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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

AS ADOPTED AT A GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY, HELD IN THE CITY
OF TORONTO, ON THE THIRD DAY OF AUGUST, 1855.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be denominated the “UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,” having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, that is—the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II.—This Society shall endeavour to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III.—This Society shall maintain in the City of Toronto, a general depôt of Bibles and Testaments, from which all the Bible Societies in connection with it, shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a board of Directors, consisting of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members; fifteen of whom, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year; five of whom to form a quorum. All ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat, and to vote with the Directors.

V.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Agents, of all Bible Societies in connection therewith, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

VI.—At the meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII.—Each person paying annually, one dollar, shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying twenty dollars at any one time, either to this Society, or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society; or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII.—That each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Company,

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duly signed by the President and Secretaries for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depository annually, for Distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of one dollar.

IX.—That the Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances ; and shall have the superintendance and management of all the property real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and the control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the act of Incorporation.

X.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretary, or any three of the Directors.

XI.—A general meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of May, in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society ; when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen ; a report of the proceedings for the foregoing year presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited.

XII.—In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it, shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the Scriptures, and the contributions to the funds ; together with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting.

XIII.—That the general Meeting of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV.—That no alteration in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

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RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

- I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the English copies being of the authorized version *only*.
- II. That the Society be denominated "THE _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."
- III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.
- IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a *quorum*.
- V. That all ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned Members of the Committee.
- VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener: the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint two of their own members for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.
- VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Upper Canada Bible Society, to supply this neighbourhood: (which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell to members at a reduced price, to others at cost; and to give, *gratis*, to those they know cannot purchase;) and that the overplus be remitted, half-yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and supplying other nations, through the Parent institution, with the pure Word of God.
- IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the _____ day of _____ in each year at _____, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee, if required.
- X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

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LAWs AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. The designation of the Society shall be the **BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the sole object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment: the only copies in the languages of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society shall be the authorized version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British dominions; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.

III. Each Subscriber of one guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Each Subscriber of ten guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each Subscriber of five guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to fifty pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of fifty pounds, shall be a member for life; or of one hundred pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General-Meetings; and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the Accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries, for the time being, shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and Meetings of the Committee, the President,—or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such member as shall be voted for that purpose; shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener, if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, OR GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of this Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meetings of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books be issued bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of the Scriptures to Societies which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sales of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

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TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

The time has again arrived, when it becomes our duty, as the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society, to lay before our constituents and friends some account of our proceedings, and an account of our stewardship. The year that has gone by has been marked by several events of more than ordinary magnitude and importance. On our own continent civil war has been prevailing with all its attendant evils, interrupting the peaceful labours of industry, paralyzing trade, and spreading mourning and desolation into many a home. For a time the dark cloud hovered over our own Province, but let us praise God that it was soon dispelled, and that we have enjoyed the inestimable blessing of peace and security. May God long continue to us the enjoyment of this blessing, and may He speedily overrule the war which still rages in the neighbouring States, for the permanent overthrow of oppression and for the establishment of true freedom for every race and every class of men.

Since we last met together, we have been called, in common with the nation at large, to mourn the death of one high in station, but not more distinguished by his exalted position, than by his possession of every noble and estimable quality. It is indeed rare to find such a combination of excellencies as adorned the character of the late Prince Consort, and which fitted him not merely for filling a distinguished place in the court of England, but for discharging the part of a faithful and loving husband, a judicious and exemplary father, the patron and encourager of everything fitted to promote the comfort and happiness of the people. May our beloved Sovereign be sustained and comforted under her sad bereavement, and may the example of Prince Albert be blessed for the good of others, and especially for the good of the Royal children, now left without an earthly father. May that "Rock of Ages," to whose shadow he looked for comfort and support in a dying hour, be early and earnestly sought by them, so that through life and in death they may have peace.

The Directors of the Society felt it to be no more than their duty to draw up and transmit an address of condolence and sympathy with our gracious Sovereign. The address was graciously received by Her Majesty.

The following are copies of the address and of the answer received :

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY :

We, the President and Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society, on behalf of that institution, beg leave to express our deep and respectful sympathy with your Majesty, in the great affliction with which it has pleased Almighty God to visit your Majesty, in the death of your beloved and illustrious Consort, His Royal Highness Prince Albert; and also to express our sincere and heartfelt sorrow, at the loss which the British nation has sustained by the removal of one whose active and energetic concurrence in every good and beneficent work, and whose domestic virtues as a husband and father, had gained for him the respect and affection of all classes of your Majesty's subjects throughout the British Empire.

While we are persuaded that nothing but the grace of God can effectually sustain and comfort your Majesty in your deep affliction, we trust nevertheless that the assurance of the loving and respectful sympathy of your loyal subjects in this as in other parts of your Majesty's dominions, will afford some consolation to your Majesty, under the sad bereavement with which it has pleased the Supreme Dispenser of events to visit your Majesty and your Royal family.

It is our earnest prayer to Almighty God, that your Majesty may be graciously vouchsafed that strength and peace, which He alone can bestow, who was Himself "a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief;" and that it may please the Almighty, in His great goodness, long to spare your Majesty to guide the destinies of the great Empire committed to your charge to His honor and glory; and that finally, after this life, He may bring you to that heavenly kingdom "where there shall be no more death, neither sorrow," through Jesus Christ our Lord.

While we notice the death of the late Prince Consort, we cannot forget that death has come nearer to our own doors during the past year. We have had to mourn the removal of two of our active friends and colleagues. We refer to the late Peter Freeland, Esq.,

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one of the Vice-Presidents of the Society, and the late Edward Childs, Esq., one of the Board of Directors. COLPORTAGE.

During the past year three Colporteurs have been labouring in the service of the Society. The following is a synopsis of their labours, and of the results :

Mr. Large laboured for eight months, principally in the county of York. During the remaining months he was employed principally in collecting the subscriptions in the city.

Mr. Dunn was employed during the month of April, 1861, by the Owen Sound Branch Society. After that he laboured for nine months in the direct service of this Society, as shown above, and for two months was engaged in colportage in connexion with the Windsor Branch, during which time he sold 187 copies of the Scriptures, and visited 919 families.

Mr. Strain's labours have been carried on in the counties of Simcoe and Grey. It is trusted that in many parts of that field his labours have been productive of great good.

The Williams Branch employed Mr. Finlayson as colporteur for several months during the year. The report of the Williams Branch, with reference to Mr. Finlayson's labours, is highly interesting. The field in which he has laboured is one of the most necessitous and important to be found.

The Directors are impressed with the value of the work of Colportage, and believe that it is peculiarly fitted to advance the interests of true religion in many parts of our Province.

AGENCY.

In the last Report of the Society, reference was made to the resignation of the Rev. Lachlan Taylor. During the year now closed, the work of Travelling Agency has been carried on by Messrs. Johnson and Ball. Their labours have been arduous and successful.

The following is a brief synopsis of the labours of the Agents during the past year :

Mr. Johnston has travelled about 3000 miles in the service of the Society, visited 130 Branches, and formed two Branches with encouraging prospects of success. He has received \$6,355 52c. on account of the Society.

Mr. Ball has visited 130 Branches, in ten cases paying two visits

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in the course of the year. He has travelled nearly 4000 miles, and has received on account of the Society \$6,292 63c.

More than usual labour has devolved upon the Agents in consequence of the retirement of Mr. Taylor, and this will account for the fact that fewer Branches have been formed during the year than during some preceding years.

The Rev. Mr. Ball having accepted the pastoral charge of the congregation of Knox's Church, Guelph, has given in his resignation as one of the Agents of the Society. The Directors received Mr. Ball's resignation with regret, and recorded their cordial thanks to him for his energetic and successful labours as agent. The Directors have been engaged in looking out for a successor to Mr. Ball. No appointment has as yet been made; but it is hoped that the Board, to be elected to-night, will soon be able to nominate one who may carry on and extend the good work.

BRANCHES.

The total number of Branches is now about 265. On the whole, they are in a prosperous state, and from year to year manifest growing interest in the great Bible cause. This is seen by the liberal contributions which they make to the funds of this Society, and of the parent Society. The Branch Societies owe much to the visits of the Agents, as well as to the energy and attention of their own office-bearers. The Directors tender their best thanks to the officers and friends of their numerous Branch Societies, and trust that in their own respective spheres they may find the work advancing. A Branch formerly in connection with us has lately been again added to the number of those connected with the Upper Canada Bible Society, namely, Belleville, which for some years has been connected with the Kingston Auxiliary, but for the past year assumed an independent position, and now, after some correspondence, has been connected with the Upper Canada Bible Society. We trust that the union may infuse fresh vigor into the operations of our excellent friends at Belleville.

We now proceed to take a glance at the progress and operations of kindred Societies and Associations.

MONTREAL.

The last anniversary of this Auxiliary took place on the 29th January last, and was attended by one of our Agents, the Rev. W. S. Ball, whose services were well received and duly acknowledged. The issues for the year were 6,456 Bibles, and 7,088 Testaments; total, 13,544; being 790 more than last year, and making a total of

261,479 copies issued by the Society. The receipts were \$10,191 41c., and the expenditure \$10,073 68c. Through the Upper Canada Bible Society was transmitted the sum of \$557 for furthering the work of spreading the Scriptures among the French-Canadians. During the year three colporteurs were employed in the English-speaking parts of the field—two labouring the whole year, and the third for three months. Several colporteurs have been employed for various periods in the midst of the French-speaking population, and their labours have not been vain, upwards of 900 copies of the Word of God having been put into circulation. We are glad to observe that our Montreal friends have inaugurated the Bible-woman movement. It is to be hoped we shall soon have some here. We have lost links here to find and to rivet. Who will take the lead in this humble but useful work?

KINGSTON.

The anniversary of the Kingston Auxiliary was held on the 21st January. The issues were reported. Bibles, 1,431; Testaments, 1,882; total, 3,313. The receipts were \$1,067 82c. During the months of April and May, 1861, the Agent of the Ottawa Auxiliary laboured for the Kingston Auxiliary. He established ten new Branches, revived seven old ones, and reported the Branches as bidding fair to be useful. The work of colportage has been for many years zealously carried on by our Kingston friends.

OTTAWA.

We have not received the last report of the Ottawa Society. We believe, however, that it is prosecuting the work with vigour.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

We are at present without any definite information as to the operations of the American Bible Society, during the past year; but we know that the Directors and friends of that important institution have been seeking to meet the present exigency in that land by supplying the thousands of soldiers with the Word of Life. May they soon be enabled, in more peaceful times, to pursue their blessed work of circulating the Bible, not only throughout the wide field of America, but throughout the wider field of the world.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

We can scarcely here enter into any detail of the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society. In the Appendix will be found more ample details. This large and renowned institution has in the parent country 47 Auxiliaries, with 3,728 Associations; while the total number, including the Colonies and Foreign Societies, is about

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9,132. Last year the receipts reached the sum of £167,941 14s. 7d. The circulation was somewhat less than in the preceding year, but still was 1,787,398. Besides these might be mentioned the vernacular editions printed in India by affiliated Societies, amounting to about 100,000 copies. Of late, one remarkable feature in the operations of the Bible Society has been, the extent to which the Scriptures have been introduced into countries from which they were formerly excluded. Italy, Austria and Russia are now in a measure open for the Bible. May every other closed door be opened, and may the glorious march of God's blessed word soon bring glad tidings of peace and salvation.

We here give some extracts from a letter recently received from Mr. Knolleke, the Assistant Foreign Secretary of the parent Society:

"Our new Report, a copy of which shall be sent to you immediately it leaves the press, will contain many proofs of the value and importance of our labours, and of the power which is still exerted by the written Word, when accompanied by the guiding influences of God's Holy Spirit, in convincing and converting the soul. We have of late had the Island of Madagascar frequently under consideration, and we are doing our best to meet the urgent demands of the Christians of that Island to be put in possession of the entire Word of God as early as practicable. And it is the more important that we should do this, seeing how necessary it is that the people should have the entire Scriptures, to enable them to resist the insidious attacks of the Roman Catholic priests, who are using their best efforts to seduce the people from the faith of the Gospel. Immediately on the news of the death of the late wicked Queen, and the accession of the young King, reaching the Island of Mauritius, the stock of Malagasy Testaments, and Portions of the Old and New Testaments, comprising upwards of 3000 copies, were despatched to Madagascar, and eagerly welcomed by the people; and we have lately forwarded to the Mauritius for ultimate transmission to the same destination, about 10,000 Testaments and Portions. Before the end of the present year we shall hope to be able to send out 5000 copies of the entire Bible. I have alluded thus at length to the Island of Madagascar, because we can point to it as one of the most striking evidences and proofs of the value of our labours.

"To turn now to another quarter, we have had our attention very much directed, during the last few months, to an island of a very different character, but where the Scriptures are not less needed. I refer to Iceland. From enquiries made in the island last autumn, by an English friend who visited it, he found that the Word of God was sadly needed there; and, as the result of measures which the friend in question was authorized to take in the name of our Committee, we have within the last few days received the revised 'copy' of the New Testament and Psalms in the Icelandic language, which we are about to print to the extent of 10,000 copies. We are the more pleased to undertake this work, as we have not done anything for Iceland since the years 1815-'17.

"In Scandinavia our labours have suffered no diminution, and the introduction or extension of the system of colportage has been productive of the best results. In no country, perhaps, are the efforts of colporteurs more required than in Norway, in which country the inhabitants are so scattered

and isolated. Our year's circulation there has comprised 21,107 copies, while in Sweden it has been 91,000 copies, and in Denmark 11,000 copies. In France the issues have amounted to 88,000 Bibles and Testaments, of which upwards of 18,000 copies were sold or distributed among the men in the French army.

"Of Austria and Russia we cannot yet report anything very favourable, for the prospects held out last year have not been realized as yet, and all we can do is to hope and wait.

"The circulation during the year in Italy has exceeded 32,190 copies. There we do not make so much progress as we could wish; but peculiar difficulties and obstacles are in our way, and it behoves us to be thankful that we can effect so much.

"These brief notices will show you that our work has not lost any of its interest; and although we have been amply provided with funds by the liberality of our friends, we shall have abundant opportunities for beneficially expending them in the promotion of our great and glorious object.

"The receipts for the year have been £168,443 15s. 5d., the payments £144,751 7s. 5d., and the total issues 1,595,248 copies."

CONCLUSION.

Let us, as a Society and as individuals, seek to realize more our obligations to the Bible, and seek with greater earnestness to promote its circulation in our own and in every other land. The Bible is the book for every age and for every land. It is the incorruptible seed which will never perish—the rock of God's truth, which is sure and stedfast. Everything earthly changes; earthly kingdoms rise and fall; human institutions vary from one generation to another; new devices are put forth by the great enemy. But amidst passing institutions, and conflicting opinions and principles, the Word of God liveth and abideth forever. Let us cleave to it as to anchor sure and stedfast; let us labour and pray more earnestly for its universal dissemination. For the Bible alone can secure the real good of individuals, and the freedom and prosperity of nations; it alone can bring "glory to God in the highest, on earth peace and good will to men."

DEAR SIRS,

In commencing my report of visits undertaken this year, it is a source of gratitude to Almighty God, that our numerous branches, so far from evincing any diminution of interest in the glorious work to which we are pledged, are fully maintaining their character for zeal and liberality. The year now closed has not been equal to its predecessor in monetary resources; the crops have not in general been so good, while the prices have been lower, notwithstanding which our report shews a gratifying increase—the more to be noticed from the fact, that our sales have not been so large as in the preceding year.

My first visit was to Bolton Village, and after an excellent meeting, I found that our friends had already moneys in hand more than equal to last year's returns, with two or three good districts still to be heard from. At Lloydtown, where we have an efficient organization, the same gratifying results may be stated. After an interesting meeting I received \$6 72 purchase account, \$40 free contribution to the British and Foreign, and \$13 28 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Newtown Robinson.—This small branch is not equal in returns this year, though the friends to whom is entrusted the management of its affairs have faithfully discharged their duties. I was glad to welcome a valuable assistant in the person of our excellent President of the Bond Head Branch, who gave us a most admirable address. I received \$25 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

At Cookstown I found it necessary to defer the meeting in consequence of a camp meeting that was in operation in the immediate vicinity, and proceeded to Thornton, where we have a few warm-hearted friends of the cause. After a Sabbath appointment we held the public meeting on Monday evening, when I received \$16 to the British and Foreign, \$8 to the Upper Canada, and \$8 to the Montreal Bible Society. I also preached at West Essa on Sabbath, and held a public meeting early in the week, when I was glad to find that our friends had raised \$20 free contribution to our funds. Collingwood also shows a gratifying adherence to the good work, and although the amount is yet small, is cheerfully given. I received \$28 82½ on purchase account. In returning, I was unfortunate enough to break my carriage over roads that were almost impassable, and fully expected to have had a night in the woods, but with a little experience gained by Canadian travel, I was enabled to patch up till I came to the clearings, and proceeded to Bond Head, where I found our good friends as full of energy and effort as ever. Their returns are made in March.

My next visit was to Innisfil, where our good friends had not quite completed their returns. I received a free contribution of \$25 75 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Leaving my horse with our kind friend, A. Gaviller, Esq., I proceeded across Lake Simcoe to Orillia, where, after a Sabbath, we held our meeting on the Monday evening, at which we had the valued aid of Rev. S. F. Ramsay of Newmarket, and Rev. J. McCallum, now of Aurora, both of whom spoke with much effect and greatly interested the meeting, which was crowded. On the following evening we held a second meeting in Oro in connection with this useful branch.

At Barrie I was glad to find the Society in a most prosperous condition. The meeting, in consequence of the election, was not so large as it otherwise would have been, though it was a very interesting one. I received \$100 free contribution, and the further sum of \$29 04 on purchase account.

The friends in Bradford evinced their usual liberality, and since my visit, have held a number of meetings, which have resulted in the formation of two new branches, which I expect shortly to visit. I received \$15 on purchase account, \$25 free contribution to the British and Foreign, \$15 Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

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Holland Landing and Newmarket make their returns in March, and both nobly sustain their long-earned reputation, the latter being equal to our very best branches similarly circumstanced.

