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## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

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During the past year the Christian life and work of the Congregation have presented no features of unusual interest, and while there is, as there must always be, much for which we should humble ourselves before God, there is also much to call forth our gratitude to Him.

There have been entered upon the Registers of the Church, during the past year, 40 Baptisms and 19 Deaths.

The condition of the Sabbath Schools has not varied very much during the year.

On the Roll of the Upper Town School, which meets in the Lecture-Room of the Church under the superintendence of Mr. Chrysler, there are 225 scholars, including 31 on the Roll of the Bible Class, with 25 office-bearers.

On the Roll of the Lower Town School, under the superintendence of Mr. Larmonth, there are 60 pupils, 27 having been removed and 15 added during the year, with a staff of 9 teachers.

In connection with each School there is a Bible Class for young men and young women, and an infant class for such pupils as are not yet able to read.

The receipts, partly from a successful entertainment given by the Lower Town School, but chiefly from the contributions of the pupils, have been \$392 25; the expenditure \$187 34. The balance \$204 91 will be devoted to the purchase of Library Books.

The Schools continue to support two orphans in India.

The Young Men's Association have not continued their meetings during the past winter. This is much to be regretted, as such an Association might greatly assist in uniting the young men of the congregation in fellowship and in Christian work.

The Ladies' Aid Society has met regularly during the winter. Having accomplished what they had first resolved to do, viz., the carpeting of the Church and furnishing the Vestry, the energies of the Society will now be devoted to other appropriate objects. The District Visiting Committee of this Society, have, as in former years, been in the habit of visiting the families of the Congregation, distributing tracts, and reporting at the monthly meetings any instances of sickness, poverty, change of residence, etc. The Poor Relief Committee have had an unusual amount of work to perform during the present season, as the amount of poverty, requiring relief, in the city, has been greater than during any previous winter. Three years ago, when the Committee discontinued the soup kitchen which had for two seasons been maintained by them, there was a balance of collections which had been contributed for that purpose, to the amount of \$196. This amount, with interest, has been devoted, during the

past season, to general poor relief, not confined to the poor of St. Andrew's Church, \$150 of this sum having been already spent in this manner. In addition to this, the amount of \$126.22 has been dispensed from the Congregational Poor Relief Fund; the total amount to this date spent in relief of the poor being \$276.22, in addition to large donations of clothing.

The Session have to express their regret that the attendance at the Weekly Prayer Meeting continues very small, in comparison with what might be reasonably expected in so large a Congregation. It is specially to be regretted that so few heads of families take an interest in the Prayer Meeting. The Session hope that a marked improvement may soon be witnessed in this matter, for the Prayer Meeting is both a feeder and a test of the spiritual life of the Congregation.

The districts assigned to the Elders for visitation are the same as last year, viz.:

District No. 1—*Mr. Paterson*, Hull, Victoria Island, Le Breton Flats, and Richmond Road beyond the toll-gate.

District No. 2—*Mr. Bronson*, Richmond Road from the toll-gate eastward, Rochesterville, and Albert Street West.

District No. 3—*Mr. G. Drummond*, Ashburnham Hill and eastward to Bank Street, northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 4—*Mr. Hamilton*, Bank Street, and Bank Street Road, from Maria Street southward.

District No. 5—*Mr. Henry*, from Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the canal.

District No. 6—*Mr. A. Drummond*, from Sparks Street northward to the bank of the river.

District No. 7—*Mr. Elliott*, Lowertown from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

District No. 8—*Mr. Clegg*, Sandy Hill, from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

District No. 9 — *Mr. Borthwick*, Gloucester, and Country Sections beyond Rideau River.

The Session greatly regret that *Mr. Duncan Graham* continues unable, through bodily infirmities, to engage in this part of their work.

The Session have, for some time, had under consideration the propriety of introducing the "Schedule System," for the purpose of securing the contributions of the Congregation for the schemes of the Church. According to this system, the members of the Congregation are requested to state in Schedules, furnished by the Session, the amounts they are willing to contribute, monthly, quarterly, semi-annually or annually, to the various schemes of the Church, and collectors, duly authorized, call for these contributions as frequently as the donors may desire. This system has been found very successful in many congregations. Its advantages are numerous. It places the opportunity of giving to each of the schemes of the Church within the reach of every member of the Congregation. It secures, on the part of the members of the Congregation, a more careful consideration of the claims of these Church Schemes, and a more thoughtful estimate of the amounts which the members can contribute to them. It thus brings the united energies of the Congregation more fully and fairly into the general work of the Church. As the District Visiting Committee of the Ladies' Aid Society have consented to undertake the work of collecting the contributions which the members of the Congregation may subscribe, the Session unanimously and cordially recommend that this system be adopted by the Congregation to take the place of the present special collections for the schemes of the Church. The Elders will, at an early date, bring the matter personally before the members of the congregation, and hope that the system will meet with the hearty co-operation of all the members of the Church.

