

WHEN COURSES OPEN.


The school for agriculture opens on Oct. 1, the school for teachers on Sept. 3 and for household science on Sept. 10. In the School of Agriculture residents of Canada are not charged a tuition fee, while \$25 for the season is the tax put on those who attend the school of Household Science. School teachers who are resi-dents of Canada are also given a course free of charge so far as fees are concern-ed. Provision has been made to keep all students on the farm, the charges for board and lodging for every occupant with a single bed being \$3.25 per week. The women's residence has accommo-dation for 170 pupils and is furnished with bath rooms and lavatories, dining-room, hospital, swimming pool and gymnasium. 