I closed this tour at Aurora, where the attendance was excellent and the meeting a delightful one. Our excellent President, Rev. T. Goldsmith, drove up from the city specially to be present. We had also most valuable assistance from our valued friend, Rev. S. F. Ramsay, who spoke with even more than his usual force and energy. The returns shew a gratifying increase over last year, and were collected by our old friend, Mr. Hunt, who devoted nearly three weeks to the Society, giving his time and strength to the work with the greatest good will.

My next journey commenced, as soon as possible after harvest, with Ontario, where we have a small but useful auxiliary. After a good meeting I received \$17 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society for supplying the Scriptures to Italy. A further sum has I believe since been forwarded. I then proceeded to Grimsby, where, owing to an unfavourable evening, our attendance was small. In addition to a payment for stock, I received \$36 free contribution for Italy.

At Chippawa we held a very interesting meeting, and from the moneys which have since been forwarded, we rejoice to know that our good friends, who have for years stood by us, are increasing in their efforts to spread the blessed volume of God's truth, both at home and abroad.

Clifton too is entitled to much commendation for zeal and liberality. Notwithstanding a severe monetary pressure, we gladly record a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign, \$15 to the Upper Canada, and \$15 to the Montreal Bible auxiliary.

At Niagara I was glad to meet with old friends still warm in affection to the good cause. Our meeting was more than usually interesting, the resident minister heartily contributing to aid. I received \$40 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

The meeting in Drummondville was also more than usually interesting, owing in part to the number of clergymen who were present, all the resident and some neighbouring ministers, and we had also the pleasure to welcome some others who had come over to enjoy the beautiful and unrivalled scenery of the Falls. Contributions amounted to over \$80.

Our noble branch at Thorold still maintains its foremost position, and this year is equal to any of its past liberal contributions. Our excellent Secretary discharges his duties with untiring devotion to the work. I received \$60 on purchase account, \$30 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society, \$15 to the French Canadian Mission, and \$15 to the circulation of the Scriptures in China. The returns, owing principally to a severe accident to our excellent friend who has for years done all in his power to keep alive an interest in the good work, were not complete. I received \$12 96 on purchase account.

Welland I found still holding on. Returns \$10 to the British and Foreign, \$10 Upper Canada, and \$7 37 to Montreal Bible Society.

I found our friends at North Pelham somewhat behind their liberal contributions of last year, but hope that the ground will be recovered, as in the neighbourhood there is quite a field for exertion. I received after an interesting meeting \$26 on purchase account.

Humberstone and Bertie had done nothing up to the time of my visit for this year, and at Bridgeport, owing to the name of the post office not being correctly known, I had to postpone the meeting.

St. Catharines.—This excellent branch I found in good working order, and I doubt not will continue as liberal in the future as she has proved herself in the past. The pretty town of Cayuga was next visited, where we had some noble friends, who conduct the affairs of our branch with most commendable efficiency. Caistorville I found still holding on and received \$15 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. The returns at Smithville were not complete.

My next visit necessitated a drive of over 50 miles through a heavy rain to the village of Caledonia, where, in consequence of the unfavourable weather, we were obliged to postpone our meeting. I arranged for another meeting, giving them a Sabbath appointment. We have an excellent Society in this place.

Our little branch at Hagersville is not without fruit this year. I received \$19 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Jarvis shewed an improvement over last year. In addition to a payment for stock, I received \$22 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society. At Selkirk, although the returns are somewhat behind former years, there was no abatement of effort on the part of our friends in that locality.

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Our spirited friends in South Cayuga have nobly kept up their energy and activity during the past year, and have exceeded any former returns. I had the pleasure of receiving \$60, to be divided between the British and Foreign, Upper Canada, and Montreal Bible Societies. Oneida, though a new branch, is already in vigorous operation. After an interesting meeting I received a payment on purchase account and a free contribution of \$34 05 on purchase account. At Allan Tract some misunderstanding in reference to our expenditure has for a while suspended operations. I received \$37 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

The Milton branch was next visited, and continues one of our model branches. Since my connection with the Society it has never yet receded, either in effort or liberality. Returns not quite complete, but since that time equal to the handsome contribution of last year.

My next visit was to Cheltenham, where our Society has a most admirable organization. I received after a good meeting the sum of \$4 95 on purchase account, and \$71 56 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society. At Campbell's Cross, another small branch four miles distant, was my next appointment. During the past year the President, who had only been recently appointed, and who had done much to infuse a spirit of activity into this branch had gone to his rest. I received about \$20, and \$5 has since come to hand to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Norval may still be designated one of our very best local branches. Not a house in the neighbourhood is left unvisited by our indefatigable lady collectors. After an excellent meeting I received about \$16 purchase account, and a free contribution of nearly \$80.

Georgetown, though only a little over three miles distant, is not behind in the good work. Our meeting was one of the best that has ever been held. All the resident clergy were present and ably advocated the cause, and we were pleased to welcome the Rev. Mr. Arnold, who had come some fourteen miles through very bad roads to attend the meeting. I had the pleasure to receive \$50 to the British and Foreign, \$20 to the Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Streetsville is another branch which has for many years sustained our operations with a liberal contribution. A new source of strength was given this year by the presence and hearty co-operation of Rev. Mr. Arnold, Church of England minister. Returns made in the spring.

I next visited Cooksville, where, after an interesting meeting, I received \$29 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Nelson and Nelson Middle Road are still doing something if not much. I received \$33 63 free contribution to the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Society.

Our meeting at Wellington Square was much better attended this year than for some time past. We had all the resident clergymen. I received a payment on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign Bible Society. Cumminsville has greatly improved its position during the past two years, and is again nobly in advance. The meeting was largely attended, after which I received \$20, to be placed to their credit on purchase account, \$17 43 to Upper Canada, \$17 to British and Foreign, and \$17 to the Montreal Bible Society.

I next visited a few branches east of Toronto that have till this year held their meetings after the new year, and commenced with Port Hope, where, as usual, our meeting was a very crowded one. No place of its size has been more distinguished for zeal and liberality in Bible operations—all the denominations working admirably in the good cause. I received \$100 on purchase account, \$50 free contribution to the Upper Canada, and \$40 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Bowmanville.—Here too the work of Bible circulation is well sustained. The town has suffered very much from the recent crisis, and many have left. Still the cause is strong in the affections of the community. I received upwards of \$40 on purchase account, \$50 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$29 86 to Upper Canada, and \$25 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Whitby affords another instance of thorough organization, and is a very efficient ally. The attendance was very encouraging and the addresses by the local ministers excellent. I received upwards of \$30 purchase account, \$50 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$20 Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

I next visited a settlement on the town line, between Markham and Pickering, in company with our excellent friend, Rev. Mr. Kennedy, of Dunbarton, where a little organization was formed, not without promise of usefulness.

My next journey to Chinguacousy East was undertaken under peculiar disadvantages. My carriage broke down, and it was with great difficulty I could keep my appointment. After preaching

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twice on Sabbath we held our meeting under more favourable circumstances than usual, which will, I trust, be seen when the returns are complete.

The first anniversary meeting of a new branch formed last year at Malton was next held. Some unfortunate circumstances, I trust now over, have somewhat retarded our operations. A useful organization may be carried on, as we have many warm friends in that locality.

I found our Society in North Etobicoke faithful and persevering as ever. The collections are in advance of any previous year and very liberal. I received \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$25 to the Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Weston.—The attendance this year was somewhat more encouraging than on our last anniversary. Our valued friend, Rev. Bishop Richardson, kindly came over to take part in the meeting. A free contribution of \$15, last year's subscription, was voted to the British and Foreign, and \$31 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

I next visited our little branch in connection with York Church, and have every reason to believe that our meeting this year will infuse new life and energy into our good friends, from whom I received \$21 25 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Vaughan.—This interesting branch has displayed very commendable diligence and energy during the past year. After a very interesting meeting I received \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$29 53 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

My next visit was to Richmond Hill, a valued branch, and one peculiarly interesting to me, from the fact that here I met for the first time in a Bible meeting in Canada, and it is a matter of thankfulness that its high reputation is still sustained. The meeting was largely attended, and our excellent President constituted another life member to a "young disciple," that may, I trust, be spared to rejoice in the glorious truths of the blessed Bible for many years to come. I received \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$60 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

At Thornhill our meeting was better attended than for some time past. I received \$40 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

My last visit during this journey was paid to the York Township branch. The attendance was good and the interest in the work well

sustained. We had a very telling address from Rev. Mr. Wilkinson and another from Rev. Mr. Jamieson, who was just about to leave for British Columbia. May he display in his new and interesting field of labour the same zeal in the spread of the Bible he has ever manifested while in Canada.

With the commencement of the present year I began my visit at Waterdown, where I was glad to find that the society was in an excellent position. Our meeting was well sustained, after which I received nearly \$20 on purchase account, a free contribution of \$30 to the British and Foreign, \$20 to Upper Canada, and \$10 to Montreal Bible Society.

I next proceeded to Beamsville, Alberton, and Jerseyville, where the returns were not complete. From the latter I received nearly \$20 on purchase account, and held the next meeting at Hamilton. This noble auxiliary continues its active exertions in behalf of Bible circulation with undiminished success. The meeting was held in Knox's Church, which was well filled. A most comprehensive and interesting report was read by Dr. Ormiston. The speaking was excellent, and without intending any reflection on any, for all spoke well, the Rev. Mr. Douglas produced a deep impression on the audience by his stirring and argumentative address. We were pleased to hear by the report that a gentleman had subscribed \$100 to the Society.

Oakville was next visited, and a gratifying improvement was realized in their funds this year. Our excellent Secretary, Rev. Mr. Nisbett, has left for the Red River Settlement, and his business energy will be missed, but doubtless in his fresh sphere of usefulness he will be equally useful in aiding on the good work. I received upwards of \$20 purchase account and a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign, and \$20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

South Etobicoke.—This branch is usefully holding on. A very pleasant meeting. Returns to be forwarded.

I next commenced my long tour of branches east of Toronto, commencing with Dunbarton, a small auxiliary, but ever faithful and active in the good work. After an excellent meeting I received \$30 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$20 Upper Canada Bible Society.

Claremont is a new but most valuable auxiliary, and is nobly sustained by a most excellent staff of officers. We had a crowded and

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very successful meeting, after which I received \$59 free contribution to the British and Foreign, and \$59 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

At Duffin's Creek local circumstances had rendered it necessary to defer taking up the collections till after the meeting.

At Oshawa I was delighted to find that our friends had worked with admirable zeal and success. After a very interesting meeting I had the pleasure of receiving the following very handsome donations: \$122 64 which was equally divided between the British and Foreign, Upper Canada, and Montreal Bible Societies.

Zion Settlement and Eldad.—I was very glad to find another improvement on the part of this interesting little branch. The weather was very unfavourable, but more were present than could have been expected. I received \$21 40 to the Upper Canada, and \$20 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Hampton too is still engaged in the good work. I received upwards of \$55 on purchase account, and proceeded to Orono, where we held a very interesting meeting. Returns, \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society.

On the following evening I proceeded in company with our excellent friend, Rev. Mr. Lawrence, to a small village in the rear of the township, to Kendal, where a new organization was effected under promising circumstances.

Newcastle had not completed her returns. I received \$26 purchase account and a generous contribution has since been forwarded.

Our friends at Newton have discharged their obligations most faithfully during the past year. The Society is admirably conducted. I received \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$10 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Auxiliary.

Hope Township was next visited, and this branch deserves special mention. Our friends are accustomed to hold a number of tributary meetings in the course of the year throughout the township. We lose this year our indefatigable Secretary, who has laboured since the formation of this branch with unwearied and painstaking diligence to keep everything in order. May his spirit be shared by his successor in office. I received \$60 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$20 to Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Coldsprings had made her returns before my visit, and is doing well.

Cobourg.—This excellent Society was next visited, and the meeting was a very successful one. Returns since made.

At Baltimore, thanks to our devoted Secretary, I found everything in admirable order. In addition to a payment for stock, I received \$50 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$27 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

From our new branch at Alnwick, after their first anniversary meeting, I received \$28 50 on purchase account, and proceeded to Norwood, where I was happy to find that last year a most generous contribution had been forwarded. Their returns were not complete.

At Hastings we had the able assistance of the Rev. Mr. Douglas from Peterboro', who gave us a most admirable address. A lively working Society exists in this very enterprising village, which is still rapidly improving.

Keane and Percy were next in order, and are both doing well. Frankfort somewhat behind hand this year. From Brighton I received \$15 50 free contribution to Upper Canada, and \$15 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Leaving my horse with our esteemed President, I proceeded by train to Belleville, where I paid my first visit, and was glad to meet with the christian friends of this fine, rising town. The recollections of that visit are still very refreshing. I have never been in a town where the various religious denominations have coöperated more pleasantly to aid the different movements designed to advance the glorious truths of our common christianity. After two Sabbath appointments I had an opportunity of attending the anniversary of the Tract Society on Monday evening, and the Bible meeting on the following evening. The meeting was large and the spirit excellent. Several admirable addresses were given, and we hail the return of this excellent branch to our Upper Canada organization with much pleasure. Their receipts during the past year from all sources were nearly \$600.

Colborne was next visited, and here to we have an excellent Society, the worthy President, Secretary, and in fact the whole committee are deeply interested in the work. I received \$16 purchase account and a free contribution of \$40 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

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Grafton, too, desires favorable mention, as having increased its amount during the past year. I received \$16 78 for purchase account, and \$29 44 to be divided between the Upper Canada and British and Foreign Bible Societies.

After a hard day's journey the next day I held the meeting at the South Monaghan branch, which may be described as "always abounding." We held the meeting in a new church belonging to the Wesleyans, and the choir from Milbrook were kind enough to come over at some inconvenience, and very much enlivened the meeting with some excellent singing.

Peterborough came next in rotation and is well known as an active auxiliary to the good work. A colporteur is employed for the surrounding district. Our meeting was well attended and the platform well filled with local ministers and prominent friends of the Society. I received \$113 31 purchase account, and the collections, to which was added \$5 13, the proceeds of a Bible box from Catharine and George Brown, amounting altogether to \$34 93 was noted to the Montreal Auxiliary.

On the following day we, in company with the Sheriff, and member for the county, Col. Haultain, the former of whom drove us out with his smart horses, we went over to Lakefield where we held a very successful meeting. The collections at the door amounting to \$9 60 was also put to the Montreal Society for distributing the Scriptures among the French Canadians. Col. Strickland and his whole family warmly co-operate.

After a Sabbath appointment the meeting was held on Monday evening at Milbrook, and though the roads were almost impassable, we had a very agreeable meeting and were pleased to welcome Rev. Mr. Allen (Church of England), Rev. Mr. Douglas (Presbyterian), and Rev. Mr. Stobbs (Wesleyan), who all gave very suitable and appropriate addresses. Liberal contributions have since been forwarded.

Our little branch at Manvers is holding on, and expresses some surprise that they had not been more noticed in our last year's report. All we require, however, is that they will give us the opportunity of reporting their liberal contributions, and we promised them that they shall not be overlooked.

Mount Pleasant, in Cavan, has from its commencement proved to a faithful and vigorous branch, and this year has more than maintained its ground. I received nearly \$20 on purchase account and the following very liberal donations, \$40 British and Foreign, \$22 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Our Society in Emily is still active. I received \$30, free contribution to British and Foreign and \$10 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Lindsay.—Notwithstanding the fire which last year burned down the principal part of the business streets of the town, still keeps alive her interest in Bible circulation. I received \$13 15 on purchase account and a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Our little branch in Mariposa is still holding on though we should much rejoice to see the Bible Society more largely supported throughout this excellent township. I received \$32 08 on purchase account.

We proceeded to Manilla, an interesting village where I was glad to witness an improvement in the resources of the past year. I received nearly \$30 for stock, a free contribution of \$11 22 to the British and Foreign, and \$11 18 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Beaverton shews a most gratifying state of things this year, our esteemed President, Rev. Mr. Watson, gave a most earnest and eloquent address at the meeting, after which I received upwards of \$50 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Cannington is usefully holding on, we have an excellent and active secretary. I received \$22 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

I next visited Prince Albert, where, after a Sabbath appointment, I held the meeting on Monday evening. We have here some very liberal friends and warm supporters; the contributions this year were highly commendable. I received \$82 20 for stock, a donation of \$33 80 to be equally divided between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Our new branch at Cartwright is still doing well. I received \$33 39 on purchase account, and \$26 26 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Brooklin is another branch that has contributed liberally during this year. Returns \$40 to the British and Foreign, \$12 68 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Uxbridge complained in a good natured way that our notice of her was somewhat short last year, and though our space precludes

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any lengthened remarks, we very cheerfully request our friends to read carefully the paragraph which relates to this interesting organization. A series of meetings have been held around the village in the hope of securing a large amount of interest, and have been eminently successful. So much so that our good Secretary was obliged after the meeting had commenced to add several sums to his list of contributions, and we are sure our friends will agree with us that the following returns are highly commendable, \$50 92 for stock, \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$10 to Upper Canada, and \$20 to Montreal Bible Society. We anticipate another year of success in Uxbridge.

Stouffville is still holding on: we would like to see the the Uxbridge spirit infused into this branch. I received \$22 08 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society.

Markham maintains her interest in the work of Bible circulation. I received \$17 25 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$44 08 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

I next visited Scarboro', and for once the weather proved propitious; we had an excellent meeting. No branch is better managed than this excellent organization. The following donations were made: \$60 75 to the British and Foreign, \$30 37 to the Upper Canada, and \$30 37 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Our next meeting was at Acton, and here, too, we have reason to rejoice in the increasing efficiency of our liberal friends. In addition to paying for a good supply of stock we received \$40 to the British and Foreign, \$19 to the Upper Canada, and \$19 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Orangeville shews a fine balance sheet this year and is very liberal. We had a crowded meeting, and were delighted to witness the christian courtesy of our Primitive Methodist friends. They had assembled in Conference, and were kind enough to adjourn one of their important meetings, to give themselves and their friends an opportunity of attending our meeting. We had some excellent addresses from several of their ministers. I received \$40 purchase account, \$35 free contribution to the British and Foreign, \$10 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

From our little Society in Mono Centre I received \$5 24 on purchase account, and \$3 25 to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the circulation among the Jews.

Mono Mills, owing to the state of the roads had not been able to complete its returns. I received \$9 as a free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Our branch at Charleston is in excellent working order, and with the Caledon West branch is prosecuting the work with energy and zeal; the former had not completed its returns till after my visit from the latter. I received \$20 donation to British and Foreign, and \$11 30 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

I next visited Nairn which is usefully holding on and received \$15 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Carlisle is somewhat behind hand this year. We had an interesting meeting, after which I received \$14 to be placed to their credit on purchase account.

