### IRISH PRIEST WILL BE TRIED TODAY

### DECLARE CADET INSANE

Dublin, Jan. 7.—Intense interest is being evinced in the trial here tomorrow by field court-martial of Father Dominic, chaplain of the republican guard and spiritual adviser to the late Terence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, who died in Brixton Prison, London, while on a hunger strike some time ago. It is stated that it is so urgent that it is impossible to convene a general court-martial. The accused man will maintain that the charges are being put on this prisoner for preparation of his defence also has been curtailed.

**Murderer But Insane.**

London, Ont. Jan. 7.—"We have now reached the deflation and readjustment period," said L. Harris, strictly business, in an address before the Brantford Club members at their annual meeting tonight. "I hope that one of the things the nation will do is to keep its hands off business and enact legislation that will give protection to all classes of society and its development. The reason for the inflation which had now spent itself," he added, "was the excess profits taxes, and he hoped that this new budget and the finance minister would remove this handicap to Canadian trade."

### DAUGHTERS OF CANADA TO ADVANCE PATRIOTISM

Let the government do this; the people assuredly will do the rest."

### MEIGHEN PRESIDES AT CABINET MEETING

Lunacharsky and M. Rasokolnikov.

Differences have arisen at the all-Russian congress of Soviets thru Premier Lenine advocating autonomy for trade unions and M. Trotsky wanting continued government control of unions.

On the other hand, there is a growing feeling of optimism to be noticed among manufacturers and wholesalers, who are making plans for "business as usual."

### BUY GOODS, NOT FURS

While it is true that bargain sales are much in evidence in all cities, there is not the wild scramble for furs in order to turn stocks into cash at any cost, and business is undoubtedly becoming stabilized at the present level of values. The buying by the public is due to the recognition that deflation in many lines is unusually heavy, with every prospect of still further reaction taking place before spring trade opens.

Many wholesalers report travelers already out on the road, while others are preparing to do so. Retailers are beginning to look around for new stocks. There is little more confidence by the general public in all that is needed to place business conditions in Canada on a much higher plane.

