of practical religion for any church to indertake. Dr. Pratt's first class consisted of 15 or 20 persons, chnefly young clerks, sall in the early stage of the lisease, and all still at work. He met them once a week in a room off the school room of the church, and there they discussed their cases with him. were weighed every week, They were weighed every week, a careful analysis was made of their symptoms—how much they had gained. or how much they had lost. 



Tells Rosedale Business Men What Will Happen Without Intelligent Conservation.



FIGHT TRANSMISSION LINE

And Conservation Commission Will Enquire Into It.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.-The bill to incorporate the St. Lawrence Power Transmission Co., which the promoter said was independent of the Long Sault scheme, but "would procure power from that source if it were developed," caused a fight in the private bills committee to-day.

The company proposes to build a line from Cornwall east to Montreal and west to Brockville. Authority is sought west to Brockville. Authority is sought to acquire and develop powers, enter upon private property between Brockville and Montreal and in the City of Montreal, export power to the United States, construct transmission lines, issue securities.

Mr. Broder of Dundas objected to the bill as over-riding private and municipal rights.

R. A. Pringle, K.C., argued that only a transmission line was proposed. It had nothing to do with the Long Sault scheme.

"But are not all the incorporators the same?" asked Mr. Broder.

"Some of them are," admitted Mr. Pringle. The company had developed some power, and there were others along the line which could not be utilized save by a transmission line. He added that the hydro-electric commission had declined to build lines in the district because of expense.

The farm was cleared, except for a few acres of bush at the back, adjoining which was about nine acres of permanent pasture land, which was very rough, and contained logs, stumps and herry bushes. The buildings were a good brick house, heated by furnace, a bank barn, and a silo, all in good repair.

I soon found that my land was well adapted to growing strawberries, and as there is here an unlimited market. adapted to growing strawberries, and as there is here an unlimited market, at good prices, I like to have an acre, which yields from \$300 to \$400 per season. I set out a half acre each year, and thus take two crops off before plowing down. The old patch generally comes in a few days acrilian and plowing down. The old patch generally comes in a few days earlier, and thus lengthens the season. In 1905 I sold 1400 boxes off one-sixth of an acre at an average of 7 1-2 cents per box. Last year we averaged 9 cents per box. The strawberry crop requires a little change in the rotation, as I like to have them follow potatoes, and, as they are two years in the ground, they will be in corner of oat field. I run a temporary fence around them if I wish to pasture field. Keeps a Few Cows.

This farm had been occupied by a dairyman, who kept a large stock, and the silo was 14 feet in diameter. This is too large for my stock, so I do not use silage, but store straw in silo. As to stock kept now, the locality decided that dairying on a small scale would pay well, so I keep six mileh cows. The bulk of the milk I dispose of to The bulk of the milk I dispose of to a dairyman, who retails it in town. The price received at door is 5 cents per quart in winter, and 4 cents in summer. I have five of the cows freshen about Oct. 1, and the other one in the spring, as the demand for milk and the price, also, is better in winter, and the heavy milking occurs when there is a period of leisure. I do it all myself. I find that cows milk well thru winter and continue till following August, or ten to eleven months. lowing August, or ten to eleven months. One coming in spring insures us always having milk. I sell or veal the fall calves, as five-cent milk is too expensive for calf-feed. We make butter from any milk that the dairyman does not take, as in June, when he has a large flow from his cwn cows. In order to dispose of any surplus skim milk.