Ancaster is in fine working order, and has faithfully discharged her duties. I received \$20 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$20 to the Montreal, and \$20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Nassagaweya also claims special mention. After a small but interesting meeting I received \$25 to the British and Foreign, \$10 to the Upper Canada, and \$7 17 to the Montreal Bible Society. A warm friend of the Society, John Youart, jun., Esq., of whose death we we heard more than twelve months ago, who was for several years the largest contributor in connection with this branch, did not forget us on the prospect of leaving this world. Several years before his decease he made a will which he had re-made some six months before he died, leaving one-half of his property at the death of his wife to the Bible Society, till which time his executors are to pay \$8 per annum. This is the largest bequest we have ever received in Canada.

Our meeting at Dundas was a very interesting one. We have an excellent band of officers in this town, and the Society is in a most flourishing condition. I received \$ to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and \$ to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Although I was not able to close my meetings by 31st March, I was more fortunate than last winter, as I have been enabled, though sometimes with the greatest difficulty to keep all my appointments. May another year be even more signally prosperous.

TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE U. CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

GUELPH, June 2nd, 1862.

The time has come when my duty requires me to present a report of my past and last year's labours as one of the Agents of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and this duty is all the more pleasant to myself because in the face of almost unequalled difficulties the friends of our Society have given a most plain proof of their undiminished interest in work of Bible circulation.

The work has moved on with more than usual quietness during the past year, and there are few striking incidents that require or even admit any special prominence in the Annual Report. Most of the branches have advanced a little, or at least nobly held their own; while in the cases where there has been apparent diminution, it would be unfair and invidious to single them out for the public gaze, because few, if any, have failed through lack of interest or zeal, and the diminution almost always has arisen from causes which, if fully known, would leave no reflection on the zeal of those who seem to have failed in reaching the attainments of former years.

There are many features of the work especially encouraging. There is evidently a growing acquaintance with the nature and extent of the operations of the Bible Society, which has increased the interest and liberality of the contributions to the cause. There is a determination to make the Society a practical benefit at home, while at the same time there is no diminution in the desire to send the word of God abroad; and I cannot speak too highly of the efforts of those who have visited the homes of the ignorant, the vicious and the ungodly; who have visited hotels, ships, prisons and asylums, and left behind them the precious word of life.

Particular mention deserves to be made of the Ladies' Bible Association at Simcoe and Dover, and the youngest and most successful one at Ingersoll. These Associations have done the double duty of spreading the word at home and collecting large sums to send it to the regions beyond. Could all the females of Canada know the self-denying patience and labour of those Associations, could they but learn the measure of their success in this good work, I am sure that it would not be long before we should have innumerable calls upon the services of Rev. J. Vicars of Ingersoll, who is the father of this movement here, and soon not a village that would not follow the noble example of the three places I have mentioned above.

It is also pleasing to record the fact that the interest is becoming more general in our country, and is gradually drawing the ministers and people of all denominations into a more hearty and liberal coöperation. The spread of the Bible is felt to be the work of the Church of Christ, and cannot therefore be left to the resources of any one denomination of the Church; and while it is felt to be a duty that all ought to take as their own, it is felt to be a privilege which all can partake; and few sights, even in the Church of God, are more lovely than "Brethren dwelling together in unity" around the Bible Society. There are some of the old veterans of the cause who stood fast and firm to the Society when its days were dark and its friends were few, such as the Rev. Messrs. Flood, of Delaware, and Brough, of London, who were Bible Society men before a majority of the present ministers of Canada were born; who feel now almost like Simeon of old, when they seek the position of the cause in the country.

The past year has not been without success among the Romanists of Canada. Prudential reasons demand that in this matter no printed report should be too specific, for in Canada as everywhere, Rome hates and fears the Bible.

It has been usual in the annual reports to make particular mention of the several branches. Such a course soon becomes one of most dry detail and tedious repetition, without effecting any good, except ministering to the vanity of those who do not need any flattery, and I shall therefore avoid it. All parties can easily turn to the statistical tables and see the result of the operations for the year; but I shall this year, as I did last year, present a short comparative statement by which at a glance you may see the state of the Western division this year as compared with the year before:

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As this report concludes my work in the Agency, it becomes my pleasing duty to thank the many kind friends who have helped me so much for the work's sake; of their kindness I will cherish a life-long remembrance, and I trust they will ever give to my successor the right hand of fellowship as they gave it to me. The cause in Canada will not admit the loss of any old friends, nor any abate-

ment in former interest. We owe it to Christ, to the Church, to the world, and to our country, to make the Bible Society a part of the very being of our colony, to grow with our growth and to strengthen with our strength.

The time is come when men and churches and nations will be strong and stable only as they live and labour for the cause of Christ. Christ has brought about the time when He will claim more of the earth for Himself, and "the nation and kingdom that will not serve Him shall perish." He will shake terribly the earth, so that only those things that cannot be shaken may remain. And that our beloved Canada may be among the righteous nations that hold fast and hold forth the truth, is the prayer of

The business of the committee was merely to receive contributions and subscriptions and take steps with regard to their disposal.

Your committee have further to state that a circular has been received from the Secretary of the East Williams Branch Bible Society respecting Colportage throughout this western district. The object is no doubt an important and interesting one, but your committee agreed to postpone the considering of the matter until the society's agent would visit us, which although later this year than usual, we hope to receive a visit at no distant date.

In conclusion your committee desire to express their gratitude to Almighty God for the measure of success which has attended our efforts during the year, although our prospects seemed dark and gloomy at the beginning, yet in the end our utmost hopes have been exceeded; this under God we may justly attribute to the efficient manner in which our lady collectors discharge their duties. By the liberality of the people and the persevering energies of our collectors, we are now in a position to appropriate some \$12 more this year than last as a free donation to the good cause.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALDBOROUGH BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY
FOR THE YEAR ENDING 16TH OCTOBER, 1861.

In presenting their Annual Report your committee deem it a fitting occasion for recording, in their own name, and in the name of the Society, their gratitude to Almighty God for his unmerited goodness to us all, in not only sparing our lives so that we are permitted to assemble again at our Annual meeting, but also in continuing to us during another year, undiminished tokens of His favor and love. In view of these things we do well to set up our "Ebenezer" with the grateful acknowledgment that "hitherto the Lord hath helped us." Nor is the return of our anniversary less fitted to remind us impressively, of the rapid progress of time. It seems but as yesterday when the respected Agent of the Bible Society paid us his last visit, and yet when viewed more narrowly how large a portion of an ordinary life is seen to have since elapsed; how many of the human family, some of them known to ourselves, and one of them a respected member of your committee have finished their earthly career. And what momentous events have since taken place in the world; in all these respects the lessons of the year addressed to us, may be summed up in the emphatic language of

that Book which we profess to believe ourselves, and which it is our aim to put into the hands of others, as their only sure guide in all matters of faith and practice. "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might, for there is no work nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom, in the grave whither thou goest."

Your committee have nothing special to report as to any striking or tangible fruits of your labors during the past year, as a stimulus to exertion during the coming year. They cannot tell what good may have been done even among ourselves, by means of copies of the scriptures supplied by our own Depository, much less can they tell what good may have resulted from the moderate sum contributed by you last year, for the free circulation of the scriptures in other lands. They are not endowed with that ubiquity that would enable them to follow the 200 Bibles, that may be supposed to have been thus given by you, to so many individuals or families, who perhaps had never read the Bible before, and report to you the result in each case; but surely it is not too much to believe that He who knoweth all things, knows that souls formerly in darkness are being enlightened, and souls formerly lost are being saved, by means of these very Bibles put in circulation by you.

But your committee do know and can report, with certainty, for your encouragement, that the Bible has been producing powerful effects upon the world, and especially during the past year. The triumphs of Bible truth, in the conversion of sinners, and in the enlargement of Christ's kingdom, has afresh set its soul of confirmation to it, as "the Rod of Jehovah's strength" for the subjugation of this rebellious world, to his own righteous sway. Nor is its efficiency as an instrument of the Divine government, less conspicuous in those civil convulsions and revolutions, that have rendered the past year so memorable in the annals of time. Whether in Italy or in the United States we need be at no loss, even amidst the confusion and violence produced by human passions, to trace the Bible in its own majestic and invincible power, waging war with despotism and oppression, for the release of captives, as the necessary condition of their spiritual freedom—an unchallenged right to "serve the Lord Christ." It is a significant fact that modern warfare, whatever may be its ostensible cause, has generally the effect of opening the way for the Bible, and creating a demand for it; "I came" said Christ, "not to send peace on earth but a sword." The Bible is Heaven's Royal charter for securing freedom and salvation to an enslaved and lost world. "Know ye the truth and the truth shall make you free." And if we enjoy that liberty ourselves, in its twofold aspect, and realize our indebtedness to the Bible, as the instrument of our freedom, can we doubt its being one of our first duties, and one of our highest privileges to assist in sending it to those who are without it, and to follow it with our prayers that it may "prosper in the thing whereto it is sent."

As regards the manner in which your committee have discharged the trust committed to them. During the past year they may in general state, that they have followed the same method that was adopted last year, and reported at our last annual meeting, and they take this opportunity of thanking those ladies who again gave them such valuable assistance as collectors.

They have endeavoured to keep your Depository supplied, with copies of the Scriptures, in number and variety, corresponding to the demand. They may however state, as an apparent exception to this, that they have been unable to get Gaelic Bibles in large type suitable for aged persons, though they have repeatedly written for them. Sales have been very small, because as is supposed the neighbourhood is pretty well supplied already, though there is reason to suspect that many families satisfy themselves with too

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meagre a supply; perhaps in some cases two or three Bibles are regarded as a sufficient supply for a large family, whereas no family should consider themselves as adequately supplied, till they have a Bible for every one that can read, till each old and young had *his own* Bible. No case came under the notice of your committee during the year, requiring gratuitous supply, though it is proper to keep in mind, that the committee are authorized to give a Bible to any poor person, that applies for it, or is known to need it.

When the Agent visited these parts last year, he formed a new Branch at Duart, with promising prospects. We rejoice in this, as opening another channel of Christian benevolence in the neighborhood, and wish it "God speed," but it is proper to remark, that it has somewhat narrowed our field of operations in that direction. and diverted some former contributions to this society, into that channel. Your committee have aimed all along, to keep the society on an independent footing, as regards pecuniary matters, and they are happy to be able again to report it free from debt.

As the Treasurer's Report will furnish a detailed statement of the business and finances of the society; you are referred to it for information of that kind.

In conclusion your committee would remind the society that their motto in so good a cause should be "*onward*:" and there is reason to hope, that as God has this year blessed us with a plentiful harvest, the people will find a fitting expression of gratitude, in an enlarged liberality during the year, in the furtherance of his cause.

REPORT OF THE ARTHUR BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Committee of the Arthur Branch Bible Society beg to submit their fifth Annual report.

At the commencement of the present year, your Committee paid over the balance of last year's collection amounting to \$15 31 to the Upper Canada Tract Society, to be placed to their credit on purchase account. During the summer, Stock to the amount of \$41 44 was purchased, this brought the Society in debt \$26 56, which has been discharged in full from the proceeds of sales, and we have now \$36 81 worth of stock on hand.

It may be interesting here to give a brief account of what has been done by the Society since its commencement.

During the first year the sales were, Bibles 13, Testaments 33, Subscriptions \$8. Second year, Bibles 7, Subscriptions \$11 67. Third year, Bibles 7, Subscription \$10 07. Fourth year, Bibles 22, Testaments 28, Subscriptions \$34 04. Fifth year, Bibles 30, Testaments 43, Subscriptions \$35 95. Total number of volumes circulated 181. Total amount of subscriptions \$99 73. In thus reviewing the past your Committee feel thankful for what has been accomplished when all the disadvantages with which we have been surrounded are taken into consideration.

The claims of the Society are beginning to be better understood than they were formerly, and we feel confident, that they only require to be known, to be appreciated and liberally responded to.

The committee have been endeavouring to carry out the important objects for which the society was instituted, to furnish the Word of God at a cheap rate to the inhabitants of the Township, and to assist in the blessed work of diffusing it throughout the world, in connection with that noble institution the British and Foreign Bible Society. God, in his goodness has been pleased to favor us with the word of life which he has not given to many of our fellow creatures, while they are living in heathen darkness, sunk in ignorance on the most important of all subjects, we have His word as the light of our feet and the lamp of our path to regions of immortal felicity. The Apostle asks what advantage then hath the Jew or what profit is there in circumcision? to which he replies much every way, but chiefly, because unto them he hath committed the oracles of God. If this was a great advantage to the Jew, how much more to us, who have the New Testament Scriptures as well as the Old. In gratitude for his goodness, it is our duty to use our efforts and our means to diffuse the knowledge of His word and will among those who have it not. The society has not been without success in this object. Since the commencement of the society sixty seven bibles have been sold, (one having been given gratuitously) and thirty-one Testaments. The debt of the society has been nearly discharged as will be seen by the Treasurer's account; and twenty-five dollars was given to the British and Foreign Bible Society to assist it in sending the scriptures to all nations of the world. Greater efforts are being made by the Church of Christ to send the Gospel to those who have it not than at any other period of its history, and it is necessary that the Word of God should be prepared and sent along with the missionary. This your society is endeavouring to assist in doing. May the Lord hasten the time when the knowledge of God

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shall cover the earth, as the waters cover the channel of the great deep. The term of office of your committee now expires, and it rests with you to choose new office-bearers.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BRANTFORD BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Brantford Branch of the Bible Society was held at the Wesleyan Methodist Church Brantford, on the evening of Monday, 17th inst. The President of the Society, Rev. J. C. Usher, occupied the chair, and there were present on the platform, Rev. William Pollard (Wesleyan), Rev. J. R. Swift (Primitive Methodist), Rev. J. Alexander

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(Baptist), Rev. M. Fawcett (Wesleyan), Rev. J. Wood (Congregational), and others. The meeting being opened with prayer, the following annual report was read by the Secretary, Rev. John Wood:

The return of our anniversary and the review of our efforts in the cause of bible circulation, which is necessarily associated with it, ought to remind us of the deep obligations to Almighty God under which we have been laid by the blessings of another year. To but few countries or people are those words of the sacred volume as applicable as they are to us:—"He hath strengthened the bars of thy gates, He hath blessed thy children within them. He maketh peace in thy borders, and filleth thee with the finest of the wheat." Famine has numbered its victims by thousands, and war by its ten thousands in other lands, while we have been preserved from both these forms of devastation and death. We have, indeed, been threatened by similar judgments, but only long enough to make us value more the quietness and assurance we have so long enjoyed, and to shew us how slow to anger is He who has averted from us the fearful calamity. For all our blessings, both temporal and spiritual, we are indebted, instrumentally, to our possession of that Word, the circulation of which we are met to promote. Especially may we see its influence, under the Divine blessing, in preserving peace between our own and the neighboring country. We can not doubt that, under other circumstances, a war would have been precipitated, as disastrous to our spiritual as it must have been to our material interests. But England and America possess and love the bible—that bible which, while it cherishes and promotes everything that is truly manly and noble, teaches us, if it be possible, to live peaceably with all men—to love our enemies, and to forgive, as God, for Christ's sake, hath forgiven us; and presents to view an era, not far distant we hope, when "men shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks, and nations shall learn war no more." And these counsels of peace and moderations have prevailed, and the world has been spared the pain, the shame, the monstrous anomaly of beholding the two great Protestant nations of the earth—the two most enlightened and christianized that the world has ever known—engaged in fratricidal war! And what has prevented this? To the glory of its Divine Author, we say it was the Bible! or, what is the same thing, the christian principle operating alike through the people and the governments, by peaceful counsels and efforts, and especially by prayer. No candid mind, we think, can doubt it. Who, then, shall compute our indebtedness to the Bible, and to Him who has given us these "lively oracles," regarded from this point alone? To say nothing of its influence in promoting our material interests—agriculture, commerce, literature, and the arts and sciences, and of those vastly greater and more valuable blessings of "life and immortality brought to light through the gospel"—the averting of war alone should make us cling to our dear old Bible afresh, and infuse us with a new zeal to impart the Divine right to others who perish for lack of knowledge.

"Your Committee regret to have to report so little done during the past year in the way of direct effort for the circulation of the Holy Scriptures in the midst of our community. Early in the year a sub-committee was appointed to visit the hotels in the town for the purpose of supplying them with copies of the Word for the use of travellers. In this way, 101 small bibles and 8 larger ones for sitting rooms, were distributed, the reading of which, even if from no better motive than to beguile the time that often hangs so heavily on the hands of travellers, your committee hope and pray may lead some to think of the unseen land to which they are journeying and from which no traveller returns, and to prepare for it. One large bible was sent also to the

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Great Eastern, with the name of your Society upon it, to be placed in the grand saloon for the use of passengers. In addition to which, 14 bibles were given to the prisoners in the jail, and 12 New Testaments for the use of a Union Sabbath School at Onondaga.

The sales at the Depository have been smaller than for several years past, having amounted to only 209 Bibles and 302 New Testaments, making the issues in all, including those made gratuitously, 647 volumes, or a grand total of 10,790 since the organization of this Branch.

The receipts from sales, were, of course, in proportion. It is gratifying, however, to be able to say that the amount received in subscriptions and donations has not been much less than in 1860, the subscription lists showing contributions to the amount of \$348 92 against \$386 in the previous year. This diminution in the income of the Society, your committee regard as only *accidental*, and not at all indicative of and flagging of zeal on the part of its friends—a view of the case which they hope will be fully borne out when the collectors again present the claims of the Society to the public.

Of the amount placed at the disposal of your committee, \$80 were sent as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society, with a special view to the wants of the Canadian field; the balance, after meeting the incidental expenses of the Depository, was remitted to the British and Foreign Society, with instructions to expend it upon *Italy*, which just now presents “a great door and effectual” for the labourers in the employ of that noble institution, “though there are many adversaries.” May we not indulge the hope that He who has declared that “His word shall not return unto Him void,” will make use of our humble efforts to sow the seed of the truth in that long oppressed and benighted country, to raise up a glorious harvest around the very Vatican itself! “The Lord hasten it in his time.”

