YOUNG MEN, DON'T BEA POLITROTS.
 The Mail and Empire in its issue yesterday warned the young men of Toronto against registering for the Sunday car vote, holding out as a threat against them that they will be liable to a dollar poll tax in the event of their names being found on the registered list. The Mail and Empire even goes so far as to threaten the young men that a committee of citizens will make it their business to see that every one who registers to vote on the Sunday car by-law is subjected to the poll tax. It is evident that the City Treasurer is delaying his annual announcement with the expectation of being able to include several thousand dollars that it is expected will be raised through the poll tax. The Evening News has adopted similar tactics to lighten the unpopularity of the Sunday car registration for the Sunday car vote.

INTERCHANGEABLE CITIZENSHIP.
 In the Contemporary Review Prof. Dicey proposes a plan of common citizenship for Englishmen and Americans. By concurrent legislation of the Imperial Parliament and United States Congress every citizen of the United States during the continuance of peace between the two countries would be a British subject and every British subject would be a citizen of the United States. Upon the occurrence of war between the two nations such legislation would cease to have effect. The net result of the arrangement, according to Prof. Dicey, "would be that every American citizen on landing at Liverpool would possess the same civil and political rights as would, say, an inhabitant of Victoria who landed at the same moment from the same boat; and that an Englishman who landed at New York would possess the same civil and political rights as would necessarily belong to an American citizen who, having been born abroad, had for the first time entered the United States." The American citizen thus transformed into a British subject could vote for a member of Parliament, be himself elected a member, and be eligible to the post of Prime Minister. In like manner the British subject coming to America and settling in the United States would possess there all the civil and political rights which would necessarily belong to an American citizen who, having been born abroad, had for the first time entered the United States.

INDEPENDENCE OF THE FIRE BRIGADE.
 The fire brigade is degenerating, or rather it has degenerated, in the last fifteen minutes elapsed before water was turned on at the Front-street fire on Thursday, and it was twenty minutes before the water-tower began to throw a stream of the burning building. Complaint at the inefficiency of the brigade was universal among the insurance men and onlookers. Of what avail is it to have the horses hitched to the fire wagons in so many seconds when the interval between the sounding of the alarm and the turning on of the water is reckoned by quarter hours? The inefficiency of the brigade apparently has its origin in the superior officers. The men are capable enough, or, at least under proper discipline, they would be so, but through indifference and incapable management the brigade has deteriorated. At a time that occurred a short time ago near Cawthra-avenue the whereabouts of the nearest hydrant was not known to the firemen, and much valuable time was lost in seeking information that should have been at the fingers' ends of some member or other of the brigade. It seems to us that a properly disciplined corps of firemen should have had a stream of water playing on the Eckardt building five minutes after the alarm. Ten minutes is a fearful waste of time at the inception of a fire. Every minute saved in beginning the attack upon a burning building is worth thousands of dollars.

THE BICYCLE ROBBER.
 The wheelman has no right to disturb pedestrians on the sidewalk. That is conceded. But let the pedestrian, on the other hand, remember that he has no right to interfere with whomsoever in the roadway. In crossing the street, except at the regular crossings, the onus is on the pedestrian to keep clear of bicycles and vehicles. In this age of flying wheels pedestrians should religiously stick to the sidewalks, or, if they do have occasion to leave them, they should never do so until they have taken a survey of the roadway both up and down. Let every pedestrian get this idea firmly set in his head, that it is dangerous to leave the sidewalk. The observance of this rule will prevent many a serious accident.

Who Committed Suicide in Greenwood Cemetery the Other Day.
 New York, April 30.—The woman who committed suicide Wednesday in Greenwood Cemetery, Brooklyn, according to Dr. W. D. Sewell of Brooklyn, was Mrs. Basil Hall of White Plains, N. Y. Many society people will remember Mrs. Hall well. She was Miss Virginia Pettigrew of this city, and married in her day when she married Basil Hall, a young Englishman, then in the brokerage business in Wall-street. That was in 1874. A year or so later Mr. Hall, who turned out to be a nephew of Sir Basil Francis Hall of Dunelm, came into a good deal of money, and he and his wife went to England, and he died there about four years after his father's death. The widow returned to America with her two children. Her daughter, who is now stopped at the Murray Hill Hotel. Her diaries, receipts and other entertaining items were frequently shown to her. She was in society and was spoken of as one of the best dressed women in New York. She was a woman of great refinement and consumption two years ago. Mrs. Hall sought forgiveness from grief in the death of her husband, and she followed to have been the cause of her suicide.

CITIZENS' SUNDAY CAR ASSOCIATION MANIFESTO.

As the voters of Toronto will be called upon shortly to decide whether a Sunday Car Service shall be permitted or not, the undersigned desire, with all respect for the opinions of others who regard the question differently, to bring to the notice of their fellow-citizens some of the reasons which induce them to favor the proposed Sunday Service.

1. That the changed conditions of modern life, which have increased the population of cities and spread them over large areas, make easy and cheap transportation for the people of large towns on Sundays, as well as week days, an important social and moral consideration.

2. That it will tend to place the poor in the crowded parts of the city on something like an equality with those who can afford carriages or bicycles in maintaining intercourse with their friends, or in getting access with their children to the open air and public places on the only day on which many families, and especially those of working men, can enjoy them together.

3. That while the convenience to the public, and particularly to the poor, will be infinitely improved, less labor will be required proportionately for communication throughout the city by a Sunday Car Service than is at present entailed on coachmen, cabmen and others.

4. That as the employees of the Street Railway Company are prevented by special bylaw from working more than six days in the week, and as the enforcement of this bylaw is under heavy penalties in the hands of the Civic Authorities, it is evident that, in this respect, working men are thoroughly protected.

5. That a Sunday Car Service will add to the influence and usefulness of Churches and Sunday Schools by enabling people to attend places of worship for which they have a personal preference, or with which circumstances have given them a strong personal association.

6. That, in the opportunities which it gives for Church attendance, for social and family intercourse, and for healthy and natural recreation, a Sunday Car Service will tend to strengthen rather than weaken the moral tone of the community.

7. That, as in a total vote of 27,311 polled in 1893, over 13,000 residents of Toronto voted for a Sunday Car Service, and 11,000 have again lately petitioned for it, it seems arbitrary on the part of those opposed to such a service to impose, by so small a majority, a restriction on the freedom of others, as to how they will travel from one part of the city to another, especially as all opponents of Sunday Cars are left free to use their own or that they think fit.