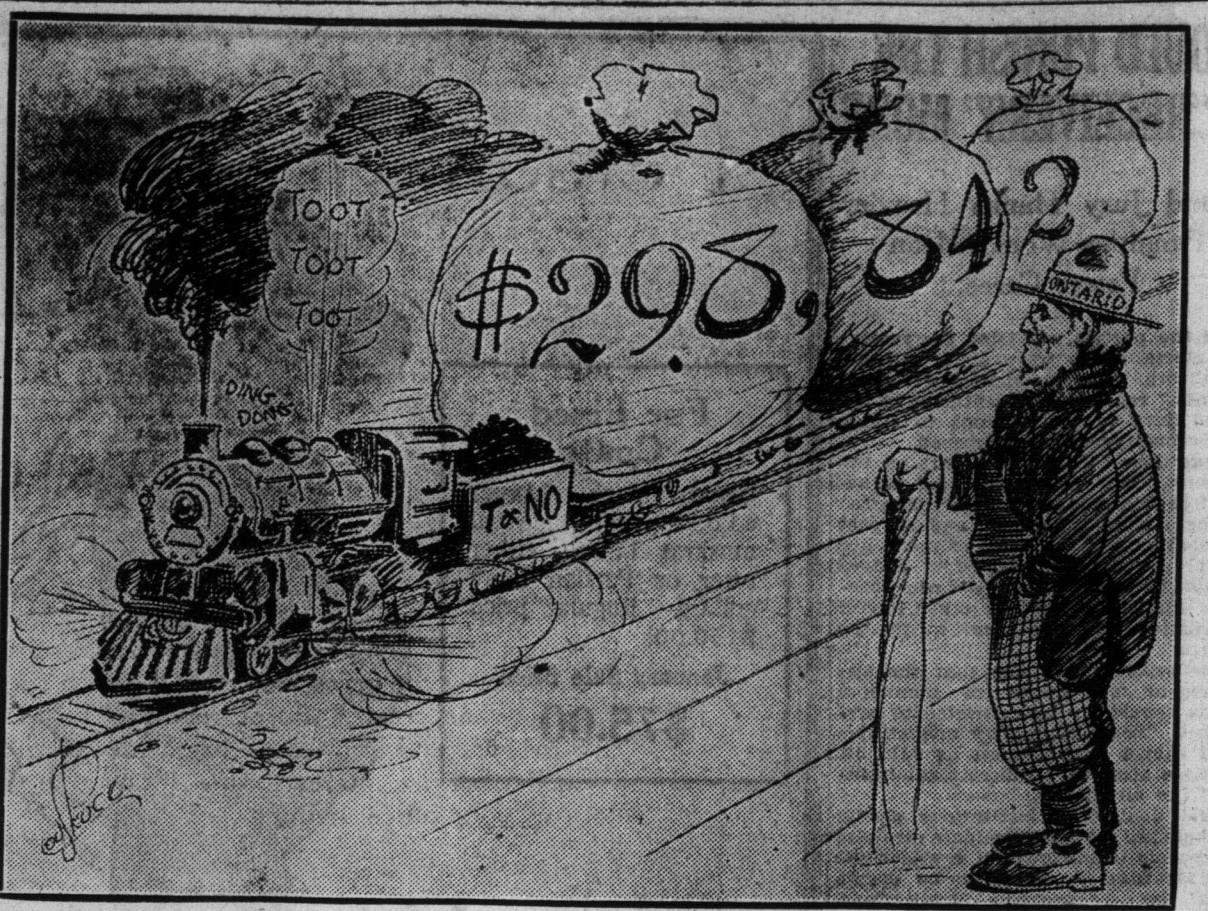

# MAKE NEW DISTRICTS HELP PAY FOR CAR LINES

### Transportation Commission Asks City Council to Apply for Necessary Legislation—Some of the Proposed Lines Will Extend Into York Township.

The transportation commission are proposing to force districts tapped by new street car lines to contribute a portion of the cost of construction on the same basis as the cost of pavements, sidewalks and sewers, is assessed.

The city council will be asked to apply to the legislature for the necessary powers for the commission. There is likely to be some opposition to the scheme at the city hall, it is felt by many that as the older sections of the city have been supplied with car services without local cost, it would not be fair to compel the new outlying districts to pay.

The proposal was talked over informally by the commission and last year's York township council. Some of the new lines proposed by the commission enter the township and the township authorities have been asked to co-operate in the application to the legislature.

Commissioner's Statement.

A statement was issued by the commission yesterday as follows: "The transportation commission has decided to request the city council to apply for legislation, in order that property, the value of which is increased by a street railway extension,

should contribute toward the cost of such improvements.

"The principle that property which has clearly been increased in value by an improvement should contribute to the cost of such improvement is felt to be fundamentally equitable and sound, and has been generally recognized for many years in Canada, the United States and England. This principle has been applied to transportation in the case of the New York state rapid transit law of 1911, which provides that the whole or any portion of the cost of any future rapid transit lines may be assessed against the property specially benefited.

"The commission have not decided as to the extent to which these powers when obtained will be put in force, but a letter has been forwarded to the board of control making the request, as outlined above.

"Regarding the statement that the commission has taken up with the York township council, it is stated that the commission some time ago, but as the matter has not been dealt with by the city council, the York township council cannot be said to have been officially approached.

# SAYS QUEBEC HAS NOT THE POWER

### Right to Prohibit Liquor Exports Questioned by Attorney-General Raney.

The view is taken by Attorney-General Raney that the Quebec Legislature cannot prohibit the export of liquor. A measure to accomplish this will, it is said, be introduced at the coming session, and commenting on this Mr. Raney yesterday said:

"This legislature has always gone on the assumption that the province's jurisdiction with regard to prohibiting exports is doubtful, and in passing the Ontario temperance act this was kept in mind. The assumption may or it may not be justified. It is one concerning constitutional law and constitutional law lends itself to a great variety of assumptions. One might give almost any opinion on a point of constitutional law and back it up with some arguments, but there is grave doubt as to the jurisdiction of the provinces in this matter."

# McMASTER WINS IN INTERNATIONAL DEBATE

McMaster University defeated Rochester Theological Seminary in an international debate at Rochester, N. Y., on Thursday night. The American judges were unanimous in deciding that the McMaster representative, George P. Olinour, '21, Toronto, and W. F. Nelson, '21, Ottawa, successfully argued the negative of the question, "Resolved, that oriental immigration should be excluded from the Anglo-Saxon commonwealths, Australia, Canada and the United States."

By the victory McMaster becomes the first winner of the John Harvard Castle Cup, a trophy established by Rochester friends of the late Dr. Castle, at one time pastor of the Jarvis Street Baptist Church, Toronto, and first principal of Toronto Baptist College.

### Income Returns From All Municipalities to Be Sworn To, Says Secretary.

To a deputation from the Ontario Municipal Association, which waited upon him yesterday, Provincial Secretary Nixon said he saw no reason why it should not be necessary for persons to make statutory declarations regarding their incomes in every municipality, instead of only in cities of 200,000 or more, as at present. The minister, however, said the government would not bring in a measure that would have to be left to a private member.

Hon. Mr. Nixon further promised that he would try to find a private member to introduce a bill providing that two weeks should elapse between nomination day and the holding of municipal elections.

The provincial secretary flatly turned down a request for the appointment of a commission to investigate the general question of municipal government. He said that municipal government today was the result of years of experience, and expressed the opinion that no good could result from the appointment of a commission, which might make suggestions of radical changes.