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BROOKLIN BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee, in making their regular annual report, are constrained, through a sense of gratitude, to return their sincere and hearty thanks to Almighty God for a continuation of multiplied blessings, both in a spiritual and a temporal point of view; and more especially so, when they contrast those blessings with the error, the gross error, which for ages in all its deplorable deformity has spread itself far and wide, enslaving man, wasting his energies, and blasting his prospects for time and eternity.

Your Committee are decidedly of the opinion that no better remedy can be desired for the benefit of the human race, to raise them to that high and lofty position for which they are evidently designed, than the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, as published by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

About the sixth century that arch-enemy of mankind, Mahomet, commenced his strange and wonderful career. The millions that have been ruined by him throughout Asia and a great part of Africa is truly appalling.

About the same period Romanism made its first decided move, and has been from that time to the present putting forth every effort worthy of a better cause, in darkening men's minds and ruining their souls. The Devil seemed determined, by these terrible brooms of error, to sweep everything in the shape of Christianity from the old world, and thereby take possession of the Eastern Hemisphere.

Providence opened up this country as a refuge for the oppressed, and in many respects for the down-trodden professor of Christianity; but even here there have not been wanting instrumentalities to carry on the work of soul-destruction—some in the spreading of the insidious doctrines of Universalism, some to propagate the deplorable system of Mormonism, remarkable only for its profanity and obscenity, while others in the unblushing work as soul-destructionists, coming as they do in direct contact with the plain declarations of God's word as well as with the most positive instructions of the Saviour.

Your Committee are satisfied that, notwithstanding the combined effort put forth by the old and new world, the Bible, the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible is the chief remedy that God has provided to counteract the terrible, direful, spiritual calamities of the day. At present it is pursuing the even tenor of its way, its doctrines explained and enforced by God-sent men, its promises exhibited to the world as well calculated to raise the hopes of mankind, whilst its awful threatenings appear to build a battlement around hell lest men should be exposed to its weepings, wailings and gnashing of teeth.

Already the Bible has accomplished much. Mahometanism is trembling to its very centre, the Scriptures are finding their way throughout the Turkish dominions, and the powers that be in that country have not sufficient power to resist it. Romanism is like a strong animal with the last drop of its life's blood oozing out from its vitals. It is stronger at its extremities than anywhere else. At Rome, in Italy, it is almost as weak as its decided opponents could wish it to be. The Bible is in Italy, on account of which and other causes that country is in a complete state of transition; so that evidently the day is not far distant when the height and power of Christianity shall be experienced and enjoyed from the Adriatic to the Mediterranean, from Calabria to the foot of the Alps; while in this country people are beginning to find out that Universalism is not very much calculated to light them through the dark valley of the shadow of death, and soul-destructionists in the last extremity of nature are constrained to fly to Christ.

Your Committee have not been altogether idle during the last two years in this great Bible movement; we only regret that we have not been more successful. The following is the Treasurer's report:

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE COBOURG BRANCH BIBLE
SOCIETY,

PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS, HELD IN THE
WESLEYAN CHURCH, FEBRUARY 5th, 1862.

To the Members of the Cobourg Branch Bible Society.

Your Committee in presenting a Report of their proceedings for the year with regard to work performed, have but little to state beyond the fact that the sales at the Depository have proceeded with regularity.

The total amount, however, falls considerably short of the sales of the previous year, in view of which your committee have recommended that arrangements be made for providing a supply of Bibles and Testaments in one or two stores in a central situation, in addition to the supply at the Depository.

The falling off of sales need not be taken as an evidence of diminished interest in the volume itself; for there is no reason for supposing that to be the case. It may partly be attributed to the fact that many bibles are now being printed and sold by private individuals, in which your committee see no cause for regret, except that in some cases a higher price may have been paid, than would have sufficed for the purchase at the Depository. But as the Apostle of the Gentiles did rejoice and would rejoice when Christ was preached, though not by himself, yet would your committee when the Word of God is circulated, though by other means than their own.

For some years past, no systematic effort has been made to ascertain whether the people of the town were supplied with the Bible, but from the fact that the locality has long been settled, that the means of grace abound, and that the people on the whole, are of a church going class; it is probable that for the most part they have the Bible in possession. But as the population of the town has changed very considerably of late years, it might be well, if an effort were made to ascertain the exact truth, and your committee commend the subject to your attention.

Out of the funds on hand last year, grants have been made to the Upper Canada £5; to the British and Foreign £5; and to the Montreal Bible Society £5; the last being to assist in keeping a Colporteur among the French Canadians.

This is a donation of special importance in the circumstances of our country. The French Canadians for the most part are devout and obedient Romanists, and by far the larger number of them (for the population is mainly rural) know not the Word of God. The entrance of that word giveth light, as we know, and it is the only sure guide to salvation. No object then can be deemed more worthy of the attention of those who wish their country well, and none is more likely to bear lasting fruit, than the endeavour to disseminate the Bible in their own tongue, amongst this large class of our countrymen. This can only be done by means of the Colporteur or Bible Hawker, who visits the villages and farm houses with his packet of Bibles and Testaments persuading the people to buy. Colportage is now carried on with great regularity and success amongst the Roman Catholic population of France, and with regard to efforts in Canada, though they may appear small in comparison with the evil to be overthrown, we may hope for the blessing of the Most High for success. A small charge of powder when kindled by a spark, will shatter a rock to atoms; and this great mountain of superstition may, even by the efforts of a despised Zerubbabel, become a plain. For it is not by might, nor by power, as they are estimated among men, but by my spirit that the result is accomplished, saith the Lord of Hosts.

Owing to the earlier visit of the Agent than usual this year, the collectors have not yet made their annual appeal to the friends of the cause for their subscriptions, but hope they will meet with a generous response when they do.

The heavy expense attending the operations of the Upper Canada Bible Society is, by not a few, frequently urged as a reason for withholding that aid which otherwise would be given towards the support thereof.

In conclusion your Committee cannot but recognise the necessity of combination in the work assigned them, knowing that "union is strength," and organization the keystone of success, they look for a more vigorous and energetic support. Dark clouds will from time to time intercept the progress of their labors, still they continue to hope that such momentary gloom may only exist to reveal a following brightness.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DUNNVILLE BRANCH OF THE UPPER
CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY FOR THE YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 15, 1861.

The Committee of the Dunnville Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society in presenting their Annual Report desire to record their gratitude to Almighty God for the measure of success which has attended their efforts during the past twelve months. Particularly does it give them pleasure to announce, that the number of books issued during the past year has been greater than on any previous year since the organization of the Society in this place. The total number disposed of has been 487 copies. This, however, includes 44 copies sold at Wellandport by Samuel Holmes, Esq., who at the request of your Committee took charge of a Branch Depository for that neighborhood in December last. Deducting the sales thus made at Wellandport, there have been issued from the Depository in Dunnville, by Mr. Hugh Asher, 443 copies, being more than three times the number of last year's sales, the whole number sold last year having been 105. Of the 487 copies issued this year there were, 131 Bibles, 348 New Testaments, and 5 Psalm Books. One Bible and two New Testaments were given gratis to poor persons. Your Committee can not but look upon it as a token for good that there has been so great a demand for the Word of life in the community around us. May the Divine blessing accompany the reading of these sacred volumes wherever they have gone.

It should be stated that nearly one half of the copies sold have been for Sabbath Schools. In order to give greater facilities for Sabbath Schools being well supplied your Committee agreed in February last to sell the cheap

Bibles and Testaments at half price when ordered in quantities for Sabbath School purposes; that is to say, the 20 cent Bibles at 10 cents each, and the 10 cent Testaments at 5 cents each. Since that time there has been a large demand for this class of books. Of course the deficiency occasioned by this reduction has to be made up by the general subscriptions.

Your Committee have also pleasure in reporting that, notwithstanding the pressure of the times at present, the subscriptions paid at Dunnville exceed those of last year by \$7.19. The amount from Wellandport, however, is smaller. The total subscriptions paid for this year amount to \$53.86.

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXETER AND FRANCETOWN
BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR 1861.

Through the great goodness and mercy of our God this Branch Society has been privileged to hold its second Anniversary meeting. An entire year has gone its round since we last met, and during that period a great many events have taken place all filled with deep interest to nations and peoples. But as a branch Bible Society we are interested in a still more important event than either of these, and which goes to still the troubled passions and sheath the sword—to give hope to the dying and comfort to the distressed and bereaved. This event is the Bible—it is God proclaiming peace to men since Adam fell down to the pre-

sent moment, and blessed be God that he has called us as a Society to become interested in this most noble, most divine and heavenly event; to aid in sending this bible to all peoples, announcing this great and glorious peace. It is now the duty of your Committee to furnish you with a report of their doings for the past year. During that period five meetings have been held, and at all of these meetings business of more or less interest was transacted for the benefit of the Society. In the outset your committee deemed it necessary to have the stock of bibles, &c., in the Depository insured, which was accordingly done. For the better diffusion of the scriptures within the limits of the branch, the ministers connected with the same were requested to call the attention to the depository, that all might be supplied with a copy of God's word, and from the Depository's account, which will afterwards appear, the effort has been blessed with success. Your Committee had some correspondence with the Committee of Williams Branch, relating to the employment of a colporteur, in the person of Mr. John Finlayson. This person has been employed for a considerable period as colporteur by the Williams branch, and his labours have been abundant and successful, especially were they so among the Roman Catholic population which he visited, of whom we have not a few within the limits of our branch. It was the desire of the Williams Branch to extend the sphere of Mr. Finlayson's labours into our branch, that we might thereby assist in the expense of the work. Your Committee considered the matter and replied that they gladly would accept of Mr. Finlayson's services for a given period on trial; and but for an accident which occurred to him at that time, laying him aside from active work, we no doubt ere this would have been cheered with reports of his work. At a later period of the year your Committee had a circular from the Williams Branch Committee, inviting a co-operation of different branches to carry out within their limits a system of colportage, and appointing a meeting of delegates from the different branches, to meet at Nairn to discuss the question. This matter was also considered by your Committee and two delegates were appointed to meet at the place and time mentioned in the circular. Nothing as yet has arisen from this move, as the delegates were prevented from meeting because of the unfavorable state of the roads and weather at the time the meeting was to be held. During the past year the number of copies of the Scriptures sold at the Depository is 375, exceeding were 169 bibles and 206 testaments. Proceeds of sales, \$93 59. Your Committee will now present a financial statement of the Society at the present time.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EVERTON BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

During the past year your committee have had reason to feel the responsibility of the position they occupy, being entrusted with business of such great and paramount importance, viz: the circulation of the Word of God; we should all be thankful that we have had opportunities to see the light. 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FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDEN MILLS BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, 13TH DECEMBER, 1861.

As it is little more than seven months since we last met together, and our present meeting is so much earlier than usual, your Committee have but very little to present to you this evening by way of report.

The work of spreading abroad the Word of Life is still going on, and it is our glorious privilege to aid in this work; and although it is but little we can do towards helping it in its onward progress, let us nevertheless do what we can with a single eye to the glory of Him whose cause it is, and for whose blessing upon our exertions we have every encouragement to pray. To the Jews of old were committed the oracles of God; these they held in safe keeping until Shiloh came, and then these same oracles were by him commanded to be made known to the Gentile world. And although ages of darkness and heathenish ignorance followed after the first dissemination of the tidings of salvation through the crucified Saviour, yet that same darkness is being gradually dispelled, by the light of the glorious gospel being brought to shine in many of the dark places of this world; and the preaching of Jesus Christ according to the revelation of the mystery which was kept secret since the world began, is now made manifest, and by the scriptures of the prophets, according to the commandment of the everlasting God, made known to the nations for the obedience of faith. Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. The word of God must be scattered like seed sown, and although but a small portion of it has as yet been sown on a fruitful soil, yet we are not to be discouraged and relax our efforts to extend the knowledge of a Saviour to every nation under heaven, that they may put their trust in him to the praise of his glory. It is said by St. Paul, of the Ephesian Church, "In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation." If it is the gospel of salvation to us who dwell in this enlightened and professedly Christian land, will it not likewise prove the word of truth and the gospel of salvation to the darkened inhabitants of other lands, to whom it is the glorious privilege of the Bible Society to send the scriptures of truth? Yes, blessed be God, it will; for the word of truth declares to the expectant Church, "Fear not for I am with thee, I will bring thy seed from the East, and gather thee from the West, I will say to the North give up, and to the South keep not back; bring my sons from far and my daughters from the ends of the earth, even every one that is called by my name."

The last report of the British and Foreign Bible Society affords every encouragement to the people of God to persevere in their exertions to introduce the Word of God to every land, and since that report was published another wide door and effectual has been opened in the removal by death of the cruel and tyrannical Queen of Madagascar, who persecuted the Christians of that island with such severity that many of them sealed their testimony with their blood. The accession of her son to the throne, who it is said has always professed Christianity, and opened that island to the missionary of the cross, will do doubt stimulate the friends of the Bible cause to send an abundance of the scriptures there. It is lamentable to think that there are several professedly Christian nations who refuse to receive the scriptures, and are consequently trusting to vain refuges, yet it is nevertheless pleasing to hear that the heathen are reaching forth their hands for the inestimable

treasure, and will we are persuaded soon be enabled to read and hear, every one in his own tongue, the wonderful works of God.

Since our last meeting, there has been sold from your Depository fourteen bibles and five testaments; and an addition has been made to the stock, of twelve bibles and twelve testaments, and the value of stock at present on hand is \$25 25. Although the amount of sales may appear to you to be small, yet your committee are persuaded that there is not a protestant family in this neighborhood unsupplied with a bible. May the Lord grant that it may not be a sealed book to them, but may He pour out upon us all an abundant and refreshing supply of his Holy Spirit, opening our understandings that we may understand the Scriptures, which are able to make us wise unto salvation, through faith in Christ Jesus.

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REPORT OF THE FERGUS BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY,
ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD THE 16TH OF JANUARY, 1862.

The Committee of the Fergus Branch Bible Society, on the occasion of their annual meeting, in place of presenting a full report as usual, can only furnish an abstract for the past year, as the meeting is held nearly a month earlier than it has ever been since the Branch was organized. The collections for the Society have only been partially made in the country districts; and it is impossible to say at present what funds may be at the disposal of the Branch for the purpose of aiding the parent societies in their God-like enterprise of sending the sacred Scriptures throughout the world. The Committee rejoice to believe that the work is a hopeful one, and that the promoters of such schemes as the Bible Society contemplates will be seconded in their efforts by the christian community; and considering that there is increased need for greater exertions, as the doors which have hitherto been closed are gradually being opened, they would cherish the hope that in their own highly favored situation the work is in some good measure appreciated as it deserves, and that they may be able to send such a sum this season to help it on as will not be altogether unworthy of those who possess the privilege of an *open* Bible, and the regular administration of Gospel ordinances.

The sales of copies of the Holy Scriptures since last annual meeting have not equalled those of the former year; 48 bibles and 58 testaments being all that have been sold at the depositories in Fergus. 27 bibles and 19 testaments were lost to the Branch by the late calamitous fire in Fergus: the loss, however, has partly been made up by the liberality of Mr. MacMullen, the Depository, and the balance will be readily met. The value of the stock in his hands was \$15. The Committee have never insured any part of their stock, as it is distributed among four different depositories. There stands at the credit of the Branch, with the Depository in Douglas, the sum of \$17 82, being value of the stock there at the dissolution of its connection with the Fergus Branch; and in consequence of the formation of the Garafraxa Branch at Douglas the receipts at Fergus are, of course, smaller this season, as the services of three collectors were withdrawn. What is lost, however, in this one quarter, is gained, and probably more than gained to the Society in another. The receipts are likewise smaller, from a larger stock than common remaining now in the Depositories in Fergus, viz., 203 bibles and 174 testaments; but the Committee have now sufficient funds to discharge all liabilities, and to meet in part the donation which they propose forwarding to the Parent Society, when the collectors' lists have been all returned.

ANNUAL REPORT OF GEORGETOWN BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Another year has rolled its precious moments amongst the now remembered past, reminding us as a community of our deep indebtedness to Almighty God for his preserving care over us during another year. Also of our great obligations to the exalted and honored institution whose anniversary we are this evening met to celebrate. It also reminds us of the fleeting nature of time, whose lesson to us should be, “Whatsoever thine hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might.”

We hereby record our gratitude for the pleasant places in which the lines have fallen to us.

Your Committee, in reporting of the operations of the past year, cannot point to many particular incidents of individual interest in connection with the work, owing to a full supply of the Word and ordinances already enjoyed by us; but are happy to state that this Branch, as a whole, has fully sustained its efforts of former years, with much less trouble, in some instances, to our vigorous staff of collectors. This we look upon as an indication for good, showing an evident growth of christian liberality, and the fast approaching permanency of that vital and spiritual principle which has for its object the sowing of the good seed of the kingdom beside all waters; and not until we find “that righteousness which exalteth a nation” covering the earth as the waters do the channels of the great deep, can we behold its immense energies, in its onward, honored, blessed work—a work fraught with love to perishing man—a work which takes the whole earth for its field—before which eventually the darkness of Heathenism must be made light; the delusions of Mahomedanism must be swept away; the discontent of Infidel Idealism must be overturned; and that bloodthirsty and tyrannical fictitious form of Christianity with a name to live while dead, must be purged and brought to the truth as it is in Christ. GODERICH BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING.

This evening (25th February, 1862), the Goderich Branch of the Bible Society held its annual public meeting in the Wesleyan Church, when Mr. H. D. Cameron, Vice-President, in the absence of the President, took the chair. The Rev. Mr. English opened the meeting with prayer; and the Reports of the Treasurer and Secretary were read.

Moved by the Rev. Mr. Caswell, and seconded by his Honour Judge Cooper, and

Resolved, That the Reports now read be adopted.

REPORT OF THE GODERICH BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

In presenting their reports for the past year, your Committee would direct your attention to the Treasurer's and Depository's report as an evidence that more than an average amount of business has been done by this Branch of the Society, and that God has smiled upon their labours.

Goderich has had its season of deep anxiety in reference to Divine things; and your Committee would hope that the wickedness of some has been arrested; that the knowledge of Divine truth of some has been increased; and that the piety of some in this place has been rendered more alive and spiritual than before. There is still too much of sectarianism, unfruitfulness, and death in all the Churches; and there is a large proportion of this population, both old and young, who live as if there were no God; and, be it remembered, that many of these are members of professedly Christian families. It cannot be that earnest prayer is not presented to God on their behalf. But your Committee feel that something more than this should be done; and that your Society, and other living Christians, should do something more effectual and appropriate than heretofore to meet the case of all during the coming year.

