





DRUMMOND COUNTY RAILWAY,

Deal for All He is Worth - Sir Lonald Returns to Eugland.

Montreal, April 30.—(Sprelal.)—Your correspondent saw a French Liberal member of the House of Commons to-day who will oppose the Drummond County railway deal for all he is worth, and if he and other Liberal friends are beaten in the Commons, they will carry the war against this transaction to the Schate and ask Conservative aid in the Upper Chamber to prevent the purchase in question. This gentleman states that the men who are selling the Drummond County road, or leasing it for 39 years to the Government, which amounts to the same thing as a sale of 73 miles at \$12,500 per mile, were willing to part with the railway a year ago more or less af \$5000 per mile, in a word, they signed an option, and this French Liberal member saw the option with his own eyes, by which the Drummond County Railway people agreed to accept \$365,000 for the road between Ste. Rosalie and Forestdale; yet about six weeks after the Government casse into power an order-in-council was proposed, authorizing a transaction that will give the fortunate proprietors of the Drummond County no less a sum than \$612,500, or a clear advance of over \$500,000 over the price stipulated in the option referred to above. The member also declares that \$4000 a mile is a good price for the railway in question.

The story sent from Otiawa to the Government papers to the effect that Sir Alex Lacoste, Administrator of the Government of Quebec, had refused to sign the order-incouncit guaranteeing the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway bonds, is a consummate falsehood, the Administrator having signed the same on Tuesday last.



TORONTO, APRIL 28th, 1897.

As the voters of Toronto will be called upon shortly to decide whether a Sunday Car Service shall be permitted or not, the undersigned desire, with all respect for the opinions of others who regard the question differently, to bring to the notice of their fellow-citizens some of the reasons which induce them to favor the proposed Sunday Service.

They believe: 1. That the changed conditions of modern life, which have increased the population of cities and spread them over large areas, make easy and cheap transportation for the people of large towns on Sundays, as well as week days, an important social and moral consideration.

2. That it will tend to place the poor in the crowded parts of the city on something like an equality with those who can afford carriages or bicycles in maintaining intercourse with their friends, or in getting access with their children to the open air and public spaces on the only day on which many families, and 3. That while the convenience to the public, and particularly to the poor, will be infinitely improved, less labor will be required proportionately for communication throughout the city by a Sunday Car Service THE BANK OF TORONTO. especially those of working men, can enjoy them together.



Bread in Waxed Paper.

So much has been written within the past few years regarding the communication of disease through bacilli microbes found in dust, etc., that practical methods are being introduced to counternet their extension or growth. One of the latest ideas is the protection of such an important article of food as bread. In our cities a large proportion of the bread consumed is supplied by bakerles. Bread from such places must, of necessity, be handled second at times by different composes, and it sometimes happens that bac'll germs become attached to the bread during the handline, either from contamination from the hands or perhans from the clothes of the paper sustended from such possible contingencies, the custom is being introduced in many places among bakerles of wayed apper, sealing the knot of the string bolding the paper surrounding the loaf. The bread is not only in this way well guarded from bacilli germs, but is also kept moist and fresh, as the waxed paper revents evanoration of moisture, wille the consumer is certain to receive an article that can be depended upon as heelthful and good without regard to the number of handlings it has undergone.

The idea of wrapping bread, cake, confectionery, tobacco, soap, ment, etc., in waxed paper to preserve their freshness is orite old, but the use of the paper as a guard against the communication of disease germ is comparatively new, yet it is sopractical that it is surprising it has never been thought of or advocated before.