The Session have also had under their consideration, for some time, the best means of securing the amount of interest annually due on the church-building loan. A year ago they were hopeful that the so-called "Envelope system," which they had introduced in the congregation would fully meet the requirements of this interest fund.

During the summer, the Session charged the pastor with the collection. The Session was satisfied with their satisfactory work of his Sym.

Since our Presbyterian Church has been organized. The terms of Union consideration, for the accomplishment of the schemes which The Home Mission Fund, and now called on for contributions. Regarding the Church full information in the *Presbyterian* which is supplied to the families of the results of Union may be mentioned. Within the City of Rochester, N. Y. contributed a number of families with much interest in the Church in those

Many members, however, have failed to contribute at all to this fund, while the contributions of others have been irregular, and in some cases have fallen considerably into arrears. To secure the amount required for this payment of interest, the Session have resolved to add a special column to the schedules which they shall issue in connection with the schemes of the Church—this column to be devoted to the "Interest Fund." This will take the place of the "envelope system" hitherto used for this purpose, and will, it is hoped, meet all the requirements of the case.

During the absence of Mr. Gordon in Europe last summer, the Rev. F. P. Sym occupied the pulpit, and discharged the pastoral duties connected with the congregation. The Session take this opportunity of expressing their satisfaction at the efficient manner in which all the work of his position was at that time fulfilled by Mr. Sym.

Since our last annual meeting the Union of the Presbyterian Churches of the Dominion has been consummated. The Session had unanimously approved of the terms of Union proposed to them when these were under consideration, and they now record their gratitude to God for the accomplishment of Union. A slight change has been effected by the Union of the Churches in the schemes which the congregation is expected to support. The Home Mission Fund takes the place of the Sustentation Fund, and includes the Manitoba Mission, and we are now called on to contribute to the work of Foreign Missions. Regarding these and the other schemes of the Church full information will from time to time be furnished in the *Presbyterian Record*—the organ of the Church—which is supplied, as the *Presbyterian* formerly was, to all the families of the congregation. As one of the beneficial results of Union in our own immediate neighbourhood, it may be mentioned that two new Presbyterian congregations have, within the past year, been organized almost within the City limits—one at New Edinburgh, and one at Rochesterville. To these our own congregation has contributed a number of families, and the Session regard with much interest and satisfaction the extension of the Church in those districts.

Within the past year the Presbytery submitted to the Kirk Sessions within its bounds the proposal to contribute towards a "Presbytery Fund," at the rate of 25 cents per family, this fund being designed to defray the expenses incurred by ministers and elders in attending meetings of Presbytery. The Session have agreed to this proposal, and it is hoped that the Session Fund will enable them to pay the proportion due from this congregation without calling for a special collection.

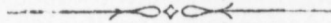

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## REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

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To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church,  
in General Meeting.

It has again become the duty of your Committee to lay before you statements of the financial condition of this Church, and an exhibit of their transactions of the past year on your behalf.

These will be found chiefly in the accounts and papers herewith, but it seems proper to note briefly some of the principal features therein revealed.

First it will be seen that only \$225 have been realized from outstanding subscriptions to the Building Fund, instead of \$1,000, at which they were valued last year.

\$277 have been received from premiums on pews, brought over from last year.

For pew rents the sum of \$4,009.17 has been collected, against 3754.42 last year, showing an improvement in this branch of revenue.

A large falling off appears on the collection of rents from property—\$413.70, against \$801.63 last year. Two exceptional causes explain this in part. One is, that one of the tenants paid a half year's rent in advance last year—\$50—thereby increasing last year's collections and diminishing this year's to that extent; the other is, that the dwelling-house on the Church property, which last year yielded \$120, has this year ceased to be a source of revenue, it having been given over for the use of the caretaker of the Church. This, together with the fact that two of the tenants are unusually behind with the rents, accounts for the difference.

With regard to the last remark, it may be necessary for our successors to take some decided action either for the recovery of the rents or the resumption of the property.

The greatest falling off, however, is to be found in what is called the "special fund," from which your Committee last year received \$2,651.50, being sufficient to meet the instalments for the year on the Toronto loan, and interest on the money borrowed from Mr. McConnell; while during the year now closing only \$1,685.75 have been received—a reduction of nearly \$1,000.

Another feature in the account is that of notes discounted, there being now maturing in the banks paper to the amount of \$4,650. In this way your Committee have been obliged during the year to raise money to meet pressing obligations, which were beyond ordinary resources.