In looking abroad upon the world, though the events of the past year have been very different from those anticipated by ardent Christian minds, yet enough every where appears to show that God reigns; and enough displays itself in the character of the events of the past year, to demonstrate the superiority of Jehovah's plans, indeed, "that the foolishness of God is wiser than man," that He is not slack to overthrow oppression and superstition and establish Christ's Kingdom in its spirituality and power, and that He will do so at the proper time. True, civil war still reigns in the United States of America, ought we not to feel, however, that the continuation of the struggle is necessary to the permanency and efficiency of the good to be achieved by it. True, in Syria, anarchy and malignant Mahometan hatred are strong, and the human arm, stretched out "to defend the right," is weak, yet is it not often in these circumstances that the Lord purifies and spiritualizes the Church. True, in China, still rebellion plants its iron heel on the most sacred interests and sympathies of man, and even the blood of the missionaries of the cross (at peace with all mankind) have been shed. In these circumstances man is apt in pain to say, "Where is the God of these missionary friends? Has He forgotten to be gracious?" Piety feels that He does reign, but that His ways are not as our ways, and His thoughts are not as ours—that, indeed, the iniquity of the Amorites is not yet full; and that that fullness is necessary to the maturity of His plans for their emancipation; and that it is our contracted vision that is incapable of comprehending the harmony of His operations which causes our disquietude. Should not our faith rather demonstrate to us that He who brought order and beauty out of

primitive chaos, will make love, and truth, and holiness, take the place of present misery in that vast country as soon as His glory and their good will admit of it; and that, too, without the slightest violation done to the moral constitution of any one.

Your Committee, in looking at India, and, indeed, upon the world, as a field of Missionary and Bible operation, feel convinced that it is far more ready to receive that operation than the Church is to put it forth. She is wanting in the simplicity, the purity, and the spirituality of the gospel, and, consequently, she is wanting in that efficiency which is necessary to make her a fit instrument in Jehovah's hand for the accomplishment of His work. Your Committee, however, look with deep gratitude to God to the development of the gospel in Britain during the last year. It seems to have been deepening its hold upon the masses of the people, penetrating to classes hitherto ignored by the Church, and bursting forth into fresh life and vigour, and moral loveliness. Surely it cannot be wrong to view Britain (hitherto the distinguished champion of Jehovah's cause) as now clothing herself with fresh moral and spiritual strength, that she may have greater fitness for going forth to evangelize the world, as now whetting her sword, and preparing her armour to go forth and fight with greater success than ever before under the banner of the Cross. Let us pray that God would lead the Colonies, and Canada at their head, and Goderich in the front ranks, to join the mother country in this labour of preparation, to fight with her in the coming struggle, and to participate with her in her glorious triumphs.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LONDON BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee in presenting a report for the year just closed have but few details to relate. The operations of the Society have been conducted in the usual manner and with the usual results.

The stock in the several depositories has been kept up by fresh supplies from Toronto, fresh stock to the value of \$391.51 having been received during the year. An additional deposit of the Society's books has also, at the request of Messrs. Taylor & Wilson, been left in their store, so that the Holy Scriptures, as provided by the Society, are now presented to the public at four different places.

There is stock now on hand to the value of \$609.85, being above the value of the stock in hand at the same date last year by \$65.97. It was lately examined by members of the Committee and compared with the invoices and found to be correct and in good order, with the exception of some cheap Bibles which had been long on hand and were quite shop worn. These the Depository was instructed to reduce in price, making a reduction in the whole number of seven dollars below original value.

The number of issues during the year has been, of Bibles 434, and of Testaments 704, making a total of 1,138 copies, the aggregate value of which is \$328.84.

These have been issued in the form of sales, with the exception of a Testament in large print, which was given to a poor man in the Hospital.

Your Committee, through a deputation of three members, lately visited the Gaol, Hospital, and some of the Hotels, with the purpose of ascertaining whether there were copies of the Scriptures for the use of the inmates. They found that the Bibles and Testaments formerly granted to the Hospital were still there, but that those placed in the Gaol had disappeared, having been, as they supposed, either carried away or torn to pieces by the prisoners. The Committee ordered a fresh supply of six Bibles and six Testaments to be placed there, also two additional Testaments in large print to be sent to the Hospital, and three Bibles and twelve Testaments to be put in the rooms of the City Hotel.

The annual subscription in aid of the Society was lately taken up, which amounted to \$181.50, being \$30.28 more than the subscription of the previous year. The whole of this sum, with the \$18.50 additional, has been sent as a donation to be equally divided between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies, being \$100 to each.

It has put in circulation 1,138 copies of the Scriptures, has placed the Word of God in the hands of the inmates of our public institutions, and has given a contribution in aid of the Parent Societies of \$200, while it possesses in value \$612.21.

REPORT OF THE MILLBROOK (CAVAN) BRANCH OF THE UPPER
CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1861-2.

The Committee have to report that owing to a very severe snow storm on the night of the annual meeting, the gross amount collected by this Branch is a trifle less than the sum obtained last year. However, a most favourable effect was produced by the able and earnest appeal of the Agent, Mr. Johnson, on behalf of the Society, together with the excellent addresses delivered by the Revs. T. W. Allen, J. Sanderson, J. Douglas, and T. Hobbs. TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MILTON BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY AND 22ND OF THE SOCIETY'S OPERATIONS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY:—In the unceasing movement of time in its rapid flight into eternity, the season has again arrived when it becomes the duty of your Committee to appear before you and present a report of the proceedings of the past year.

While your Committee have nothing of special interest connected with your own Branch to report, it affords them much pleasure to witness the continued and unabated interest which the members of the Society and community at large manifest in the promotion of the noble object of the Institution with which we are associated—the dissemination among all nations of the priceless treasures of the word of God.

In our own immediate neighbourhood there happily exists but little necessity for the gratuitous distribution of the Scriptures through the agency of this Society, as nearly every family is amply supplied with this inestimable blessing. And while a Depository in our midst for the sale of the Bible is a great accommodation to the town and vicinity, our labours as a Branch necessarily partake largely of the missionary character, sending the word of God to the more destitute settlers and aborigines of our own Province and to the nations beyond.

During the past seventeen years this Branch has contributed for this purpose over \$1,500—\$430 to carry on the work in our own Province through the agency of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and \$1,100 to aid the British and Foreign Bible Society in the glorious work in which it is engaged. In addition to this liberal contribution this Society has issued from its Depository during the same period about 800 Bibles and 750 Testaments.

During the past year the contributions to the Society have been \$165 57, including a bequest by the late Mrs. John McPherson of Esquesing. \$100 have been given as a free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and \$80 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

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During the year 62 Bibles and 66 Testaments have been sold by the Society, and 10 Bibles donated to Homer's Hotel for the use of travellers.

When we reflect on the contents of the Divine volume—the subjects of which it treats—of man in his primitive purity, of his transgression and fall—of Christ—of His life, of His death, of his atonement, and of salvation and eternal life for fallen man through that atonement—subjects of intense interest and infinite importance to every individual, deeply affecting his welfare here, and upon a personal practical knowledge of which depends his eternal happiness—we realize, to some extent, the importance of the enterprise in which we are engaged, and the great honour which God hath put upon us in permitting us to be co-workers with Him in the accomplishment of this glorious work.

A consideration of the vast multitudes of the human race who are yet destitute of the Word of Life, and within whose reach it has never yet been brought, and of the darkness of error and superstition which, in consequence, hangs over them, should stimulate us to increased liberality and induce us to “do with our might” the work which God hath given us to do.

Your Committee are pleased to learn from various sources that this cause is progressing nobly. The receipts of the Upper Canada Bible Society for the last year were over \$1,500 in advance of the previous year, and with increased means they are prosecuting their labours with increased activity and zeal, and God is crowning them with success. The British and Foreign Bible Society, one of the noblest institutions which bless our earth, reports an increase of receipts of over £4,000 and extension of her efforts in almost every land. There are now connected with this society no fewer than 4,661 Auxiliaries, Branches or Associations, which in every quarter of the globe are benefiting and blessing our race by the circulation of nearly two millions of copies annually of the Word of Truth.

The degraded aborigines of America and the refined and polished semi-infidel of France—the insolent Hottentot and the cannibal Feegeian—the flowing millions of China and India and the scattered inhabitants of the frozen North, share alike the beneficent labours of this *noble Society*, which is quietly, but successfully, working out its glorious mission, and by the all-powerful lever which it controls is elevating and blessing the world. Your Committee feel that they but reiterate the aspirations of your hearts when they pray the Giver of every good in a very special manner to own and bless her continued efforts and crown them with abundant success.

In conclusion the Committee would urge upon the supporters of the Society the increased responsibility which rests upon them in view of the openings which are presenting themselves for the distribution of the Scriptures in Italy, China, India, and other parts of the world, to contribute still more liberally of their means to supply those who are hungering for the Bread of Life.

Your Committee in resigning their trust pray that the blessing of God may rest upon their successors in office, that in their hands the Society may go on and prosper and be abundantly successful in advancing the work of the Lord.

REPORT OF MOUNT FOREST BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee beg to submit the following brief Report of the proceedings of the Branch Bible Society for the past year :—

At the beginning of 1861 there were Bibles on hand to the value of ..\$83 42
 During the year additions were made to the Stock to the value of ... 79 70
 The Sales for the twelve months have been to the amount of 68 05
 And there is now Stock in the Depository to the value of 95 07

It may be remarked, that the Sales for the year have not been so large as some might desire. The fact, however, may be partly accounted for by the apparently trifling consideration, that for a time the situation of the Depository was not so accessible as it is now. And it may be hoped, that since the Stock may now be found in one of the most public places of the village, there will be a greater readiness in the sale.

There has been a considerable demand for copies of the Scriptures in Gaelic, and care has been taken to have a supply of that version constantly on hand.

Scarcely any application has been made during the year for copies without payment. But it is to be feared that the want of such applications can by no means argue the general possession of the Word of God. And it may be supposed that if greater publicity were given to the operations of the Society, there are many who might take advantage of the terms on which it offers to bring the Sacred Scriptures within reach of every family in the district.

The quarterly meetings of your Committee have been kept up with regularity, but they have not been attended as well as might be desired. This is unfortunate, for at these meetings much might be done to further the great interest in which the Society is engaged; and the hope is now expressed that the meetings will be better attended in future.

No steps have yet been taken to establish any system of colportage in the district; and it will remain for the Society, at its present meeting, to determine whether it would be expedient to introduce this new feature into its operations.

Your Committee cannot conclude without reminding the Society of the importance of the work which it is pledged to advance. It is by the circulation of the Word of God that we possess every national, and social, and family blessing. The Sacred Scriptures are alike the bulwark of the State, and the medicine of the soul. Where they are open to the eye of man, the arts flourish, liberty is secure, the laws are respected, and society is prosperous and happy. And to the quickening power which accompanies that holy volume may be traced every precious influence that restores our nature to its

lost dignity, and fits it for the sublime pursuits and unspeakable enjoyments of the eternal world. Happy is the people that is in such a case; and happy are we, if, ourselves having first tasted the blessedness of the heavenly gift, we are privileged to hold forth to others the word of life.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MOUNT PLEASANT BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Mount Pleasant Branch Bible Society was held here on the 18th February. The attendance was good—rather more numerous than had been for some previous years—and the entire audience manifested the deepest interest in the whole proceedings of the evening. The Rev. W. S. Ball, agent for the Society, gave a very interesting address on the various fields which Providence had prepared for the seed of the Word during the past year—waste places had been reclaimed, and fields which once appeared white and ready for the harvest, but where the “wicked one” has been reigning with undisputed sway for the past quarter of a century, were again prepared for the scattering of the truth of the Gospel. The Committee of the Nassagaweya Branch Bible Society, in making up this their Annual Report, feel that they have not accomplished all that might be desired; yet, they have done something towards spreading the inspired Word of God. Your Committee feel satisfied, as far as they can ascertain, that there are very few, if any, houses in this vicinity which do not contain a copy of the Bible; but should there be any destitute of that blessed book, they have only to make their case known to any of the Committee, and their wants will be supplied. Every institution has its rise and fall, at one time flowing with prosperity, at another, exposed to adversity—such has been the history of the Nassagaweya Branch Bible Society. In the year 1860, you gave as a free gift for the spread of the gospel the sum of \$62 69½; the following year, you gave to the same cause, the sum of \$35 68, although the people were suffering under a crisis which sent so many into the depths of poverty. And what shall we say for the present year, when the prospects of the country has been dark in the extreme, from the blighting frost of last spring, and the civil war in the neighbouring Republic, which seemed at one time to threaten our peaceful homes with the curse of war; but God, in his kind providence, has been with us, and kept us from the awful consequences, when man fights and kills his fellow man. And, my dear friends, after all those blessings, can we be so ungrateful to Him who has taken care of us, and protected us from so many dangers, and given us so many blessings which we all enjoy, as to put our hands into our pockets and say to ourselves—Stay there thou almighty dollar; I have got them, and I will not give one to assist in sending the blessed Word to those that are perishing for the want of that which has made me and my country what we are—the Bible. ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OWEN SOUND BRANCH
BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee beg to submit their eleventh Annual Report, as follows:

During the year past, this Society has been able to put forth more in Bible distribution than for some years past. The committee are glad to say that the liberality of the friends of the Bible has been very encouraging. A year ago, arrangements were made to have a Colporteur travel for three months in the County. Accordingly, Mr. John Dunn was sent up by the U. C. Bible Society, and began his labours in the beginning of February last. Mr. Dunn travelled through the townships of Sullivan, Holland, Derby, parts of Keppel and Sarawak, and parts of Sydenham and Arran. He found the people wherever he went, well disposed to receive him, and found occasion for religious conversation with a large number of families who were destitute of the public means of grace. Mr. Dunn disposed by sale of 185 Bibles, and 89 Testaments; and visited 692 families. He says in his report at the close of his labours, "I am happy to say that I have been most kindly received by all; even by Roman Catholics, from whom I had every mark of respect. * * * Many there are throughout the townships I visited, who would have supported your Society by contributing and purchasing, but were prevented from want of funds."

The committee hope that much good was accomplished through the visits of Mr. Dunn in the back settlements. The sub-committee, to whom was given authority to settle with the Colporteur, and whose action your committee at their next quarterly meeting approved, recommended that the satisfaction they felt respecting Mr. Dunn's labours and procedure, should be communicated to the U. C. Bible Society, who had sent him to us.

The expense to this Branch Society on account of colportage, was \$84 50. At the last annual meeting, which was of course after the date of the last Report, \$44 were handed over to the travelling agent, as a free grant to the U. C. Bible Society.

Your committee feel thankful that in a year when such extraordinary exertions for Bible circulation were needed, this Branch has been able to keep a Colporteur in the field, part of the year at home, and to assist in sending the bible abroad. The amount directly expended in bible effort, (distinct from payments on account of stock, or working expenses of the Society,) has been during 1861, \$128 50; in 1860 it was \$105; and in 1859, \$70.

Another object has largely engaged the attention of your committee through the year—the establishment of Branches in the townships around. Much correspondence has passed on the subject. In two of the neighbourhoods to which attention was specially directed, (Invermay and Walter's Falls,) Branch Societies, as your committee are glad to hear, have been formed during the year. At Woodford, a sub-committee was appointed, and a good collection taken up, which has been returned to the sub-committee in the shape of Bibles and Testaments from the Depository of this Society. Your committee hope to see Depositories established soon at Leith and Chatsworth.

The quarterly meetings of the committee have been punctually held, and well attended; and have been conducted with the utmost harmony and good will. As far as recollected, every resolution passed in the committee room during the year, has been by a unanimous vote. The Treasurer's Report now submitted, shows the income and expenditure of the Society; and the annual statement of the Depository shows the amount of sales and the stock in hand.

Your committee refer with gratitude to the generous support accorded to this Society by christians of all denominations in the town; and hope that in the future, as in the past, the BIBLE SOCIETY will never lack a willing advocate nor a generous donor.

THE TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCETON
BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

In drawing up a Report for the past year, the first thing that presents itself to our notice is the fact, that our last year's Report does not appear in the printed Report of the Parent Society of March last. The Report was carefully transcribed and put into the Post Office at Princeton, a few days after the last annual meeting; but, agreeably to the statement of the Depository in Toronto, it had not reached them. This is the more to be regretted, because great pains had been taken to wind up the affairs of the Society, and to present a fair statement of them. We begin the Report of the past year at the date of the last annual meeting; it then appeared that the Collectors had been very assiduous in the discharge of their duties, and that the sum of \$94 33c. was collected; this sum was voted as a free contribution to the funds of the Parent Society, and paid over into the hands of Rev. W. S. Ball, Agent, accordingly; incidental expenses being met, there were no funds left in the hands of the Treasurer.

At the close of the meeting, the Committee met, and enjoined the Sub-Committee to use their best endeavours to establish a Bible Depository in Drumbo, in connection with this Society, and authorized them to purchase Bibles and Testaments to the amount of twenty or twenty-two dollars.

The duty of the Sub-Committee is to attend to any business that may transpire during the year, and not requiring a full meeting of Committee; but as this Sub-Committee had never been fully organized, nothing was done in this matter until the annual meeting of the Committee in November last. At this meeting the Sub-Committee was re-appointed, and Mr. Manual Freeman chosen Convener of said Sub-Committee.

At the same meeting, a letter from the Corresponding Secretary was laid on the table, tendering the resignation of his office, and requesting the President to accept of the same.

The Committee found that they had no authority from the Constitution to act in such an emergency, and therefore drew up a resolution, acknowledging his services since the commencement of the Society, and requesting him to reconsider the matter, and continue in office at least till the next annual meeting: a copy of said resolution to be transmitted to him by the Minute Secretary.

After some discussion on several matters connected with the working of the Society, and a free expression of opinion, it appeared that the paramount duty of supporting the Bible cause harmonized all, and the Committee expressed their wish that the business of the Society should be conducted as it had hitherto been. Several young ladies were appointed Collectors, and their several districts assigned to them, and the Secretary was enjoined to furnish each Collector with a book for entering subscriptions.

The Committee adjourned to meet in Willis's Church, one hour before the commencement of the annual meeting.

The Committee met in Willis's Church, on Monday, the 20th January, 1862, at six o'clock: Mr. William Dickson, President, in the Chair. *Interalia*, the Sub-Committee presented their Report, a copy of which is as follows:—

It has long been the desire of the Committee to take some steps towards exciting an interest in the Bible cause amongst the population in and around Drumbo, which is the northern boundary of this Society; another Bible Society in the north, extending their operations so far south; and it has often been their expressed intention to establish a Depository there for the accommodation of the public; and the Committee, at their last meeting, re-appointed the Sub-Committee, and Mr. Manual Freeman was chosen Convener of the Sub-Committee; and the Committee had enjoined the Sub-Committee to make a division of the stock in the Princeton Depository, and to apply one-half of it in establishing a Depository at Drumbo. Following up these instructions of the Committee, the Convener called a meeting of the Sub-Committee, which was held in the Depository, on Thursday evening, the 28th November last, and there were present—Messrs. J. W. Scott, R. C. Beumer, J. G. Lemesay, the Corresponding Secretary, with the Convener.

The stock was then carefully inspected, and found to be in good condition. A paper, containing an account of the stock in the Princeton Depository, and the distribution for the new Depository in Drumbo, is herewith produced for the satisfaction of the Committee, from which it appears that there were at that time in the Princeton Depository, 104 volumes of Bibles and Testaments of different sizes and prices, amounting to \$60 46c., of which 56 volumes of Bibles and Testaments were set apart for the new Depository, amounting to \$40 06c., and leaving in the Depository at Princeton 48 volumes, amounting to \$20 40c. It may appear that there is a discrepancy between the value of stock assigned to the one Depository and the value of the stock left in the other; but this is easily accounted for, there being some expensive family Bibles assigned to the new Depository, which were purchased by order of the Committee when times were good.

On the 6th December last, the following members of the Sub-Committee, viz.: Mr. J. W. Scott, the Corresponding Secretary, and the Convener, proceeded to Drumbo with the books assigned to the new Depository. Their first object was to secure the coöperation of Mr. Landon, who very kindly and cordially tendered his services in finding out a suitable place for the object we had in view. We soon succeeded in engaging Mr. James McKenzie, Postmaster, Drumbo, to take charge of the books; he has placed them in a prominent part of his store, and given to the Sub-Committee a receipt which is herewith produced.

Further, the Sub-Committee have found it necessary to make a trifling reduction in the price of some books that have been long in the Depository, in order to facilitate the sale of them, and in others that were very expensive. Again, the Sub-Committee would suggest the propriety and importance of employing some means to inform the public that we have Bible Depositories; in other places, sign-boards, with the words "Bible Depository," are put up

over the places where the Bibles are kept; the want of this is probably one reason why the sales are so few. The above is the Report of the Sub-Committee. The Committee adopted the foregoing Report. Circulars have been sent to eight ministers in the neighbourhood to attend this meeting, several of whom are now present, and a good meeting is confidently anticipated. All which is respectfully submitted.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PELHAM BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY FOR
THE YEAR ENDING 13TH SEPTEMBER, 1861.

In the order of a benign and well-directed Providence, the directors of the Pelham Branch Bible Society are permitted to present another yearly report. They have observed with much pleasure an increased demand for the Bible, thus giving good evidence of an increasing desire on the part of the people to know God's revealed will; and also forcibly reminding them that the work of disseminating the holy scriptures is not yet accomplished within the precincts of the society; and therefore lerve to their successors in office an interesting field of usefulness to enter upon.

An idea seems to prevail with some who contributed to the funds of the society last year, that it is a local enterprise, and its benefits should be confined to the locality in which the contributors reside. To all such your committee would respectfully say, they consider the society for which they have had the honour of acting, as a tributary to the great Parent Institution, just as the small stream taking its rise in the far distant mountains, contributes to the great river flowing majestically along in its course; so do they view this as an organization to aid the Parent Society in the great work in which it is engaged.

Only two instances of Bible destitution have come under the notice of the directors, those two were supplied gratuitously per order of Rev. Mr. McGlashan and R. D. Casselman, Esq.

On examination of the stock of Bibles on hand at the commencement of the year it was thought advisable to have it replenished; accordingly three dozen Bibles and one and a half dozen Testaments were ordered and received from the Depository at Toronto.

While we exceedingly regret the war now raging in the neighbouring republic, we feel thankful that peace is still maintained in our own country; and we do hope and pray that nothing so disastrous may befall the great nation to which we belong, but that England may long be spared to foster and encourage the British and Foreign Bible Society, and all kindred organizations, not only within her own borders but through the whole world until it shall be "filled with the knowledge of the glory of God." We would also gratefully acknowledge God's goodness in giving His revealed Will, that the holy precepts thereof are measureably interwoven in the laws of our land; that we live in the enjoyment of all those civil and religious liberties so essential to happiness and the untrammelled operation of every Godlike enterprise, and the prospects we have that such laws shall be enacted and administered as will secure to future generations even more fully the same blessings.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PETERBORO' BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Committee have much pleasure in presenting a report of their humble efforts to circulate the records of reclaiming love among their fellow men, and although the history of the Branch for the past year is not marked by any striking incidents, they feel that they have much cause for thankfulness for what they have been enabled to do, and for the harmony and good feeling which have characterised all their meetings.

Besides the work of Colportage which has been more fully entered into than in any previous year; your committee sent to the Parent Society as a free contribution the sum of £25, and appropriated £10 of the funds for the establishment of a Branch of this Depository at Lakefield, where the friends have always taken a deep interest in the cause and contributed most liberally.

In laying before you an account of their colportage operations, your committee deem the best mode that of giving a brief synopsis of the reports of your faithful colporteur Mr. John McDonald, when he from time to time has submitted gleanings therefrom, that which is the most interesting nature.

His first report for this year begins with Douro, which is mostly settled by Roman Catholics among whom he labored about a fortnight. In his first two journeys through that Township he was unable to sell any Bibles, they assigning as the chief reason that they were forbidden by the Priest to read them; he distributed some tracts amongst them which numbers of them took willingly, he was in general received very coldly some of them using very abusive language, and going so far as to threaten violence, with others he was permitted to hold religious conversation, and to read portions of scripture to them.

He gives a bitter account of the Roman Catholics of most of the other Townships he has visited, especially those in which they are scattered amongst protestants, they being more free to converse about the subject of religion; yet even amongst them great things have not been done as regards the circulation of the scriptures. He mentions staying all night with an intelligent Roman Catholic with whom he spent five or six hours conversing or arguing about the teachings of the church of Rome, the result of which was that his

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host purchased a Bible, and although evidently for the purpose of being better able to defend his religion; may we not hope that it may lead him to the Saviour of whom it testifies.

In passing through Emily on his way to Bobcaygeon, he visited some Roman Catholic families, with five of whom he left copies of the New Testament, stating that on his return he would call, and if they did not wish to keep them they might return them. One of them purchased, another would have done so but was unable, he left it with her; the others refused to keep them.

Altogether he has sold to Roman Catholics six copies, supplied six copies gratis.

He remarks that in general they have a great aversion to the Protestant Bible, while some ask for the Douay translation. He thinks that the books of the Religious Tract Society might be sold amongst them. Notwithstanding that it is not very encouraging to labor among this deceived portion of our fellow subjects, it is your committee's intention to persevere in their efforts, in the humble hope that even among them they shall reap if they faint not.

In passing through Fenelon he found several families destitute of Bibles, and of the means to purchase, whom he supplied gratis. In the North of this township he visited several lumber-shanties, in two of which he sold Bibles; he stayed a night in one of them, where he held worship evening and morning; he is sorry to state that the greater portion of this class whom he met with, have no regard for God or man, and are fearfully addicted to the habit of profane swearing. He explained to them the awfulness of this sin; some of them acknowledged it to be wrong, others apologized that they did not mean as bad as they spoke. He told them that such an apology would not be received by a just God, that the best apology would be to abstain from such practices, and flee to Jesus Christ for pardon and acceptance.

Mr. McDonald visited the back townships both in the Spring and in the Fall, your committee believing that to be a portion of the field which ought to be particularly cared for, both on account of the comparatively humble circumstances of the people, and the destitution of the means of grace amongst them; and likewise, because many new settlers are constantly going there, some of whom in their pursuit for the bread that perisheth neglect to labor for that which endureth to everlasting life.

Your Colporteur has been especially useful in establishing three Sabbath Schools in that locality, to each of which, at his recommendation, a grant of one dozen New Testaments were given. He has visited them since their establishment, and reports them to be in a prosperous condition, and likely to be productive of much good. He did not find great destitution of the Bible, and those who were destitute he supplied; he distributed and exchanged Tracts amongst them, which in general were appreciated very highly, they sometimes asking when he entered their houses if he had brought tracts with him. He states that some of the Roman Catholics there received them gladly.

In such destitute places Mr. McDonald makes it a rule when practicable, to read the Scriptures and pray with the people.

His last report gives an account of his tour in the townships of Asphodel, Dummer, Belmont and Marmora; the two former were well supplied. In the latter, Belmont and Marmora, the demand was greater, but the generality of the people are poor and unable to purchase; the really destitute he supplied gratis. With reference to the other townships, of which no mention has been made, such as Smith and Otonabee, the people were generally

well supplied with the scriptures, and most of them appeared to take an interest in the Society.

During the past year Mr. McDonald has been employed six months, in which he has visited over 1000 Protestant and 200 Roman Catholic families, sold over 400, and given gratis 31 copies.

The aggregate number issued by the Branch for the past year has been 967 copies; the amount collected \$170; this is less than the amount collected to same date last year, but it is expected the receipts will equal those of 1860 when all the collectors have given in their reports. The report presented at the last Anniversary of the Parent Society, is replete with interest, and contains abundant proofs of the blessing that accompanies its extensive labours to give the word of life to the nations, kingdoms, and tribes of the earth. But as we expect the respected Agent of the Society will, in his usual graphic style, give us the interesting details, your committee would conclude by expressing their conviction that we need a more lively faith in the great and solemn realities of our holy religion, more faith in God as the hearer of prayer, a devout wrestling with him at the throne of grace; more zeal in the great and good work, that we as a Branch may not only have to relate what we are doing, but what, through God's blessing, we are accomplishing for his glory in the salvation of our fellow men.

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ROCKWOOD BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

On presenting the fourth annual Report, we have the satisfaction of stating, that the sums reported by the Collectors exceed those of any previous year. We had anticipated a different result. Our yearly gathering having hitherto taken place late in the winter, we had unconsciously inferred that such must always be the case. Not anticipating so early a call, many, however willing, were unable to increase our funds; others considered the call premature, and would pay about the usual time. When asked to deviate from a beaten path, we are too ready to deem ourselves the victims of imposition; especially is

this the case in matters which do not affect our worldly interests, but appeal rather to our sympathy and benevolence.

A word of explanation is due with reference to a statement made by the Society's Agent, who visited us last year. In his published Report he says, in effect, that the remittance from the Rockwood Branch had fallen off more than one-half. This is literally true; but it is not the whole truth. The Agent had, doubtless, forgotten that the collections were in advance of those of any previous year. It is to be regretted, that a partial statement should be lightly made so disparaging to our zeal, and, in the opinion of some subscribers, affecting our probity also. A portion of the collected funds was reserved for the purchase of stock, believing we should as well subserve the interests of the Parent Society, by paying cash for a supply of Bibles, as by going in debt for them, and affecting to present our surplus funds to the Society.

Never, perhaps, was there a time when the British and Foreign Bible Society had a higher claim on our sympathies and exertions. Gigantic as is the scale of its operations, it is not an association for the attainment of political power or the increase of individual wealth; it is emphatically a benevolent society; and its beneficence knows no limits but the boundaries of the peopled world. The proudest triumphs of war—the grandest displays of national glory—pale before the higher glory of this moral power, which aims to introduce the revealed will of our Father in Heaven, into the dark places of the earth.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE STRATFORD BRANCH
BIBLE SOCIETY.

ADOPTED, 4th March, 1862.

It is a part of the duties of those charged with the management of the affairs of this Branch of the Bible Society, to submit to its members and supporters at the annual meeting, a report of the proceedings and operations of the committee during the year that is closing, together with some information respecting the progress of the Bible cause in general, as well as in our own immediate neighbourhood. Very little has been done during the year, to ascertain the extent to which the Scriptures may be possessed, within the limits of our practical operation. The proceedings of the Committee during the past year, are nearly all detailed under the head "Depository," having only had two successful meetings during the year; twice, although duly notified, a quorum was not present. Such a state of things manifests indifference on the part of many of those chosen and appointed to manage the affairs of our Society, which is much to be regretted; besides, such inattention is very discouraging to those who strive in a measure to do their duty, and on whom the labour all devolves. The Committee, in the discharge of their responsible office, should at least devote four evenings during the year to the consideration of the affairs of the Bible Society. The work is not altogether in distant lands; although we live in a Christian country, enjoying British freedom, we should not forget that there are people among us who do not possess, nor hear the Bible read any more than if they lived in Japan. Besides the injunction is, to begin the preaching of the Gospel at Jerusalem. Let each member of this Branch of the Bible Society annually avail himself of the happy privilege of supplying some neighbour or young person with a copy of the Scriptures, who may not be possessed of a copy of the sacred volume. We cannot tell how God might bless the gift. One thing is encouraging which we see in the list of contributions, that a large and unabated interest is still taken by the Christian people of this neighbourhood, in the glorious cause. We proceed to give some interesting particulars in detail, under their respective heads:

DEPOSITORY.

The Stock on hand at last annual meeting amounted to \$95 30; during the year a number of Bibles, for a special purpose, have been added, amounting

to \$7 90. The sales have been much larger than for some years past. Four members have applied for copies of the Scriptures, under the regulation allowing each member annually to receive copies, to the value of twenty-five cents, for gratuitous distribution. Two Bibles and two Testaments have thus been given to persons, we are informed, nominally Christians, but who had been previously without the Word of God in their possession. It having been observed that the Bible was not among the many books on the shelves of the Mechanics' Institute Library, a copy has therefore been presented to the Institute, with the request, that it should receive a place in the Library, and its title inserted in the catalogue. Four copies were presented to the Board of School Trustees, for the use of the several Teachers, in conducting the opening and closing exercises of each day; the receipt of these volumes the Board have acknowledged in their annual report of last year, and state that "these exercises have, since the 13th of May last, been regularly conducted and attended to with due respect and attention." It has, however, with sorrow been observed, since the inauguration of the Board for 1862, that a strong effort is being made to cause the discontinuance of these exercises, and thus suspend the reading of the Bible in our schools. The friends of Bible truth and Christian liberty should be deeply interested in this matter. It was determined to have one copy of the Bible left at the Union Station, where it might be perused by travellers and others there waiting the several trains, but owing to the inconvenient state of the premises, a suitable position for the volume has not been found, but will be left at the earliest opportunity.

The Committee of the Scarboro' Branch Bible Society beg to report that the operations of the Society during the past year have been as follows:—

The last annual meeting was held within the Scotch Church, on the 19th March, 1861; W. Paterson, Esq. in the chair.

The meeting having been opened with prayer, the Annual Report was read and adopted. Rev. J. Bain suggested, that whereas the notice of the meeting had been so short, and few of the subscriptions had been collected, it would be advisable to hold another meeting in the same place, on the 28th of March, to receive the remaining subscriptions and to appoint office-bearers for the current year. 3. It was also agreed that the Secretary take means to notify the collectors to have their contributions in readiness by the end of February at the latest.

Your committee would earnestly ask the co-operation of all who feel an interest in the diffusion of that glorious Gospel, which alone is sufficient to make men wise unto salvation.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WHITBY TOWN BRANCH BIBLE
SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR 1861.

Although the present Anniversary occurs some six weeks earlier than usual, and thus diminishes the time usually allotted for the full operation of this Branch Society, your Committee are grateful that they can meet the friends of this Institution with a cheering Report, which they hope may prove an encouragement and stimulus to more earnest effort.

To reflecting and Christian minds, it will generally be regarded as a privilege to be engaged in promoting the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, especially when it is done on a *Catholic* basis,—Christians of all denominations taking part in the glorious enterprise. All honour to the great Parent Society that thus binds in united action the avowed followers of the Lamb of every section of the Christian Church.

The spirit of scepticism and speculation, whether by the living voice or the press, may utter dark things concerning the oracles of God, so as to induce doubts and misgivings in the minds of some; but we rejoice in the conviction that the triumphs of Divine truth were never more conspicuous than at the present time, and that those triumphs will continue to multiply as the hosts of the living God band together in prayerful, liberal, and active service.

By means of the Funds raised by subscriptions and collections, we are enabled (after paying incidental expenses) to contribute, either to the British and Foreign Bible Society, to some Provincial Institution, or to our own immediate locality, and this we have done each year; and then by the sales at our Depository, and by occasional grants and donations, we have supplied the Scriptures to a considerable number, as our previous Reports intimate. For one season (1859) we employed a Colporteur, who canvassed the entire town, and supplied either by gifts or sales, but chiefly the latter, all who were disposed to receive the sacred Scriptures.

THE SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WILLIAMS BRANCH
BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Statement of the proceedings of this Society to the subscribers, and they feel assured that similar feelings will arise in the minds of all who sincerely desire the increased circulation of the Word of God.

Your committee have continued for a period of four months the system of colportage, which was commenced in 1860, and the tangible results are given as follows:—

Mr. Finlayson, who was again our agent, re-visited a considerable portion of the ground formerly traversed, and found not only that those copies of the Word of God which had been formerly sold appeared to have been read, but that an increased desire existed on the part of those who did not previously purchase, to possess the precious volume. He also visited portions of McGillivray and Stephen, which he had not been able to reach last year, and found abundant proofs that such visits were necessary. It is gratifying to learn that almost every vestige of opposition to such visits has disappeared, and that in most instances your agent is received in a friendly spirit. It appears also that in some few instances a serious impression has been made by his earnest expostulations with those who at first appeared careless and indifferent. We cannot, of course, pretend to estimate the amount of good that has been effected. Results belong alone to Him from whom came the precious gift we seek to distribute. It is our duty to work perseveringly and prayerfully. We have, however, this ground for rejoicing, that a large number of families have now in their possession that which, if rightly used, will bring light and truth to bear upon their daily duties, and we cannot but hope that good will result from this circumstance.