With regard to unpaid pew rents, which amount to \$1,274, about \$200 belong to the year 1874-5, and \$318 have been paid since the accounts were closed, leaving \$756 of the pew rents of 1875-6 still unpaid.

The reason for so large an amount of uncollected pew rents must to some extent be attributed to the great depression of trade, which affected so many, compelling some who were never in arrears before to be in that condition this year. But allowing for the cases alluded to, it will be seen by comparison that the collections from this source have been more than usually successful, although not up to the measure which is desirable.

The items of expenditure need not be dwelt upon, as the accounts show them sufficiently; but it may be mentioned that it was found necessary to expend about \$400 on the caretaker's house to make it fit for occupation, and there remains a little to be done yet.

Your Committee, in endeavouring to carry out the scheme foreshadowed in the Report at last meeting, which was adopted, of extending the term of payment of borrowed money, and relieving the congregation of a part of their annual obligations, have been engaged in negotiations during the past year for that purpose.

Having ascertained that the Canada Landed Credit Company would receive back the money due them without any sacrifice, it became manifest that the best way of effecting the object aimed at would be, to borrow the sum of £6,000 sterling, if possible, for a period of fifteen or twenty years, with which to consolidate all our liabilities,

and which would also leave \$2,500 towards making a proper fence round the Church.

Negotiations in this behalf are still in progress, and in a very short time it is probable that the Committee will be able to announce the completion of an arrangement which will reduce the annual charge for interest from over \$3,000 as at present, to a little over \$2,000 per annum, the latter also representing an increase of principal to the extent of about \$2,500, which has already been referred to, being an annual saving of about \$1,200 per annum.

Your Committee take this opportunity of earnestly urging upon pew-holders to pay their pew rents always in advance, as failure to do so makes it necessary for members of the Committee to use their own personal credit in the Banks to maintain the honour of the congregation, which is both inconvenient and unseemly, and besides involves a loss of revenue by the payment of discounts. It is therefore to be desired that in the coming year the necessity for borrowing at the Banks for ordinary obligations shall cease.

Your Committee now yield up their trust, and hope that a wise selection will be made in the appointment of their successors.

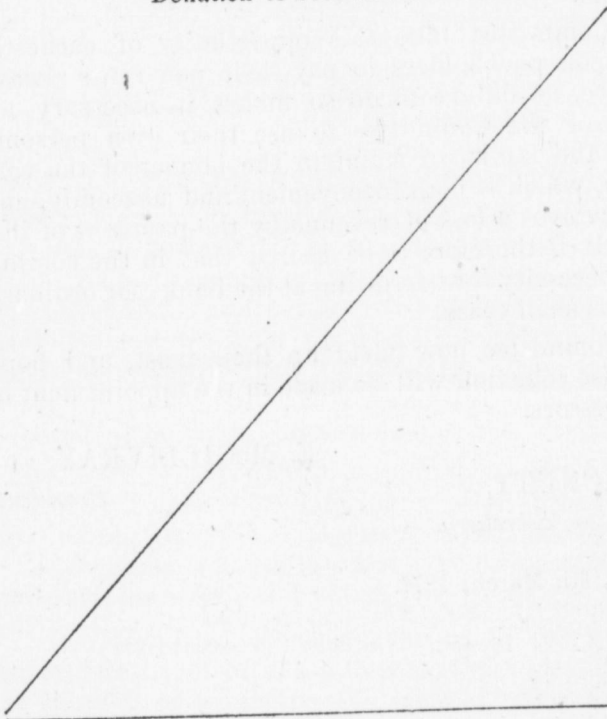

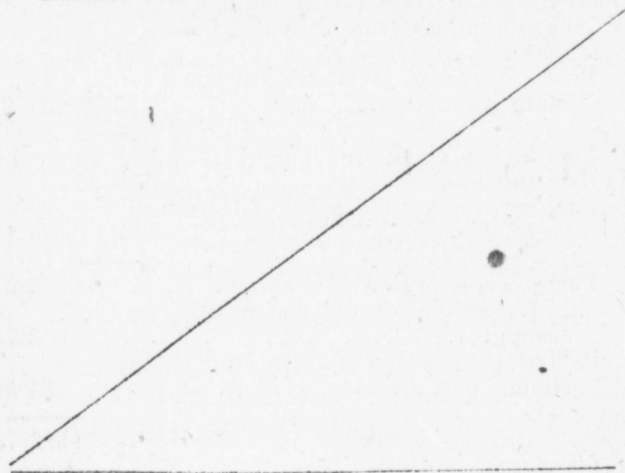