Mr. Finlayson visited during this year 1006 families, and sold or gave away, 250 Bibles and Testaments, of which twenty Testaments and one Bible were left with Roman Catholic families.

Your Committee, feeling the importance of colportage, have been in correspondence with several other Branch Societies, with the view of securing their co-operation in this work, and we have reason to hope that some united effort will be made, which will make the burden on this branch lighter, and at the same time secure a more thorough prosecution of the work.

During the summer a series of five public meetings was held in Williams and N. Gillivray, for the purpose of giving information as to the objects of this Society, and we hope that increased liberality of subscription will be the result.

Our subscription list this year is not quite as large as on a former occasion, but we believe this was chiefly owing to the late season of the year at which the collections were commenced, and the bad state of the roads, which made it impossible for the collectors to visit every portion of the ground allotted to them.

REPORT OF THE WEST PUSLINCH BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

In presenting their second annual report, your Committee have very little to notice which would be either useful or interesting to dwell upon. It must be manifest to all of you that the principal part of the work of this Society will always consist in raising funds to help in circulating the Scriptures, where there is a dearth of the Bread of Life. In our own quiet and peaceable locality there is no destitution of that kind, such as to demand any great effort to meet it. No doubt the fact that so large a number of Bibles have been sold here last year, proves that a depository was required even among us; but we cannot expect such a demand in any one year for the future. Your Committee will, however, see to it that there is a sufficiently large Stock at all times kept in your depository to meet local wants; for, as the Agent of the Bible Society so well remarked at the annual meeting last year, it cannot be

said that any family is supplied with the Word of God till every individual member of that family possesses a copy of the Scriptures for himself. But, as already observed, our main field of labour is not our own locality, but wherever our fellow-creatures are perishing for lack of knowledge, and wherever there is a scarcity of the Word of Life. Nor can we be said to have done our duty to this Society till we have reached the utmost limits of our ability in contributing towards circulating the Scriptures in the dark places of the earth. The British and Foreign Bible Society is a grand Missionary scheme, having for its aim the conversion of the whole world to God, and in as far as we discharge our duty to it, we are yielding obedience to the last command of our Saviour—"Go ye into all the earth and preach the Gospel to every creature."

It is painful to find a slight falling off in our funds for this year; at the same time, your Committee think that it may be accounted for in various ways, without the unpleasant conviction being forced upon us, that we are losing interest in the objects which the Society aims at. Your Committee cannot think that there is any lack of interest in any quarter within our bounds with regard to these matters. They earnestly hope, as they firmly believe, that this Branch will not in future be behind any of its equals in any part of this Province.

REPORT OF THE CLINTON BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, FOR THE
YEAR ENDING 26TH FEBRUARY, 1862.

Your Committee in presenting the Seventh Annual Report desire to express their profound gratitude to the All-wise disposer of events, as well for the mercies vouchsafed to our Society during the past year, as for the peace and prosperity with which our land has been favoured, and which enables us to renew our efforts with cheerful hopes for the promotion of the great work in which we are engaged.

While remarking that our receipts both from collections and from sales at the Depository, have been less than during the previous year, the Committee are not disposed to believe that the decrease has been caused by any diminution in the zeal and willingness of the community who have hitherto given our operations such a steady and generous support.

As regards the sales we are satisfied by careful inquiry that the decrease

is caused by the opening of two flourishing book stores in our Village, both of which have sold large numbers of Bibles during the past year. Your Committee consider this a gratifying fact, and are always sincerely glad to welcome all competitions in the good work. Adding the number of Bibles which have been sold at these stores to those from our Depository, we believe it will be found that more copies of the inspired Word have been distributed in this vicinity during the past year than at any former period of our Society's existence; and we may with satisfaction direct attention to the good effect produced by our Depository in keeping the prices of Bibles offered for sale down to the lowest rates.

But though our own district is now so well supplied, the Committee would express their earnest hope that there will be no slackening in our zeal or efforts for the support of this and the parent societies. It must be borne in mind that the object of the societies will not be accomplished until every human being on our globe who has capacity to read and understand the teachings of God's Holy Word, shall possess the book and be taught and induced to peruse it. Here is a work great and beneficent enough to call forth the energies and liberality of every Christian. And the committee trust that the coming year will show that our community is still animated with the same zeal for the promotion of this great cause which it has exhibited in previous years.

The following statement will show more particularly the financial condition of this Branch at the present time.

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ABSTRACT

OF

THE FIFTY-SEVENTH REPORT

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society,

1861.

ALTHOUGH the British and Foreign Bible Society has now completed its fifty-seventh year of useful labour, the necessity for its continued operations is in no wise diminished. The events developed during the past year, especially in Continental Europe, and the events which now impend, present features and circumstances which awaken the hope that a wider range of action than ever will soon be available, and that the Bible will be borne by your Society into lands from which hitherto it has been jealously and systematically excluded. Moreover, the bold and daring speculations which have sprung up in our own country, and which are seeking to shake to the very foundation the doctrine of inspiration, and to impair national faith and reverence for our precious Bible, may convince us that there is some advantage for truth in having a Society established in our midst, which, in itself, is a standing homage to the supremacy and authority of Divine revelation.

Long has it been the privilege of your Committee to render their Annual Report with a preface of joyful thanksgiving; nor is the present less fitted than former occasions to inspire sentiments of praise in review of what has been accomplished.

FRANCE.—The year just closed has had its peculiar features and its peculiar success, and is declared by your excellent Agent, M. de Pressensé, to have been a season of great encouragement, and fraught

with direct results such as it has rarely been his privilege to announce. The deep conviction implanted in the minds of many, that the days of the Papacy are numbered, and fast running out, has predisposed them to a candid and favourable consideration of that volume which Protestants accept and honour as the only authoritative rule of faith and practice. Under the influence of those and other circumstances, the circulation of the Scriptures in France exhibits an increase over the issues of the previous year, and presents a total of 87,199 copies. The total circulation effected in France by your Agency, to the present period, amounts to 4,668,103 copies, seven-eighths of which have passed into the hands of Roman Catholics.

BELGIUM.—There are few countries on the continent of Europe where Protestantism has made such marked progress within the last twenty-five years as Belgium; and the connection of Bible circulation, as a moving cause, with this gratifying state of things has been too often mentioned in these Reports to require any additional explanation.

The past year has had its average amount of success; and, notwithstanding every difficulty, 9311 copies have been dispersed amongst the people, and the aggregate issues in Belgium now amount to 261,095 copies.

HOLLAND.—The operations of the Society in Holland have been conducted in the same earnest and judicious spirit as heretofore. The prevalence of the rationalistic leaven amongst professed Protestants, and the unmitigated hostility of the Romish hierarchy to the diffusion of the Scriptures, render the mission of your Society one of vast importance as well as of Christian obligation: it is therefore gratifying to be able to state that the circulation of the year has been carried to a higher point than usual, the issues through sales at the Dépôt, free grants, and the labours of Colporteurs amounting to 25,223 copies.

COLOGNE.—It is with unfeigned regret that your Committee have to announce the somewhat sudden decease of their respected Agent at Cologne, Mr. N. B. Millard. After a brief but severe attack of nervous rheumatic fever, he departed this life on Sunday, March 10th, leaving a deeply afflicted widow and three children to survive him. How the Society and its work fondly lingered in his thoughts when quitting the sphere of earthly labour, may be inferred from the fact, that one of the last audible utterances of his lips was, "God bless the Bible Society."

The circulation of the Scriptures effected within the limits of the Cologne Agency during the year, reached a total of 91,521 copies.

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FRANKFORT.—The operations of your Agent at Frankfort, the Rev. G. P. Davies, have not been marked by any special circumstances. The area assigned to the Agency has been enlarged by the addition of the French-speaking Cantons of Switzerland, so that now the whole of that country is placed under the supervision of Mr. Davies. The circulation of Scriptures from Frankfort has been very large, amounting in the year to 97,016 copies.

BERLIN.—Your Committee are happy to report on the continued efficiency of the Berlin Agency. That a circulation of 151,326 volumes has been secured in connection with this one section of the German field, is a fact which must be viewed with interest and gratitude.

The efforts of past years to obtain a recognised position in Austria are familiar to most friends of the Society. The commencement of an Agency at Vienna in 1850, and the subsequent arbitrary expulsion of Mr. Millard, under the direction of the authorities, were fully explained at the time. A most promising sphere of labour was peremptorily closed, and the Austrian Government assumed the attitude of determined hostility to the free circulation of the Scriptures, even amongst her Protestant subjects. It is now a subject for devout congratulation, that the police regulations which prevented the introduction of the Scriptures into the Austrian dominions are absolutely rescinded, and the Bible may now freely enter those territories whence it has hitherto been so unwisely banished.

DENMARK.—Hitherto the circulation of the Scriptures by this Society has been confined to the New Testament. As a step in advance, the Psalms have been printed, by permission of the authorities during the past year, to be sold separately, or appended to the New Testament.

The Report of the Agency at Copenhagen says, that 6989 copies of the New Testament were issued on behalf of the Society in 1860.

NORWAY.—The issues of Scriptures from the Dépôts at Christiania, Christianssand, Stavanger, Bergen, Dronthem, and Tromsøe have comprised 16,581 copies.

SWEDEN.—The Agency at Stockholm have sought to fulfil both the wishes and the hopes of the Committee. Nor has the effort been in vain; for while the word of God has been borne to the poor and wretched dwellings of the destitute, to the sick-bed of the sufferer, to the cell of the degraded criminal, and offered far and wide in the busy town and at the wayside hut through the land, such a blessing has accompanied these endeavours to render the Bible the common

property of all classes, that the vast circulation of 89,629 copies has been secured, exceeding the issues of the previous year, when the work had reached a point beyond which progress was scarcely anticipated.

RUSSIA—ST. PETERSBURG.—Events of deep significance, both political and ecclesiastical, have taken place in Russia, which cannot fail to have an important influence on the future dissemination of Divine truth.

The friends of the Society will be happy to hear of the activity and energy now displayed, by the Synod of the Greek Church, in preparing and publishing a new translation of the Bible into Modern Russ. It is understood that the whole of the translation is already completed, but as yet only the four Gospels have been issued. Of these, probably not fewer than 200,000 copies have been circulated.

In connection with your own Agency at St. Petersburg, 17,250 copies were issued during the year 1860.

ODESSA.—It is but a discouraging and depressing account that Mr. Melville is able to furnish of operations in Southern Russia during the past year; and the issues actually reported have sunk to a point unusually low, amounting to no more than 3873 copies.

SPAIN.—Various grants of Spanish Scriptures have again been made to correspondents who have available means for their distribution.

The committee have the satisfaction of stating that the entire Bible, according to the translation of Valera, is now printed, and will be ready for immediate circulation.

The Auxiliary at Gibraltar continues to employ such modes of circulation as are practicable, and, by a visitation of vessels frequenting the bay, many persons are induced to purchase the Scriptures.

ITALY.—Before dwelling on the incidents and success which have attended Bible circulation in this country, it may be stated that Lieutenant Graydon has resigned his Agency.

The Committee believe they have found a suitable successor in Mr. T. Bruce, who has resided for many years at Leghorn, and was previously well known to them by correspondence, and by such efforts as were practicable for the circulation of the Scripture in Tuscany.

Mr. Bruce entered upon his duties in September last, and has visited the principal parts of his Italian field. Henceforth, Switzer-

land will be entirely severed from the district of the Agent having charge of Italy, and be incorporated with the Frankfort Agency; and Malta and Italy will be united and placed under the control of a single Agent.

TURIN.—The usual modes of action have been here maintained, securing a circulation for the year of 4098 copies.

An event of considerable significance in its bearing on liberty of religious thought and action, as well as the circulation of the Bible, has taken place at Turin during the year. Hitherto the Scriptures circulated in Italy have been imported into the country, not *printed* there, inasmuch as the law of Sardinia forbade the printing of the Bible, without the previous concurrence and sanction of the Romish Archbishop. Such a condition was a practical interdict against the printing of the Scriptures on the part of Protestants. The Vaudois Church wisely judged that the time had arrived when the Government would be disinclined to apply and enforce the existing enactment; and consequently, a few months ago, an edition of 2000 copies of Diodati's Testament was passed through the press at Turin. As the Sardinian Government has abstained from all interference, and so allowed its own law to be regarded as obsolete in its application, it is presumed that henceforth the printing press will be free throughout the country, for the production of God's word to any extent that may be required by the enlargement of the work.

NICE.—This place now ceases to be a portion of the Italian district, and will be added to the Agency of M. de Pressensé. Arrangements have been made for the duties of the Depot, and 1137 copies of the Scriptures have gone forth through various channels.

GENOA.—The same active measures as before are adopted by Mr. Betti for the circulation of the Scriptures, and 7646 copies have been disposed of over a large extent of country.

BOLOGNA.—Some Scriptures have been circulated here, and increased success is confidently anticipated. Colporteurs have laboured in the vicinity, and one has been employed in Bologna itself.

LEGHORN.—Operations here have issued in a circulation of 3438 copies.

FLORENCE.—Your Committee are thankful to state that, during the year, nearly 8000 copies of the Sacred Volume have been issued from the Depot at Florence. Colporteurs traverse the city without molestation, and sometimes in the private dwelling, and sometimes in the public thoroughfare, find ample success to encourage their labours.

NAPLES.—The entrance of the Scriptures into this far-famed city,

was an event long to be remembered, and full of deepest interest. The eager throngs that gathered around the Bible stall in the crowded "Toledo," gave audible expression to the joy they felt, that some gleam of religious liberty had at length dawned upon their unhappy country; and the avidity with which the Sacred Volume was purchased proved the intense eagerness of multitudes to possess that heavenly treasure which had been so long withheld from them.

By the close of 1860, although the period of action had been comparatively short, 4438 copies had been sold at Naples; and the demand still continues, if not with augmented eagerness, yet with gratifying steadiness.

SICILY.—When the tide of revolution passed from Central Italy to Sicily, your late Agent, Lieut. Graydon, proceeded to Palermo, and began to arrange his plans for opening a sale of the Scriptures.

At a latter period Mr. Bruce visited the island, and now that a more orderly state of things prevails, and the people begin to realize the fact of their liberty, prospects of success are brighter. Nearly 700 copies had been sold in Sicily by the end of December.

Colporteurs are now at work, by whose agency, and by the opening of Depots in the principal towns, the Scriptures will be widely available in this thickly-peopled but fearfully degraded island.

The Committee are deeply grateful that they have been enabled, through the agency of the Society, to disperse 30,000 copies of the Scriptures in Italy during the past year, and to send forth at least thirty Colporteurs, who have traversed the land with a cheap and open Bible.

MALTA.—By a fresh geographical division of the work of the Society, it is proposed to curtail the range of the Malta operations. Greece will be appended to the Turkish Agency; Northern Africa, Egypt, and Syria will remain attached to Malta, and draw their supplies of Scriptures thence; but the Agency will now be incorporated with that for Italy, and be placed under the responsible control of Mr. T. Bruce. The Rev. I. Lowndes retires from his post of labour, and returns to England after a period of useful service in a work very dear to his heart.

In closing his connection with the work of the Society at Malta, Mr. Lowndes surveys the operations of the past year, and is able to report a circulation, amounting, in the whole, to nearly 14,000 copies.

GREECE.—The operations of the Society in Greece present an improved aspect as compared with former years. The newly-appoint-

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ed Depository, Dr. Kalopothakes, is endeavouring by various means to extend the circulation of the Scriptures, and the issues for the past year have been 3293 copies.

EGYPT.—The circulation of the Scriptures in this country is unusually promising; it is effected almost exclusively by sale, and very much amongst the Mussulman population. There are open Depots at Cairo and Alexandria, eligibly situated in leading thoroughfares, and much is done to aid the good work by Christian friends who visit the Nile in search of health.

TURKEY.—Last year's Report announced the decease of Mr. B. Barker, who had for a long period directed the operations of the Society in Turkey. The Committee have been guided to the selection of a successor well competent to assume the responsible position of your representative at Constantinople. The Rev. A. Thomson, who has entered upon the duties of the office, has resided for seventeen years in the Turkish capital, as a Missionary of the Free Church of Scotland to the Jews, and, during that period has had ample opportunities of becoming intimately acquainted with the operations of your Society in the East.

An able and satisfactory report of the Agency for the past year has been supplied by Mr. Thomson, from which it appears that the copies circulated have reached a gratifying total of 20,847, and have been widely dispersed.

Bulgaria has received the most ample supply, amounting to 8538 copies.

The issue of Turkish Scriptures has been threefold the number disposed of during the preceding year, exciting the hope that divine truth is gradually, though silently, making its way amongst Mohammedans, many of whom confidently anticipate the eclipse of their own faith, and the ultimate supremacy of Christianity.

INDIA.—It would afford your Committee unfeigned delight, could they depict in more glowing colours the operations of the Society in India. With a population so vast and so varied as that included within the limits of British India, the combined circulation of Scriptures, effected by all the Auxiliaries, amounts to little more than the comparatively insignificant number of 108,000 copies. Yet are the Committee assured that no indifference or inactivity, in relation to the work, can for a moment be alleged against those who administer the affairs of the affiliated Societies. Difficulties, however, of a serious character are to be combated and overcome, in endeavouring to secure a wider range of action for your Society. The neutral attitude still assumed by the Government in reference to the diffusion

of the Gospel; the deep-rooted aversion of the natives to a religion which puts its interdict upon the indulgence of their depraved lusts and passions; the implacable resentment towards Christianity which burns in the heart of the proud Mussulman; the utter inability of the great masses of India's population to read; the paucity of qualified labourers to go forth and scatter the seed of truth;—these and other untoward circumstances cannot fail to present formidable barriers in the way of all efforts for circulating the Bible.

CALCUTTA.—The Calcutta Auxiliary has recently celebrated its Jubilee, having been the first of the affiliated Societies planted in British India. During the half century of this Auxiliary's existence many important plans have been adopted for the translation and dissemination of the Scriptures, issuing in the circulation of more than a million of copies.

The total circulation of the past year is stated to have been 28,485 copies.

NORTH INDIA.—**ALLAHABAD.**—The long and painful period of inaction imposed upon the North-India Auxiliary has now happily passed away, and the day of labour has again returned. Furnished with an ample supply of God's word in the vernaculars of the surrounding population, the Auxiliary has resumed the same active measures for the circulation of the Scriptures as were adopted before its zealous efforts were temporarily paralyzed.

MADRAS.—The operations of the Madras Auxiliary are assuming, from year to year, an aspect of greater magnitude and importance. Proofs are given that portions of the word of God, casually borne far beyond the limits of Missionary labour, are sometimes earnestly perused, and lead the mind to a just and believing appreciation of Christianity. From the valuable and interesting communications addressed to the Auxiliary by Missionaries labouring within the Madras Presidency, it is evident that the Scriptures are in greater demand amongst the natives than formerly; and the wise precaution, now frequently adopted, of requiring a small price for the copies distributed, tests how far the professed desire for the word of God is sincere.

The circulation of the Madras Auxiliary for the past, was nearly 20,000 copies beyond the issues of the preceding year. The total distribution, including the issues by colportage, amounted to 65,939 copies.

BOMBAY.—The Auxiliary Society at Bombay, the centre of Scripture supply for Western India, cannot report any great amount of progress in the operations it directs. A circulation of 1359 copies

amongst the ten millions speaking the Marathi language, and of 533 copies amongst the six millions employing the Gujerathi tongue, is a result as insignificant as it is depressing; and a total circulation of 4315 copies through the year indicates a range of action painfully limited when compared with the vastness of the field of labour.

CEYLON.—In the important island of Ceylon several Auxiliary Societies are in operation, placing, by their agency, the Scriptures of truth within the reach alike of heathen, papists, and Christian converts. In connection with the Depots at Colombo, Jaffna, and Kandy, 9514 copies have been circulated during the past year.

CHINA.—Christian hope again kindles for China. Resources and appliances for a great work in that populous empire have long been in a state of readiness, but the lack of opportunity has prevented that wide diffusion of the Holy Scriptures for which the contributions of British Christians have so amply provided.

SHANGHAE.—The issues at this place, though far below the ardent wishes of the Committee, are in advance of the number last reported, and amount for the year to 28,830 copies.

CANTON.—During the past year 6000 copies have been distributed with a considerable amount of care, for precautions were adopted to give copies to such persons only as appeared likely to read and understand the sacred contents.

HONG KONG.—The operations here, as elsewhere in China, have been limited. The issues amounted to 4385 copies.

AUSTRALIA.—The Committee have long entertained the desire to appoint a permanent resident Agent for the Australian colonies, whose time and energy should be wholly devoted to the periodical visitation of Auxiliary Societies. The subject has been matter of correspondence for a lengthened period, and the Committee, after anxious inquiry, have been led to appoint the Rev. J. K. Tucker, Incumbent of Holy Trinity, Northwich, to this important and responsible office.

SYDNEY.—The forty-fourth Report of the New South Wales Auxiliary dwells upon the recent commercial depression of the Colony as having checked, at least temporarily, the prosperity of the Auxiliary; but affirms that the object itself has lost none of its interest and importance in the estimation of the public. The circulation has been 3378 copies, making the total issues of the Auxiliary 744,418.

MAITLAND.—The receipts of the Hunter River Auxiliary exhibit a considerable increase; and the sum of 200*l.* has been remitted as a Free Contribution to the Parent Society.

VICTORIA.—Measures are still in progress for imparting greater efficiency to the Victoria Auxiliary at Melbourne. The visitation of Branch Societies is being more systematically provided for. The sum of 170*l.* 12*s.* 7*d.* has been received from the Auxiliary as Free Contribution. In addition to the foregoing remittance, 750*l.* has been paid for the purchase of Scriptures. The issues of Scriptures from Melbourne during the year have been 11,429 copies, showing an increase of 3974 on the issues of the previous year.

GEELONG.—The issues have been 1151 copies. The Auxiliary at Geelong has now circulated 15,324 Bibles and Testaments.

ADELAIDE.—The South Australian Auxiliary does not deem all its mission fulfilled when providing an adequate supply of Scriptures for the whole Colony, and it has evinced its readiness to take part in the general schemes of the Parent Society by remitting a Free Contribution of 600*l.*, in addition to 250*l.* for the purchase of Scriptures.

The issues of the Auxiliary for the year comprised a total of 4788 copies, bringing the entire issues since the establishment of the Auxiliary to 40,055 copies.

TASMANIA.—HOBARTON.—The Report of the year states that the circulation of the Scriptures for the year had amounted to 1056 copies.

The Committee feel bound to make special mention of the unabated liberality of the Tasmania Auxiliary, 300*l.* having been appropriated during the year as a Free Contribution, together with 100*l.* toward the Special Fund for India.

Nor must reference be omitted to one generous friend at Hobart, Henry Hopkins, Esq., who has recently remitted a personal Contribution of 500*l.* towards the general operations of the Society.

LAUNCESTON.—The issues reported for the year were 612 copies, making the total since the establishment of the Auxiliary 18,443.

NEW ZEALAND—AUCKLAND.—It is but a brief record of Bible work in New Zealand which it is in the power of your Committee to supply. Yet is there, in the paucity of materials at command, assurance that many of the Maori race appreciate and love the Bible which they now possess in all its completeness, in their native tongue.

As an expression of gratitude for the Scriptures furnished by your Society, the Maoris at Archdeacon Maunsell's station have forwarded a Free Contribution of 12*l.* 13*s.* 8*d.*

There has been received from the Auckland Auxiliary the sum of

50*l.* as a Free Contribution, in addition to 70*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* in payment for Scriptures.

The Rev. R. Burrows, of the Church Missionary Society, has remitted 40*l.* 3*s.* 6*d.*, a concluding payment on the distribution of 5613 copies of the Maori Testament sent to New Zealand in 1852.

SOUTH-SEA ISLANDS.—TAHITI.—It has been for some time in contemplation to print a fresh edition of the Tahitian Bible, and great care has been expended upon the revision of the text. The Rev. A. Chisholm having returned to this country in the autumn of last year, bringing the revised text prepared for the press, the Directors of the London Missionary Society have requested your Committee to undertake the printing of an edition of 5000 copies in the paragraph form, with the Marginal References affixed.

SAMOA.—The London Missionary Society have also requested your Committee to sanction and bear the expense of printing the entire Bible in the Samoan, with the addition of Marginal References, &c.

Both the above requests have been complied with.

TONGA.—The Committee are happy to state, that the printing of the Tonguese Old Testament is proceeding satisfactorily, under the editorial superintendence of the Rev. Thomas West, Wesleyan Missionary.

SOUTH AFRICA.—The South-African Auxiliary is the centre of supply to a large district of country, over which numerous Branch Societies are formed, bringing the Scriptures within reach of a widely-scattered and mixed population, including natives as well as foreign settlers. The following extract supplies a brief epitome of the labours and results of the year—

“The number of books issued from the General Depository in Cape Town has been 961 English Bibles, and 887 English Testaments; 1861 Dutch Bibles, and 1924 Dutch Testaments; and 157 Bibles and Testaments in foreign languages; in all, 5780 volumes, being a circulation equal to that of any former year. The total receipts have been 1033*l.* 19*s.* 3½*d.*, viz: Free Contributions, 447*l.* 4*s.* 10*d.*; for the sale of Scriptures, 559*l.* 7*s.* 9*d.*; being somewhat in advance of any preceding year.”

GRAHAM'S TOWN.—The circulation effected in the course of the year amounted to 2362 copies, and the Auxiliary has remitted 375*l.* for the payment of Scriptures.

MOUNT COKE.—The Rev. J. W. Appleyard, who has devoted so much labour and zeal to the preparation of the Kafir translation, has returned to England with a revised copy of the entire Scriptures, for the purpose of carrying an edition through the press in the pa-

ragraph form, and with chapter-headings. At the request of the Wesleyan Missionary Society the Committee have undertaken to print 5000 copies: and it affords them great satisfaction to anticipate the speedy completion of a uniform Kafir Bible.

WEST AFRICA.—The Yoruba translation has been increased by the addition of the Epistles to the Corinthians, Galatians and Ephesians. At the request of the Church Missionary Society, your Committee have undertaken to print the above Epistles. It is hoped that the Yoruba translation will soon be so far advanced as to admit of printing the complete New Testament.

In the Ga or Accra translation, the following books of Scripture have been printed for the first time during the past year, or are now passing through the press: Exodus, Leviticus, the Psalms, and Proverbs.

In the Otji language, the book of Genesis, the Epistle to the Romans, and the General Epistles of John, are now being printed for the first time. Other parts are in the course of preparation.

At the request of the Church Missionary Society, the Committee have prepared an edition of the first seven chapters of St. Matthew in the Nupe, being the commencement of an entirely new translation in a language spoken over a vast extent of country.

SOUTH AMERICA.—The Agency of Mr. R. Corfield has been prosecuted through another year with great vigour, and the word of God has been borne by him to remote provinces in the interior of the country, across the Andes and down to the shores of the Pacific.

The immense extent of country traversed by Mr. Corfield, during the year, may be partially understood by tracing his steps from Buenos Ayres to Rosario, thence to Parana the capital of the Argentine Republic, Sa. Fé, Corrientes, Ascension, the capital of Paraguay and back to Rosario. Starting afresh from the same point your Agent then proceeds to Cordova, Tucuman, Santiago, Salta, across the Andes to the port of Cobija in Bolivia, thence by steamer to Valparaiso, taking another pass over the Andes, which enabled him to visit Mendoza, returning once more to Rosario and back to Buenos Ayres.

Men of various nationalities, French, Swiss, Italians, Germans, Hungarians, and Portuguese, were met and supplied with the Scriptures. At each place of importance some days were spent in the sale of the word of God, and in endeavouring favourably to influence the inhabitants, and to provide means for subsequent operations.

Mr. Corfield will now superintend the Society's work over the whole South-American continent, and during the present year will

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visit Peru, &c., for the purpose of taking up the operations which were opened by Mr. Duffield, whose Agency is closed.

WEST INDIES.—The Committee have had much correspondence with their Auxiliaries in Jamaica and the other West-India Islands. In almost every locality a greater interest is manifested in the general operations of the Society, and for many years there has not been so large a demand for the Scriptures, especially in Jamaica, where the revival influence has been widely felt.

UNITED STATES.—NEW YORK.—The Committee rejoice at the growing prosperity which marks the operations of the American Bible Society. The last Report announces an amount of income and circulation surpassing any point previously attained, giving assurance that in the Christian community there is no diminished veneration for the Holy Scriptures as the divinely appointed rule of faith and practice, nor failing zeal in the work of their dissemination. The issues were 753,772.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.—TORONTO.—The Upper Canada Auxiliary Bible Society can announce that its operations have resumed the vigour and comprehensiveness by which they were previously distinguished.

The circulation for the year was 27,037 copies. This shows an increase, as compared with the previous year, to the extent of 7,666 copies, and brings the entire circulation of the Auxiliary to the large total of 373,467.

The following sums have been received during the year which closed March 30th: Free Contribution 533*l* 18*s.* 9*d.*; Purchase Account, 1404*l.* 16*s.* 3*d.**

KINGSTON.—The renewal of Colportage has given an impetus to the issues of this Auxiliary, which have reached a total for the year of 3,290 copies.

MONTREAL.—The general operations of the Montreal Auxiliary are satisfactory and progressive. The issues have been 12,816, showing an increase, as compared with the previous year, of 1,300 copies, and bringing the total circulation of the Auxiliary to 247,984.

QUEBEC.—In reporting issues, the following remarks are presented :

“The entire number of copies issued is 1,187 which may appear insignificant for the extent of the field occupied ; but its peculiar nature would, under the existing state of things, preclude the hope of any very great progressive increase in the annual circulation. The entire issues of the Auxiliary to the present time are 21,320 copies.

* Since this date, further remittances have been received, comprising 550*l.* 17*s.* 3*d.* as Free Contribution, and 700*l.* on Purchase Account.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—ST. JOHN.—The Auxiliary for the Colony of New Brunswick continues to prosper. Free Contributions have been received from the Auxiliary and its Branches (inclusive of payments on account of legacies) amounting to 395*l.* 5*s.* ;* and 1474 copies of Scripture have been forwarded to St. John.

FREDERICTON.—The circulation effected by the Auxiliary for the past year was 1600 copies. A Colporteur materially aided the distribution, visiting, during the summer, 800 families scattered over a wide district, 45 of whom were found entirely destitute of the Scriptures.

NOVA SCOTIA.—HALIFAX.—The sum of 205*l.* 6*s.* 11*d.* has been received for the purchase of Scriptures, in addition to 200*l.* for General purposes. The Dépôt has been supplied with 2,506 copies.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—CHARLOTTE TOWN.—The Correspondence from the Auxiliary in this Island informs your Committee, that the issues for the year were 2068 copies, and of this number, 1060 had been sold through the zealous efforts of a Colporteur in the short space of fifteen weeks.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—ST. JOHN'S.—The circulation of the year was 1839 copies, making the total issues of the Auxiliary 18,903. The Parent Society has received 87*l.* 19*s.* 4*d.* in payment for supplies of Scriptures, and 182*l.* 0*s.* 8*d.* for General Purposes.

DOMESTIC.—The past year, no less than its predecessors, has witnessed the removal by death of some earnest and long-trying friends of the Society. The Bishops of Worcester and Madras, and Lord Lilford, whose names were on the list of Vice-Presidents, have finished their earthly course.

The following Prelates, on the invitation of your Committee, have signified the pleasure it affords them, to have their names placed on the list of Vice-Presidents of the Society:—The Right Reverends the Bishops of Carlisle, Rochester, Sierra Leone, Antigua, and Waiapu.

FUNDS.—The prosperous state of the finances is once more a subject for devout congratulation. The Receipts from ordinary sources have reached the sum of 167,164*l.* 6*s.* 7*d.* To this amount must be added 777*l.* 8*s.* for Special Funds, thus bringing the entire Receipts to a GRAND TOTAL of 167,941*l.* 14*s.* 7*d.*

A large increase is thus apparent as compared with the previous year, the excess on the total income being 3805*l.* 8*s.* 2*d.*, and on the ordinary income 5,143*l.* 13*s.* 2*d.*

* Further remittances, comprising 301*l.* 16*s.* 9*d.*, have been received since the accounts of the year were closed.

The sum applicable to the GENERAL PURPOSES of the Society is 84,254*l.* 11*s.* 4*d.*

The Receipts for the sale of Scriptures have produced the sum of 82,909*l.* 15*s.* 3*d.*

The EXPENDITURE of the Society has amounted to 165,462*l.* 12*s.* 2*d.* Omitting payments amounting to 5,646*l.* 5*s.* 1*d.*, made on behalf of the Jubilee, China, and India Funds, the ordinary expenditure has been 13,804*l.* 15*s.* 8*d.* below that of the preceding year, and is more than covered by the year's receipts.

ISSUES.—From the 1st of April, 1860, to the 30th March, 1861, the copies circulated have amounted to 1,787,398; being less by 130,499 than in the previous twelve months. Your Committee see no ground of discouragement in this circumstance, as special and exceptional causes contributed to swell the issues announced in the last Report.

The Issues of the Society now present a total of THIRTY-NINE MILLIONS, THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTEEN THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SIX COPIES.

The labours of the District Secretaries have been not less numerous and arduous in the past than in preceding years; and although difficulties have been occasionally encountered, and public attention is drawn to an infinite variety of religious and benevolent schemes, yet results, both in contribution for general objects, and the circulation of the Scriptures in all parts of the kingdom, may be accepted as sufficient proof of the growing appreciation and usefulness of the Society.

The Committee again solicit the attention of their friends and subscribers to that important class of Agents for circulating the Scriptures in the Metropolis, known under the familiar designation of "Bible Women." At the present time there are 152 of these agents employed. The Bible-Society has been, and continues to be, identified with this organization, as far as the circulation of the Scriptures is concerned, but no farther. During the past year the Bible Women in London disposed of many thousand copies of the Scriptures amongst classes which, to a very great extent, were beyond the reach of the ordinary means by which the Society is enabled to effect its work; and this circulation was attained, not by the easy method of gift, but by sale, the very poorest of the population being willing, when brought under kind and persuasive influence, to pay for the Bible or Testament by small weekly instalments.

SCOTLAND.—As in former years, grants of Scripture have been made to poor localities, under the direction of the Rev. W. Swan, of Edinburgh.

IRELAND—The HIBERNIAN BIBLE SOCIETY, while prosecuting its own distinctive work, continues to evince unabated interest in the operations of your larger and more comprehensive Society; and as another proof of earnest desire to have some share in the circulation of the Scriptures beyond the limited range which Ireland affords, has again remitted 500*l.* in aid of your funds for disseminating the Word of God in other lands.

THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL SOCIETY FOR IRELAND derives annually from your Society a large amount of gratuitous assistance; and the Committee have voted, during the year, in free grants, 16,500 Bibles and 13,000 Testaments, allowing at the same time the privilege of purchasing other samples at cost price.

CONCLUSION.—In whatever direction your Committee look, they see much to encourage—much to recompense past labour—much to incite to renewed energy and devotedness. They believe that the object of the Society is of unrivalled importance; that it meets a want the world over, which no other organization can supply. The Society is the Society of one Book; it draws together in loving concord those who, whatever their ecclesiastical diversities, have undoubted faith in the divine inspiration of the Scriptures, and believe that the Sacred Volume may be safely trusted anywhere and everywhere, inasmuch as the Divine Spirit is able to unfold its revelation of grace and mercy to the soul of the reader, even without the intervention of human instrumentality.

The Committee feel that it is incumbent upon them to infuse fresh life and activity into their labours, now that the Bible is challenged to substantiate its claims in a new struggle; and men who should stand in the foremost rank to assert and vindicate by voice and pen, the immutable authority of inspired truth, are girding on the armour of a vain philosophy, to prove that the Bible owes its sacredness to the weakness of superstition, rather than to the convictions of an enlightened faith. Your Committee must content themselves with the declaration of their solemn and unqualified adherence to the Divine inspiration and supreme authority of the Bible. Take these away, and the object of the Society would be stripped of every claim which now wins the sympathy and zeal of so many hearts. All the motive power which impels to this noble enterprise would be paralyzed; the grand point of agreement, which is felt to be stronger than a thousand minor diversities, would be at an end; and the Society would fall in pieces by a natural decay, and pass into oblivion. But a more worthy destiny awaits both the Book and the Society. The Bible has outlived many a bold and reckless assault; it has been unscathed by the arrows of sarcasm and the shafts of infidelity; one army of its assailants after another has passed away; and so will it
